During the past three months, the Divisions throughout nearly all the Counties,

A number of our older Divisions have shown extraordinary activity, and have rolled up their member-No. 3.

ship in a manner worthy of the Order's best days. After deducting for losses sustained by retirement and expulsion, and making such revision of our roll of Divisions as the most rigid application of our laws requires, we are able to report a net gain of one hundred and thirty-six members.

Our Order requires but a fair field to demonstrate its usefulness, and needs only to be known and understood to command the sympathy and good wishes of all good men. Adapting itself to the necessities of its meridian, and to the wants of a progressive age, it has acquired a perfection of form and structure which it would be difficult to improve, and the only preliminary to unlimited success is that we should recognize the supremacy and leadership of the "Great Patriarch above" and be "workers together with Him."

FINANCES.

Two hundred and twenty-six Divisions have paid their per capita tax for the quarter ending Dec. 31, and the aggregate amount paid is \$75.00 in advance of the corresponding quarter of last year. The sales of stock are above the average. The total amount of receipts from all sources shows an advance of \$42.00 over

those of the corresponding quarter of last year.

AGENCY.

The receipts for the Agency Fnud are considerably less than the same quarter last year, for which two reasons may be assigned. First, during two months of the quarter we have had but one agent in the field, a circumstance which will be fully explained by the Committee. Second, last year a number of Divisions had paid their contributions to the fund before the new financial scheme had been lauuched; whereas, this year all payments are postponed until after the appointment of new collectors in January. No. 3.

In December last circulars were sent out to all of the Divisions requesting them each to nominate one or more members to act as Agency Collectors, as was done last year. The number of names reported to the Grand Scribe to date is 100, showing an increase of 11 over the number nominated last year.

The returns of these Bands show an aggregate membership of 1,527.

Three new Bands have been organized during the quarter, viz.:—Silver Stream. No. 69, at Sambro; Ever True, No. 68, at Enfield; and Rising Star, No. 70, at Springhill. Golden Dawn, No. 22, Guysboro', has been re-organized.

In conclusion, the times require a more vigorous prosecution of the work of our Order. Let us not lose sight of the great principles and objects of our Order, nor be led away from them by plausible schemes which tend only to divide and weaken. As a reformatory, and educative agency the country needs us, and our success will be commensurate with our fidelity in adhering to our principles and doing our own work.

Year Book; in which reference is made to the Montreal Convention, for which, see pages 102-3, 4, and 5 of the same book. We have got pretty well beyond the petitioning period, and now prefer that politicians and governments shall petition us.

To the last question asking us to vote:—Resolved, that all the members of the "Cumberland County Council who voted against having a Scott Act Inspector, be published in the Clarion and also county papers."

This Grand Body advises always the greatest publicity in all Temperance matters. The members in each County must do the work in such cases as the above.

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REPORT ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

To the Grand Division of Nova Scotia:

Our duty as a Committee at this time is one of almost unmingled pleasure. With the Grand Scribe we do most heartily acknowledge "the supremacy and leadership of the Great Patriarch above." The quarter has been one of prosperity.

There were reasons for anxiety. While Temperance sentiment is doubtless advancing, it cannot be overlooked that there are dangers of distraction and even of disruption in the ranks of Temperance workers. That our Order has kept well together and unflinchingly pursued its true aims in the midst of so much diversity of opinion as to the best methods of working for Prohibition, is cause for congrat-ulation and thankfulness. We would recommend that the G. W. Patriarch be requested to issue a letter as to the decided opinion of this Grand Division, that our Order should move on the same old lines which have led us to such true prosperity and avoid all issues in the Divisions which would have a tendency to cause

Our progress in membership, the increase of Divisions, and the healthy state of our finances are all indications of strength. But best of all, it seems to us, is the fact brought out by the Grand Scribe, that "the promptness with which Returns and per capital tax have been sent in, has no parallel in past years." This is evidence beyond reasonable contradiction that well adapted to the necessities of our times and the genius of our people.

The Agency Committee, we are glad to see, is much encouraged. This well and successfully tried arm of our organization has done incalculable good. Whatever helps them is an encouragement to the best interests of the people. We are ever her is an encouragement of the best interests of the people. We are glad to see the results of our Agents' work in so clear and satisfactory a light in the report of the Committee. Any sacrifice that may be required in reason, ought to be cheerfully made to secure the best Agents available.

The Bands of Hope seem to have risen in greater strength during the past quarter. Too much importance cannot be attached to this movement. Our 1,527 members ought to be increased to 15,000. This can be done if each Division will only organize a Band of Hope. Why should there not be material of youth where there is material of manhood and womanhood? Surely there is a child in every community for every member enrolled on the books of the Divisions.

The G. W. Patriarch very modestly suggests the importance of Law Enforcement as an educative and effective element in our reform. His experience and observation are very valuable on this point. Our conviction is that every aid in our power ought to be tendered to men regularly appointed to carry out the laws of the country; and we hope this will be the prevailing conviction throughout our jurisdiction.

We are glad to see that District Divisions, wherever established, are reported as giving satisfaction. There may be exceptions; but, in the estimation of the best workers, in those cases the failure has resulted from want of hearty co-operation. For the purposes of reviving declining Divisions, of re-organizing Divisions that have declined, and instituting new Divisions, we think the District Division will do good work.

Our meeting, three months ago, at Springhill, was held with the coal miners, and at a time when the winter's campaign was well under way with the promise of good results. We now number 306 Divisions and 16,704 members, with cash receipts during the quarter on general account \$1,022.10; Agency, \$366.79, making a total \$1,308.89. Three new Divisions have been organized and two dormant Divisions resuscitated. There have been seven Bands of Hope instituted, with 165 children enrolled.

CAPE BRETON.

The Scot Act is being very vigorously enforced throughout the County by a league formed for that purpose. So far the prosecutions have been very successful. The Sons and Divisions are determined, with others, to sustain the laws.

CUMBERLAND.

The AGENCY COLLECTORS are rendering material assistance. It is a great advantage to have one person in each Division especially charged with this important part of our economy. Without their aid last year and this, it would be difficult to keep two Agents employed. As advised by Grand Division at Springhill, we sent the subjoined circular to every Division in Nova Scotia :

"To the Sons of Temperance in Nova Scotia:

"HALIFAX, March 7, 1889.

"DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS,-By vote of Grand Division in recent Session at Springhill we address you respecting the AGENCY COLLECTOR. The Annual Session of 1887 advised each Division to appoint one member (for the year) who, being especially interested in Temperance missionary work, would collect funds from Members and others, and be a medium of communication with collect lands from stembers and others, and be a medium of communication with the Agency Committee. For forty years the Sons of Temperance have been doing work outside their Division rooms by Addresses, Lectures, Public Meetings, and have expended over \$60,000 with the good results that to day this Province is the most temperate in the Dominion and one of the soberest countries in the world. most temperate in the Dominion and one of the soberest countries in the worto. Divisions have trained two generations of workers. Every other Temperance organization is indebted to us for earnest and experienced members; and we bid them all "God speed" in their labors and successes. The work of our Order has increased with our years: during 1888 Agents of Grand Division have held 442 Public meetings, addressed 277 Schools, visited 199 Divisions, organized 37 Temperance Societies, travelled 6716 miles, addressed in meetings 58000 people, all at a cost of \$2500. Over \$1000 of this came from friends and the Divisions of our 18 Counties (see page 207 of Year Book—or the Agency pamphlet pp. 19-36); the balance came from the funds of Grand Division. This is a good showing. Without these donations from the Divisions we could have done only about half the work above stated. During January over 100 Divisions appointed their collectors who have received from the Grand Scribe reports, &c., for distribution, and who are now making contributions. The sums given are often small: we do not in general expect large amounts; but if only 25 cents a quarter, the act does good to those who give and to those who receive. A Division already paying a large sum for Stock, or Hall, or Agency, and whose members cannot give more at present, should appoint the "Collector" so that she (or he) may receive reports &c., to be distributed. If a division is poor, the same reasons urge the appointment. Every division should have this officer: if not previously selected, you can elect now and thus be in line with the Divisions that are helping to carry our Order into every part of the Province. Our reports and accounts are presented to Grand Division and full statements made of receipts and expenditure. These and reports of all work done are also printed in pamphlet form. Our special attention is now to the Schools. The Agents and Lecturers try not to pass a school house door without calling and addressing the pupils. We want every Town and Hamlet and School in Nova Scotia to learn the grand principles of our old Order. By each division doing a little all will be accomplished. Will your division help?

The collectors are urged to gather the contributions every quarter, so that at the close of our year in October a goodly amount will have been furnished by means of the many small donations.

As shewn by the summary large attention is being given to the children in our schools. The young folk duly appreciate the visits and addresses' of our Lecturers; and most satisfactory results are flowing therefrom. We shall endeavour to reach and influence for sobriety the hundred thousand boys and girls of this Province, with the assurance that fifteen years hence when most of them will be men and women our Order and the cause of Temperance will be reaping the best of rewards.

During the past forty years we have been almost constantly at work by means of Lecturers and Temperance Tracts and papers with the good results that Nova Scotia is the soberest part of Canada. Since 1872 our Agency work has been carried forward without a break, and our 300 Divisions and 30 Bands of Hope with a membership of 1900 speak strongly to our sister Grand Divisions to go and do likewise. We present to the G. D. and to the world a tabulated statement of our Agency work for the past sixteen (16) years and the aggregate of the same. By this you will see that our Lecturers have spoken to nearly half a million

By this you will see that our Lecturers have spoken to nearly half a million people; organized 464 societies with 12,543 members; travelled 64,000 miles; distributed 131,388 pages of temperance literature, all at an outlay of \$21,000. Half the cost of this vast amount of work was collected by the Agents; the balance was contributed mainly by Grand and Subordinate Divisions. Encouraged by the magniticent results of our past efforts we are determined to advance along the well defined lines of the Sons of Temperance, with the platform of our dear old Order so solid and so broad that all classes, creeds, and nationalities can stand thereon and shoulder to shoulder fight and conquer our common foe.

REPORT ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

To the Grand Division :

I. Your Committee, having examined with due care the reports of the 1. Your Committee, having examined with due care the reports of the several Grand Officers, have great satisfaction in congratulating the Grand Division upon the efficiency of each department of our work, and the general advance of all our interests during the past quarter. The winter campaign has proved that the old Order has lost none of its early vigor, and that it continues to retain a power of adaptation to its environments which its quasi friends had considered to have passed away. Success has not been achieved so much in opening up new control of the processing of the processing and developing old practice. fields, and founding new Divisions as in conserving and developing old interests. The increase reported in membership is mainly found in Divisions with a history, as well as in localities where the character and working of our Order are best known.

2. The formation of seven new Bands of Hope indicates the interest taken, by our Subordinate Divisions, in Juvenile Temperance work. Your committee venture to suggest that zeal and effort in this direction should be increased until all the children of the Sabbath and public Schools of Nova Scotia are enrolled total

abstainers.

The subject of official visitation is of no small importance. The suggestion of the G. W. P. that visits be made by members of Grand Division to Subordinate Divisions other than their own, and in their representative capacity, is worthy of consideration, and much good might be expected to follow. Deputy McKinlay's method of inviting co-operation of other Divisional Deputies, while of great advantage where Divisions are contiguous to each other, would be found difficult to operate in the country sections of our work.

4. Agency work has gone steadily forward, two agents having been employed in four Counties. For the preservation of the aggressiveness and vitality of the

Order, Agency operations are invaluable.

5. The Grand Treasurer's accounts and the statement of the Grand Scribe indicate a healthy financial condition. The number of reporting Subordinate Divisions is larger than the average. Receipts for per Capita Tax and supplies

show an increase of \$100 over the corresponding quarter of last year.

6. The Necrological roll of this Grand Division has received additions in the names of P. W. P. Alexander McCurdy, of Rising Sun Division, a pillar of temperance and religion; P. W. P. Albert Marshall of Clarence Division, an active member of our order, and P. W. P. Rev. L. B. Gates. The Veterans are

falling in the ranks; let their sons step into the vacant places.
7. Larger sympathy is being displayed in the enforcement of temperance laws. Some portions of the jurisdictions are in advance in this line of work, notably two of those sections of the province engaged or interested in Coal Mining, Firm, uncompromising, and fearless administration of existing laws would do very much to lessen the evils we are combating.

REPORT OF THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH.

RIVER JOHN, Aug. 13th, 1889.

We meet encouraged with good news from Subordinate Divisions in almost every part of this jurisdiction. The returns have come in, busy season though it is, with commendable promptness, and exhibit our Order in fine condition. Our gains have been large and our financial condition is good; all of which will be shown in the report of Grand Scribe.

Very few Divisions have been organized since our last meeting; but with so No. 3. [557] many temperance societies in existence, it is not easy now, especially in the summer season, to institute new ones.

ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.

Where public opinion is not strongly in favor of Temperance, it is difficult to enforce the laws and almost impossible to exterminate the liquor traffic in any community. Where a Division or Lodge exists it is easier to carry the law into effect and bring offenders to justice than in places where there is no temperance society. When a fine or imprisonment is imposed upon one violator, other law breakers become terrified and go out of the trade or greatly curtail their business. Every successful conviction of a liquor seller makes it so much easier to procure other convictions and ultimately to dry up the sources of drunkenness. Some say that even the visit of a License Inspector to a place accomplishes considerable good. If members of our Divisions would back up those who are enforcing the law there would be more rapid progress on the road to prohibition. The more agitation our societies can make, and the more discussions in their meetings as to law enforcement, the faster and surer will be our freedom from the traffic in strong

Freedom from this evil, like every other form of freedom, seems to be the better

and stronger when beaten into shape and slowly fashioned by public opinion.

Self government is our boast and our grave responsibility; the people are the rulers; let us continue to arouse, educate and make sober the rulers. Much has been done, much must yet be done before the liquor traffic will be entirely a thing of the past. Our Divisions have been in the fore front of moral suasion and prohibition, and by all appearances we must stay there and battle till victory crowns our work.

EFFORTS FOR THE YOUNG.

Children and youth-comprises half our population, and the juveniles of to-day will shortly be the rulers of our country. Then, to have the rulers right ten years hence, we have only to educate them properly to-day. The principles are lasting which we learned when we were young, and it is the duty of the Divisions to see that in the public schools and sunday schools, temperance shall be taught. Perhaps a special committee appointed by the subordinate Divisions for that purpose would best accomplish this in places where it does not already receive attention. But the regularly constituted Band of Hope should be in every community where a Division exists. Is a Division doing its duty that neglects the children in its own district? children in its own district?

Permit me here to commend your careful attention to the deferred report of the committee on juvenile organizations.

This great work has been carried forward in Cumberland, Colchester and Halifax Counties by Brother T. Hutchings, who favored me with an extended report of his tours, where I learn that in the three months ending the 23rd July, he held 42 meetings, organized one Division and one Band of Hope, resuscitated six dormant Divisions, visited 38 Divisions and 41 Schools and Bands of Hope; distributed 887 temperance tracts, and travelled 652 miles

Bro. T. M. Lewis has labored in Kings and Annapolis Counties, travelling 900 miles, speaking 56 times, visiting 62 schools, addressing in all 6000 persons. He resuscitated one Division, visited 46 Divisions, and distributed 1300 tracts and papers. By this right arm of the Order so much has been accomplished that we

all feel it a duty and privilege to sustain it.

Two hundred and four Divisions have paid their per capita tax for the quarter ending June 30, and the aggregate amount paid shows a gratifying improvement as compared with last. G. W. P. and Members :

During the quarter ended July 23rd Brother T. M. Lewis has been continuously employed in the Counties of Hants, Kings and Annapolis, and Brother Thomas Hutchings has labored in Cumberland, Colchester and Halifax. These Agents rendered monthly reports of work done and in part the good results accruing—and in addition wrote weekly letters to our chairman giving details of their laborand experience. They have also sent to us reports for the quarter which are

and in addition wrote weekly letters to our chairman giving details of their labors and experience. They have also sent to us reports for the quarter which are appended hereto and are worthy of careful consideration.

The apparent results are not large for the three months' work,—only one new Division and one Band of Hope organized, and seven (7) dormant Divisions reganized; but in this as in all intellectual and moral labor we cannot always count up and measure all the good that has been accomplished. The visits to Divisions (84) and the schools visited and addressed (103) are encouraging leatures of our work. The following tabulated statement is similar to that presented every quarter, and enables you to compare the facts here given and to lay them beside those of preceding quarters.

There is a large falling off in the collections and donations to Agents in the field. If this is not compensated by generous contributions through the "Agency Collectors" the results will shortly become serious to those who have the responsibility of procuring the funds to meet our current expenses.

We had hoped to hear from the District Divisions and to have their reports incorporated with the statistics given above, but nothing has come to hand. A brief return such as that given by the Agents could very easily be made quarterly to the Grand Scribe by the scribe of each District Division. Such returns would be very interesting reading, and would help make up the full report of our missionary efforts throughout the Province. We suggest that our Grand Worthy Patriarch be requested to visit or confer with the District Divisions or officers. The Grand Scribe informs us that blank returns have been sent each quarter to the District Scribe or District W. P., and generally the blanks have not been filled up and returned to him. REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

RIVER JOHN, PICTOU Co., Aug. 14, 1889.

To Grand Worthy Patriarch and Members of the Grand Division, S. of T., Nova Scotia.

RETROSPECTIVE.

Your Committee in presenting this report, with much satisfaction are able to assure you that the facts submitted to us show the Order, in this jurisdiction, to be growing in strength and increasing in its influence for good. While it is with pleasure we hear of increase in numerical strength and of financial prosperity, it is with especial pleasure that we notice the growth of a more just and accurate No. 3.

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appreciation of our aims as an order, and a more fixed adherence to the genuine and fundamental principles upon which our institution rests, by those who have taken our pledge and assumed our name. While there is an increase in membership, we think it rather a gratifying feature than the reverse that this increase is not due so much to the formation of new societies as to the strengthening of old ones, indicating that this growth is due to no spasmodic excitement caused by the introduction of a novel method of working into new localities, but that the labor of years is bearing fruit, and that the sobor sense of the people after years of education is bringing them to recognize the soundness of our principles and the wisdom of our methods.

FUTURE WORK.

22. We have no new plans to propose for the future, but would urge increased zeal and more devoted consecration to the perfecting of the plans used in the past and to the more effective and vigorous prosecution of those plans for the future. So long as there is a misguided soul to be directed, a home to be brightened, a social circle to be purified, or a national conscience to be enlightened by the promulgation of our doctrines, we must never dream of giving up our work along the lines of moral suasion. We must give line upon line, precept upon precept. First, make sure of what is good and what is true, then preach and teach and agitate daily and hourly by every legitimate means which God and nature and country have placed in our bands. By this means alone can we succeed; by this plan faithfully athered to we are gure of our premises—the possession of the Truth. "He that looks back upon the history of mankind will often, we might say always, find that in politics, jurisprudence, religion. and all the great concerns of ignorance, gradually acquiring confidence in her own strength, and ultimately triumphing over the dominion of prejudice and custom." So it must be with us. May the command given at creation be the prayer and the motto of every Son of Temperance. "Let there be light." For with the triumph of Truth we must succeed, or be convinced that we do not deserve success.

LEGISLATION.

The question of wise legislation on the temperance question is one of the first importance. The past few months have been full of great lessons for us on this branch of our work. We have seen one of our sister Provinces, with a unanimity that is startling, reject the Scott Act as a useless, obsolete or unsatisfactory law, and in our own Province the enemies of restrictive legislation have become more open and fearless in their opposition to the laws they hate and in the advocacy of the doctrine of freedom and projection for the liquor trade. The state of affairs in Nova Scotia cannot be satisfactory to any patriot. Rum sold openly in every County in the Province, and not a drop sold legally outside of the city of Halifax, is a picture that should bring a blush of shame to the cheek of every citizen, and arouse to thought and action every one who hopes for the success of representative government and free institutions. What shall we do? Repeal our prohibitory laws and begin anew? Never! Our laws in so far as they brand the rum trade as an enemy of society are right and just and wise, and they must stand, and we must renew our efforts to make them effective. In spite of delays and disappointments, in spite of quibbling opposition, in spite of every obstacle which the avarice of liquor sellers and paid advocates, and the ill-concealed prejudice of dispensers of justice, can throw in our way we must struggle on in an earnest effort to make our laws respected. But is there not a danger that in doing this we make a mistake, not in devoting too much attention to the actual work of enforcing law, but in not carrying along with this important work the 15687 VOL. XII.

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equially essential work of education? Our laws, our respect for law, cannot rise above the level of public sentiment, and in our country they will never fall below it. Parliament cannot make a crime by branding an innocent act with that name, the public conscience must first condemn, then Parliament prohibits the act. We must, therefore, carry on our work of education with no less vigor, because the circumstances of the hour demand a vigorous attack upon the saloon. Every man converted to total abstinence, every child saved from becoming a tippler, is a deadly blow struck at the rum trade and strengthens the cause of prohibition. We dare not counsel any relaxation of our efforts to repress the liquor traffic by law. To do so would be to desert the cause of human freedom and imperil the home. The law must guard what years of toil and nights of prayer have won, but as Sons of Temperance we must also redouble our efforts to make existing law more effective and more pronounced legislation possible and effective by converting the reason and the conscience of the people of this country to the cardinal principle upon which prohibition rests, viz., that there is but one safe and honorable rule of life for a good citizen to-day—total abstinence.

THE YOUNG.

4. & We rejoice to hear of an increased interest in the work of educating the young. To much effort cannot possibly be put forth in this direction. Here we sow for future years and what we sow "that shall we also reap." We should aim to teach the young the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, in reference to this question of temperance. This is, we believe, well done in our bands of Hope, and we would urge that they receive all possible encouragement.

AGENCY.

5. The work of the Grand Division Agents is one of the most important under the charge of this body, and these Agents do not, we fear, always receive the encouragement and support which the high character of their mission deserves. We are glad to learn of, and with pleasure direct the attention of the Grand Division to, the work done by the Agents during the past year. Agents constantly in the field who understand not only the needs of the Order, but who also understand the wants and the prejudices, the faults and the virtues of society outside of the Order, and who keep themselves abreast of the best thought of the day, are an absolute necessity if we are to continue to prosper, and we feel sure the Grand Division will never lose sight of this fact. The small amount contributed by the members of the Order and the general public to the support of Agency work indicates a want of appreciation of its importance that is discouraging, and we feel convinced that the most effective appeal we can make will be to render this branch of our work more beneficial to the public. Work well done our Order has never failed to pay for. While then we urge more liberal contributions from our members and more direct appeals to public for support, we would more especially urge that our members spare not their personal efforts in the Agency field. There is room for all to work, and all should not be left to the Agents. Let our aim be to improve and bless society, and a grateful public will give us the support we desire.

THE CLARION.

6. We have much pleasure in referring to the excellent work done for the Order by the Clarion. The press has not been as much used for the promulgation of our doctrine in the past as it should have been. The official organ is a necessary arm of our Order, and should be better encouraged than it is. The editor has placed the Order under great obligations by the faithful and efficient No. 3.

REPORT ON JUVENILE ORGANIZATIONS.

The W. P. Officers and Members of G. D. :

Your Committee on Tuvenile Organizations having, in accordance with the wish of Grand Division, carefully reviewed their report submitted at the last Quarterly Session, containing suggestions as to the carrying out of Band of Hope work, now beg to present an amended report, which it is believed should more nearly meet the views of our membership.

The Committee for some time past has aimed at simplifying Band work suffi-

ciently to enable every Division to organize and conduct a Band.

In pursuance of this object we recommend-

That where regular Bands of Hope cannot be conducted as prescribed in the Manual, Subaltern or Reserve Bands may be formed wherever a Division is willing to devote at least one session each quarter to Band of Hope work, and provide a Superintendent for its management as hereafter indicated. VOL. XII. [570]

Art. II, Sec. 2 Young persons or guardians, bec tendent and accep

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Such Bands to be under the general management of the Superintendent appointed by the Division, and to meet quarterly with the Division, at the close of the routine business, or at a special meeting appointed for the purpose.
 Propositions for membership in the Band shall be made in writing accord-

ing to Constitution, Art. 2, Sec. 3, and if approved by the Superintendent the candidate may be initiated by ritual of Band of Hope, the officers of the Division acting in the corresponding offices for regular Bands.

The Recording Scribe and Treasurer of the Division shall Act respectively

as Secretary and Treasurer of the Band.
5. Subaltern or Reserve Bands shall not be entitled to a charter until they ceive certificates of membership and wear the regulation badge.

6. The organization of each Band shall be promptly reported to the Grand Scribe, giving name of Band, location, date of organization, number, and names of members.

7. The Constitution and Rules of regular Bands are adapted to Subaltern or Reserve Bands by the following alterations, viz. :

GENERAL RULES.

Rule IV, Sec. 1, shall read—
This association shall be under the management of a Subordinate Division, which shall have all the powers of a Board of Directors.

Rule IV, Sec. 2, omitted. Rule V, Sec. 1, omitted. Rule V, Sec. 2, shall read—

The Division shall elect a Superintendent who shall have direct control and supervision over all meetings of the Band. He shall make necessary arrangements for the instruction and entertainment of the Band, prescribe penalties for offences not otherwise provided for, and remit fines and dues in cases of inability to pay, subject to the approval of the Division.

Rule V, Sec. 3, shall read—
The Recording Scribe of the Division shall keep a record of the business. He shall, also, at the end of each quarterly term, prepare the quarterly returns to the Grand Division, showing the number of boys and girls respectively in the Band at the commencement of the quarter, the number admitted, the number dropped or expelled, and the number of boys and girls respectively in the Band at the close of the quarter, which returns he shall forward direct to the Grand Scribe certified by the Superintendent.

CONSTITUTION.

Art. II, Sec. 2, shall read-

Young persons between 5 and 14 years, may, with the consent of their parents or guardians, become members of the Band, on being proposed by the Superin tendent and accepted by the Division.

Art. 3, Sec. 1

The officers of the Band shall be the officers of the Division for the time being.

Sec. 2 and 3 omitted. Art. IV. The Band shall meet quarterly with the Division, or oftener when practicable.
Art. VI, Sec. 2, shall read—

Any member violating the pledge, or persistently behaving in a disorderly manner in the meetings, shall be liable to be reprimanded, suspended, or expelled, No. 3. [571] provided, however, that no member shall be expelled except by vote of the Division!

Art. VIII—
This Constitution may be altered or amended by vote of the Grand Division. Committee on Juvenile Organizations, with the consent of Grand Division.

Believing that the question can never be brought into the school in an effective manner except through the medium of the teacher, your Committee renew the recommendation made by a former Committee of this Grand Division, viz., that the Council of Public Instruction be asked to place some suitable text book on temperance on the list of books to be used by candidates for teachers' licenses.

To this end your Committee recommend that the Executive of the Grand Division, associating with them, by letter or in person, representative Sons of Temperance from different parts of the Province, have a conference with the Executive Council of the Province, and ask from the Council a favorable consideration of [572] VOL. Patriarch was confirmed by majority vote, after that a representative with satisfactory credentials to a Grand Division or the National Division, may be refused admittance if guilty of conduct unbecoming a Son of Temperance. This overturned an old decision of N. D. that the representative must be admitted on the credential and then dealt

Several appeals came before us, but not of grave importance, and they were

disposed of according to past precedents.

The usual Prohibitory resolution was moved and adopted without discussion. On motion of Bro. Parsons, of N. S., National Division resolved to present at annual session and to publish in the Year Book a tabulated statement of work done in every jurisdiction, and also by the N. D. Agents during the year ending the 31st of March; and for this purpose each Grand Division is requested to forward to the M. W. Scribe before the first of May in each year a report of meetings held, societies organized, &c., same as for some years past our Agency Committee pre-sents to each session of this Grand Division. With the good example of Nos Sociia and the fine practical suggestions of M. W. Patriarch Temple as he meets the various Grand Divisions, and this yearly report of Missionary (Agency) work to be placed on permanent record of proceedings of the National Division, we hope that many of the weak Grand Divisions will be made strong and that our dear old Order will become as great in numbers as it has been and is yet in solid influence for good.

A Special Committee was appointed at the Toronto session to consider Temperance work with the young folks,—of which Bro. Temple was chairman. After requesting and receiving suggestions from persons interested in juvenile work the Committee prepared a report on the subject and presented it at Saratoga.

The main features were-

(1.) For our Order to relinquish all claim to jurisdiction over the "Cadets of Temperance," and that we hand over to the National Executive of the Cadets all cadet stock and supplies; the Cadets undertaking that wherever practicable their chief (Patrons) officers should be members of our Order. It was also agreed that delegates would be sent and received between the two bodies.

(2.) Special attention is to be given to the children by such organization as will be adapted to teach them Temperance principles and train them in the practice

of sobriety and good morals.

A copy of the report is herewith presented.

The financial report of the year was good—showing an income of \$8000.00; but in numbers there was a net loss of 2000 members. The report of M. W. Scribe shewed us to be only 77295 strong on 31st of December, 1888. Some 32000 joined our ranks during 1888, and by death, resignation and expulsion 3,4000 went out from us. In Nova Scotia alone about 5000 persons joined, and about the same number was lost, mostly by withdrawals and expulsions. "How to retain our members" is an important question for our Grand and Subordinate Divisions.

The next session of N. D. is to be held at Ocean Grove, New Jersey, about 60 miles south of New York, on the second Wednesday of July, 1890.

Hoping that Nova Scotia will be well represented at the session next summer, and thanking the Grand Division of N. S. for electing us as representatives to sit in the National Division, we are,

REPORT OF GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH.

Officers and Members :

The flight of Time has carried us through a very prosperous year. Standing here just on the dividing line between the past and the future, I realize that the blessings and advantages vouchsafed to us place us under greater obligation to do hetter work in the future. Our debt to the past cannot be repaid to the past. Every day we live will present opportunities for each of us to show by word and act our gratitude for the good that temperance has done for us.

The Grand Scribe's report will give you the details of membership, finances and progress, and only the outlines will be mentioned here. The losses of membership are distributed among thirteen Counties, while six Counties show an increase. Queens has made the largest gains and Cape Breton has sustained the heaviest loss. Halifax reports the largest number of Divisions—36—and members—1.976, and Hants follows with 34 Divisions and 1.674 members. Of the Subordinate Divisions the largest net gain is reported from New Era Division, No. 179, and the heaviest net loss from Truro, No. 41. One hundred and nine Divisions report net gains and eighty Divisions report net losses. FINANCES.

Two hundred and ten Divisions have paid their per cap, tax for the quarter ending September 30, and the aggregate amount paid is considerably in advance. of that of the corresponding quarter of last year. A large number of the Divisions in this jurisdiction are situated in sparsely settled districts, and are therefore small and fluctuating in their fortunes, and find great difficulty in promptly paying their for capita tax when it becomes due; but a gratifying improvement is perceptible in the circumstance that when the quarterly returns are forwarded to the Grand Scribe, the per capita tax almost always accompanies them. The case of a considerable number of Divisions which are obliged to suspend work during the summer season in consequence of the absence of leading members from their homes, and which consider it a hardship to be obliged to pay per capita tax for the period of their inactivity, is worthy of the consideration of the Grand Division.

AGENCY.

The receipts for the Agency Fund fall below those for the corresponding quarter of last year, and the aggregate amount contributed to the fund for the year is considerably below that for the previous year, which may be largely accounted for by the circumstance that during nearly four months of the year we had but one agent in the field. A full report of the work of the year will be presented to the Grand Division by the Agency Committee.

REPORT OF AGENCY COMMITTEE.

Grand Worthy Patriarch:

Since our last Quarterly Session Brother Hutchings has been travelling and lecturing in the Island of Cape Breton, and Brother Lewis has been busy sowing the good seed and reaping in Kings, Lunenburg, Annapolis, Digby and Yarmould Counties. Their monthly reports and detailed statements have been full and on the whole encouraging. In these two brethren we recognize earnest, faithful workers for the cause of Temperance, and men eager for the permanent prosperity of our Order.

Schools and the young people have been a specialty this year; and our Agents have spoken to 12,660 children in 401 school-rooms. Probably no part of our endeavours is so productive of good results as the temperance papers, pledges and addresses with which we endeavour to instruct and train the boys and girls—soon to be the sober men and women of our land. The temperance leaflets are eagerly sought by the scholars, and are carried to many a home that perhaps our lecturers or Order could not otherwise reach or influence.

The actual results which can be tabulated from the efforts of our agents are not so positive this year in the number of societies organized and resuscitated as your committee desire; but with 310 divisions in this small province and Templar No. 3.

Lodges and other Temperance organizations covering the ground, it is not so easy now to form new societies. But our visits to weak Divisions as well as the strong, conveying fraternal greetings and giving valuable information and suggestions, accomplish much good which your committee cannot measure. The grand results in part are before us in this magnificent assemblage of representatives in annual session of the largest and best Grand Division in the world.

We make a modest statement in asserting that if our Agents had not been employed in Nova Scotia during the past year we would not be so strong to-day

by 40 Divisions and 1500 members.

The necessity and great advantage of keeping our Lecturers constantly in the field is so generally conceded that we do not propose to discuss the question. But we urge that no false economy nor any other reason should be permitted to lessen our efforts in this direction. Splendid progress has been made by the general public towards Total Abstinence practice and prohibition since this grand body began its missionary work 40 years ago. Our agents have labored unceasingly along the old lines and the rewards have come to us all through these years, and are here with us now to stay.

and are here with us now to stay.

The plan adopted by Grand Division two years ago of advising that an Agency
Collector be appointed by each Division in January for the year, who has special charge of the contributions to the Agency Fund in that neighbourhood, is fast becoming an established rate in all our progressive Divisions. The sums sent in this year by the "Collectors" aggregate \$250, without which you see we could not have carried on so much work as this day is reported to you.

The "Collectors" coveraging us the loggest compared to you.

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Some of the "collectors" sending in less money than the foregoing have, no doubt, made strenuous exertions and are deserving of as much praise as these: but it is difficult to distinguish. The small sums are very welcome. Our special thanks are hereby tendered all the collectors. The names of all will be published

in the Year Book together with the sums collected.

To enable us to employ the agents continuously as above stated we have expended \$2,144.24. Of this amount the Lecturers received by collections, donations, &c., \$683.53; from Charter fees, Agency collectors and donations direct to G. S office, \$250.64 have been received; from Grand Division vote at last Annual Session, \$500; from National Division Propagation Fund, \$239.88, leaving us in debt at end of the year, \$470.19. And we have to request an appropriation of this sum by Grand Division now, so that our financial affairs may not be a burden to the next Agency Committee.

During the year our two Agents have laboured in sixteen Counties, reports of which have been presented to Grand Division each quarter and published in the

journal of proceedings.

Briefly the year's work is 956 Lectures and Addresses delivered to 44,000 persons; the organization and resuscitation of 38 Temperance Societies, with 885 members; the distribution of 7,500 temperance tracts and papers; 7,000 miles travelled; and \$683 collected, at a total cost of \$2,144. Tabulated statements please find at close of this report.

For our quarterly session in May last at Lawrencetown we prepared and presented a summary of Agency work performed by this Grand Division during [610] VOL. XII.

REPORT ON JUVENILE ORGANIZATIONS.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 12th, 1889.

G. W. Patriarch, Officers and Members:—Your Juvenile Organization Committee takes pleasure in reporting herewith. The past quarter, and indeed the whole year, has been perhaps one of the most successful in the history of this Grand Division in the Juvenile Department. The signs of the times betoken the fact that the claims of the children will be given increasing prominence. The several Quarterly Sessions of the year have been notable for the unanimity of thought and attention given to our Juvenile work.

Feeling that in order to carry on Juvenile work successfully, simplicity of form must prevail, your Committeee have devoted themselves during the year to maturing a system better adapted to the requirements of sparsely settled communities than hitherto existed, the object being that no Division of our order might

be without a Band of Hope under its care.

A simplified plan of work was accordingly presented at the last Quarterly Session and adopted. By it Subaltern Bands are constituted on a very simple

While the new plan is identical in many respects with the existing Band of Hope ritual, some changes have been introduced which it is expected will enable many to engage in the work who formerly felt the duties of Band of Hope work too onerous

Regular Bands now working are not in any way disturbed, but the following changes in the ritual apply to Subaltern Bands.

GENERAL RULES.

IV. places the Band when enrolled under the management of a Division instead of a Board of Directors.

V. requires the Division to elect a Superintendent whose powers are equal to those of a Superintendent of a regular Band.

The R. S. and Treasurer of the Division perform the duties of Secretary and Treasurer of a Band.

CONSTITUTION.

ART. II., SEC. 2, is changed to allow the Superintendent instead of the Band to receive propositions and accept new members.

ART. III., SEC. I, requires that the officers of the Division shall, for the time being, be the officers of the Band also.

ART. IV. requires that the Band shall meet quarterly with the Division. (The Band may also be assembled by the Superintendent at such other times as is convenient.)

ART. VI., SEC. 2, gives the Division power to expel from the Band any unruly members.

These in brief are the changes made for Subaltern Bands.

A leaflet, giving the changes in full and detailed instructions, will shortly be added to the present ritual.

For the information of Divisions desiring to organize Subaltern Bands, we add the following :-

The Band ceremonies, such as opening, closing, or initiation of members, are performed by the Division officers, but on the recommendation of the Superintendent members of the Band may be called upon to perform the duties or ceremonies. These Bands, known as Subaltern Bands, are formed by the Division appointing a superintendent, who enrolls the names of such children as are willing or eligible to become members, brings them to the Division room on the Divisional Band of Hope night for initiation, and every three months thereafter, the Division on these visitations exercising due care over the Band, and besides conducting their ceremonies, giving such instruction or entertainment as may be beneficial. By this means the children and youth of any community may be brought under the direct influence of our Order, and Bands in many places inoperative for want of managers be again brought into active work by the aid of the Division members. When a Band becomes efficient enough to conduct its own work a charter may be issued, and the Band classed on the regular list. For

many valuable suggestions your Committee are indebted to the Grand Scribe.

The above plan has not been fully presented to our subordinate Divisions yet, chiefly owing to the fact that the National Division had called for prize copies of a new ritual for juvenile work, and it was thought some additional ideas might be gathered from this source. The result of the competition is not yet officially known, but we are assured by the M. W. P. that nothing in our plan will be affected by the new National ritual.

With an earnest effort on the part of each Division our winter campaign must With an earnest enort on the part of each Division our winter canpaign mass show large results in the juvenile departments. A tabular statement of existing Bands of Hope is appended, showing 87 Bands, with a membership of 3,535, being a gain of 1,304 over the membership of 1888, and a gain of 28 Bands. Rosebud, No. 1, is the largest, comprising 531 members; Ivy, No. 18, comes next with 137 members; and Sparkling Water, No. 37, third, with 112 members.

Following close are Royal Banner, No. 30, with 110 members; Willing Workers, No. 19, with 103; Lunenburg, No. 85, with 101; and Water Lily, No. 77, with 100 members. The smallest Band is Star in the East, No. 51, with 15 members. The papers supplied by Grand Divison are much appreciated, and to their circulation is in some measure due the success of our work during the year.

Your Committee again call attention to the recommendation of 1888, regarding the introduction of the triple pledge into the day schools of our Province.

Two other Divisions at least are likely soon to be organized within the county.

No licenses are granted, showing that after all there is a strong temperance sentiment prevailing amongst the people. Intoxicating liquors, however, are sold on the sly, but our sincere and faithful inspector, Brother Watson, has been largely successful in keeping down the evil by prosecutions and otherwise.

Our Band of Hope is flourishing, as it has done for a number of years past.

No doubt it is a most efficient society for training the rising youth in temperance

principles that through life will be lasting.

Brother Thomas Hutchings' work for the last two weeks has been such as to make a most favorable impression upon the minds, not only of temperance men and women, but also upon many who hitherto have been luke-warm and indifferent.

ANNUAL REPORT OF P. G. W. P. THOMAS HUTCHINGS, AGENT AND LECTURER.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 12th, 1889.

TO BROTHER THOMAS W. OFFEN,

Chairman of Agency Committee :

My Dear Sir and Brother,—Another year has passed away, and I find myself called upon in the discharge of my duty, as one of your Agents, to present to you my Annual Report of work done by me during the year; it will not be necessary for me to give details at any great length, as my monthly reports have been published in our official organ (the Clarion) from time to time. It simply remains for me to note the several sections of the country that have been visited, giving some idea of the progress of the work, in the interests of the cause we are ardently striving to promote.

During the year, my work has been confined to the Counties of Halifax, Colter, (Section of) Guysboro, Antigonish, and Cumberland, in Nova Scotia proper, and in the Counties of Cape Breton, Victoria, Richmond, and Inverness in the

Island of Cape Breton.

It will be gratifying to the Committee as well as to all who love the principles we are fighting for, to be informed that the old Order of the Sons of Temperance holds its proud position to-day, as in the past, and is recognized as the most effective moral lever to be employed in carrying forward the work of total abstinence in our land, and the Grand Division of Nova Scotia, through the work of years, is regarded on all hands with very great favor by all who love the cause of truth and right, and their commendations are the more highly appreciated, when we consider the great amount of zeal, as well as practical good which has been accomplished.

I may be permitted to say that in the several sections of the counties before named, the three-fold object of the Order was not lost sight of at any of the meetings held; first, to encourage the Divisions already working; second, to re-organize Divisions that were inoperative, and in the third place, to organize new Divisions in places where no temperance societies exist, and finally to carry out the most important parts of our programme, the Public and Sabbath schools were visited as often as opportunities were presented, and thus the work was duly carried on with such measure of success, as we have been privileged to report from

time to time.

It becomes my duty to note a very serious drawback to the more prosperous work of the Order, and which is quite perceptible in many of our Subordinate Divisions. I refer to the small proportion of older members attending the regular weekly meetings, for in many places I have found the membership largely composed of young persons, many of them only a short time in the Order, and therefore not in a position to grasp its important features, as did those who entered these Divisions years ago, when there existed (as some now say) a greater necessity for such organizations. I have therefore felt specially called upon, as I have met with the members of the several Divisions visited, to address myself to these young members of the Order, that they might be in a position more readily to apply themselves to this important work of reform, thereby securing their influence in No. 8.

extending the blessings of total abstinence and prohibition throughout the land. I am glad to be in a position to report increasing interest manifested in our Band of Hope work, and feel quite sure that the new plans recently proposed and adopted by the Grand Division must tend to give additional prominence to this arm of our service, by the several Subordinate Divisions, in those sections of country especially where no juvenile temperance society has been organized; and it is to be hoped that the day will right speedily come when in connection with each Division of our Order there may be found a good and effective working Band of Hope among the children, for I am safe in saying that of the thousands of young persons that I have met when visiting the schools of our Province, three-fourths of the number if invited to become associated with such a society, would

be only to glad to accept of such an invitation.

Let us, therefore, with as little delay as possible, adopt the old adage, "Prevention is better than cure," and in this way do all we possibly can in the interests of those who must shortly take our places in the struggle for the right.

REPORTS OF T. M. LEWIS, AGENT.

SECOND QUARTERLY REPORT.

SOUTH RAWDON, April 24th, 1889.

To THOMAS OFFEN, Chairman Agency Committee:

Dear Sir and Brother,—One half of a quarter has elapsed since I returned from Vermont and commenced work again in our own jurisdiction. Notwithstanding that it was a bad time in the year for travel and for meetings, on account of the condition of the roads, I have the pleasure of reporting a large amount of work performed with pleasing results. My field was the County of Hants, and Dr. McMurray, Deputy of the Western District, had the management of the campaign. I communicated with him from time to time. I found the cause, and especially the Order, in the country districts in a flourishing condition. Of the town of Windsor perhaps it will be as well for me not to speak. Suffice it to say, that I had a noble meeting in that town, and that they served me well on that occasion. The reception that I got, and the audiences that greeted me throughout my tour were fairly inspiring. The ground as to organization is almost entirely occupied by ourselves and others, and no new Divisions were formed. In regard to reorganization I may say that Avalanche Division at Hantsport came to regard to reorganization 1 may say that Avoidance Distriction at hantsport came to the front afresh; and I have pleasure in stating that a fine Band of Hope, now numbering over 70 members, was started in Windsor. There was some spirit of opposition, but the pluck and energy of our good brothers, the Rev. Wm. Brown and Worthy Patriarch Fraser, of Avon Division, overcame all obstacles. Preliminary steps are also taken in regard to a Band at South Rawdon.

I was treated in a noble manner financially as my account will fully show. My public addresses numbered during the half quarter 34, and nearly 4000 people were present. The record of visitation to the schools exceeded anything I was ever able to perform, and I do not expect to duplicate it soon. Fifty-one schools with 1500 scholars were addressed. I met the members of 21 Divisions; and travelled over 300 miles. The hospitality I received will ever remain in my mind, nothing ex-No. 3.

ceeded it during my six years toil in the jurisdiction. I rejoice with you in the prosperity of the Order. An impetus seemed to be given to the cause through the visit of the Agent. Ten new members joined the Division at Summerville since my lecture there on April 4th. I witnessed initiations in several other Divi-sions. THIRD QUARTERLY REPORT.

TO THE AGENCY COMMITTEE, T. W. OFFEN, Esq., Chairman:

Sirs,—I am called upon in the line of duty to submit my Quarterly Report, July 23rd, 1889. I have been steadily engaged during the quarter in the Counties of Hants, Kings and Annapolis. I found but little ground where it is at all likely that new Divisions can be established and live. The ground is nearly all occupied, or else quite hopeless as to the successful working of organizations like ours. I shall have an eye to one or two places when the evenings shall be longer and the busy season over. I have the honor of reporting the Order mostly in a very vigorous condition in those three counties, and our members seem proud to belong to the Cons of Temperance. Meetings are kept up with great regularity. There is in reality but little ground for re-organization. This is a changeful world, and in certain places where Divisions have formerly worked, some of the people have left and it would seem impossible now to do anything. Take Ellershouse for example, I cannot see that anything can be done. Thus at Uniacke Mines the mining operacannot see that anything can be there in a to make the see as we took are largely broken up, so at Mount Dennison. In Kings I cannot see as we can hope to work at Steam Mill Village; people have gone away. Cold Brook too is scattered and absent. Hall's Harbor is demoralized, the breakwater having broken away and business suspended for the present. I re-organized at Scotts Bay, and it is too bad that we do not move in at Aylesford; liquor is sold quite near the station, so it is affirmed, but a lethargy pervades the place. A kindred society with our own holds the ground at Waterville, so of course we could do nothing

A very few Divisions have suspended for the summer, they will resume work later. Temporary suspension is a bad expedient in my opinion, but sometimes cannot be avoided. In Annapolis County things look well as far as I have gone.

cannot be avoiced. In Annapois County tinings fook were as at as a lawe goine. Phinney Cove Division is undone; people gone, no one to run it. I propose returning to Margaretville and re-organizing if possible.

A beautiful new hall has been built by the Division at Round Hill, and Energetic Division which I had the honor of planting two years ago at Bentville, is a power for good and a credit to the cause. A fine new hall which they will occupy power for good and a creat to the cause. A fine new half which they will occupy will be started soon. I spoke 56 times during the quarter and got before 62 schools, addressing in all some six thousand people. I travelled 900 miles. Thanking all my friends for their kindness, and trusting that the truth dispensed will bear fruit adown the years,

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The following reports were presented and adopted at the Annual Session. (See Proceedings, pp. 137, 139, 140.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

HALIFAX, Nov. 4, 1889.

To Grand Division of N. S.:

Your Committee on the State of the Order beg to submit the following report: I. It is the hour of the rising tide of success with our Order in Nova Scotia.

Our responsibilities are those of the strong. A firm adherence to cardinal and essential principles is the great duty of to-day. While all surrounding society is moved by premonitions of approaching change, while kindred organizations are stirred by agitations for improvement or change, we consider it a matter for gratitude and congratulation that our Order is characterized above all things else by a faithful adherence to its fundamental principles, and an unwavering determination to move steadily forward in the glorious work of raising the fallen with the hands of Love, scattering the night of ignorance by spreading abroad the light of Truth, strengthening the faithful and protecting the weak and the innocent by the all-powerful agency of fraternal organization.

2. There has been no great increase in the number of Divisions during the past year. Nova Scotia has reason for thankfulness in the fact that nearly all our past year. Nova scota has reason for thankfulness in the fact that hearty all our towns and villages already have temperance organizations, differing in name and sometimes in methods of work, but all holding aloft the star of Total Abstinence as the safe guiding star for humanity. We are pleased to note the increase in the strength of existing Divisions, and a greater appreciation by the general public of

their usefulness and power.

The Grand Division has to deal with no more important work than the education of the young, and we cannot too strongly urge the importance of putting forth even greater efforts in this direction. The organizations directly engaged in carrying forward this work should be marked by simplicity of design, and great care should be taken that the truths which our Order teaches, are conveyed to the youthful mind in an attractive and in an unadulterated form. It is with pleasure we note the increase of numbers and membership of the Bands of Hope, and trust that continued prosperity may attend their efforts.

4. The Report of the Agency Committee shows that a large amount of practical work has been done during the past year. It is to be regretted that the financial support has not been sufficient to meet the demands of this important branch of our work. We cannot advise any shortening of this arm of our work. Our Order must meet the demands of the public for the education and encouragement afforded by the living voice and presence of the lecturer. We would recommend that the request of the Agency Committee for a grant of money to meet immediate demands be granted, but would recommend this only as a temporary remedy, and would urge more persistent appeals to the general public, and particularly to those interested in moral reforms, for more financial support.

The Clarion has been a strong voice in the land, speaking the truth, advising with caution, and worthily representing our Order. It has been edited under difficulties, and, in view of all the circumstances, we consider the measure of success that has attended the paper most gratifying. We are of the opinion that

6. There is little new to report in reference to legislation, We regret that the laws which declare the liquor traffic of this Province illegal are not enforced as they should be. This is an evil that cannot be cured by tinkering our laws. As no amount of motive power will make an ill-balanced wheel work well, so no amount of legal force can put into our people the moral energy to compel them to do their duty. We must, therefore, continue with greater zeal our efforts along the line of moral suasion, that our laws may be rendered effective by the enforcing power of a corrected public conscience. At the bottom of this great requirement is sound and true men in our legislative and municipal bodies. Sons of Temperance can consistently vote for no others.

7. We commend the retiring officers for their fidelity and zeal, and trust their successors may be equally faithful.

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DEPUTY GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCHS AND THEIR DUTIES.

Deputy Grand Worthy Patriarchs are appointed by the Grand Worthy Patriarch, who is the executive head of the Order in the jurisdiction, and are responsible only to him. They are entitled to the same respect as the Grand Worthy Patriarch whom they represent, nor can any Subordinate Division refuse to receive a Deputy who has been legally appointed. Their authority has been subjected by the National Division only to the following limitations, viz. :—

1. They have no power to declare a charter forfeited, nor to restore the charter of a Division, without the sanction of the Grand Division.—(Jour. pp.

1240, 2644, 2674.)

They have no right to vote in any Division but their own, nor to take part

in debate in another Division without invitation.—(four. p. 722.)

There are four grades of Deputies appointed in the jurisdiction of Nova Scotia,

viz.: (1) The Provincial Deputy; (2) The Country or District Deputy; (3) The Division or Local Deputy; and (4) The Special Deputy. The duties of these officials are clearly defined in their commissions, which are a conclusive appeal for the settlement of all questions of doubt which may arise on the subject.

I.-PROVINCIAL DEPUTIES.

The jurisdiction of the Provincial Deputy is co-extensive with that of the Grand Division. It is his duty to organize new Divisions wherever it may be practicable: to re-organize dormant or suspended Divisions, and to visit officially all working Divisions and report to the Grand Worthy Patriarch any irregularity in their procedure. A Provincial Deputy's commission is usually held by Organizers under the direction of the Agency Committee, who are required (in addition to the duties imposed by their commissions) to bring the objects and principles of the Order before the public, and to advance the cause of temperance by holding public meetings, visiting and public meetings, visiting the public schools and distributing temperance literature. Provincial Deputies are expected to act, in all cases, in harmony and co-operation with the County and District Deputies, whose functions are similar, within their own jurisdiction.

In organizing and resuscitating Divisions the following regulations should be observed, viz. :-

ORGANIZATION OF A DIVISION.

An Application for a Charter, signed by at least eight (and, if possible, by twenty or more) persons—not excluding females, should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe, accompanied by the charter fee. If any of the applicants are members of Scribe, accompanied by the charter rec. If any of the applicants are members or the Order it should be so stated in the applicant, and such applicants should, at the time of organization, put in the hands of the instituting officers a Withdrawal Card from the Division to which he belongs, which card should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe with the report of organization. The application for a Charter having been approved, the Grand Scribe will immediately issue a Dispensation under which the new Division will work for three months, and at the end of that period, the Dispensation should be properly corrected, according to directions given in a feat note on the sheet, and returned to the Grand Scribe who will st given in a foot note on the sheet, and returned to the Grand Scribe, who will at once issue the Charter.

In organizing the Division it is desirable that the Deputy should have the assistance of ten or more members of the Order, in which case the meeting may be VOL. XII.

But when this is impracticable the Deputy may administer the Obligation to the applicants, and then proceed to the election and installation of officers.

Blank Applications for Charter and Reports of Organization are furnished, free of charge, by the Grand Scribe. The Charter Fee is \$5.00; a Set of Ritual, \$2.00; a full Outfit (including books for R. S., F. S., and T., as well as a set of Ritual),

RESUSCITATION OF A DIVISION.

In order to the resuscitation of a Division which has been suspended, it is neces-In order to the resuscitation of a Division which has been suspended, it is necessary that a blank Application for Re-organization (supplied by the Grand Scribe), should be signed by at least eight of the former members of the Division, who have been faithful to their obligations as Sons of Temperance during the suppension of the Division, should be sent to the Grand Scribe, who will see that arrangements are made for the re-organization. If any of the applicants should be Past Worthy Patriarchs it should be stated in the application. All of the former members of the Division who sign the application will retain their membership, with honours unforfeited; but all new members must be initiated or obligated.

II.—COUNTY AND DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

The jurisdiction of County and District Deputies is confined within the bounds of the County, or specified District, for which they are appointed. It is their duty to visit every Subordinate Division within their jurisdiction once in each quarter, if possible, and report to the Grand Worthy Partiarch any irregularities in their working; to resuscitate dormant and suspended Divisions; to explore unoccupied working; to resuscitate dormant and suspended Divisions; to explore unoccupied ground within their jurisdiction and organize new Divisions therein, when practicable; and at the close of each quarter to receive and condense the reports of the several Local Deputies in the County or District, and forward to the Grand Worthy Patriarch a general report of the state of the Order in their jurisdictions as early as possible in the months of January, April, July and October.

The County or District Deputy holds one of the most important offices in the Order, and the Grand Worthy Patriarch relies upon him to direct and stimulate the propagation work of the Order, and to exert the influence of his character and official position to advance the interests of the Order in his jurisdiction.

III.—DIVISION OR LOCAL DEPUTIES.

The Division Deputy is not a constitutional officer of a Division, nor is he entitled to a seat in the Grand Division by virtue of his office. He must win his honors by the usual constitutional methods

The Division Deputy is not appointed by the Division, but by the Grand Worthy Patriarch, to whom alone he is responsible for his official acts and who alone can displace him. He may, or may not, be appointed on the recommendation of his Division; but in this jurisdiction it is usual for the Grand Worthy Patriarch to accept the recommendation of the Division, provided it is properly signed by the W. P. and R. S., and sealed with the Seal of the Division. Blanks are supplied

W. P. and R. S., and sealed with the Seal of the Division. Blanks are supplied for this purpose by the Grand Scribe.

The Division Deputy holds a position of the highest importance and responsibility; and the welfare, if not the life, of the Division as well as his own credit and honor render it necessary that he should acquire a thorough knowledge, not only of his own official duties, but also of the whole routine of Division work. His official authority, however, should be exercised only when there is apparent necessity for it, and then always in a spirit of kindness and brotherly courtesy, but with firmness and impartiality.

The following are the principal duties of a Division Deputy, viz :

I. To attend the regular meetings of his Division as often as possible and to

visi it officially once, at least, in each quarter.

2. To see that the laws and usages of the Order are faithfully observed and its ceremonies properly performed, and promptly to report to the Grand Worthy Patriarch any irregularity of procedure, or infingement of the Grand Worthy
Patriarch any irregularity of procedure, or infingement of the constitutions and
laws, which the Division or its officers neglect or refuse to correct.

3. To present to the Division all official letters, circulars, books, &c., sent to
them, and promptly to answer all communications from the Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Scribe.

To give permission for the holding of concerts, festivals, etc., under proper management, and for wearing regalia in public on proper occasions .- (Rule 19,

Consti. of G. D.)

5. To authorize the postponement of the election of officers for sufficient

cause.—(Your. of N. D., pp. 1892. 2259, 2288.)

6. To give decisions on questions of law and usage, when appealed to, and in cases of apparent immediate necessity; otherwise to refer the case to the Grand Worthy Parriarch for advice. All decisions given by the Deputy should be immediately reported to the chief officer.

7. To see that the per capita tax is appropriated, and the returns to Grand Division are accurately prepared and signed by the out-going Worthy Patriarch and Recording Seribe, and attested by his own signature, at the last meeting in

the quarter.

8. To instal the officers elect and communicate the passwords, at the proper time,—provided the returns to the Grand Division shall have been properly prepared and the per capita tax appropriated; otherwise the password shall be

 To forward (or cause to be forwarded) to the Grand Scribe, without delay, the quarterly returns and per capita tax, together with the credentials of Representatives to the Grand Digision, the quarterly returns of the Band of Hope (if any) under the care of the Division, and the names of any Representatives to the Grand Division who may have died during the quarter, with their age, and the date of their death. The postponement of the installation of officers should not be allowed to delay the transmission of the returns and per capita tax. The non-appropriation of per capita tax, from unforeseen and unavoidable circumstances, should not prevent the timely forwarding of the statistical returns. So important and necessary to the Executive are these returns that the failure of the Deputy for two successive quarters, to forward them before the required date, involves the forfeiture of the confidence of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, and the consequent forfeiture of his commission.

10. To forward a full report of the state of his Division at the end of each quarter, and prior to the 10th day of January, April, Julysand October, to the County or District Deputy, whose name and address may always be found in the Year Book and the Official Organ. Blanks for this purpose are supplied by the Grand Scribe. The neglect of this duty by the Deputy for two successive quarters involves the same penalty as in the pheceding case. REGULATIONS OF GRAND SCRIBE'S OFFICE.

As the official and responsible medium of communication between the Grand Scribe's office and the Division, it is necessary that the Division Deputy should observe the following regulations, viz. : -

If the blank Return, blank Report to County or District Deputy and Password circular should not be received before the 25th of December, March, June

and September, write to the Grand Scribe.

2. Direct the Recording Scribe in preparing the returns for the Grand Division, when the inexperience of that officer renders it necessary. Call his attention to the "Instructions" on the back of the Return. See that all of the items are filled in, and with perfect legibility; that no erasures or alterations are made, but that necessary corrections are indicated under the head of "Remarks"; that the heading is properly filled, and not dated a quarter in advance; that the figures are entered in the proper column; that item (1) is correctly carried over from the returns of the previous quarter and agrees with the number on the Deputy's Receipt Card; that item (8) is correctly computed by adding the initiations, etc., to the membership of the previous quarter and deducting the losses; that item (9) is not included in the losses and subtracted from the membership; that females who have been initiated are counted as full members, and not as "lady visitors;" that names of officers are written correctly and in full, those of females with the prefix Mrs. or Miss attached; and that the returns being completed, certified and attested, the seal of the Division is affixed. Take an honest pride in having the returns well and neatly made out. If the blank Return should be mislaid or injured send for another.

3. See that the returns and per Capita tax are in the hands of the Grand Scribe by the 15th of January, April, July and October, and in no case later than the 26th, or they will be too late to be reported at the ensuing session. If the per capita tax cannot possibly be paid before the 26th of the month, the transmission of the returns should not be delayed, as they are absolutely required for the compilation of statistics.

4. See that representatives to the Grand Division are elected at the first regular meeting in October, and the blank Credential sheet is filled, signed and sealed, and forwarded to the Grand Scribe with the annual returns. The W. P. and all P. W. P's (and those only) are eligible for election. The credentials of W. P's who are raised to the chair during the interim terms, and elected representatives at the first regular meeting in each quarter, may be sent with the quarterly returns, in writing, according to the form in Rule 2, Sec. 2, Const. of G. D.

5. See that all orders for supplies are made out on the Order Blanks, provided for the purpose, supplied by the Grand Scribe free of charge, and sent to Deputies in the parcel of stationery. This is imperatively required by the Committee of Finance. If stock is ordered by the Recording Scribe, give that officer particular instruction on this point. The Grand Division orders also that all orders for stock shall be accompanied by the cash. The price list is printed on the face of the Order Blank, so that there need be no doubt or uncertainty as to the price of the articles required.

6. In remitting money to the Grand Scribe send Post Office Order, or Registered Letter. Fractions of a dollar, however, may be sent in Postage Stamps. The Grand Scribe will not be responsible for cash sent in unregistered letters. By no means enclose coin when stamps may be had at any Post Office. The Grand Division per capita tax must be paid in full, without deducting postage or cost of transmission. All moneys received by the Grand Scribe will be promptly acknowledged and the receipt sent to the Deputy. SYNOPSIS OF THE TENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

At the Thirty-fifth Annual Session of the National Division, held at Washington, D. C., in June, 1879, a Commission of nine members was selected to organize a Mutual Relief Society for the Order.

This Commission assembled in New York City, and on Tuesday, July 8, 1879, organized the Sons of Temperance National Mutual Relief Society. The officers No. 3. [687]

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selected at that time still retain their respective positions. In conducting such associations a permanent officiary is eminently desirable, as this secures careful and uniform management of the important trusts confided to them.

TEN YEARS OF WORK.

From the date of our incorporation to the present time-ten years-we have paid one hundred and four death claims, aggregating \$162,800, and averaging

During the same period we have expended for postage, rent, printing, office furniture, attorneys, medical examiner, solicitors, clerks, and all other office requisites, \$35,842: an average of \$3,584.2 per year.

From Jan. 1st, 1887, to June 1st, 1889, we paid thirty-eight claims, averaging

\$2005.00, and aggregating \$76,300.00.

In ten years we have had 110 deaths, located as follows:

Our average annual death-rate from 1879 to 1889, is eight to each one thousand members, while in three hundred similar organizations, whose reports have been examined, the annual average death-rate for this same period is nearly ten to each thousand members, making the actual cost of our insurance about 25 per cent. less than in these kindred organizations. It pays to be a total abstainer.

During the past year we collected seventeen assessments-five double and seven single-while many associations had from 20 to 24 calls.

It will be noticed that almost our entire membership is in the Eastern and Central States and Canada, and in these sections our death rate has been the smallest.

OUR PLAN OF WORK.

Sons of Temperance over eighteen and under sixty years of age, who are in good health, are eligible to admission. If you are not a member of a Division of Sons of Temperance, the General Secretary will inform you how to proceed. If you live in a locality where our Order has no existence, we will send and organize a local association if you desire it.

You can have an insurance of from \$500 to \$3,500, as you may desire. The only cost is for admission fee and death assessments. We have no quarterly or

All applications are sent to the General Secretary, who hands them to the Chief Medical Examiner, and when approved, certificates of membership are mailed directly to the applicants.

Our admission fees are smaller than in any other similar associations.

Assessment cards are mailed direct to each member and all remittances are made to the General Secretary, who returns a receipted card. This is simple and economical. There is no divided responsibility in handling money. Assessments are always issued on the first day of each month when we have a death re-

The Relief Society is managed by a Board of Government, consisting of thirteen of the prominent members of the National Division. The M. W. A., M. W. Treas., and four P. M. W. Patriarchs are now members of the Board. These gentlemen are chosen because of their business qualifications and their general fitness for the work.

Our insurance is purely mutual. We have no stockholders; we pay no dividends, and build no palaces for offices. Our assessments are equitably graded, and are not increased with advancing years. We have no deaths from liquor drinking. Our insurance is prompt, safe, and economical.

Every Son of Temperance, who is in good health, should be a member of our noun Relief Society. It is not excelled by any other in promptness or economy. It insures only members of the Order. As we pay for no liquor deaths, our insurance is, of course, cheaper than in associations that admit drinking men. We have not grown rapidly, but steadily, taking no step backward.

In its practical work the Relief Society is a great public charity, though conducted as a fraternal business enterprise. It is a valuable auxiliary in the propagation work of the Order, and its influence for good is being more widely extended

gation work of the Order, and its influence for good is being more widely extended every month. It gives strength and permanence to Divisions.

Do not be deceived by high-sounding advertisements. Mutual Relief Associations, formed to make money, do not furnish insurance at its actual cost, and nay such claim is absurd. They issue stock, and pay dividends upon it, just as other insurance companies; and the dividends come out of the pockets of the members. The Sons of Temperance National Mutual Relief Society does give insurance at actual cost. We have neither stockholders nor salaried officials. The current expenses of the management is as economical as is consistent with the importance of the work. All surplus from assessments belongs to our members, and will be of the work. All surplus from assessments belongs to our members, and will be

weed in paying death claims in compliance with our by-laws.

We accept members from all the healthy portions of the States, and from the British Provinces. We can not, therefore, be seriously damaged by local epidemics. Our field of work is constantly being extended.

The General Secretary has no authority to keep a member in good standing unless his assessments are paid within the usual thirty days, as this would be a

Our assessments are graded according to age. Any other plan is necessarily faulty. If you charge a young man at twenty an assessment of one dollar per death, and a man of forty the same amount, and both live out their lives expectancy, the and a man of forty the same amount, and both live out their lives expectancy, the young man will have paid nearly twice as much as the older one, yet the heirs of the two men receive exactly the same amount. This being unjust to the young man, and his attention being called to it, he refuses to pay, drops out of the ranks, and in a few years the association consists mainly of older men with a largely increased death-rate. In the "Sons" Relief, we grade according to age, and thus make it purely equitable for all. We have a large number of young members. Our admission fee is small, as the main object is to strengthen the Order of Sons of Temperance. Solicitors and organizers will give full information.
