## The Farmer's Corner.

## Hints on Working Butter.

Do not work too much nor too fast. Work slowly until all is thoroughly mixed, and then increase the speed. The butter will not be of uniform color. Working it too fast will destroy the grain, and the butter becomes salty and lard-like in its texture. Let it stand or put it away in the tray for twenty-four hours. Then work it enough to remove all the buttermilk or surplus brine, so that the butter may become dry or like a piece of cheese. Mould in rolls, and set these away for twenty-four hours, or until they become hard and firm. The cloth should now be put on, and so to cover one end, while the other is left open for the stamp. The cloth should be cut in pieces of exact size and dipped in brine, and the butter rolled when the cloth is dripping wet. Butter should never come in contact with the hands, and should be in bulk it can be easily handled with a ladle and a flat paddle. —*Journal of Chem.*

**WASH FOR FENCES.**—Good lime slacked with sour milk, and diluted with water till it is about the consistency of ordinary whitewash is recommended by the *Landowner* as an excellent coating for woodwork, fences, rafters, partitions, etc., are especially protected against the weather for at least ten years by this application. The casein of the milk in combination with the lime forms a permanent film, which dries so quickly in warm weather that heavy rains falling directly after it has been laid on will scarcely affect the work.

A French agricultural paper announces the discovery of an extremely simple and cheap means to protect houses from being struck by lightning. This consists merely of bundles of straw attached to sticks or broom handles, and placed on the roofs of the houses in an upright position. The first trials of the simple apparatus were made at Tarbes (Hautes Pyrenees) by some intelligent agriculturists, and the results were so satisfactory that soon after eighteen Communists of the Tarbes district provided all their houses with these bundles of straw, and there have been no accidents from lightning since in the district.

## Deferred Matter.

## Lord Beaconsfield's Reception in the House of Lords.

Lord Beaconsfield, on entering the old palace yard on his way to the House of Lords, about 2 o'clock this afternoon, was heartily cheered by the great crowd which had assembled there to greet him. He experienced much difficulty in passing through the throng, though accompanied by a squad of police. Public interest in the promised statement by Beaconsfield has attracted a large and distinguished assembly in the House of Lords, including the Prince of Wales and other members of the royal family. When Beaconsfield retired there was considerable cheering, and he looked well, and betrayed no special feeling at his brilliant reception. About five minutes later, Lord Salisbury entered, and then Lord Beaconsfield rose, amid loud cheering. "He said, in laying upon the table, protocols of the treaty of Berlin, that he should only be doing his duty to the House, to Parliament and the country, by making some remarks upon the policy supported by the British representatives in Congress. He pointed out that in the changes made in the treaty of San Stefano by the treaty of Berlin that menace to the independence of Europe had been removed, and the threatening injury to the British Empire terminated." Lord Beaconsfield's statement showed throughout a strong bias in favor of the Turks, and he almost apologized for the nomination of the Sultan's authority in Eastern Russia. His Lordship continued saying, "Most competent authorities had convinced him that would have taken 50,000 of Turkey's best troops to secure any approach to order in Bosnia. Even then the attempt perhaps would have been unsuccessful and such an attempt would have secured Turkey's absolute ruin. He disclaimed any desire to attribute Austrian occupation to a necessity of submitting to the wishes of the majority of Congress, and the suggestion of Lord Salisbury was earnestly supported by himself. The object in recommending the occupation was to protect the Turkish Government, who had consistently resisted the principle of the partition of Turkey, because, exclusive of the consideration of the morality, it believed an attempt at partition would inevitably lead to a long and sanguinary war; the advocates of partition had spoken out. The Government had been taken up into the mountains and shown all the kingdom of the earth and told, "All these shall be yours if you will only worship partition." This remark of the Premier seems to be an allusion to the proposal which Prince

Dismarck is generally understood to have made that England should occupy Egypt. Continuing he said: "It was remarkable that after the great war and prolonged negotiations all the Powers, Russia as strictly and completely as the others, should come to a unanimous conclusion that the best chance for the tranquillity of the world was to retain the position as the port of European system."

Lord Beaconsfield said, in conclusion, let Russia keep what she has obtained. England has now said, thus far and no further. Asia is large enough for both Russia and England; there is no reason for constant war or fears of war between them. Lord Beaconsfield said he could not at present communicate details of the proposed reform in Asia Minor, as he was acting with Turkey, which is an independent power, and was determined to be required to do measure. The Government's operations were in the interest of peace and civilization. It did not mainly rely on its fleets and armies, however great, but on the consciousness of Eastern nations that our Empire is one of liberty and justice.

## Beaconsfield and Prophecy.

Lord Beaconsfield and the British protectorate he has just established over Asiatic Turkey are the subject of a note sent to the *Sun* by a young man who has been studying yesterday's news. The substance of the young man's speculations may be presented thus: Beaconsfield is a Jew; Beaconsfield has negotiated the new protectorate, Syria, in which Palestine and Jerusalem are located, is one of the Turkish provinces that are placed under the British protectorate; according to the terms of the protectorate, the Governors of the Turkish provinces will be appointed with the approval of the British Government, the appointment of the Governor of Syria in which Palestine and Jerusalem are located, will be under the control of Beaconsfield; Beaconsfield will, therefore, be the ruling power at Jerusalem over ancient Palestine; he will place a Jew in the office of Governor; the Jews will again rise to power at the seat of their ancient glory; the laws of Moses and the old Jewish system will be restored; and this may be done by the key of Beaconsfield's Eastern policy, and behold the consummation of his Jewish ambition.

THURSDAY, July 18.—The engine, baggage and second-class cars of the express train from Foston were thrown off the track this morning between West River and Riverside, by a misplaced switch. One man hurt and damaged a wheel on the cars and very little if any to engine.

The switch had been turned by a trackman to put his hand-car in siding and left so.—*Chronicle.*

**SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.**—While Thomas H. Barter, aged 19 years, son of Mr. George Barter, of Barter Settlement, Charlotte County, was bathing with another lad near Salmon Falls on the 4th instant, he got beyond his depth, and, said to say, was drowned. His body was recovered soon after. He was a fine, smart boy and much sympathy is extended to the parents in their sad loss.—*Courier.*

Sad affairs took place at Hopewell, Cape on Friday 5th. A young lad Arthur Smith, about fifteen years old, went in swimming. After he had been standing on the shore, but before help could be sent Smith sank to rise no more. The body was found two hours after when the tide went out.—*Times.*

Mr. W. B. Clark, one of the numerous vice-presidents of the Sanitary Reform Association, seems to do a varied, not to say a mixed business, for a dry goods man. In 1876 he sold \$4,570 worth of "powder," for the "New France" book, and last year \$4,698 worth of "supplies" for the same work. In 1875 he sold \$1,573 worth of "supplies" for Pacific railway construction.

**SPARROWS.**—An enterprising gentleman of Halifax recently imported a number of English sparrows, with a view to ascertaining if these useful birds cannot be kept and made to breed in the country. The birds have been let loose on the gentleman's grounds at the south end, with what result cannot yet be ascertained.—*Herald.*

Rev. Dr. Reed has received under the will of the late Mr. John McBean, the following amounts for sundry schemes of the Presbyterian Church, viz: For home missions, \$1,000; for foreign missions, \$1,000; for the "New France" book, \$1,000; and for the aged and infirm ministers fund, \$1,000.

Madrid, July 17.—The obsequies of Queen Mercedes were celebrated in the Church of San Francisco to-day with great pomp. Forty thousand persons were present, including Ambassadors, Presidents of Chambers, and the entire Court. Nine bishops assisted at requiem mass.

During the procession at Brantford in compliment to Sir John A. Macdonald, by the Workmen of Brant County, a motto on one of the arches displayed the Blacksmith's anvil, with the words "With Sir John in power I ring!" with Mackenzie in power I rust!

New York, July 18.—Yellow fever prevails at the naval hospital on Ashland Avenue, Brooklyn. So far three deaths have occurred.
