

Monster demonstrations were held by Orangemen in different parts of the province, the principal gathering being that at Drumbeg, near Belfast, where Sir Edward Carson delivered a fighting speech. In unequivocal terms he emphasized the determination of Ulster to make no surrender. The government, he said, seemed to be in great difficulty. "I'll help them out," he added. "I'll give them our alternative—give us a clear cut Ulster or come and fight us. There is no other alternative possible. They must make up their minds once for all whether they are going o put us fown or leave us alone."



The first number of Punch, the world-famous London satirical weekly, was issued seventy-three years ago today, July 17, 1841. Mark Lemon was the first editor, and asociated with him were Henry Mahew, Dougias Jer Pold, Gilbert a Beckett, and others. The first cartoons and the first cover design were the work of Archibald Henning, a humorist who looked the part, for a contemporary writer declared that "merely to look at his jovial phiz is a cure for melancholy." The first edition of "Punch, or The London Charivari," consisted of 5,000 coples. All were sold in a day, and a second edition of 5,000 of the first number was sold out he following day. For a three penny humorous publication this was a great triumph, and Punch from its first day of life has basked in the sunshine of prosperity. Since its birth Punch has had seven different covers. For more than three-score years, until Cotober last, the cover remained the same, and all England was startled when Punch appeared in a gay colored dress, but with the old design practically unchanged except for the addition of colored inks in the printing.


