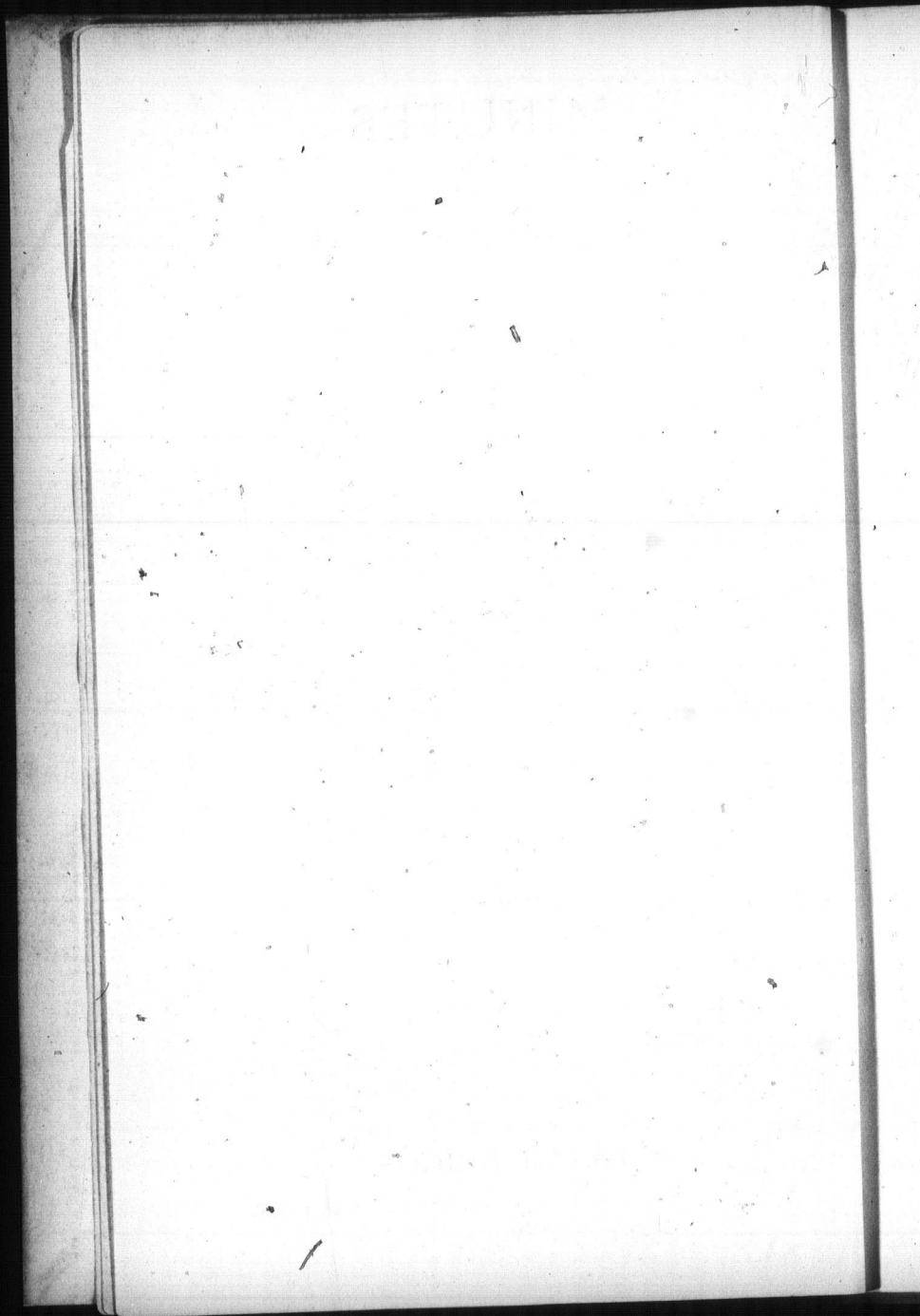

## MINUTES OF THE MINISTERIAL SESSION OF THE TORONTO CONFERENCE.

The Ministerial Session of the Toronto Conference was opened at 9 a.m., June 12th. The President, Rev. Wm. Galbraith, M.A., LL.B., Ph.D., occupied the chair.

The President announced the 564th Hymn. The Secretary read Acts ii., and Revs. J. E. SANDERSON, M.A., and M. FAWCETT led the Conference in prayer.

The General Superintendent, being present, was called to the chair, and after roll call, addressed the Conference.

MINUTES OF THE TWELFTH SESSION OF THE TORONTO  
CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Conference opened in Elm Street Church, Toronto, Thursday, June 13th, 1895, at 9 a.m. The Conference prayer-meeting, from 9 to 10 a.m., was conducted by Rev. WM. GALBRAITH, M.A., LL.B., Ph.D., President of the Conference.

At 10 o'clock the President called the General Superintendent to the chair. After delivering a suitable address, the General Superintendent proceeded to call the roll, when 130 ministers and 89 laymen answered to their names.

On the second ballot, Rev. M. L. Pearson was elected President, and briefly addressed the Conference.

The printed list of stations was taken as read.

On the first ballot, Rev. George K. Adams was elected Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, Rev. Lewis W. Hill, B.A., Rev. J. W. Churchill, and John T. Moore, Esq., were elected Assistant Secretaries; Rev. Edward Barrass, D.D., Journal Secretary; Revs. J. F. Ockley and Henry Harper, Conference Letter Writers.

On motion, the Chairmen of Districts were instructed to name a minister and layman from each District to constitute a Nominating Committee to nominate the Standing Committees of Conference.

Herridge for his kind offer, and that we recommend the Conference to accept it, and that the prizes be awarded at the Examinations of 1896, according to the wish of the generous donor.

Whereas, the Discipline of 1894 requires candidates for the ministry to present a certificate, or other evidence of matriculation; and whereas, the University examinations do not take place until the first week in July, thus rendering it impossible for candidates to obtain and present such certificates in the year in which they make application to be received on probation;

#### TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following:

1. We believe that while there has not been the inspiration and encouragement of the former year, as a result of the signal triumph of the plebiscite vote, yet there has been substantial progress made in the cause of Prohibition this year. The dissemination of temperance literature, the preaching and teaching of temperance principles, and the silent but potent influence of the ever-increasing number of godly men and women who have set their faces steadfastly against the drink curse, are, step by step, slowly but surely leading us towards the desired goal of absolute prohibition. We thank God for what has already been accomplished, and take courage for the future.

2. We deeply deplore the fact that at a time when prohibitory legislation was generally and strongly demanded, the Dominion Parliament, instead of fairly meeting the issue, evaded the question by the appointment of a needless commission which put upon the country a heavy expense, brought to light no new evidence of value, and resulted in findings which were virtually a foregone conclusion before the Committee began its work.

3. Your Committee is more and more convinced that if as Christians we are really in earnest and desire the annihilation of this terrible curse, "the drink traffic," we must suppress our political leanings where necessary; and whenever and wherever we can, speak out in trumpet tones against this evil, and vote as we speak, regardless of whether our words or our votes will help or hinder this party or that, so long as they help the temperance cause. In this connection, we would strongly recommend our people to be diligent in using their influence to have men of both parties brought out as representatives, who are in favor of Prohibition and who will support such a measure.

4. We strongly condemn the action of the License Commissioners in granting a license for the sale of liquor on the Island at Hanlan's Point, a spot which has hitherto been largely free from the blighting influence of the sale of intoxicating liquor. We have no hesitation in declaring that this action is entirely in opposition to the best interests of our people, and a direct insult to the Christian and temperance people who petitioned and otherwise used their influence against the granting of said license, as well as to the City Council of Toronto which, by a vote of nineteen to one, opposed it. The action of the commissioners is all the more culpable, from the fact that the Government under whose appointment they act, are pledged to grant all the prohibition in their power, and yet in this case they have allowed the very opposite to be done.

5. Your Committee received a letter from the Secretary of the Dominion Alliance requesting the Conference to send four delegates to the annual meeting of the Alliance Council, which is to be held in Toronto this year. Your Committee recommend the appointment of Rev. W. F. Wilson, Rev. J. C. Speer, Messrs. W. Pemberton Page and F. W. Winter as delegates to said Alliance Council.

6. It is cause for thankfulness that Christians of all denominations are looking with more and more disfavor upon the liquor traffic, and that public sentiment is such that in many societies and orders, men engaged in liquor selling are not admitted to membership, thus putting the stamp of reproach upon a business that is ruining the souls and bodies of so many of our people.

7. The publication and authorization of temperance text-books for use in our Public Schools is also cause for thankfulness, thus materially assisting to mould the minds of the young against the evils of intemperance. We are gratified to know that the number of Sunday School pupils pledged to total abstinence is constantly increasing, the number now reaching 11,500 or 37½ per cent. of all scholars outside of the infant classes, and we take this opportunity of urging officers and teachers to still greater diligence in this direction. Above all, we would urge not only Sunday School teachers and officers, but all persons desirous of advancing the cause of Prohibition, that the most effectual way of accomplishing this is to win men for the Lord Jesus Christ, for in Him alone is safety, and without His help none is secure. We rejoice in the progress made in the past year, and pray that God may grant us still greater in the present.

COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee beg to report as follows :

Whereas, it is learned from the Conference Minutes of last year that on the 38 missions of this Conference the average salary received by the missionaries was \$341.48, being \$203.34 from the Missionary Fund and \$138.14 from the Circuits; or, that of our 38 missionaries on these 38 fields, 18 received an average salary of \$203.00, while the remaining 20 received an average salary of \$406.15, the smallest salary received by any of these 38 missionaries being \$159.00;

Whereas, the missionaries on the Foreign Missions of our Church are always paid their grants in full, while if there be any deficit in the year's receipts the missionaries on our domestic fields, who are scantily enough paid at best, are forced to bear the shortage among themselves;

Whereas, while we gratefully acknowledge the liberality of our people, in that while the stringency of the times and the local financial burdens of many of our churches have enforced increased economy in private life and in local circuit expenditures, they have stood loyally by this fund, yet believing the shortage in the receipts of this year to be due not so much to the financial depression as to the lack of particular information regarding the work on our mission fields, and resulting in a lack of enthusiasm for Missions; therefore your Committee recommend as follows:

1. That very substantial increase be made in the grants to our Domestic Missions.

2. That in the years in which a deficit may arise in the Missionary Funds, such deficit be borne equally *pro rata* by the missionaries on foreign as well as on domestic fields.

3. That in view of the Master's great commission to "go and disciple all nations," and in view of the many open doors in every direction, our ministers be recommended to preach at least once per quarter upon the subject of Missions; also that a monthly Missionary Prayer-meeting be held.

4. That wherever practicable the Financial District Meeting arrange for week-night as well as for the Sunday Anniversary Services. That District Conventions be recommended where practicable.

5. That a book covering our mission fields be written for our Sunday School and Epworth League libraries and for general circulation.

6. That in addition to the able and efficient ministrations of the General Secretary and his excellent assistant (Rev. Dr. Shaw), other men also especially fitted for the work, be employed to travel through our Conference to further instruct and stimulate our people in behalf of this work.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee beg to submit the following report:

They feel that great care needs to be exercised and much wisdom displayed in considering a question of such great importance to the religious, social, physical and material life of a people as that in what way should one day in seven be spent, and in making a deliverance upon it which will meet with the endorsement of those who are members of Christian churches, and all others who may wish to preserve as far as possible one day in the week from disturbing cares of business and occupations which render it impossible to pay that attention to religious duties which is so necessary to the spread of Christian truth in the world.

1895] protest against any business or enterprise that has the appearance of causing any labor on the Lord's Day, not of necessity or mercy, and disturbing to the quiet and spiritual worship of the day.

While we gladly recognize the importance of the work done at Grimsby Park, yet, in view of the danger of encouraging religious dissipation and other attendant evils on the Sabbath day, we would earnestly recommend that the directors consider the wisdom of closing the gates of the park on the day in question.

The formation of a provincial Lord's Day alliance which has recently been effected, is an event which calls for hearty congratulation, and for which we bespeak the earnest and intelligent support of our people in all places where it has branches, and recommend the establishment of such in places where its operations have not as yet been extended.

The Sunday ferry service to the Island at Toronto, with its accompanying attractions and Sunday concerts of so-called sacred music, is a matter which calls for the most emphatic condemnation. The plea that the ferry service on the Sabbath is needed to convey residents of the Island to their city churches is hardly a sufficient one, as there is at least one church on the Island, and other places of worship could be easily provided.

The efforts of John Charlton, M.P., to place legal safeguards around the sanctity of the Sabbath are to be heartily commended. We tender our thanks to the honorable gentleman for his praiseworthy exertions on behalf of the Sabbath.

The Conference has learned with pleasure that the Minister of Justice, Sir Charles Hibbard Tupper, has introduced a bill into the House of Commons amending the criminal law, so as to prevent the publication and sale of newspapers on the Lord's Day, and the Secretary of Conference is hereby instructed to express to the Minister of Justice of the Dominion the satisfaction experienced by this Conference in regard to the proposed legislation, and the Conference respectfully recommends that the bill in question be amended so as to provide against the publication of even ostensible Sunday newspapers in this country.

The great increase in the use of that novel and useful machine the bicycle, is now, and promises to be in the future, a source of danger to Sabbath day quiet rest and religious worship. The practice of "club-meets" and trips in larger companies on the Sabbath to outlying towns, villages and rural hamlets cannot be productive in any degree of either moral, religious or physical advantages, but quite the opposite, and therefore it is earnestly advised that our people will abstain from this and other practices which their own good sense and conscience tell them are not of the sort to build up and maintain strong Christian manhood, the tendency to demoralize Sunday School services being one of the many reasons for their discontinuance.

The holding of meetings for the discussion of political and economic questions on the Sabbath, and the attendance and participation of our ministers and laymen in the proceedings will need the exercise of much wisdom and discretion, and generally speaking call for condemnation. Sunday parades of societies and Sunday service in connection therewith are not to be commended, but rather the reverse.

It is quite safe to lay it down as an axiom that no industry or system of traffic or other enterprise is warranted in being put in or kept in operation on the Sabbath unless it is an actual necessity to many more people than are compelled to keep it or them in motion.

The Sunday street-car service, which some are so anxious to see in all our cities, is an illustration in point. Those who actually need a Sunday service form but a small proportion of any of our cities. No doubt a large number, for the sake of pleasure and to reach various attractions which would spring up, might use a Sunday car service, but necessity is one thing and the desire for pleasure is quite another.

The question of a half holiday, or more than one, during the working days of the week, is closely allied to that of Sabbath observance, as the concession of the one does away very materially with the plea of the need of any special outing on the Lord's Day; hence the Conference desires most emphatically to endorse the holiday scheme during the working days of the week, and hopes that the time may come, and that speedily, when this much-needed and just reform will be firmly and irrevocably established. There can be no doubt of its great advantage from all social, physical and religious standpoints.

We would also suggest the propriety of all shopping being done early on the Saturday, so that stores may be closed early in the evening. We would desire to express the hope that, as far as possible, the use of livery rigs on the Sabbath will be discontinued.

Regarding many other forms of Sabbath desecration which are so often matters of controversy as being of a necessary character or the opposite, they must be largely left to an educated and enlightened conscience, yet your Committee feel it a duty incumbent upon them to address these words of admonition and advice, and trust that each and everyone will remember that he is his brother's keeper in the eyes of the good Being who will call us all to account for the example we set to those around us and with whom we mingle. May that example be of such a kind as to merit the "well-done" at the end of life's race, and thus be entitled to enter upon an eternal Sabbath, where controversies regarding its sanctity cannot possibly have a place.

The tabulated returns from the various Districts of the Conference show that during the year 2,068 Sabbath School scholars have been converted, and have united with the Church, for which we express devout thanksgiving to God. We note, with pleasure, that the great subject of temperance occupies a prominent place in our Sunday School work, as evidenced by the fact that 11,500 scholars have taken the total abstinence pledge during the year.

From each District in the Conference we have subscriptions to the Missionary and Educational Funds, and while the amounts contributed in many cases are small, we believe there is a growing interest manifested in these very important departments of the work of our Church.

It is a matter of regret that comparatively few of our Sabbath School scholars are learning the Catechism. Out of a total number of 41,762 attending our schools in this Conference, only 2,906 are being taught in this department.

A few schools are still obtaining literature from foreign publishers. We would respectfully urge our people to purchase supplies from our own Book Room, as we are satisfied they are better and cheaper than those obtained elsewhere, and contain what is frequently lacking in other publications, sound Methodist doctrine.

Your Committee regret to find that there are a great many discrepancies between the amounts reported in the schedules as raised for the Sunday School Extension Fund and the cash actually received by the Treasurer, which discrepancy they believe arises from the fact that in some instances money is sent to other parties instead of being sent direct to the Conference Treasurer. Your Committee beg to recommend the Conference Treasurer to order Sunday School Funds to be sent direct to Treasurer, as they believe that by this means greater accuracy will be secured. They would also strongly urge that all moneys should be paid in at the District Meeting.

Your Committee find that the Owen Sound District has paid its Sunday School Funds to the Guelph Conference Treasurer. This being the case they cannot see how Toronto Conference should publish the receipt of money which has never come into their hands.

Your Committee regret to report a falling-off in the amount of collections for the Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund. This may arise in part from the usual complaint of "hard times," but it is a matter of regret that there are a few Sunday Schools which have not taken a collection. The Board will have heavier claims this year, seeing that a portion of the salary of the agent, Rev. A. C. Crews, will have to be provided for by the Board. Your Committee beg to express the hope that the ministers of the Conference will do their utmost to secure the usual collection in every Sunday School.

Your Committee would beg to recommend the reappointment of the Rev. Dr. Barrass as Conference Treasurer.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, in looking over the year's work, feel that there is cause for devout thankfulness to God for the measure of success given to us as a Conference. Again we have to rejoice over an increase in the membership, 971 being reported over the returns of last year. At the



same time we feel there is a call for renewed and greater consecration to the work committed to us, so as to secure the greater success, which two hundred ministers, actively engaged in the work of the ministry, and nearly forty thousand members, among whom are thousands of gifted and devoted men and women, should warrant us to expect. This we are persuaded will be more surely secured if we remember that as a people we have been raised up to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land. Taking as our motto for the year the one suggested by Dr. Potts at the ordination service, "Salvation in every home and a revival on every Circuit," we cannot but achieve great things in the work of soul saving.

Our agencies are varied, and give ample opportunity to all to work for God. Let us make them as thoroughly efficient as possible, and not yield too much to the tendency of the times to increase agencies to a degree which would render their working impracticable.

From information received at the District Meetings, the Leaders Conventions and other sources, we are convinced that our highly prized and important social means of grace, especially our class-meetings, are not attended by large numbers of our members. We are convinced that the neglect of these shows generally either a lack of a thorough change of heart of those received into the Church, or a decline of spiritual life and religious fervor among many of our people.

We would reaffirm the position taken last year on the subject of worldly amusements, believing that the same watchfulness is required, and convinced of the scriptural character of our rules on the subject, their observance will save us from "the friendship of the world which is enmity with God."

In the country districts, at the front, the depleted farm population and the excessive number of churches has created a condition that should be dealt with cautiously but resolutely. To gradually reduce the number of appointments will relieve the burden upon all and strengthen those that remain. This matter is commended to all the chairmen of districts, pastors, and official brethren on our Circuits.

We note with pleasure the Federated Church Movement, having as its aim the unification of the churches on the lines of Christian work, and we would hope that something really practical will result in removing the little rivalries which exist between the different denominations in small places, especially on our mission fields, and in uniting congregations in the service and work of the common Master.

We would call attention to the grand work which our Epworth Leagues and other young people's societies are engaged in. We hail with joy the organized forces of the devoted young people of Methodism, and believe a much needed and efficient department of work is secured, and in order to fully retain them in the closest possible relation to our church life and work we would guard against any falling-off in the attendance at our regular church class-meetings, or to have the thought to exist that these societies render the class-meeting unnecessary. And in this connection, while we recognize with thankfulness the number of Sabbath School scholars who are reported as church members, yet we would express the conviction that some more direct and effectual means should be

*To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church:*

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of the last year's work and of the present position of the Institution.

Number of students in Arts, McGill University, full course, 6 (others as Partial Students take more or less work in the University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 21; for the degree of B.D., 21; for the Conference Course, 20. Total enrolled, 68.

(Edin), D.D., lectures in Apologetics, Hebrew and Homiletics; Rev. Professor Richardson, B.A., B.D., Registrar, in Greek and Latin, and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, will lecture in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., is still pursuing a post-graduate course in Semitic Literature, in Heidelberg, Germany.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference Preliminary requirements either by matriculation, the equivalent of matriculation, or the special course for non-matriculants, also to give them lectures in the new course for probationers or the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in Divinity leading to the degree of B.D.

The Endowment Fund is now \$70,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$3,000. The Boarding Department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the Institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.  
DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College take pleasure in presenting to the Conference this their twenty-first annual report.

It is with feelings of profound gratitude that the Directors are able to report that, while decreasing attendance and consequent falling revenues have been the experience of nearly all similar institutions in this Dominion during the past year, attributable in part to the depressed condition of the country, the college year just closing has, in regard to attendance, income and the value of the educational work done, been highly satisfactory to the Board.

The total enrolment of pupils has been upwards of 130, and the revenue has exceeded the sum of \$20,000.

The Directors are pleased to be able to bear testimony to the excellence of the management of the Institution by the Rev. Dr. Hare and his corps of accomplished professors and teachers. The large attendance of boarders, the gratifying health record, the character of the advanced educational work accomplished, the varied courses of study and the modern methods employed, are evidences that the cause of sound learning is faithfully championed in this institution.

Since the foundation of the College upwards of 2,000 pupils have received the benefits of a thorough training, which the Faculty have been careful to impart, no less in the primary than in the collegiate department.

The college curriculum embraces a full course in all the departments of

English, Classics, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Natural Science, up to third year of university work; a full conservatory course in Music and Elocution; the full Art School course in Fine Art; a complete Commercial course, including Stenography, Typewriting and Telegraphy; also the most improved training in Physical Culture.

It is gratifying to the Board to state that the literary advantages afforded by the College are something more than merely superficial in their character. This year the College has prepared pupils for third, second, first-class C and first class B, certificates, junior and senior university matriculation, and first and second years in Toronto University.

For a long period the Directors have recognized the fact that the yearly increase in the attendance of pupils, the want of sufficient accommodation and equipment, and the steady advance made by the College to the foremost rank among the ladies' colleges in this country, have rendered it essential, if the College is to maintain its splendid position, that a comprehensive plan of enlargement should be undertaken. Accordingly, after careful consideration, the Board have submitted to the shareholders, who have ratified it, the proposition to erect a science and concert hall to the south of the main building, 130x50 feet, and three stories high. This addition will include a new science hall, a concert hall with new pipe-organ, a large, airy and attractive dining-hall, and a large number of first-class rooms for pupils in residence. There will also be erected a new three-story kitchen, provided with the most approved appliances, bath, etc. Complete steam-heating, electric-lighting, and best modern sanitary arrangements are to be provided, and no expense will be spared to secure ample provision for the home comforts and health of the pupils.

The estimated cost of the proposed enlargement and the sum necessary to discharge the present obligations of the Board amount to upwards of \$60,000, the greater part of which amount has already been secured. Many friends of the higher education of young women have manifested a practical interest in the undertaking, and the Board take pleasure in making special mention of the munificent gift of Hart A. Massey, Esq., whose interest in Christian education has been so generously exhibited by him on many occasions. In consideration of Mr. Massey's very liberal donation, the Board have designated the new hall "The Lilian Massey Hall," in honor of the donor's daughter. It is proposed to lay the corner-stone of the new structure on the 19th of June instant, during the Commencement exercises.

This important addition to our present magnificent, palatial building, with its massive walls, turreted towers, spacious halls, magnificent drawing-rooms with their rich decorations, broad carved oak stairways, elegant stained glass windows, all combine to render the college buildings, when completed, the most perfect, the best equipped and the best adapted to their educational purposes in the country.

The Directors desire to tender to the members of the Conference their grateful thanks for the confidence and the hearty co-operation in the college work in the past, and cordially commend the College to the most favorable consideration and the continued patronage of the Church.

## WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

*The Board of Regents of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton, to the President and Members of the Toronto Conference.*

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN, — The first entry in the Minutes of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, of Hamilton, is dated July 6th, 1860, hence we are just closing our thirty-fifth year. That entry was signed by S. D. Rice, Secretary, and Edward Jackson, Chairman. Since then our halls have been visited by thousands of young ladies, and our graduates number almost four hundred. They are found in positions of honor, trust and usefulness all over the Dominion and many of them in the United States, and several in the mission field. We have furnished lady principals and teachers to several colleges, and rejoice in the success that has attended their labors in these institutions. We have followed the career of our graduates and students with great satisfaction, and have had the rare pleasure of receiving as students, for several years past, the daughters of women who graduated from the old Wesleyan in the earlier days of the College. No stronger endorsement could be desired by the Institution.

We need not waste your time with any financial exhibit, as the Church is in no way responsible for our finances. Suffice it to say that the college labors under no embarrassment. Like all other institutions we have felt the pressure of the times, but the year just closing is in advance of the year before, and the prospects for next year are better still.

An examination of our course of study will show that it embraces everything found in a first-class institution. As the oldest ladies' college in the Province we cannot afford to employ any teachers except those of the highest grade. In addition to our very extensive work in Literature, Music, Art, Elocution, Book-keeping, etc., we have daily work on the English Bible and Christian Evidences. No lady can graduate from our college without an intelligent conception of the origin of our Scriptures and of the Christian religion. These subjects do not involve any sectarian colorings, and we believe they ought to form an essential study in all our higher institutions.

We are closing a very prosperous year. Excellent work has been done in all departments, and we have a fine graduating class. The year has been pleasant and harmonious throughout, the health of all, both teachers and pupils, has been invariably good, and serious sickness is almost unknown in the College. The discipline of the Institution and the care that has been exercised over our pupils may be inferred from the fact that no mishap of any kind has ever befallen an inmate of the College.

## ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

*To the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR FATHERS AND BROTHERS.—The enrolment of students in Alma College this year has reached 150, representing, as in former years, all parts of Canada, and including 21 from the neighboring republic. The results of examinations under non-resident examiners and the Education Department of Ontario show faithful and successful work on the part of students and teachers. The health of the school has been excellent and the spiritual interests distinctly marked. All the voluntary religious services, such as prayer and class-meetings, Bible Classes, Y. W. C. Association and Missionary services, have shown deep religious interest, and about twenty students have professed conversion and united with various Christian churches.

The Graduating Class, if successful in their final examinations, will be as follows: M.E.L., 7; M.L.A., 1; Elocution, 7; Music, 6; Fine Art, 3; Commercial, 1; total of 25.

The College Relief Fund has now reached about \$20,000, about \$6,000 being added this year.

The Board of Management and College Council feel much encouraged that in this year of great financial stringency the attendance has reached so large a number, and that after payment of all expenditures on school account, of the heavy bill of interest and all costs of agency, etc., the year will show a substantial reduction in the debt.

We ask the brethren of this Conference to help us by their sympathy and prayers, and by their active co-operation in increasing the patronage of the school. We also respectfully ask you to appoint a Conference representative on our Board of Management and Trust.

## REPORT ON PRISON REFORM.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

That it is very desirable that the reforms recommended by the Prison Reform Commission, appointed by the Ontario Government four years ago, be carried out as speedily as practicable, comprising, as they do, various important and vital changes, such as the provision in every county or counties, conveniently grouped, of an industrial home for the destitute poor, the reorganization of the Boys' Reformatory at Penetang, the entire separation of the girls from the older offenders at the reformatory for women at Toronto, the establishment in the Province of one or more reformatories for habitual drunkards in order to avoid sending such to the common gaol, and that a portion of their earnings may, where deemed advisable, be used for the maintenance of their families. We are persuaded that by attention to these recommendations, a better classification of prisoners may be attained, and the destitute poor will be better provided for. We urge these considerations on the Ontario

Government the more strongly, because nothing has yet been done to give effect to the recommendations of the Prison Reform Commission, which are of such great importance, and which were the outcome of their own appointment.

In regard to the memorial from Toronto West District relating to a reformatory for young men as proposed to be established by the Dominion Government, we beg to respectfully but most decidedly suggest that the institution should be located near to a large town or city, and thus placed in reach of, and in touch with, voluntary clerical and lay Christian workers, otherwise we fear that the institution will largely fail to accomplish the work designed. We think that attention to the above suggestion will materially aid in affording moral and religious instruction to the inmates of such reformatory.

We beg to suggest that a Standing Committee, composed of the following ministers and laymen, be appointed to co-operate with the Prisoners' Aid Association, viz., Revs. Dr. Galbraith and John Hunt, Dr. W. W. Ogden and Jos. Tait, Esq.

*Resolved*,—That we deprecate anything that has a tendency to cause labor on the Sabbath or the desecration of that day, and would express the hope that the efforts that are being put forth to prevent the opening of any cemetery for burial purposes on the Lord's Day may be successful.

The Board of Management has held fifteen meetings during the year in the interests of the work.



Miss Thompson, the Superintendent, has fully met our expectations and given complete satisfaction.

During the year six properly qualified ladies have been received on probation. At present we have in the Home four probationers and two Deaconesses in training, in addition to the Superintendent.

We are sure such a record of Christ-like service will be regarded as an ample reward for the time, thought and money expended in this youngest department of Methodist activity.

These figures are valuable as indicating the zeal of our Deaconesses and the necessity for such work as that in which they are engaged, but they give a very inadequate idea of the sorrows which these visits have assuaged or the burdens lifted through their instrumentality. These records are engraved on the hearts of the beneficiaries and written in the journals of heaven.

That our Deaconesses may become thoroughly qualified for their work, a broad course of study has been prescribed, including the systematic study of the Bible, the discipline and theology of the Methodist Church, the History of the Bible, Church History and a short course in Physiology and Geography. Lectures have been delivered on these subjects by the Superintendent and the following: Rev. Drs. Galbraith, Parker, German, Wallace; and the Revs. Webber, Chown and Dinnick. These lectures have been well attended, and have been very helpful to the probationers and Deaconesses in training. Written examinations have been held, and the results indicate superior mental ability and thorough study. The examiners are unanimous in expressions of satisfaction.

The Board has been gladdened by manifestations of increasing liberality in support of the work, and feel certain that ample means will be cheerfully contributed when our people become better acquainted with the necessity which exists, and the thoroughly Christian character of the work we have undertaken.

Our Deaconesses are ready to respond to the call of any pastor or church desiring their assistance, and are willing to go to any home in the city or suburbs where poverty or sorrow requires relief or comfort.

#### COMMITTEE ON MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

Your Committee beg to submit their report as follows:

Whereas, it is of inestimable moment to this young Dominion that its educational system should rest upon the broad foundation principles of national unity and Christian integrity;

And whereas, the introduction into public schools of any distinction of creed or nationality is a direct violation of that just and impartial policy which promotes peace and good-will amongst all classes of citizens;

And whereas, Manitoba has, by legislation, sought to eliminate from her school system the elements of sectional and sectarian strife;

And whereas, recent Federal action is calculated to interfere with the operation of such legislation;

This Conference desires to place its position on record as follows:

1. Warm approval of the position taken by the Manitoba Government in opposition to sectarian public schools.
2. Strong disapproval of the Federal authority imposing upon the people of that growing province educational conditions which are obnoxious to the great majority.
3. The earnest hope that calm and careful consideration of this important question by the Governments concerned will yet lead to a satisfactory solution of the difficulty "in justice to all and with favor to none."
4. This Conference would deplore any attempt to make this great question the instrument of political or party advantage, but would commend the earnest efforts of a united and patriotic people, and of loyal Parliaments, to secure a public school system based upon a morality as wide as our common Christianity, and possessing a nationality as broad as the Dominion.

#### STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

There are at present in the Toronto Conference 157 ministers and 45 probationers engaged in the active work of the ministry.

The total amount raised by Circuits and Missions for their support during the year was \$130,387.

The total amount of deficiencies for the year was \$7,132.

We rejoice in the fact that there has been an increase of 971 in membership. Total membership, 39,994. There are 1,374 catechumens in the Conference.

There have been during the year 2,534 baptisms, 1,007 marriages, 1,429 burials.

The Connexional Funds stand as follows for the year:

Missionary, \$788.55 decrease; Superannuation, \$324.75, increase; Educational, \$656.25, increase; Contingent, \$86.07, increase; General Conference, \$69.99, increase; Union Church Relief, \$62.98, increase; Sunday School Aid, \$17.65, decrease; Sustentation, \$20.29, increase; Woman's Missionary, \$8.36, increase. Total Connexional Funds, \$58,738.62, showing an increase of \$422.49 for the conference year.

During the year three new churches have been erected in the Conference at a cost of \$8,400.00.

There are at present 521 preaching places and 405 Sunday Schools.

The laymen in the Quarterly Official Boards number 4,023.

Your Committee beg leave to call attention to the fact that they have experienced considerable difficulty in tabulating the statistics through the incompleteness and lateness of returns, and we earnestly request promptness in this matter (on the part of those concerned) in the future.

## THE ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows :

In accordance with the provisions of last Annual Conference each member—clerical or lay—of this Conference was required to contribute the sum of one dollar towards a Billeting Fund ; and an Entertainment Committee composed of thirteen ministers, resident in the city, and a corresponding number of laymen devoted themselves to the duty assigned them in this connection.

The Committee would place on record here their grateful acknowledgments of the cheerful and generous response made by our people in this behalf, and pray that God may bless these willing entertainers in "their basket and in their store."

Could the intention of the last Annual Conference be carried out, in its integrity, no doubt a satisfactory solution of the billeting problem would be secured. We feel it our duty, however, to recommend that this system be abandoned, for the following reasons :

1. The non-compliance of a large proportion of the Conference with the condition of a one dollar payment on or before the first day of Conference.

2. The absence of any means of securing compliance in this respect.

3. The injustice which this neglect inflicts upon the loyal brethren who make prompt payment as required.

In order that the burden of such expenditures as have been incurred by the Committee may not fall upon those brethren whose only offence was punctual payment, we recommend that the one dollar be refunded to each contributor, and your Committee will undertake to provide for the necessary outlay by private subscriptions.

This concludes the functions of your Committee.

## REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1. There have been reported to this Conference, 52 Senior Leagues, with 2,324 members ; 133 Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor, with 7,193 members ; 6 affiliated societies, with 207 members ; 14 unaffiliated societies, with 557 members ; 31 Junior Leagues, with 1,495 members ; making a total of 236 Leagues and Societies, with a membership of 11,776, showing an increase of 68 societies and 4,210 members.

The total income of these societies for the year has been \$7,384.27. We would call attention to the importance of having the schedules for circuits and districts carefully filled up.

2. While we rejoice in this increased organization of our young people, we feel that there are many circuits and appointments where such organization has not yet been effected. We would, therefore, urge upon all pastors the great importance of organizing their young people for the performance of training in Christian work, not as a separate institution but as a composite part of our Church.

3. We rejoice in the extended and thoughtful attention given by the General Conference to all matters pertaining to the welfare of our Leagues and Societies, resulting in the drafting of a simplified and greatly improved constitution, which has been sent forth as a uniform constitution for all Leagues throughout the Connexion.

4. We are pleased to notice that the General Conference has granted to Conference conventions of our young people the privilege of direct representation on the Epworth League Board, thus enabling them to participate in the general supervision of the work throughout the Dominion.

5. Your Committee desire to express satisfaction at the unqualified success of the large and enthusiastic convention held in Toronto last February, with its inspiring motto, "Revivals and Missions." We believe it has been a great stimulus and practical help to our young people in their work all over the Province. We would recommend all to act on the printed report of this convention.

6. We heartily endorse the appointment by the General Conference Special Committee of Rev. A. C. Crews, a member of this Conference, as General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, and believe that under his wise and able superintendence the work of our societies will be developed to a higher degree of efficiency. We heartily commend him to the pastors, congregations and societies in the Conference, and pray that God's richest blessing may rest upon him in his most important work.

7. We regret that so many Leagues and Societies have overlooked the annual collection for the Epworth League Board for this year, only \$59.26 having been contributed throughout the Conference. We would recommend that a collection for the past year, where omitted, be taken up as soon as possible, and sent to the General Treasurer, Mr. J. W. Flavell, corner of Front and Beachell Streets, Toronto. We would strongly urge upon the attention of our young people the wisdom and importance of recognizing this collection and our connexional literature as a first claim upon their financial support.

8. We feel that emphasis cannot be too often or too strongly placed upon the primary importance of the spiritual phases of our work being put in the forefront, thus exercising a pervasive influence upon all the departments of work. The first great aim of all our societies should be to "save souls," and then to "promote an earnest, intelligent, practical, Christian life." This overmastering spirituality should predominate and pervade all the meetings, obliterating the fictitious distinction between the sacred and the secular, and resulting in making the religious meetings truly social, and the literary and social meetings truly spiritual in tone and influence.

9. We are pleased to notice that the General Conference has placed the Missionary Department as second in importance, and we would urge upon all societies of young people the cultivation of an aggressive missionary spirit and the development of some plan of systematic effort. We are pleased to notice that \$1,119.78 has been raised for Missions by the leagues and societies of this Conference during the year. ## OBITUARIES.

## DONALD GEO. SUTHERLAND, D.D., LL.B.

Donald George Sutherland was born in Toronto, April, 1839, the child of godly parents, who were God's first ministers to mould his life.

His mother was a daughter of that cradle of English liberty, the royal city of Lincoln. With the father separated from home by his calling for many months of the year, the responsibilities of the home devolved largely upon the mother and called out the hidden strength of her quiet nature. The family altar was always maintained, the children were diligently taught the Word of God. In the midst of such a home-life, the children, three boys and one girl, grew up in the fear of God, and with deep moral convictions. When Donald G. Sutherland was fourteen years of age, the eminent revivalist, James Caughey, visited Hamilton. In his heart, as he acknowledged years after, there was a mighty struggle. But one thing stood in the way of surrender. He had even then heard an inward voice saying, "Go preach my Gospel." But his boyish ambition had already pictured for himself another career leading to wealth and worldly honor. He could not, and he did not yield. The next year found him at college.

Then God began to speak in another way. At the end of the third year at college the first heavy blow fell. It came suddenly in the death of his father, he having been among the many victims of the Des Jardins bridge disaster.

The next year recorded a succession of providences, speaking to him in tones of fatherly chastening. His beloved brother died; he himself lay for weeks uncertain of life, but still he held out and the old ambitions of life were retained. In 1859 he graduated from college and at once entered upon the study of law, completing his course in 1862. Meantime the great moral struggle within had grown desperate. The die seemed cast for evil. He says of himself, "I would not be a hypocrite, I would not mock God, and I gave up even the form of prayer." But other prayers were offered in his behalf and prevailed. The Sabbath preaching of the late Dr. Douglas now began to take hold of him. He saw clearly that the service of God was a nobler and worthier life than the pleasures of sin.

At the covenant service, January 1, 1862, he deliberately consecrated his heart and life to the service of God. On the next Sabbath morning, after a week of seeking for God, he went to class, and while the Rev. Geo. Goodson led in prayer in his behalf, the burden was lifted and his soul was filled with the peace and love of God. But still the question, "What shall I do with my life?" was not settled. He completed his course in law and entered upon his practice with every prospect of success. Just as these seeming prospects were opening another and still heavier blow fell. His mother suddenly died. In the shadow of this great bereavement these beckoning lights were all quenched in darkness.

In 1864 he entered the Methodist ministry on the Milton Circuit, under the superintendency of the Rev. J. E. Betts. He was now twenty-five years of age, but the five years since his college graduation had not been lost. They were spent in diligent study, and so he brought to his new and life-long calling a trained mind, habits of intellectual work, business methods and sympathies with men in the work of every-day life, which served him in good stead ever

after. By a thorough course of exegetical study he completed the work for the university degree of B.D. In after years as Conference examiner in divinity, as a university examiner in Hebrew, as editor of our *Quarterly Review*, or as presiding officer in church courts, where theological discourses were frequently in order, he always took a high place as a scholarly and accurate theologian.

His style of pulpit preparation was equally thorough. He learned not to deal in ornate language, but to get directly at truth in its own spiritual beauty and power, and through well-chosen words to let it speak for itself to the hearts of his hearers.

As a pastor he was diligent and conscientious, watching over his flock with the tender solicitude of a true shepherd.

To the homes of sickness and sorrow his genial, gentle presence was always welcomed, and tarrying was ever a benediction. He always considered the poor and was ever ready to communicate.

His interest in the social services of the Church and Sunday School was deep and abiding. In them all, he stood before the Church and the world as a faithful, modest, intelligent, consecrated servant of the Lord Jesus Christ, ever with kindly sympathy watching for souls.

In 1872, God gave him a companion in his work and a true helpmeet, who, for twenty-three years, shared the labors and triumphs of a Methodist itinerancy. Ganoque, Simcoe, Clinton, St. Thomas, London, Toronto, Hamilton, and last the Central Church, Toronto, were the fields of their united labors, and in every charge the Church was left in peace and prosperity. He loved his people, he gave himself to them. The best that was in him was faithfully offered, and in the last painful months of his affliction one thing seemed his chief burden, and that was, that he could no longer work. His separation from them only seemed to make his people dearer to him. As long as it was possible he forced his way to the sanctuary in great physical weakness, endeavoring to take some part in the service—on two or three occasions addressing a few words of salutation; counsel and testimony to the people. When no longer able to get to the church he sent weekly messages from the sick-room, which revealed inward victory and hope through faith.

His last illness was prolonged and acute, but through it all so upborne was he by divine grace, that he was sweetly submissive in spirit and grandly heroic in endurance.

On Sunday, March 10, it seemed evident that the battle was nearly fought and the victory won; and on March 12, with the members of his family about him, he calmly slept in Jesus. After a useful ministry, during which he was elected to some of the highest positions in the gift of the Church, and endeared himself to all his brethren in the ministry, this diligent and faithful man of God went to the fulness of joy and to the pleasures which are for evermore, leaving behind him a memory like the breath of summer, full of sunshine and flowers, a grief and gladness in the atmosphere.

#### REV. JAMES CORNISH SLATER

Was the son of a Methodist minister. He was born at Launceston, Cornwall, on the 7th day of April, 1823, and died in Toronto, May 14th, 1895, aged seventy-two years.

Mr. Slater had an excellent early educational training, first at a private school in Wales, and then at Kingswood. There was laid the foundation of that systematic method in all things which characterized his entire future life. He made rapid progress in study, and gained for himself the reputation of an earnest young Christian. He afterwards was articled to an apothecary and pursued successfully the required course. He was appointed as secretary and to prepare prescriptions for an eminent London surgeon. About twelve months after this he entered the establishment of Mr. Samuel Budgett, of Bristol.



## REV. SHEM BLANSHARD

Was born in England, in November, 1827, and passed to his reward on April 2nd, 1895, in the sixty-eighth year of his age. He was known and loved as a faithful disciple of the Lord Jesus, an earnest, persuasive preacher of the everlasting Gospel, and "an Israelite indeed in whom was no guile." The French name by which he was familiarly known is accounted for in the fact that his ancestors were Huguenots, who long ago fled from their fatherland to England in quest of religious freedom.

From the days of John Wesley's personal ministry the family have been identified with Methodism, the father of deceased being a local preacher continuously for forty years. His mother was a devout and godly woman, whose influence formed a potent factor in building the character of her son, so that he was early brought to the Saviour, and to the example and training of these parents may easily be traced much of the beauty, strength and sweetness that were so apparent in the life of our departed friend.

While growing into Christian manhood Bro. Blanshard planned for himself a career similar to that of his father, which was one of extensive religious usefulness in association with business life. With this in view he spent several years as a local preacher, but his gifts and labors commended him to the special notice of the Church; whose chief officers urged him to enter the regular ministry, and give his whole time to the work. When at length he realized that God's call to labor implied a larger field, he was persuaded by Rev. Dr. Stinson to join a band of young men, who came to Canada in 1858, and in that year he became a probationer for the ministry of our Church. At the Conference of 1862 he was received into full connection and ordained, shortly after which he was united in marriage to Miss Minda Adams, of South Grimsby, who shared with him the varied experiences of the itinerancy, and now survives her husband to enjoy the calm hopefulness of a Christian life that grows more and more meet for the inheritance of the saints in light.

Our departed brother spent thirty-five years in the active work of the ministry. In 1893, just two years ago, he obtained a superannuated relation, intending to spend the remnant of his days in Canada, but matters were otherwise ordered. Owing to the very sudden death of their daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Blanshard went to Oberlin, Ohio, in August, 1893, that their son and his two motherless children might have continued to them the blessings of home, with the kindly ministrations of those who knew how to care for them. Here they remained until the voice from heaven called our friend to the rest that remains for the people of God.

The career of our dear friend was remarkably free from sickness, so that during a long and laborious ministry he was absent from his pulpit only three weeks through illness. Of late, however, the strong frame began to give way, the rugged constitution felt the strain of labor, and at length a paralytic stroke caused his death. He was seized while engaged in an evangelistic service in the Methodist church where he resided. During the progress of the meeting he spoke and prayed with his accustomed fervor, but as he went home the paralysis extended, and he never afterwards had sufficient command of his mental powers to realize that he was dangerously ill, nor was he conscious of any suffering during the three weeks' prostration that terminated in the sleep that knows no waking. Thus, like many before him, he "ceased at once to work and live," his last words being spoken in a revival service for the extension of the Saviour's kingdom.

As a preacher Mr. Blanshard was clear, thoughtful and instructive, and it would indeed be a new privilege to hear once again those forceful, masterly and persuasive sermons of his on "The Barren Fig Tree," and "Perfect Love that Casts out Fear." In him as a man and a minister were many noble qualities. Of a naturally amiable disposition, divine grace early added all that was necessary to make a character beautiful, as well as good. His was the ornament



of a meek and quiet spirit; he would rather be wronged than wrong; he witnessed for Christ in a Christly life, and his death reminds us of those bright, strong words of the 37th Psalm: "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

Though but a short time in Oberlin his funeral was attended by many whom he had won as warm friends. Four clergymen took part in the solemn services, and the address of Rev. Mr. McClay, of the M. E. Church, was appropriate and full of comfort. May we follow our dear brother as he followed his Lord, laboring well in view of a blessed rest. Then when the night of trial is o'er, and the sun lights up the eastern hills on the morning of the resurrection, we like him, shall have a full reward.

### E. DEWART LEWIS.

The subject of this brief memoir was born in the township of Dummer, county of Peterborough. Brought up in the sweetness and purity of a country Christian home, he was early in life impressed with the importance of having a personal experience of the forgiveness of sin. While in attendance at Norwood High School his religious convictions deepened, and he made a full surrender of all to God.

His call to the work of the ministry was unmistakably of God; that was never doubted by any. He entered the ministry in 1876, and attended Victoria College two years. After his ordination he was stationed at Hastings, Northam, Shannonville, Warsaw and Epsom. On each field he labored with marked success. While wrestling with the angel of death at the Sanitarium, thirty members on his circuit were being welcomed into Church fellowship. His sermonic ability was above the average, and he never appeared in his pulpit without being well prepared.

He was a staunch supporter of the Temperance cause; in fact, it was the campaign for the adoption of the Plebiscite that, owing to fatigue and exposure, brought on that disease which ultimately proved fatal.

After the Conference of 1894 he sought rest for a few weeks, but finally concluded to visit an American sanitarium to resuscitate his shattered health. Never very strong physically, he gradually declined in strength, and on February 20th, 1895, he passed away in the triumphs of faith in the presence of his now sorrowing widow and his uncle, Dr. Dewart. Thus passed away one of the purest of God's servants. His mortal remains were brought home to Peterborough and lovingly laid away to rest, awaiting the resurrection of the just.

- (5) Who are the Superannuated Ministers?
- (6) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?
- (7) Who are now located?
- (8) Who are the Laymen elected by the several Districts to this Conference?
- (9) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (10) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath School Committee?
- (11) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Epworth League Committee?
- (12) What representatives have been elected by the District Meetings to the Stationing Committee?
- (13) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

Second. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such a manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate committee or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

Third. Having selected a suitable secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair; the report to be read from the platform, and in such a manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on every item presented.

Now that Dr. Withrow, by arrangement of the General Conference, retires from the office of Secretary of Epworth League and Sunday School Extension movements, the Conference cannot allow this opportunity to pass without recording its high appreciation of his indefatigable labors in discharging so faithfully the duties of these offices (without monetary remuneration), in addition to those of editing our *Magazine* and Sabbath School publications. We recognize the success that has attended his labors, and record our devout gratitude to Almighty God for the great and pre-eminent success of our Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools. During the past eight years the increase of our schools has been 622, of teachers and officers 6,024, and scholars 61,361. Twenty years ago the first year's income of Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund was \$297, which has increased to \$4,720. This Conference assures our dear Brother Withrow of our love towards him, and the high esteem in which he is held, and prays that his life may be long spared to exercise his talents for the cause of God; and we wish him a pleasant journey to the Orient, which we learn he is taking, and a safe return to his home and family.

Dr. Dewart for his long and faithful services as Editor of the *Christian Guardian*, and begs to assure him of the esteem in which he is held by his brethren, who trust that in his retirement from the editorial chair he will have many years of comfort in the evening of life.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from him which is, and which was, and which is to come; and from the seven Spirits which are before his throne; And from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful Witness, and first begotten of the dead, and the Prince of the kings of the earth. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

Assembled once more in our Annual Conference in "Toronto the beautiful," we convey to you our most cordial Christian greeting. We take this opportunity of blending our thanksgiving with yours to the great Head of the Church for all that is past, and in uniting our expressions of trust for all that is to come. As a Church we feel increasingly the magnetic touch of a great brotherhood and the unifying bond of a common faith. It is our heart's desire, that in all that touches the doctrines of our holy Christianity, the essential principles of our Church polity, and the extension of Methodism throughout the land, we continue to be in mind and method, aims and aspirations, one.

We rejoice to be able to report progress in the various departments of our church work. During the year great things have been aimed at and great things have been accomplished by the power of Christ through human instrumentality. We thank God for many rich seasons of refreshing, victories achieved, blessings vouchsafed, power bestowed, and additions made to the swelling empire of Christ. Our prayer is that great grace may continue to rest on us as a Church, that as pastors and people, "our love may abound more and more in knowledge and in all judgment, that we may approve things that are excellent, that we may be sincere and without offence until the day of Christ, being filled by the fruits of righteousness, which are by Christ Jesus unto the glory and praise of God."

We praise God for the increased interest manifest in the work of Sunday Schools. God is touching the eyes of His people to see as never before the natal relation in which the children stand to Christ and His redeemed Church. Let it be the supreme endeavor of parents, pastors and teachers to keep the children where Christ has put them, so that they may never forfeit that ethical and spiritual standing which is theirs by virtue of that free gift which is come upon all men unto justification of life. We would suggest the importance of a systematic study of God's Word, and an intelligible exposition of the distinctive doctrines of our Church on the part of all concerned in the teaching of the young, so that they may grow up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, and be able to render every man a reason for the hope that is in them.



The schools within the limits of our Conference are having in attendance, 41,762. We notice with gratitude conversions to the number of 2,068 scholars.

The great Temperance question lies heavily on the heart of our Church. We have still great cause to deplore the ravages of the demon drink throughout our land. It is a truism to say that it is the greatest curse of modern times, and the greatest obstacle that opposes the progress of the Gospel. "Drink, indeed, is the echo of the dungeon's wall, the blight of each abandoned home, the dirge that leads many a sad procession to an early grave. It is the felon's fortitude, the gambler's god, the harlot's hardihood, the coward's courage, and the assassin's inspiration." This evil custom is the tombstone beneath which many a Lazarus, bound hand and foot and dead, lies buried. Listen to the words of Christ addressed to you as a Church to-day, "Take ye away the stone."

Notwithstanding the defeat of such tentative measures as the Scott Act, etc., and the unsatisfactory results of the Royal Commission, we believe that the temperance sentiment never registered a higher mark in the social thermometer than to-day. Let that sentiment but crystallize itself into the legislation of the country, and Prohibition would at once be the result. We believe that if the Christian element of society would but wield its power of franchise in the direction indicated, the total extinction of this evil would follow. The crisis is coming. It has come, and Methodism expects every man to do his duty.

There is no divine institution which we ought to guard with more jealous care than that of the Christian Sabbath. Like every other divine appointment it has its basis in the constitution of man, its rationale in the very nature of things. We cannot, therefore, violate its sanctity without incurring upon ourselves that penalty which the self-administrative laws of nature are sure to inflict. So essentially does this whole Sabbath question enter into the original plan of things that the well-being of the individual, the family and the State is hinged upon its observance. To do away with the Christian Sabbath is to desecrate every Christian altar, hush the chime of every church-going bell, relax the moral fibres of the community, and raise upon the society the flood-gates of ruin. Let us therefore urge upon you the duty of making this day which the Lord hath made, a holy day and not a holiday. Let us make our Sabbaths as bright and beautiful as possible, and by refraining from such pleasure and business as is not absolutely necessary, let us find in them that which feeds the best part of our being—use them for soul purposes and spiritual ends. Let us in all things seek to spiritualize and sanctify the secular, rather than secularize the spiritual and sacred.

In these days of socialistic agitation and aggressiveness when theories are being promulgated which undertake the readjustment of society and the rectification of all economic wrongs, we would remind you that society as a whole can never be any better than are the individual members of which it is composed, and that individual character cannot be regenerated merely by changing its material and social conditions. All social wrongs will be redressed, and all social friction must cease when we have translated into the life of the individual and society at large the social ethics of the Old and New Testament, as developed in the Decalogue and in the Sermon on the Mount.

Amongst us far more than in the days of Solomon it is true, "of making many books there is no end." We rejoice in the multiplied facilities for the diffusion of knowledge, which our modern press supplies. He who writes a book or a sentence which contains a thought immortal, elevating, inspiring, has done far more for humanity than he who builds an elegant edifice or rears a magnificent mausoleum. Well may the Sage of Chelsea say, "Of all things which man can do or make here below, by far the most momentous, wonderful and worthy are the things which we call books." And yet amidst all this swelling tide of literature whose volume increases every day, one of our greatest perils is to be found. Keep out of your homes and the hands of your children such reading as is tainted with the vile infection of infidelity and vice. A pure literature is as necessary to the moral health of your families as are fresh air and wholesome food to their physical health.

In this connection we would remind you of the papers, periodicals and books which are being issued from our Book Room by the sanction and authority of our Church. No better corrective of the evils we have named, and no more wholesome, mental pabulum in the form of literature can be found than that created and circulated by this agency. Let us here add that now since the price of the *Guardian* has been reduced to the nominal sum of one dollar per annum, there is not a Methodist home from the Atlantic to the Pacific from whose threshold it need be excluded.

The educational interests of our Church never had a stronger claim upon the sympathy and support of our people than at the present time. Never did a greater number of students throng the halls of our university and colleges, never were our professorial chairs better manned, and never was our university better equipped, or its affairs more wisely administered, than to-day. Let all our people remember that nowhere can their sons and daughters receive a more thorough training, or a better mental, moral, professional and practical outfit for life, than at our own colleges and university. The influence of these institutions must ever be reckoned as one of the prime factors in our church work and in the progress of our people. In fact, Methodism has reached that phase in her development where she must be more loyal and liberal in the support of her educational interests, or forever handicap herself in the execution of the high and holy work to which, in the providence of God, she has been designated.

Perhaps one of the most phenomenal movements of modern times is the sudden rise and expansion of the Christian Endeavor and Epworth League Societies. It is scarcely possible to exaggerate the importance of this new movement in its bearing upon the future development and destiny of our Church. This young giant is all vibrant with energy and full of the promise and potency of all manner of usefulness. We pray that its energies may be wisely directed, made to flow through the best channels, and expend themselves upon the most worthy objects. God bless the young people of our Church, and baptize them with the spirit of power, of love, and of a sound mind.

We cannot close without one word in regard to the great cause of Missions. If the safety of ancient Rome was supposed to depend upon the incessant burning of the vestal fires, how much more in reality is the existence and extension of the Church of Christ dependent upon our seeing that the fire of missionary zeal and enterprise never burns low or goes out upon our church altars.

We believe the nations of the earth were never more ready to receive the Gospel than at present. Barriers of centuries are being removed in a day. Never were the gates of the heathen world thrown more widely or welcomely open to the missionary than now, while the facilities for spreading the Gospel are being augmented every hour. Missions are not a failure, Christianity is not a failure. Jesus sways more hearts than ever confessed allegiance to any earthly potentate. His name is being written in every language and spoken by every tongue. Millions adore Him, and from every land His praises rise like perpetual incense to the skies. Our hope is exultant! Faith sees the mountain-tops glow with the promise of His coming. He hears the crash of falling synagogues, mosque and pagoda, and the death-sigh of every system of idolatry. The song the angels sang o'er Bethlehem's plains is spreading from continent to continent, from isle to isle, and from sea to sea, and soon our whole earth will be enswathed in its ceaseless melody, and all the grating, jarring sounds of earth will be lost in the harmonies of God in heaven.

"Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do his will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."
