STEEL TRUST IN WAR TO WIPE OUT JOBBERS.

To Build Warehouse in Pittsburg, Philadelphia and Other Cities For Small Trade,

PITTSBURG, Feb. 5—The United States Steel Corporation has decided to go after the steel jobbing trade and the steel jobbers' profits throughout the United States, and at the same time deliver a telling blow to independent makers of steel.

Its plan was revealed today through the letting of contracts by the Carnegie Steel Company for a mammoth warehouse in the heart of the business Pittsburg. The corporation will deal directly with the small consumer of steel in any form, something the trust has never before done.

The Pittsburg warehouse, which is to

The Pittsburg warehouse, which is to be duplicated in Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Buffalo, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Omaha, New Orleans and Dallas, will have power to run cranes, cold saws, planes, punches, etc., so that the small consumer, who has hitherto bought from the jobber, can have his material cut and fitted before it leaves the warehouse.

Mr. McLeod said his retirement was not of sudden determination. For years he had planned that when he reached three score years he would retire from active work in the bank. Although three score years are some way off, still, looking into the near future and seeing that Canada was headed for an era of unprecedented prosperity, with which would come grave responsibility for the heads of financial institutions, he considered it the part of good business to insist upon his handing over the reins of management to someone else. This is the true story of Mr. McLeod's resignation, rumors to the contrary notwithstanding, he declares.

It is Mr. McLeod's intention to spend many of the coming years in travel. He will maintain his house in Toronto, but two-thirds of his time will be spent in Minneapoiis, where he years ago made hosts of friends.

A DESERT ISLAND

Shipwrecked Mariners Live on Mosses and Shellfish -Grim Discov. r/.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—An extraordinary series of misfortunes ensuing in ship-wreck was told on Monday when the survivors of the London sailing vessel Deccan were landed at Liverpool by the Pacific liner Orcoma.

The Deccan, a ship of 1,836 tons, left Port Talbot with a cargo of coal last August. She was bound for South America, and had on board a crew of twenty-seven.

Not many weels had passed before the first of a series of misfortunes overtock the vessel, for when she was near Cape Horn the master, Capt. Parnell, was taken ill. His symptoms developed, and he was put ashore at Port Stanley, subsequently returning to his home at Portmadoc, where shortly after arriving he died.

When the vessel was preparing to put out to sea again fire broke out, and the greatest difficulty was experienced in subduing it. When at last the ship was able to proceed on her voyage she encountered seas of tremendous violence, and was driven ashore on Mes Island. When the Deccan struck her mainmast fell overboard, and being badly holed she began to fill rapidly. The crew took to the boats, but there was no time for the men properly to provision them, a few biscults and some tinned meat being all they managed to get together before getting clear of the sinking ship.

Fifteen minutes after the vessel struck she went down, and the crew in their open boats were left at the mercy of the breakers. After a long spell of laborious rowing a small sandy beach was discovered, and a landing was effected on one of the islands of Tierra del Fuego.

Although safe frim peril by sea, the men were now exposed to fresh dangers. Their provisions soon gave out, and this wretchedness was added to by torrents of rain and sleet, which fell practically the whole of the time they were on the island, their only protection being afforded by a rough tent made from a strip of sailcloth.

With the last of the tinned meat and biscuits gone the marooned sailors had perforce to rely for food on what could be found on the island, and in this way they managed to subsist on mosses and shellfish.

On one occasion when in search of food a member of human skeletons lying beside a pile of mussel shells, indicating only too plainly the fate of some luckless crew who had been ship-wrecked before them.

Thirteen days after the loss of the Deccan a whaler was sighted. She was promptly signalled, and came to anchor off the shore and took on board the survivors, who were again landed at Punta Arenas, from which port they sailed for Liverpool by the Orcoma.



BISHOP STRIKES AT LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Striking passages against the liquor traffic formed the leading feature of the annual pastoral letter of His Lordship Bishop Casey, which was read in the Roman Catholic churches of the diocese at yesterday's services. The Fishop gave a strong deliverance on the evils of the liquor traffic. After a searching consideration of the traffic, he struck hard on the liquor dealers, who do not observe the regulations and remember that they are Christians.

Bishop Casey at first referred to various offenses, but the foreful part of his pastoral dwelt on drunkenness.

What the Irish hishops, once assembled in synod at Maynoch, said of their children at home, may be affirmed, with equal truth, of many other mations, and not least perhaps of our own country. "To drunkenness we may refer, as to the baneful cause, almost all the crime by which the country is degraded, and nearly all the poverty from which it suffers."

No words of ours add anything to such that its enormity is increased by the fact that it may become the mother of any or all of them. Indeed, we can scarcely consider drunkenness alone, for it is always followed by an unholy brood of crimes. In itself, it is but the starting point on the way to perdition. In its wake, follow idleness, carelessness, evil company, profanity, debauchery, gambling, destruction of property, ruin of family, disease, death in abandonment and impenitence. Is there a liquor dealer worthy of general esteem, one perfectly respectable in all his relations, one who fears not the anger of God, or the reprobation of wives and mothers? Is there one who has properly obtained a license and conducts his business to meet a legitimate want of the public, who is himself perfectly sober; who does not adulterate his goods or sell them to any one likely to abuse them; who permits no disorder, as blaspehmy or indeent language, in his store; who seeks not to evade the law; who incites no one to drink, least of all the young; who hever sells to minors; in a word, who is obedient to the civil laws and to the principles of Christian charity and fusiless to fear the judgments of God or the reproaches of the public.

PARIS, Feb. 5.—King Alfonso's troubles are growing. In addition to the military conspiracy as a revealed the ther day, Don Jaime of Bourbon, pretender to the throne, is said to be fomenting another uprising. He is the only son of Don Carlos. He was educated in England and served with distinction in the Russian army.

As in the case of so many of the great houses of European royalty, the Bourbons owe their name to distard detect. It was originally one of the great baronial families of the kingdom of France, owning the rich provinces of the centre, known as the Bourbonnals, whence it took its name. The first of the Bourbons known in history was Adhemar, who flourished at the close of the ninth century. In 1272 the stouse of Bourbon had become extinct, same from Beatrice of Bourbon, sole lieiress of the name and possessions, who married Robert, Count of Clerment, sixth son of King Louis IX. of France, popularly known as St. Louis. Their son Louis became Duke of Bourbon in 1327, and had two sons, Peter, Duke of Bourbon, who was killed at the slege of Romeo by a platol shot nied by Benvenuto Cellini, and a younger son, James. Comte de la Marche, whose son in turn, on marrying the helress of the illustrious house of Vendome, assumed the title of Count and Duke of Vendome. His descendant Anthony, Duke of Vendome, married Jeanne d'Albert, Queen of Navarre, and their son, Henry, became in turn, king of Navarre and king of France and the father of Louis XIII. of France. Princess Marie of Bourbon Orleans, daughter of the Due de Chartres, is the wife of Prince Waldemar of Denmark. One of the sisters of the Duke of Orleans is Queen of Portugal and another is the consort of the royal Italian Duke of Aosta. There are Bourbons who have married into the reigning House of Bavaria, and even into the Hohenzollern family, while the Duke of Orleans himself has a wife who is an archduchess of the Hapsburg dynasty.



provides that it shall be paid in the
form of an annuity. The bill is based
upon the existing laws of Emgland and
Germany. Such legislation was favored
in one of the messages of former President Rosevelt and President Taft

THE BISHOP'S PASTORAL

WARMLY ENDORSED

Clergymen of Other Denominations Much Pleased With His Lordship's Force-

City clergymen of all denominations strongly encorse the pastoral letter of his Lordship Bisnop Casey in condemnation or the liquor traffic. Comment of the arrangament was heard everywhere this morning. The temmerance forces are particularly well pieased with the bishop's attitude.

Probably the strongest endorsement of His Lordship's views was given by Rev. S. W. Anthony, pastor of the Congregational church. He said in part:

"I have read the remarks of several well known writers on the evils of the liquor traffic, but I have never read a stronger arraignment of the traffic than that given by Bishop Casey in his pastoral letter. The letter, itself is a master piece—a classic—that I intend to preserve. His Lordship's language, is, in my opinion, most eloquent. The letter should be read, time and again."

Rev. James Crisp appreciated the timely letter of His Lordship. He thought that its contents should be endorsed by all clergymen, irrespective of denominations.

Rev. W. W. Lodge expressed himself as entirely in accord with the views of His Lordship. The letter would prove of valuable assistance to the temperance cause.
