

The fact of the matter is that Grosbois, a grand old place, built of brick and stone in 1690 by Samuel Bernard, and surrounded by a superb park, full of majestwittees, was confiscated by the Revolutionary Government in 1793, put up for auction, and purchaser by the Dictator Barras. Barras sold it to General Moreau When the latter was argested in connection with his alleged complicity in the Cadoudal conspiracy against the life of Napoleon, and eventually released, on the condition of his leaving the country, he transferred his Grosbois property to his mother in-law, Mmer Hulet, who sold it to Fouche', Duke of Otrante, and minister of police. It was from him that Marshal Berthier purchased it for a sum of million francs, although it is worth today at least five times that amount. He has two sisters; one of them married to Prince Jacques de Broglie, son of that Princess Amedee de Broglie, son of that Princess Amedee de Broglie who was Marie Say, heiress of the French sugar king; while a brother of Jacques de Broglie is that Prince Robert de Broglie whose unsavory performances in the United States contributed so much to bring discredit upon his historic name.







The work of plotting the Black river surveys, plotting Seven Islands surveys, completing a general map of the St. John river, plotting, rating curves and guage readings and computing discharge measurement is now done. A small office force has been engaged on this work, and the work that remains to be done is heim hurried along as fast as possible under the direction of M. H. Ranney, chief engineer in charge of the field work. It is expected that the engineering work will be completed within the next four months.

A party has been in the field making a survey, for a reservoir site on the main river at Seven Islands.

Data-from the various stations on the river where the discharge of the water is being recorded is taken, at regular intervals in order to obtain measurements of discharge covering the necessary range from high to low water.

In addition to field and office work which is in progress, there has been some work done on the St. John and, its branches above Seven Islands. This section of the river is very important regarding lumber operations and log driving conditions, and the engineers are securing definite in form.





HON. DR. PUGSLEY IS COMING TO ST. JOHN

Minister of Public Works to Visit All New Brunswick Constituencies-Better Train Service in Albert County

Ottawa, July 31—"As soon as I can leave Ottawa, and this will not be for a few days yet," said Hon. Dr. Pugsley to your correspondent tonight, "I shall visit my constituency and the others in New Brunswick and arrange for the holding of

your correspondent tonight, I shall visit my constituency and the others in New Brunswick and arrange for the holding of a series of meetings.

"In regard to the issues of the campaign now opening, I can hardly add to the excellent and convincing address which the prime minister has issued to the Canadian people. He has made it perfectly plain that the sole issue before the electors is whether we should vote in favor of accepting the offer of the United States to give to us better trade relations as far as natural products are concerned, a boon which our leading public men on both sides of politics have been seeking in vain for nearly half a century.

"This is the issue which is right up to the Canadian people, and as Sir Wilfrid puts it so clearly, it is for the electors to say whether they will accept or reject. We welcome the fight on this issue and confide in the good judgment of the electors of Canada to cast their votes in its favor by an overwhelming majority. I hope to be able to leave for New Brunswick the last of the week."

Dr. McAlister, member for Kings-Albert, who is still in Ottawa, interviewed the ministers of railways and public works today in regard to conditions on the Salisbury & Albert Railway, which is not being operated between Hilbsboro and Albert.

He has strongly urged that pending the passing of legislation for taking over the various branch lines of the Intercolonial, pursuant to the announced policy of the government, and for which object a measure was introduced into the house, the question of the branch line in Albert county should be immediately dealt with, that the people of the section of the country may obtain relief from the great inconvenience they are now suffering through a portion of the line being closed. 


