

The Empress of Ireland was a steel twin screw steamer of the latest tyue, fitted with electric light, wireless submarine signal systems. She was built in Glasgow in 1906 by the Fairfield Company. Her registered tonnage 14,191 gross, 9,775 under deck and 8,028 net. She had four decks and shelter deck and was 548.9 feet in length,

She was fitted with quadruple engines, of eight cylinders measuring in diameter 36, 52, 75 and 108 ctively, with a boiler pressure of 220 pounds. She was 3,168 normal horse power.
