If the present ratio of decrease, which has been fairly constant, continues, there will be 75,000 fewer Canadian immigrants to the United States for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, than during the preceding year.

Chairs were broken up and pleces thrown around the stage, the missiles being aimed at the officials, and more particularly the physicians who had delivered a snap examination that Schwartz had not been fouled by Durand in the seventh round of a scheduled ten-round title encounter.




