THE MERCURY TOOK DROP OF 60 DEGREES Rain, Sleet, Snow, Windstorm And Freezing Weather In States

MANY LIVES LOST Property Damage is Millions of Dollars—Several People, Caught by Sudden Change, Are Frozen to Death—Montreal Catches it Severely, Too

(Canadian Press) New York, Nov. 13.—Nearly a score of deaths, a property loss of several million dollars, and much suffering and inconvenience resulted from a violent change of temperature, the preceding storms and the succeeding cold and snow that beset the central portion of the country, on Saturday and Sunday.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 13.—The north-south line of the storm, which swept over Oklahoma and Texas on Saturday afternoon and Sunday, cleared to allow the coldest weather for this date in twenty years. At Amulook, in the Texas panhandle, the thermometer showed about zero yesterday, breaking all previous records.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Following a mild and rainy storm yesterday afternoon and last night, more wintry weather set in today, with the temperature registering from ten to twelve degrees below the freezing point.

Train Wrecked Greenboro, N. C., Nov. 13.—The New York Atlanta and New Orleans Limited train on the Southern Railway, which left New York at 4.30 p. m. and Washington at 1.45 p. m., yesterday, has been wrecked near this place, one person is reported dead and several injured.

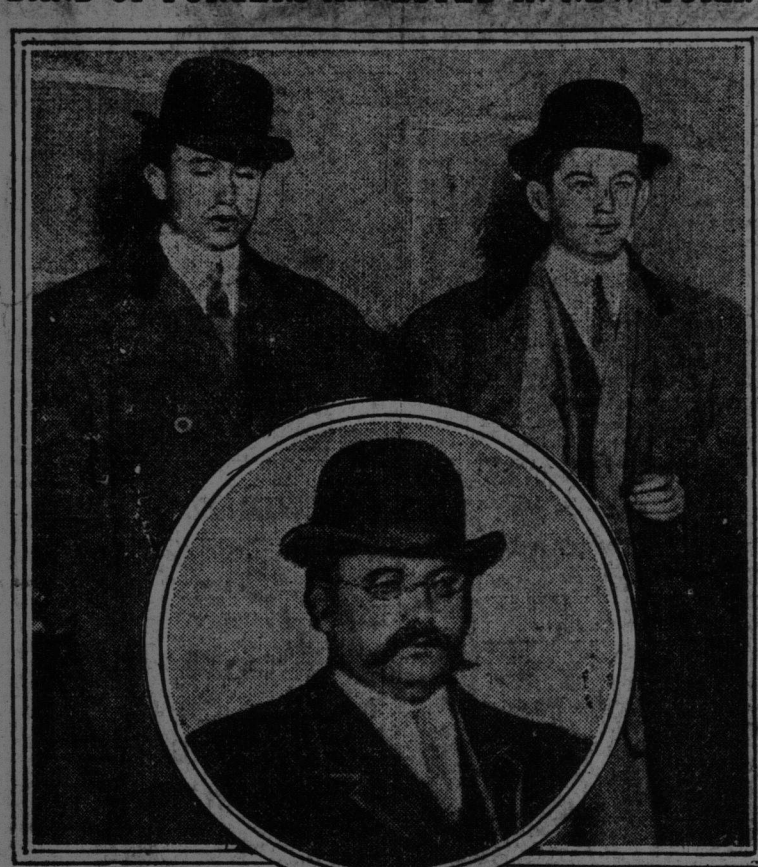

LADY GREY AND THE WOMEN OF CANADA



LADY GREY

The women of Canada are just like other women, said Lady Grey, in answer to the desire of an Englishwoman to know more of her Canadian sisters. But the touch which makes every woman of whatever country peculiarly the child of her own land was soon supplied by Lady Grey. The free winds of Canada began to blow at she talked, and the woman of the land emerged—an Englishwoman, practical, persevering, yet with something of American briskness, of American freedom.

"The women of Canada are more independent than those at home," said Lady Grey, "and they have less of the shyness which is characteristic of the Englishwoman. That is naturally so, for the children are brought up differently. From the time when they go to school they manage their own lives. They arrange how they shall spend their time and their money. They have their own parties and amusements quite independently of their parents. The young girl, for instance, will have a luncheon party without her mother being present at all."

"The Canadian girl given a good education," "Yes, I should say so. As soon as she has finished school, if her parents can in any way afford it, she is sent to Europe—to England, France or Germany—in order to study music and languages. "There is little opportunity yet for her to grow accomplished in Canada. Everything is beginning, but at present there is as much less good music than in England and there are few picture galleries. All the fine pictures are in private collections, particularly in Montreal.

"The Canadian girl has every opportunity for reading, however, for there are public libraries, too, and the University at Toronto. A very good education is given at the Agricultural College at St. Ann's, Bellevue, about twenty-eight miles from Montreal. "The girls are taught domestic science—cooking, laundrywork, housekeeping—and everything to do with agriculture, dairying, poultry farming, bee-keeping, and fruit growing. The college is a part of the McGill University, and when possible the men and women study in the same classes. Always at meal times the students meet together."

"Do these girls intend to become farmers?" "No, for I do not think women are able to take up homesteads by themselves under government in Canada; but many will marry settlers, and all are needed to help at home. The servant question has not yet been settled. When the servants will, at any moment, walk out of the house if they are not pleased, leaving the mistress in the lurch, it is necessary for the girls to know how to do things for themselves."

"English girls are still wanted, then, to help in the homes of Canada?" "Yes, particularly if they are well trained; but the right kind of girl most who should have a fixed determination to consider nothing degrading. She will drop into the place she wants later on, but she must make up her mind to adapt herself to the ways and needs of the country. It is no use for her to say: 'I never did things like this at home.' People imagine that gold can be picked up in Canada, but hard work has to come first. On the other hand, the girls are freer in Canada than in England. When the evening meal is finished the time is their own, and they may go out two or three times a week and nearly every Sunday. "It is, however, very dangerous for girls to come to Canada as they do, knowing nothing about the country, and very little of the situations to which they go. Something is being done in the matter of recruiting homes for girls arriving, but not nearly enough. There ought to be a chain of well-managed homes right across Canada. Only so will the conditions be right for emigration. The girls would then be properly placed, and committees of ladies would look after them when they left their situations. At present they may be lost sight of, and get into difficult positions."

"Work For Educated Women" "Educated girls coming to Canada need the same quality as the domestic servant. Adaptability is the keynote to success. It takes a clever girl to fill the position of home-help in a family, and not find herself in the way. "Have educated women begun to work in Canada out of the home?" "To a certain extent. There is a large number of nurses in Canada and in the States. These nurses are very highly educated both in Canada and in the States. Women go into the civil service also, they become school-teachers, typists, and stenographers. "But more women are needed in home-life than in England, for there are more opportunities of marriage. The married woman does a great deal of useful work for the community. Every hospital has a committee of women, which arranges banquets and working parties, in order to raise funds for its needs. "The Canadian National Council of Women and other societies stir up public opinion, and work for good laws for women and children. Women have also taken up the work of probation officers, and

La MARQUISE de FONTENOY

The New Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs—Sister of a Queen—Stricken With Apoplexy—A Russian Romance

Francis Dyke Acland, who has just been appointed under secretary of state for foreign affairs, and who, as such, will have to answer most frequently in the name of the British government in the House of Commons, questions about matters of foreign policy, is the eldest son and heir of the Right Hon. Arthur Acland, who was minister of education in the last Gladstone cabinet, in which he was a colleague with Herbert Asquith, and who was not included by the latter in his cabinet, nor yet in that formed by the late Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman. Arthur Acland declined a peerage, not so much because he resented the manner in which he had been treated, but because of the distribution of offices by Campbell-Bannerman and by Asquith, as owing to his reluctance to change his place of residence from the old baronetries, for one at the very tail end of the year.

The young man of Acland is one of the most ancient in Devon, and can be traced in the male line direct, by official records, and without any doubt, to a noble family of the name of Acland, who flourished at Acland, in the parish of Land Key, Devon, in the reign of King Henry II, 800 years ago. 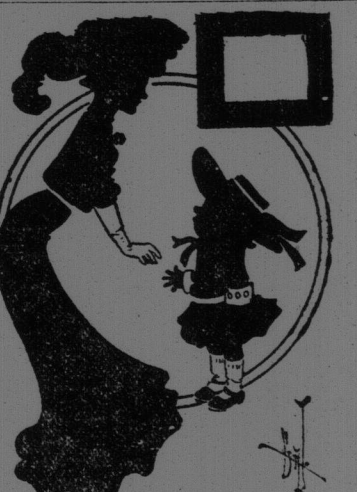

It is notorious that when one falls among a strange community there are no inflexible signs by which one may separate the elect from the throng. Women novelists especially, who are the most reckless class of snobs, delight in making do the most outlandish circumstances.

How terrible for the snob to contemplate that the superiority he adores is not as evident as the cresting hills and yet for some reason his snobbery is perfectly so. To be a gentleman is to be a compound of natural refinement and culture, with innumerable nuances of thought and feeling that cannot be analysed in a word or a work of art from the studio of nature.

Little snobs have bigger snobs upon their backs to bite 'em. And bigger snobs have other snobs, and so on, ad infinitum. Intellectual snobs have written a good part of English literature. Often snobbery comes from genuine ambition and an imagination lifting itself out of its ordinary surroundings.

Snobbery, ugly everywhere, is doubly ugly in a new country where qualities of personal achievement should count so much and another experiment in human society is possible. In an old country there is a great tradition of aims and graces for those of little faith to follow, and indeed all may follow them profitably.

Here in Canada neither hobbles skirts from England nor cuspidors from the United States are necessary to our social development. Travel leaves on every man who has employed it sanely, some trace of the civilization he has encountered. If he is a snob he will emphasize it, though a travelled man is rarely a snob.

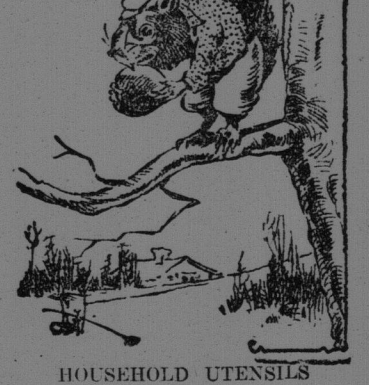

HOUSEHOLD UTENSILS A Nut-Cracker.



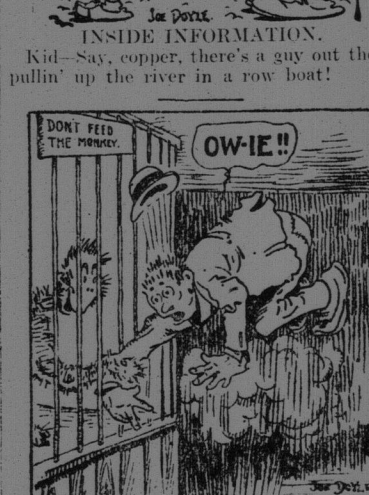

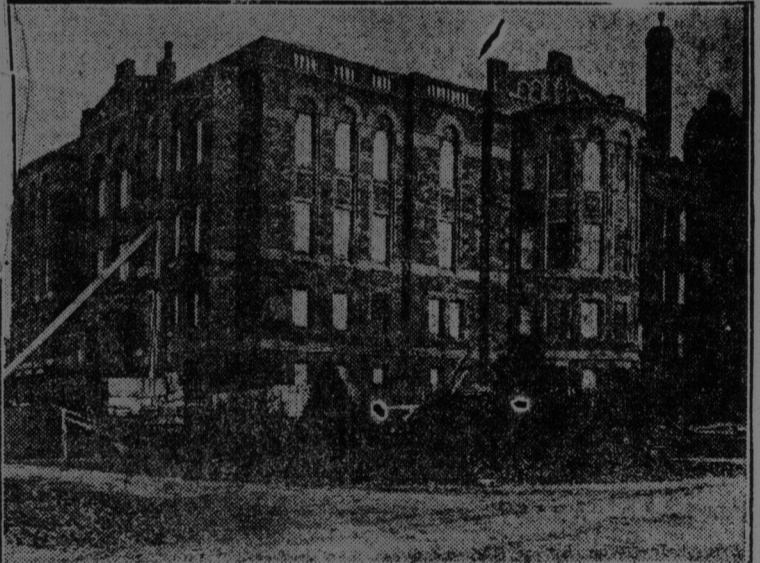

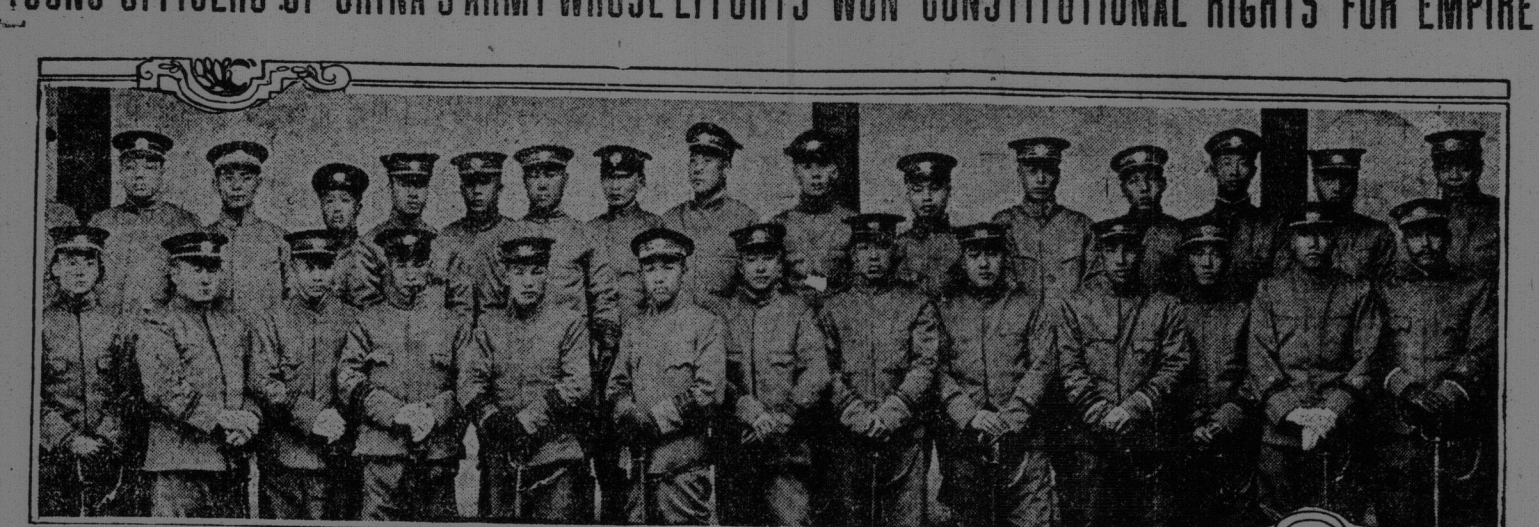

FIVE MILLIONS FOR LAND IN PORTLAND

Boston & Maine Stockholders Vote Large Sum for Terminal Facilities

In voting to expend \$5,000,000 for additional land at the Portland terminal, the stockholders of the Boston & Maine railroad at a special meeting in Boston last week, learned many other interesting facts relative to the company.

The stockholders authorized the Boston & Maine to act jointly with the Maine Central railroad in guaranteeing the payment of the principal and interest of the Portland Terminal Company bonds.

In reply to an inquiry from one of the stockholders, President Mellen said that the building of the projected Boston & Eastern railroad from Beverly to Boston, might hurt the Boston & Maine railroad.

President Mellen estimated the floating debt of the Boston & Maine railroad at between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000. He said before July 1, 1912, the company must have \$10,000,000 to pay this debt and to provide for improvements as the Boston & Maine must keep in the same position as the Maine Central.

Every time that the Maine Central in the Boston & Maine must reach into its treasury and pay 51 per cent of the Boston & Maine stock which it owns.

In conclusion, Mr. Mellen said: "I expect at the next annual meeting of the stockholders, to have a much better statement, as we intend to keep expenses down."

SUNDAY TEMPERANCE TALKS

Rev. M. F. McCutcheon at the Every Day Club — Rev. Dr. Flanders in Centenary

The Every Day Club was crowded last evening to hear Rev. M. F. McCutcheon discuss intemperance as the cause of other social evils. Charles S. Humbert presided and spoke largely on the work of the club.

The music included a concert song sung with fine effect by David Higgins. The following is a summary of Mr. McCutcheon's address.

The relation of intemperance to other social evils has been scientifically investigated only in comparatively recent years, and therefore the earlier results are not to be relied upon. The problem is complicated because the fact that intemperance is both a cause and an effect.

While it is often traceable as the cause of social evils there are also cases where it is the effect of other evils and men are driven to drink by reason of pauperism, disagreeable family life, or some other evil.

The bias of those making investigations is also liable to affect the conclusions reached. When a given system of investigation is pursued the difficulty of obtaining accurate statistics is a two-fold one: the difficulty of obtaining accurate statements of facts from those affected and of their relatives, and secondly, that of securing a given method uniformly applied by different individuals or institutions.

The statistics here given are the result of the most thorough and recent investigations of the subject. In so far as drunkenness is in itself an offense which renders one committing himself to arrest, sentence and imprisonment, the percentage such arrests, sentences and commitments to prison are of the total number can be ascertained, and these percentages are almost everywhere startlingly high, generally over fifty.

**DEATH OF WM. FILDEN**  
The body of William Filden was brought to the city this morning on the Boston train for burial in the Anderson lot at Fernhill, and the funeral took place from the depot, with Rev. S. G. McKay of Coburg street church, officiating. His death took place on Saturday at his home in west Brookline street, Boston, in his seventy-first year. Mr. Filden, who was a native of Blackburn, England, had been superintendent of a large cotton mill outside Boston for several years, and had many friends here as in St. John. His wife, who survives him, was Miss Louise Anderson, of Coburg street, St. John, and she and her sister accompanied the body this morning to the city. He is survived, besides his wife, by two sons, Seymour and William, and one grandson.

**COLD WEATHER IS PREDICTED**

Drop of Twenty Five Degrees in Twelve Hours—Wind Last Night Had 50 Mile Velocity

If the weather man says right, you had better rearsure your furs and winter garments, for he has predicted clearer and much colder weather for us after yesterday's storm. The rain-fall yesterday and early this morning amounted to only two-tenths of an inch. The wind, however, during the night blew a gale, reaching a velocity of fifty miles an hour between four and half-past five o'clock this morning. Practically all night long the wind howled and whistled and signboards and fences throughout the city were laid low. It started blowing from the southeast, but changed to southwest and then to north-west. At midnight the thermometer registered fifty-six degrees, but at noon today it had dropped to thirty-three degrees, making a decline of twenty-three degrees in twelve hours. The wind at noon was blowing strongly from the northwest.

**SEES GOOD SEASON ON THE INTERCOLONIAL**

Mr. Tiffin Says the Grain Contracts Already Exceed the Whole of Last Winter's

E. Tiffin, of the I. C. R. board of commissioners, arrived in the city yesterday and left for his home in Moncton on the noon train today. In conversation with a Times reporter Mr. Tiffin said that the prospects were exceedingly bright for a record business on the I. C. R. this winter. "We have already contracted to ship one million and a quarter bushels of grain through the port of St. John during the season, and we expect to have considerably more than this before the season closes. The contracts so far express our entire shipment through this port last season, so you see we will be kept quite busy."

"At the present time we are a little short of freight cars, but we expect to be able to overcome this difficulty before the rush starts. The ships at Moncton are all going full blast, and every department of the road expects to have an exceptionally busy winter."

**PILOT CENSURED**

Report on the Grounding of the Lake Champlain in St. Lawrence

Quebec, Que., Nov. 13.—Capt. L. A. Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner, after an investigation into the recent grounding of the steamer Lake Champlain, just off the levee in Montreal, has censured Albert Gagnon, the pilot.

Although the court held that he had exercised commendable precaution in dropping anchor, he committed an error of judgment in not more precisely deciding his position.

**BAPTIST WOMEN'S WORK FOR MISSIONS**

Miss Flora Clarke, returned missionary from Bimlipattan, India, reported that she was much pleased with the result of her efforts in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, where she had instituted several new societies. Particularly in P. E. Island the work was going along well.
