


The first two were promised consideration and Mr. Connors was given to understand that his request would be granted.



K. Cornwall, forestry superintendent, who declares it is the worst fire in the last 25 years. The blaze originated on the headquarters of a creek where beaver hunters had established a camp. Virtually the entire beaver country has been destroyed. It will be necessary to stop beaver trapping for the next five years. The loss of timber already has mounted into millions.





The dry leaves of the kukui, or candlenut tree, were wrapped around bananas to hasten their ripening, and effected in three days what would usually require a week's time. Fish were enclosed in them as a protection in cooking rather than for flavor, for which the ti leaf was used. Dry kukui leaves served for polishing woodwork and decayed leaves for fertilizer. The leaves of the papala, which were deeply lobed, were safd to render meat tender when wrapped in them overder when wrapped in them over-

The long, linear leaves of the lauhala, commonly called the hala, had a special value with the Hawaiians as with all Polynesians, being used not only for mats of every kind needed in the house, but for baskets, hats, fans and in some cases for house thatching. The long, pinnate leaves of the cocoanut, like the hala, served in making mats, screens and baskets, and in certain features of house construction. The mid-rib of the leaf furnished material for durable vard and house

terial for durable yard and house brooms.

The centre of sugarcane leaves was scraped and used for hatmaking and the mature leaves for thatching. The ash of the leaf when burned furnished the principal ingredient for black dye. The taro leaf, when cooked, resembles spinach and has a similar taste, and for this purpose two or three of the younger leaf stalks were selected. The mature leaves were found useful as water cups. One of the Hawaiian traditions is that a spring was once removed when all the water was bundled away in taro leaves.





# NUMBER OF CANCER DEATHS LARGER

Insurance Journal Figures Show
Mortality Much Greater Than
10 Years Ago.

New York, N. Y., June 12.—Mortality from cancer continued to increase at an alarming rate during 1923 and the number of annual deaths from the disease in the continental U. S. probably now is about 110,000 as compared with 75,000 ten years ago, according to an article by Frederick L. Hoffman, consulting statistician of the Prudential Insurance Company, published today in an insurance journal, The Spectator.

The cancer death rate in 23 cities with an aggregate population of 20,-839,787 reached the high figure of 108.5 per 100,000 last year, Mr. Hoffman's computation showed.


