BUILDING HOMES FOR
AUSTRALIAN SOLDIERS

Adelaide, South Australia, June 4—
There will be many tributes in Australia to the gallantry of her soldiers. In Adelaide, at least three are already contemplated, including a large hall to be erected by the returned soldiers to their fallen comrades, and a monument the cost of which will be subscribed by the women.

However, the greatest tribute of all, perhaps, is the practical one of home building for the soldiers and their dependents. It is estimated that the cost to the Commonwealth to build the necessary houses will be between £50,000,000 and £60,000,000. South Australia alone intends to spend £5,000,000 to £6,000,000 on these homes. Although a large number of the men will settle on the land the great proportion will be domiciled again in the city and suburbs.

The state government is now considering an offer from a private contractor to




USE OF THE GREAT GUNS Paris, June 5-The most astonishing the sword into the plougshare is that of M. de la Baume Pluvinel, president of the French Astronomical Society. He be-lieves that the German "Berthas" or long-range guns of the type that was used to bombard Paris can be utilized to study the composition of the upper atmosphere.

His plan is to have the big cannon fire into the air special shells equipped with devices to register the density, temperature and pressure in the higher reaches of the air. Pointed vertically one of these guns would fire a shell 78,000 meters (nearly fifty miles) in 125 seconds, or about two minutes.

M. Duchesne, a naval artillery engineer, is studying the problem and experiments are expected soon.










