




HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

Servia on the Verge of Serious Trouble

—Angry Scenes in Parliament.







# NEW BRUNSWICK FORESTRY ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED

Convention Also Recommended Forestry Course at U. N. B With Outside Instruction, Rigid Fire Protection, Export Duty on Pulp Wood and Other Suggestions for Government in Framing

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 21.—
After a closing hour of open discussion in which the lessons of the previous meetings were summed up and expressed in the form of recommendations in the form of recommendations in the form of recommendations in the formation of a New Brunswick Forestry Convention closed a highly successful session. The visible results of the convention are the formation of a New Brunswick Forestry Association, recommendations in favor of a Forestry course at the U.N. B., of drastic provisions for the prevention of fires, of the protection of the export of pulp wood and several valuable suggestions for the government in its formation of a definite forestry policy.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At the opening of the session this afternoon the premier read a paper he har received from Charles E. Oak of Bangor, vice-president of the Miramichi Lumber Company. The writer did not believe that the time of scientific forestry had arrived unless such a system would be adopted by the government. A HARVARD PROFESSOR'S AD-

Prof. Austin Cary of Harvard University read a paper on the Forest Policy of the United States and Other Countries. Prof. Cary, after some general references, advocated as regards the forests, government ownership, skilful administration and a well directed line of education. New Brunswick had many advantages among these its splendid situation, and that the forests were a source of revenue. In connection with administration it was most necessary that a strong con-In connection with administration it was most necessary that a strong consistent policy should be adopted and that its execution should be put in the hends of strong, active men. The formation of a strong organization meant money, but it would be money well spent. This province, with its splendidly trained men in the crown land office had those well fitted to take control and with its fine educational institutions spon train its young men. In conclusion he advocated the mapping of all the lands, showing the growing as well as the burnt districts and the estimated value. The plan had an interesting address on Protection of Forests from Fires. Mr. Fish spoke of the great value of our trees, and claimed that prompt action should be taken with meeting the destructive fire. Our forests are yearly becoming smaller and it was absolutely necessary that what we have we should protect. Fires resulted from one of three causes—lightning, lumbermen clearing their land, or from railways. The latter two we could control, and the secret in meeting the difficulty was using vigilance beforehand. Little fire resulted from lightning.

C. E. Lund, Sackyille, contributed an

C. E. Lund, Sackyille, contributed an interesting paper on Forest Fire Law of Westmorland County. Owing to the lengthiness of the paper Mr. Lund read only a number of extracts. The chief principles to be advanced were agitation, education and legislation. Forest fires were like smallpox and must be stamped out in the inception. He told of the Westmorland law and claimed that in many respects it was worthy of the best consideration. 

Mrs. Cole who lived up stairs over Forbes and Charters did not carry any insurance and estimates her loss at three or four hundred dollars. Much of the furniture and household effects were either destroyed or partially ruined by the flames, while carpets were soaked with water. McDonald and Bourgeois carried a thousand dollars insurance on their stock which covered the losses, a portion of the stock being saved. Miss Magee also had a thousand dollars on the stock but lost considerable household effects. Forbes and Charters building was owned by F. C. Jones, of this city, who carries two thousand insurance which will cever his losses.


