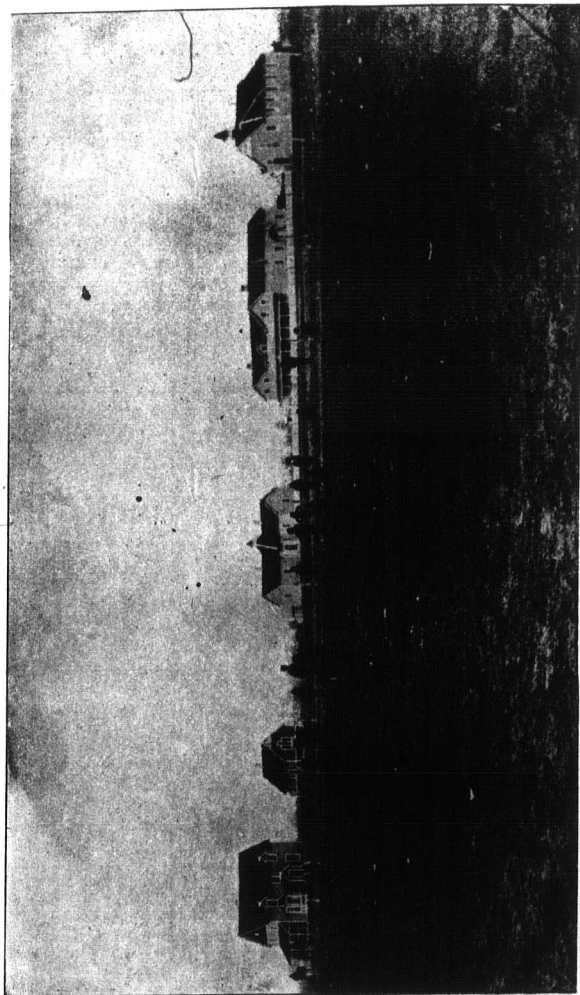

ST. JOHN'S MISSION, NORTH BLACKFOOT RESERVE.

REPORT.

IN presenting our friends and helpers with the accompanying statement of Receipts and Expenditure in the various Indian Missions in the Diocese of Calgary, we desire to give them our most hearty thanks. We would also impress upon them that as the work grows our expenses naturally increase, and to carry on the work at the present rate, an income of from \$1,500.00 to \$2,000.00 over and above what we received in the past year is required.

An additional Clerical Missionary has joined us, the Rev. C. H. P. Owen, who has been appointed Principal of the St. John's Home for boys, at the Blackfoot Mission. Our staff of workers has in some instances been changed, and more efficiency and economy thereby obtained.

Six clergy are now labouring on the reserves, besides one, the Rev. G. H. Hogbin, who has charge of the central Indian Industrial School at Calgary, making a total of seven clergy engaged in Indian work in the Diocese. A Lay Missionary and Teacher has been appointed to Bull Horn Mission, on the Blood Reserve.

Of the clergy, five are supported by C.M.S. Funds, one is dependent on the Church in Canada, and the Principal of the Industrial School receives his salary from the Indian Department.

The C.M.S. continues its grant of \$4,970.00 for Indian work. Valuable aid has been again given by the W.A. in Canada, towards our Homes; and the S.P.C.K. has made a grant of £100 per year for three years towards the Maintenance of forty pupils in the new Victoria Jubilee Home. The Government grants \$72.00 per head on the average attendance of pupils, towards their maintenance and tuition, and in order further to assist our funds, allows us to get beef or flour, or both, from them at contract rates, the amount received in kind being deducted from the per capita grant.

The actual work done by our Missions cannot be measured by visible results, nevertheless we have much cause for thankfulness in the movement towards Christianity which has set in of late. On the Blackfoot Reserve nine or ten adults have been baptized since the beginning of the New Year, and four have been confirmed; and at the Sarcee Mission a whole family, consisting of

seven souls has been admitted into the visible Church of Christ. Encouraging reports come likewise from the Blood and Peigan Missions. At the latter place about eighty-five people attend the services at the two stations occupied. In the Industrial School also four of the senior scholars, whose early training was received in our Boarding Schools have been baptized and others are under course of special instruction previous to being admitted into the Church.

St. Peter's Mission, Peigan Reserve, continues under the charge of the Rev. J. Hinchliffe, whose value, especially as a linguist, is untold. He has much encouragement from the number of Indians who come to the services. Although not actually applying for baptism, some of them shew their appreciation of his work by voluntary gifts of hay and other products.

The Victoria Jubilee Home, mentioned in the last report as in course of erection, has been completed. It was occupied in September. It is a frame building with stone foundation, lath and plastered throughout on the inside, and nicely situated on Pincher Creek, on forty acres of land which has been given by the Government to the Church. The new Crow's Nest Railway passes within two hundred yards of the property, and a railway station is being erected within a mile of the Home. The total cost of removal of the old building, and the erection of the new Home, including the furnaces, is \$4,133.96. The total amount received for this purpose to 31st March, is \$2,540.00; thus leaving \$1,633.96 still to be raised. A portion of this amount, has in the meantime, been loaned by a staunch friend to our Indian work. The financial difficulty in which, since the commencement of the Home, the Mission has been placed, is a real anxiety to Mr. Hinchliffe; and we commend most heartily to those friends of Missions who have the means, this object as a worthy one for their support. We gratefully acknowledge the services of Dr. Mead, of Pincher Creek, who has gratuitously rendered his services to the Home.

St. Paul's Mission, Blood Reserve, has been divided, and will in future be known as St. Paul's Upper Mission and St. Paul's Lower Mission. Under this plan each of the Clerical Missionaries has over thirty miles of territory to cover.

The Upper Mission is in charge of the Rev. E. F. Hockley, whose work is almost wholly itinerating. He is in no way discouraged, and in going from house to house is generally welcomed, and finds frequent opportunities of "speaking the Word." Attached to this Mission is Bull Horn's Day-school, where a Lay Missionary and Teacher is at work.

The Lower Mission is now in charge of the Rev. A. de B. Owen, who is also Principal of the Kissock Homes. Mr. Owen has found his time almost wholly occupied with the work of the institution. The staff has been somewhat reduced, owing partly to the small income the Homes now receive as compared with three or four years ago, and the cost of carrying on the work has been reduced to a minimum. Some of the pupils have been discharged as over age, others have been transferred to the Industrial School, leaving about fifty-two scholars in residence. Some of the elder girls have asked to be allowed to remain at the School, even when over age, rather than return to Indian camp-life on the Reserve. The present staff are all devoted to their work, and the moral and spiritual good accomplished by them, under God's blessing, is inestimable. The cost of these Homes last year exceeded our income by \$500.00. We desire most earnestly that the friends of this Mission will see to it that the work is not crippled for lack of funds.

St. John's Mission, Blackfoot Reserve, continues to be under the supervision of the Rev. H. W. G. Stocken. He has much encouragement in his work here. Several adults, men and women, have been baptized. The Bishop held a confirmation at the Mission recently, when three men and one woman were confirmed. At the Communion Service, which followed, six natives received the Sacrament. One of the Indians, the owner of a sacred tent and the paraphernalia connected with the dance, for which he had paid ten horses, voluntarily presented the Bishop with the whole outfit, stating that he had now found something better, which would more than compensate for the loss of his horses.

The Girl's Home, of which Mrs. Stocken is the Principal, and Miss Gibson, of Toronto W.A., the Matron, is the original St. John's Home, but is now used exclusively for girls. There are twelve girls at present in attendance, and it is hoped many more will shortly enter. They are doing remarkably well in the House, the Laundry, and the School.

At the South Reserve, the Rev. C. H. P. Owen is labouring as Missionary and Principal of the Boys' Home. He has now 25 boys under his charge, several having been transferred to the Calgary Industrial School.

The Hospital has more than met our most sanguine hopes. Through the devotion of the Dr. and the Misses Turner, it has become so useful and so much appreciated that it would be impossible now to do without it. The work grew so rapidly that an

assistant nurse had to be obtained, half her salary being generously found by those whose labours she came to share. The increase in the work and staff made it imperative that the building should be enlarged, and the erection of comfortable nurses' quarters has been completed. The following statistics to 31st March, give a partial idea of the work entailed :

St. Barnabas Mission, Sarcee Reserve, continues in charge of Archdeacon Tims. Here again he has found encouragement in the baptism of a whole family into the Christian Church. The majority of the Sarcees still hold aloof from Christianity, whilst a few are fairly regular in their attendance at the Indian Services, though not yet ready to give up all their old ways for Christ.

The Boarding School contains, with two exceptions, all the children of school age on the Reserve. They are fifteen in number. Three of the elder girls have asked for Baptism, and Archdeacon Tims hopes to receive them as well as present three adults for confirmation before he leaves for England on furlough.

The Calgary Industrial School which completes the educational organization in the Diocese, so far as Indian work is concerned, is now full ; twenty-seven pupils having been drafted into it from our Boarding Schools since the last report was issued. There are now 45 pupils, and all are doing exceedingly well under the able management of the Principal. As stated above, three have been baptized since entering the Industrial School, and others are under instruction. No pressure is brought to bear on any of the pupils, beyond a clear exposition of what God requires of man in the ordinary services and prayers day by day.

Our most grateful thanks are tendered to the W.A. Branches, which support many of our Lady workers and send us such valuable help in the bales ; also to the Missionary Leaves Association of England, and the individuals who through its means, forward to our Missions both money and clothing.

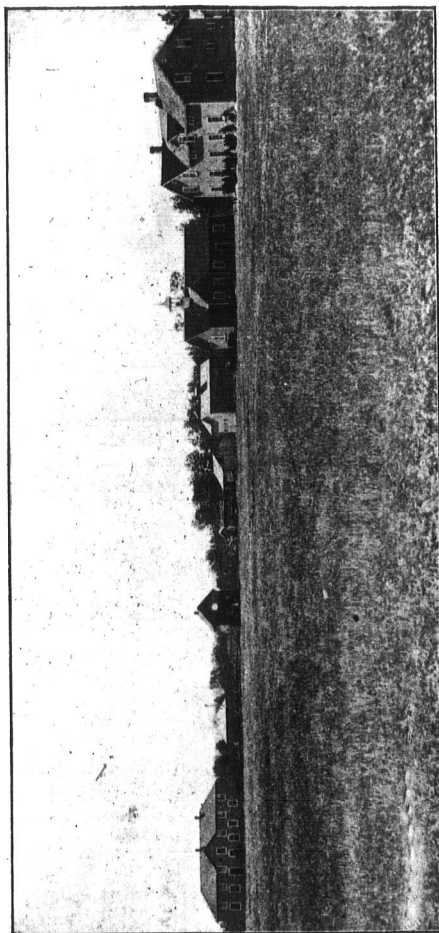

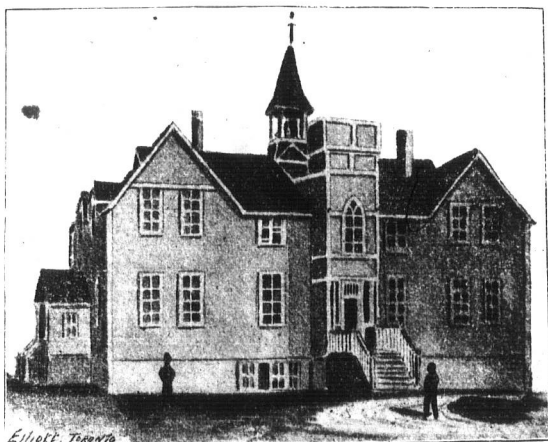

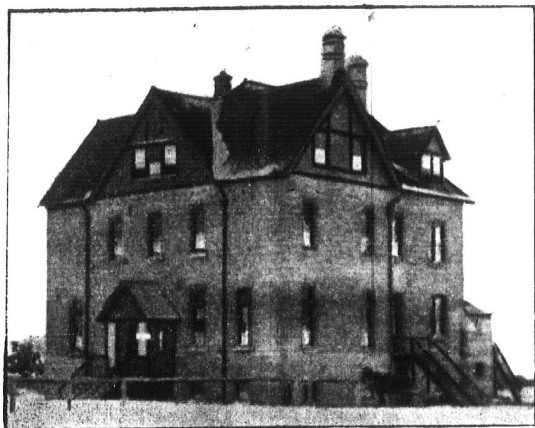

CALGARY INDIAN INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

This Institution, situated on the Bow River, about four miles below the city of Calgary, is really the graduating place for the pupils of the Mission Schools.

The building itself is a massive stone structure, and when finished will be most imposing. At present, only about one third of it is completed, but as that third is now full, it is likely to be soon added to or completed.

It was formally opened on December 9th, 1896, by His Excellency the Governor General, who was accompanied by Lady Aberdeen.

Besides the cost of building, the Indian Department pays all maintenance charges; and, as occasion arises, is providing ample and complete equipment.

There are now 45 pupils in attendance, of these 18 are Peigans, 12 are Blackfeet, 9 are Bloods, and the remaining 6 are Sarcees; and with but one exception, they have all been transferred from the Mission Boarding Schools.

Naturally, in addition to the Industrial training the pupils receive in carpentry, and farming, the endeavour of all those working in the institution is towards carrying on the work of evangelisation, so well begun on the Reserves, and to which the pupils, at some time or other, will return when of age.

Regular Sunday Services are held, and each morning and evening there is a service with instruction. Baptismal and Confirmation Classes are also held, and it is gratifying to be able to record that four—one Peigan, one Sarcee, and two Blackfeet, have voluntarily come forward for baptism, and have been baptized.

The prayers of all those interested in advancing Christ's Kingdom are most earnestly desired, that the work, so favourably commenced, may continue to receive God's blessing, and that those working in this important part of God's vineyard may be given the right judgment in all things, so necessary, and which can only come through the Holy Spirit, given in answer to earnest prayer.
