HELD IN THE CITY OF LONDON, ONTARIO, 1889.

The Conference began its Sessions in the Dundas Centre Methodist Church, in the City of London, on Thursday, June 6th, 1889, at 9 a.m.

The President, Rev. Jas. Graham, announced the 683rd hymn. The 4th chapter of 2nd Corinthians was read, and the Conference prayer-meeting was continued until 10 a.m.

As members of this Conference, the laymen elected by the several Districts were reported to the Conference.

An appeal was made to the chair on the point—" Is the election of a lay delegate to this Conference, who is not a member of the District electing him, legal."

WILLIAM YOKOM.

Rev. Wm. Yokom departed this life in great peace on the 30th day of April, 1889, in the town of Aylmer. Brother Yokom was born in St. Catharines, Ont., September 17th, 1819, and was converted to God September 3rd, 1838, under the labors of the Rev. Leonard Salsbury. He became an exhorter in the Methodist Church while a young convert, afterward a local preacher, travelling some five years under the Presiding Elder. He became a member of the Niagara Conference of the late Methodist Episcopal Church in 1858. His first appointment was to the Walsingham Circuit, thence to Chatham, and after twenty years of faithful service in the itinerancy, he closed his effective ministry on the Tilson-

burg station in 1879. Since that time he has held the ever-honored position of an approved superannuated minister of the Church of God unto the close of his natural life. Brother Yokom has left on earth to mourn his departure a sorrowing widow, three daughters, one son—now in the ministry in the United States—and a large circle of warm friends. As the closing moments of his life drew near, with his beloved wife and family around him, he waved his hand twice toward his heavenly home, bowed a final farewell, and sweetly fell asleep in Jesus. A suitable funeral service was held in the Methodist Church, Aylmer, May 2nd, conducted by the Rev. W. S. Pascoe, D.D., after which six ministers bore his mortal remains to the Aylmer cemetery, where they await the resurrection of the just.

THOMAS HANNA.

In the Canada Conference Wesleyan Minutes of 1845, in answer to the question, "Who have travelled one year?" we have the name of Thomas Hanna. He was born in Armagh, Ireland, in 1815, emigrated with his father's family in 1820 to Canada, and settled in Augusta. He was converted when about seventeen years of age, commenced to preach in 1839, and in 1845 was recommended to the Wesleyan ministry. He had spent some years on circuits, and two at Victoria College, when, at the Conference of 1850, held in Brockville, he was admitted into full connexion, and set apart to the full work of the ministry by the President, the Rev. Matthew Richey, D.D., just three years after the second union with the British Conference. After travelling for a great many years on Circuits, he was appointed to Walpole Island, where his labors were made a blessing to the aborigines of that place. While there he passed through the deep waters of personal affliction and trying family bereavement, which he bore with Christian fortitude; and a few months before his own death he lost his devoted wife. At our last District Meeting, in the summer, he said he lost four of his children through his residence on Walpole Island, in the mission house there. He became superannuated in 1881, and took up his abode near Port Lambton. He spent a great deal of his time, especially the last year, in preaching and lecturing on adjoining circuits, until a short time before his decease, so that it may be said of him he ceased at once to work and live. Joseph Hill, in his retirement writes (the two were received and superannuated at the same time): "As a preacher, his sermons showed that he was a Bible student, and he preached some of the best sermons I have ever heard. And I have never heard him preach a sermon that did not evidence the fact that he was competent, "rightly dividing the Word of Truth." The venerable Dr. Sanderson says that when he had charge of the Cobourg District, Brother Hanna was a man of great energy and devotion to his work. Possessing more than average ability, he was popular on the fields of labor he occupied, and quite successful in winning souls to Christ. As a controversialist, he was more than ordinarily able, and more than one thoughtless disputant had reason to regret provoking Brother Hanna to a wordy contest, in which he was uniformly victorious. He had a large and generous heart, and his best powers were consecrated to God, and employed for the enlargement of the kingdom of His redeeming Lord. His last illness was short. When he was asked if he was prepared to die, he said he had been prepared for a long time, and would soon enjoy the kingdom. His last words expressed his abiding confidence in the merits of Christ, "my Saviour." On Sunday, April 7th, 1889, aged seventy-four years, in the forty-fifth year of his ministry, he passed away to be with his Saviour forever. Six of his brethren bore his remains to the silent tomb. The chairman, Rev. W. Hayhurst, assisted by other ministers, as nearly all in the Chatham District were there, conducted the funeral services and consigned his body to the grave. He leaves five children to mourn his departure. Another aged member of the Conference has gone. They are being gathered home one by one. Let us emulate his virtues, and with him wear the victory's crown forever.

WILLIAM T. TURNER.

Rev. W. T. Turner, of Harrow, London Conference, was born in London, England, July, 1842. His father with two children emigrated to Toronto, Ont., on the death of his wife. In attendance on the faithful ministrations of Rev. George Young, D.D., he was led to Christ in the spring of 1861. From that period he was enabled to prove faithful in the service of the King of kings. He expressed himself years after as rejoicing that by the grace of God he had never consciously backslidden. He subsequently went to live in Detroit, and united with the Methodist Church, of which the noted Dr. Buckley was then pastor, under whose fatherly care and loving counsels he received much benefit that gave character to his after life. From that faithful minister he received his first license to preach. Shortly afterwards he returned to Ontario, and lived for a time in Seaforth. From that town he was drafted into the noble army of Christ's itinerants, and was sent to the Howick Mission. Brother Turner was ordained at the Wesleyan Conference of 1873, and was united in marriage to Miss Mary H. Horsey, of Toronto, who now mourns the loss of one of the most loving of husbands. On all his fields his devoted labors were abundantly blessed in the ingathering of many souls. For his work he manifested singular and marked ability. Many to-day bear witness to his painstaking and faithful efforts that

resulted in their conversion. His pulpit ministrations were full of sound doctrine. Well versed in our standard theology, possessed of a strong intellect, he was quick in discerning truth or delusive fallacy. He had a keen insight of character, and was blessed in a high degree with that invaluable gift, common sense. Of a kind and generous disposition, he delighted in conferring favors when in his power, often relieving suffering and poverty, quietly and liberally from his slender income. He had uncommon strength of purpose, that saw no obstacle too great to overcome. His integrity was unbending, never swerving from his honest convictions, no matter how tempted. Characteristically modest, he was ever disposed to manifest deference to others. He was carefully loyal to all the institutions of the Church, and strongly conservative of its interests. His last illness was of short duration. On his removal to Oxley, Harrow Circuit, it was found necessary to renovate both the church and parsonage in that place. Our brother entered heartily into those schemes. On November 4th, at the Quarterly Meeting, he preached with seemingly unusual unction and power. To all present it was a preciously profitable time. At the close of the prayer-meeting, after the evening service, he earnestly urged the friends to keep the spiritual fire burning, and, as the church was unfinished, he invited them to hold their prayermeeting in the parsonage during the week, little thinking of the purpose for which they would so soon assemble. On the following Tuesday he was stricken with a disease which baffled the skill of an attentive physician and tenderest care of kind friends. Notwithstanding their unremitting efforts, he passed suddenly away on Sunday, November 11th, 1888. He remained conscious until the last, and though suffering intensely, would speak in glowing terms of the bright prospects before him, and, breaking forth in rapturous exclamations, could be heard in the streets shouting the praises of the Most High. His end was grandly triumphant, and his chamber of death to all present was one of the wirelayd areas of arth onite on the verye of heaven. Strong men howell in was grantly triumphant, and his chamber of death to all present was one of the privileged spots of earth, quite on the verge of heaven. Strong men bowed in tearful joy, and said then and since: "Let me die the death of the righteous, and my last end be like his." A very large concourse of friends assembled from the different neighboring fields on which he had labored. Ten of his brother ministers were present, and many of them, led by his worthy and much beloved Chairman, Rev. Wm. Bryers, gave very touching testimony to the piety, usefulness, manliness and sterling worth of the departed. His remains were then tenderly horne by his brother to their mesont resting class in an element. tenderly borne by his brethren to their present resting place in an adjacent cemetery. Seldom has a people manifested more marked kindness in the sickness and demise of a beloved pastor, who was to them a comparative stranger, but who had wonderfully endeared himself to both young and old, in his short sojourn among them.

JAMES ALBERT IVISON.

Rev. James Albert Ivison was born near Newcastle, Northumberland County, England, on the 28th of November, 1831. In early boyhood he obtained a new heart. In his nineteenth year he came to Canada, and about two years afterward entered the ministry of the Methodist Church, where for nineteen years he labored earnestly and with success. About this time his health failed, and for some ten years he sustained a superannuated relation, making his home in Strathroy, for whose people he formed a strong attachment. As soon as restored health permitted, he joyfully re-entered the work, and for a period of nearly six years again declared the Gospel so dear to his own soul, until he fell in the midst of his work. From Heb. vii. 25, "Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them," his last sermon was preached on Sabbath, March 31st, 1889, with an earnestness that well befitted the ambassador of Jesus Christ in his last utterances to dying men. About three weeks of painful illness, endured with patience and resignation, brought him to the banks of the river across which came suddenly the "Welcome home!" "Well done!" and front the banks of the beautiful St. Clair he passed to the shores of the sea which John saw in his Patmos vision. In the early morning of April 18th, the cheerful, happy Christian had left wife, work, and friends, and what he believed to be one of the happiest homes on earth, to be "forever with the Lord." In life he had many friends who loved and trusted him, and to-day there are many who feel and mourn his absence. His mind during the year dwelt much on the thought of heaven and life there. Shortly before his death he spoke of his strong faith in Jesus, and the certainty of his "triumph in Him." In looking back, his sorrowing wife will take comfort in the sympathy felt for her, and the respect shown to his memory by his brethren of the Ministerial Union of Sarnia and Port Huron, and by those who conducted his funeral obsequies. In the St. Clair Church a brief and impressive service was conducted by the Rev. Thomas Cullen, assisted by the Revs. S. G. Staples and J. H. Stinson, after which his renains were taken to Strathroy for burial. Here, after seemly and suitable services, conducted by the Rev. W. McDonagh, assisted by the Revs. George Brown, J. Neeland and J. K. Williston, his body was quietly laid in the arms of its mother-earth, to await the coming day. On the following Sabbath evening his funeral sermon was preached in Sarnia Methodist Church by the pastor, the Rev. T. Cullen; and at the close, brief and appropriate addresses were delivered by the Rev. Dr. Thompson, of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, and Chief Lacoba interpretage of the St. Chief Rev. 2011. Jacobs, interpreter of the St. Clair Reserve. "He died at his post." the work is finished, and the eventide has come, may his dear wife and people meet him in the land beyond the twilight where the shadows never gather.

THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are pleased to report that success attends the labors of all Sunday-school workers throughout the Dominion, and it affords us much pleasure in being able to report that our own Conference comes in for its full share. Comparison with last year shows that there has been an increase of 100 in church membership, among officers and teachers, with 200 conversions, and of 400 meeting in class; thus giving the additional influence of more than 500 consecrated lives in connection with this department of church work. among officers, teachers, and scholars, of 800, we are enabled to report a grand total of nearly 30,000 engaged in Sunday-school labors within the bounds of our own Conference.

Your Committee beg to recommend as follows :---

1. That more attention be given to the attendance of the children at the regular church services. With this end in view, we would suggest that once during the quarter the church services be so arranged and conducted as to be made especially interesting and profitable to the interests of the Sunday-school; and that pastor, parents, officers, and teachers heartily co-operate in trying to encourage the children and young people to take part in these services.

2. That in every possible way the principles of Temperance be taught in our schools. We recommend that one service each quarter be devoted to the study of this important subject, and that the total abstinence pledge be introduced in all our schools. We would suggest the advantage gained by having, where possible, these pledges placed in conspicuous places for public inspection, and that the full number of signers be reported annually to the Conference.

3. Your Committee would call attention to the large number of schools which have no regular teachers' meetings for the study of the lesson, and would recommend that the ministers endeavor to secure closer attention to this, so that the teachers themselves may receive benefit, and be able, without depending so largely on lesson helps, to teach the Word of God.

4. We regret to report a growing neglect of the use of the Catechism in our schools, and suggest that each Superintendent of a Circuit recommend and insist on the study of the Catechism in all primary classes of our Sabbath-schools.

5. We recommend that the Sunday-school Report be read with the pastoral address in each congregation and Sabbath-school, and that each minister see that his Sabbath-school Superintendents are made aware of his request.

6. It affords us much pleasure to report an increase of more than \$200 n the missionary offerings, making a grand total of nearly \$2,500 for the ear; and we recommend that attention be called to the Disciplinary ecommendation for Juvenile Missionary Societies in all our Sabbath-chools.

7. We are pleased to notice the increasing demand for the excellent eriodicals and publications of our own Book Room, and we recommend hat the attention of all Sunday-school Committees be called to the advanages gained by and importance of using Methodist literature in all our abbath-schools, in preference to foreign publications.

In regard to the special resolution from Chatham District, respecting certain communications that have appeared in the public press, etc., etc., your Committee beg leave to report to Conference, that in their opinion the communications have to some degree been uncharitable, and hope for improvement in the tone and expression of newspaper correspondence relative to the interests of our Church. But, at the same time your Committee is of the opinion that the memorial takes too gloomy a view of the matter when it speaks of this correspondence as "Endangering the peace and prosperity of the Church"; and your Committee also commend the advice of the memorialists, suggesting to "both ministers and laymen the wisdom of taking time to consider any vexed question, soberly and together, and with a view to the Glory of God."

2. In reference to the memorials from Glencoe East and West Side

Churches, your Committee beg to report a follows:

That after careful consideration of the matter on hand, and with a desire to advance the interests of Methodism, and the cause of God, as well as to sustain the action of our Church courts and Disipline; we recommend that the Circuit now known as the Glencoe Circuit, be continued as at present.

We further recommend the sale of the two properties in question, the proceeds of such sale, after all liabilities have been met, to be used in the erection of a new church suitable to the necessities of the amalgamated congregations.

3. Respecting the memorials from Windsor District and St. Thomas First Quarterly Board in re the invitation system, and the composition of the Stationing Committee, your Committee have came to this conclusion:

That whereas this Conference is not a legislative body, and cannot, therefore, make laws pertaining to the administration of the Church, we recommend, that this matter be not introduced into this Conference as there is no probability of effecting any satisfactory change in the present state of affairs; but that all memorials of this nature be passed on to the General Conference for their consideration.

. SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Annual Report of the Board for the Year ending July 31st, 1888.

I have pleasure in again presenting to the Board the Annual Exhibit of the state of the Fund.

Although the past year has been one of great stringency in money matters, the income of the Fund has been sufficient to meet the claims of the year, and to pay off the balance against the Fund, with which the year was commenced.

The amounts apportioned to the several Districts have been paid, with comparatively trifling exceptions, and the claimants have received their full allowances.

I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid ministers have been compelled to make up deficiencies which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in very few instances have I heard any complaint.

The estimates for the coming year have been véry carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the precentage be no higher than 6%, the same as last year, although that may leave a small de-

ficiency against the Fund.

The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes. The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. There will probably be a falling off in the Interest account, as we will have to make a change in the securities of a considerable amount of our Investments, and the interest has been very closely collected.

The above is the Treasurer's Report, as adopted by the Board.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886, the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of the Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate of \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think, unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400, an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item.

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting this increased claim, by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

I consider the estimates made by the Financial Committee of the General Conference to be moderate and approximately correct, and I think the whole of these apportionments will be required to meet the claims against the Fund during the quadrennium.

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up till the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively. According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, I would say just here; in addition, that one-half of the quadrennium is now past, and one-half of the estimated amount should be in the Treasurer's hands.

From the above facts and figures, it will be seen that less than one-half of the amount estimated as necessary has been paid in the past two years by the Conferences; \$15,080 required, say \$7,150 paid, and \$7,930 still deficient on the two years. These figures speak more eloquently than anything I could say. What is to be done? This is a question properly belonging to the several Annual Conferences. That something should be done, and done generally and promptly, I think all will admit. The next meeting of the Annual Conferences should not be allowed to pass without very decided action. All the Conferences might not be disposed to take the same action; some might be disposed to adopt an additional collection to make up the balance, while others might prefer to do it by a private subscription among the friends of the Church. The amount should be raised in some way by each of the Conferences.

To prevent misunderstandings, it may be necessary to say that, as our year closes on the 31st of August, and the year in the Annual Conferences closes about June, it will be in vain to expect that our figures will agree with those returned in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

9. That permission be given to the trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church, Wabash, Dawn Mills Circuit, to sell the property, proceeds to be applied on the church and premises now in use.

THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

When we consider the progress the cause of Temperance has made we thank God and take courage.

Though the Canada Temperance Act has met with reverses, yet we believe the temperance sentiment is stronger to-day than ever. By the defeat of the Act we have gained better knowledge of the strength of the liquor traffic, and to-day men are thinking, watching, and comparing.

We have also learned that if we would reach the goal to which, as a Church, we have long since started, we must remember that hard work and practical living, and not mere sentiment, must prevail. Perhaps there never was a more critical time in the history of the Temperance movement in this country, than the present hour. For years we employed moral suasion, with a good measure of success. We were then given an Act which was in some measure prohibitory. Perhaps we relied too much on the Act and too little on action for success.

The work is now only begun, and, as a Church, we will be satisfied with nothing less than Prohibition for the Dominion of Canada. In the past we have been looking to the political parties in this country to give us what we asked for, viz.:—A measure that could be successfully sustained, but they have persistently refused to do so. We feel that the political parties of this country have been recreant to the trust reposed in them, regarding this matter, and we see no way of securing Prohibition, at an early date, save by cutting loose from party lines, and by using our franchise to sustain that party only that will give us a prohibitory measure for the Dominion.

Possibly we could not do better than ask ourselves the question, Are we willing to sacrifice our political prejudices for the sake of obtaining that which we are seeking, viz., prohibition for this Canada of ours?

Brethren, we must learn to vote as we pray. Your Committee would strongly urge upon the ministers of this Conference the importance of London's keeping the Temperance question before their people by preaching Temperance sermons, and having the total abstinence pledge signed by the civil and children in our Sabbath-schools.

We would make mention of the great good effected by the Women's Dominion Christian Temperance Union, and express our unqualified approval of their the Jesuit method and work.

We would also call the attention of our people to the importance of local having the Crooks' Act put in force at a very early date, and taking all qualified possible measures to prevent licenses being granted to sell intoxicating Empire; liquors where a requisite number of the electors can be found to prevent it.

We appreciate the sound, wholesome, and attractive temperance teach iscated a ing of our Sunday-school publications, and recommend its continuance education

THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Believing that a proper observance of the Christian Sabbath, lies at the foundation of true success, whether of the individual, the Church, or the nation, we recognize the great responsibility of the Church to do her utmost to secure universal recognition and obedience to God's great commandment to "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," and to exercise great care that her own example be pure in this respect.

While we recognize with profound gratitude that, perhaps, in no country in the world, is the Lord's Day more honored than in our own fair Dominion, we, nevertheless, view with concern the many forms of Sabbath desecration that are all too common in our midst—such as excursions, pleasure parties, general recreation, railway and steamboat traffic, and other unnecessary labor. And we would urge upon all Christians to draw the line distinctly in these matters.

We are pained to observe the extent to which Sunday visiting is indulged in by our members and their families in many localities, and we fear this evil is growing, because the sin and evil results of the custom are not set before our people with sufficient force and frequency. We would recommend that suitable reference be made to this evil in our Conference Annual Address.

Having observed that funerals are held more frequently on Sabbath than on other days, and believing that this causes much unneccessary labor, and also materially interferes with our Sabbath services, and our Sundayschool work, we would recommend that all our ministers with the aid of the Ouarterly Boards, and in conjunction with the ministers of other de-

We would also suggest that the following be said committee for this year:—The President of the Conference, Rev. T. Cosford, J. Philp and James Whiting, and Messrs Ransom Pierce, of Ridgetown, Wm. Bowman, of London and James Beatty, of Sarnia.

Further, we would recommend that all our ministers preach at least once on the subject of Sabbath Observance at each apppointment on their circuits.

REPORT OF ALMA COLLEGE.

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—We are grateful to a kind Providence that has preserved the lives and blessed the labors of our teachers and students through another year. We rejoice that we are able to report a year of prosperity, both in regard to the numbers in attendance and the quantity and quality of the work done in the various departments. We continue to receive the patronage of all Christian denominations, and have reason to believe that there is a growing public confidence in the thoroughness and efficiency of the work done within our halls. The completion and opening of McLachlin Hall marks an epoch in the history of our school. The building is not only of surpassing beauty, but most admirably adapted to the needs of collegiate work. It has so increased the capacity of the College that at least seventy more resident students can now be received, besides giving us a chapel with seating capacity of 500, some six additional class-rooms and an art gallery, which has been pronounced the finest in the Province.

We are glad to report healthy religious interest in the school, manifested by the attendance upon prayer and praise services in the College, and classmeetings and other voluntary services. Our College Missionary Society is doing a grand work in educating the minds and hearts of the young women, and inspiring them with burning interest in the world's evangelization. Three of our former students are now in China and Japan, and others are

contemplating work in the mission field.

Our enrolment has been 175 students—140 residents and 35 day pupils. Of the total enrolment, 15 come from the United States Our attendance was somewhat lessened by the prevalence of small-pox epidemic in an adjoining community.

Our Natural Science Department has been enlarged, and more efficiently equipped with needed apparatus. Our Music Department was never better attended or more firmly established in public favor. Our Commercial Department continues to attract and qualify young women for efficient services in business life. Our full Literary Course, with its Departments of Science, Mathematics, Literature, Languages, Christian Evidences and Philosophy, is giving young women an intellectual training of a thoroughly liberal and distinctively Christian character.

Our Art Department, with its new gallery and apparatus, is attracting students from all parts of Ontario, and in the recent Departmental Examinations more than retained its former high reputation—Alma winning 108 certificates in all, taking the only four full advanced certificates given in the Province, and winning, in addition, two gold medal certificates.

The response to the appeal for aid in the building of the McLachlin Hall has been encouraging. There has been subscribed nearly \$12,000—St. Thomas contributing \$5,000. Over \$6,000 of the amount subscribed has been paid. The total expenditure incurred to date on the new build-

ing is \$19,000.

The increasing sympathy shown the College in its work furnishes good grounds for expecting that there will be forthcoming all needed financial aid to keep the school fully equipped and thoroughly abreast of the times, and to enable it to do its share in retaining the education of Protestant girls in Protestant hands. It is a well-known fact that the numerous convents with which we compete are practically endowed through the gratuitous services of their teachers, and also liberally supported through accumulated benefactions of zealous friends of convent education. It is the undisguised aim of the convent system to control the education of women, and all Protestant colleges for women should be in such financial condition as to offer educational advantages as inviting as the best, and at rates that will remove all temptation for extending Protestant patronage to convent-schools.

The ladies' colleges should be powerful auxiliaries to the Missionary and Educational work, and should be recognized and affiliated in compact organization with our central university work. The fullest realization of this depends in measure upon the support of the ministers of the Conference, who can do much to awaken interest, promote patronage and direct

benefactions.

The Board highly appreciates the expressions of confidence made by the Conferences, as well as the hearty co-operation of many individual members thereof, and has derived much benefit from the advice and counsel of the associate members appointed by this Conference.

We are always proud of our equipment in Music and Art, and some marked improvements are in progress. You will be pleased to see the prominence we give to Biblical Studies, Evidences of Christianity, Mental and Moral Science-and in this respect, as indeed in all others, we are workers together with you. We have had a prosperous year, educationally, and will graduate, on the 17th, a good class of over a dozen in the different departments. We trust that we may have your active endorsation. OF THE

LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—"Grace be to you and peace from God the Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ." The lapse of another year has brought us together in our Annual Conference, where the work of the past year has been under review, and the work of the future year arranged for. According to time-honored custom we address our annual epistle to the Churches committed to our care. Very great interests are entrusted to the Church, and grave responsibilities rest upon it, which is the body of Christ, and by which the mighty purposes of God concerning our race are to be wrought out. Surely no one can stand upon the watch-tower, and looking out over the world, contemplate the dark scenes which sin presents, or hear the cry of those who are ready to perish, without feeling a terrible and crushing sense of responsibility as the thought comes home that we are our brother's keeper. Nor can we, nor dare we if we could, shake off the burden, or, by apathy and indifference, allow to pass the golden opportunities for usefulness which multiply themselves on every hand.

The reports of the year show a gratifying increase of membership. We have reason to thank God and take courage. We should never forget that we are God's workmen. interest to our Church, and gives information concerning the growth of religion among us. We earnestly hope that this year it may reach many homes that have hitherto missed its influence.

From time to time the interests of our educational institutions have. been brought to your notice. It is one of the standing principles of Methodism, that our Church take means to exert her due share of influence upon the higher education of the country. The various colleges of the Church for the training of young men and young women in the more advanced paths of learning are well equipped and well furnished with everything necessary for the accomplishment of their work. So that there exists no necessity for subjecting our young men to the alienating influence of purely secular colleges, or sending our daughters within the dangerous, enchanted ground of Romish convent schools. Much anxiety exists in some quarters with regard to the future of Victoria University. The danger is not that this or that policy should prevail with respect to that institution, but that the sympathies of the people should grow cold toward it. So long as our people stand by the college with loyal and liberal attachment, there can be no doubt of its increased influence for good in the country.

Among all the various enterprises of the Church, none is more fitted to awaken enthusiasm in the heart of every lover of our Lord than the cause of Christian Missions. Great things have been done in the past. Yet how much remains to be done. And what magnificent opportunities for doing it. Effectual doors for preaching the Gospel are open on every hand. From the frozen north, from the sunny south, and from the isles of the sea, it is the same outstretched hand and anxious cry, "Come over and help us." Opportunities are not wanting. Men are not wanting. But how can they go except they be sent. In so many cases it is the money to send them that is wanting. There is no lack of capital for any business enterprise. There is no lack of money to supply the worldly-minded with pleasure and amusement. It is only when it is necessary to assert the claims of our Lord, and to win the world for Him, that it seems hard to raise the means. Surely these things ought not to be. If the amounts of money spent by nominally Christian people for the gratification of a taste and desire for pleasure—including travel and attendance at pleasure resorts-were diverted for even one year into the coffers of the various missionary societies, it would give such a mighty impetus to missionary work as would bring the day of the Lord near. Think on these things, and let this great work, which is so much in the heart of the Master, be in your hearts, and upon your conscience, until all around "from the silent hills to the sounding sea" the light and salvation of our God shall be made

In conclusion, suffer a few more words of exhortation. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." The so-called claims of business and of pleasure are more and more infringing upon the sacredness of the day. Be very jealous of its sanctity. Much better err on the side of over-strictness than on the side of laxity.

It is more than ever necessary to be faithful to our principles and record on the question of Temperance. In view of the apparent set-back of Prohibition by the general repeal of the Scott Act, it is of unspeakable


