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OFFICIALS AND PHYSICIAN

Were not responsible was decision of City Health Board in recent death—Miscellaneous business transacted.

The Board of Health held a special meeting this morning to decide in reference to the complaint of Mr. Maltman that his child had been discharged from the Infectious Diseases Hospital before she was thoroughly well.

Controller O'Connor read a very lengthy report in which he stated that the physician who was not to blame, and that the child was discharged from the hospital when he was, and he suggested that a physician should visit the hospital every day while patients are there, and that a chart be kept and retained giving the history of the pulse, temperature, etc.

Mr. W. H. Wetherby stated that he did not consider that there was any neglect on the part of the medical attendance or nurse.

Controller O'Connor concurred in the opinion of Controller O'Connor and Commissioner Wetherby.

An application was read from Falcous and McDonald for permission to place seven houses on Frank St., Messrs. A. H. H. and O. R. Smith were present and stated that the character of the houses was not to be improved, and that the other principal towns of the Province to follow.

On motion of Commissioner Wetherby and a permit was granted.

Mr. Falcous was present at the meeting of the Board to show reasons why his house should not be condemned and torn down, as is now alleged by the premises.

An opinion was read from the City Solicitor in reference to the removal of the nuisance on some land on Long St. owned by St. Paul's Parish, which is the vicinity of the indicator.

The nuisance has been removed by the Health Board and the opinion was to the effect that under the health by-laws the owners were obliged to pay for the removal, although they had not been instructed in this regard.

A citizen is to be proceeded against for creating a nuisance on Morris St., without first obtaining permission.

Several citizens were ordered officially by the Board to put in modern plumbing or proceedings would be taken against them.

The owner of a house on Maynard St. was notified to attend the next meeting of the Board to show reasons why his house should not be condemned and torn down, as is now alleged by the premises.

The Board is to be proceeded against for creating a nuisance on Morris St., without first obtaining permission.
