FIRED.—Two of the sportsmen of Midgic shot a deer a few days ago on the Joggins plain. Mr. Sath Ward, Deputy Game Warden, laid an information before Justice O'Brien, who fined them \$20 apiece.

MR. ALLISON LADIES.—The Electric promises to give a good entertainment at Lingley Hall to-night. There will be essays, dialogues, recitations—probably orations, certainly music, and all the sort of thing that goes to make up feasts of reason and flows of soul.

FIRE IN SACKVILLE.—The dwelling house of Mr. John Horton, at Dixon's Landing, was entirely destroyed by fire on the afternoon of Tuesday. The fire originated in one of the bed chambers, but the cause is not known. A good deal of furniture and clothing was lost. Mr. Horton, though growing old is a hardworking man, and much sympathy is felt for him.

SMASH ON THE ELGIN RAILWAY.—On Friday afternoon the rails, a mile and a half from Elgin, sprang, and the train left the track. There were a passenger car, freight car and two flats attached. The tender was thrown against the fence and the track for some distance was torn up. It will be some weeks before the track is repaired. Two or three persons were slightly injured.

PARROBORO NEWS.

—D. R. & C. F. Eaton are building a large barque at the "Sisters."

—At a recent meeting of the Marine Board, George Simpson, of Parroboro, passed examination as mate.

—Price & Co., at West Brook, have trouble with the weather. Their logging operations are not progressing as they had hoped.

—At Half Way River a good deal of work is being done. Mr. Young's magnificent mill would saw more lumber next summer than the firm will be able to get out this winter.

—Three or four drunken men raised a terrible row in a house occupied by Mr. John Austin. They were bound to get liquor and succeeded in getting a bottle of gin after breaking nearly half a hundred panes of glass, three sashes, two doors and a cupboard. No arrests. Some of the party skedaddled.

—Sickness is all around us. One of our oldest citizens is very low, and not expected to live long.

—The many friends of J. Albert Black, Esq., of the Gazette, will be pleased to hear he is improving, though slowly.

—The roads throughout the County have been quite clogged the past month, and business generally has been almost suspended.

—An enthusiastic meeting of the Reform Club came off in White's Hall on Tuesday evening. Addresses by Mr. Cronin and others.

—The Baptist Sunday School give annual concert in their Church next Sunday evening. Silver collection in aid of the Sunday School at the close.

—The snow in the woods is very deep, and is a great impediment to lumbering. It averages five feet. Many teams have returned home—particularly in the Way River and River Heights districts.

The Scott Act in St. John.

The petition for a scrutiny came up on the 4th before Judge Watt.

The petitioners allege that ballots were counted against the Act which were not regular, and that good ballots were thrown out on the other side; that persons were allowed to vote, and voted against the Act, who were not legally entitled to vote, and that bribery, treating, conveying voters in sleighs, and undue influence were used against the Act.

Affidavits were read stating that several parties perorated voters and deposited ballots as such voters. One man swore that Charles A. Stockton, Esq., brought to the polls one King, who perorated a voter of the same name. Several other irregularities are set forth. The day fixed for the scrutiny is March 28th.

The case of Patrick Sullivan vs. Job Sears, an appeal case, was tried. Sullivan, the respondent, not opposing, the conviction against Sears was quashed with costs.

Francis Sabaneau and James Moore, the two prisoners who escaped from the Penitentiary last fall, having been re-captured, were brought into court, and pleaded guilty to the charge of "escape" and were sentenced to two and one years additional, respectively, in the Penitentiary.

Florian C. White, the bigamist, pleaded guilty to the charge of bigamy, but is not yet sentenced.

Mr. Smith has a commanding presence, (he weighs precisely one-eighth of a ton) has good control of his voice, and is strong on facial expression. Also he interprets Artemus well. The proceeds of the evening to the School were \$52, and to the other parties concerned, the recollection of a pleasant evening.

A Promising Town.

A village that is quietly growing into importance is that at Chignecto Mines. Everything there indicates prosperity. A large engine house is approaching completion. Thirty double houses will be erected next summer, when it is considered that a hundred work-men are already employed about the Mines, indicates the future existence of a fair sized town. A new and commodious school house has lately been built, and a teacher is now at work among the youth. A movement is on foot to establish a temperance society, and another was commenced looking to the starting of a dramsop. The latter failed on account of the want of sympathy of the authorities; the former will succeed. In a couple of months a locomotive will be run to the village. Coal raised at this Mine is of excellent quality. The total output last year was 3,299 tons.

PERSONAL AND POLITICAL.

—Tilden has expressed his willingness to run for the Presidency in 1884.

—Ex-Senator Conkling has declined the appointment to the Supreme Bench.

—Mr. W. Chambers, of Chambers' Journal, has been offered the honor of Knighthood by Mr. Gladstone, but has declined it.

—Mrs. Kerr, sister of Hon. Edward Blake, died last week. Her death was caused by a mistake in the use of medicine. She was a most estimable lady, well and favorably known.

—The Crown Prince of Germany has Crosses and Stars of 65 Orders. His uncle, Prince Charles has 55, and the prominent German who who sports less than 20 decorations considers himself abused.

—Capt. Percival, a Cape Cod mariner of the old school, was once awakened in his bunk by a shipmate with the announcement "The vessel was going to eternity."

"Well," replied the Captain, "I've got ten friends over to one in this world; let her go!" And he turned over and went to sleep again.

Col. Ingersoll's father is said to have been a preacher of extraordinary eloquence. The oldest of his sons, the Montreal Journalist, tells that on one occasion "he so vividly portrayed the tortures of hell that the whole vast audience was swayed like trees by a strong wind."

He began his sermon that day at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and ceased speaking at sundown.

—The Mail's Ottawa correspondent tells this speaks of the journey of Alfred Ogden, M. P., to the Capital.

—Mr. Ogden, of Guysboro, N. S., arrived here this morning, having left home on the 2nd of February. He was overtaken by a snowstorm. The Government is to be congratulated on Nova Scotia. Before it ceased the drifts were in many places more than ten feet above the tops of the telegraph poles, and thirty feet of snow drift was no uncommon occurrence.

After lying by for some days, till the snow hardened, he secured a sled, upon which he placed his traps, and then began his journey towards the capital. He frequently found himself sinking in the middle, as like some Alpine traveller he plodded his way onward to represent his constituents in the federal capital.

N. S. Assembly Prorogation.

The Nova Scotia Legislature prorogues to-day. The session has been short and sweet. The principal business done—the new Railway Syndicate Act—after an elaborate discussion of its terms, received the almost unanimous consent of the Assembly, and of a majority of the Council. Public opinion outside was just as unanimous in its favor.

The Government is to be congratulated on having accomplished a work of great difficulty with complete success.

The Queen Shot at.

As the Queen was entering her carriage last Thursday a man deliberately fired a pistol at her. The shot missed. The would be murderer was instantly arrested. He gave his name as Ryobrick McLellan. It appears that he is a miserable creature, who has been in the Lunatic Asylum, and has been considered crazy for a long time. He says he was hungry and poor and that his class was ill used by the aristocracy, at which class Her Majesty is the head. This crank business is becoming serious. It will be seen that more danger comes from this kind of people than from the sensible class of villains. McLellan says that he didn't mean to hurt the Queen but only meant to attract attention. Galt's man went to kill the President in order to attract attention to him and help him sell his book. It has become an additional peril to greatness that some fool may wish to become famous by becoming a murderer of rulers. Her Majesty was, of course, immediately protected, and there was no political significance in the shot, but if the shot had proved fatal, that would be a small consolation either to the Queen or her Subjects.

From all parts of the world congratulatory dispatches were forwarded to the Queen, expressing deep gratefulness for Her Majesty's escape. One from Canada abounds in expressions of kindly feeling and superlative adjectives. The devotion to the Queen of her Canadian subjects is no less true than that of her people who immediately surrounded Her.

A ROMANCE NIPPED.—A youth of tender years and a maiden whose age it would be ungalant to specify, belonging to a neighboring parish, left their homes a few mornings ago, and hand in hand they took their solitary way to Port Elgin—the Gretina Green of their hopes. They had travelled several miles through seas and over mountains of snow towards their destination, and it was only when the traditional parent of the cruel heart overtook them by means of a steaming horse, and with the aid of a constable and a magistrate, had them each fined five dollars and costs. Neither of them appear to have been capitalists to that extent, and they returned to their homes to work it out. Thus a pretty \$11.75 cash spoiled a dime novel romance, having loved, the attendant parent, the eloquent, the pursuit, &c., &c., all the foreground.

Nova Scotia Politics.

The Halifax papers are still publishing the Syndicate debate, and are still criticizing the Act. When the Upper House agreed to the Railway Bill, Legislative Councilor Butler was angry and announced his intention of "basing" the whole one horse concern. He was somewhat surprised at finding himself side by side on the question, with all the Conservatives in the so-called Upper House. Still he liberalized his position, but the liberal councillors and Mr. McKinnon voted for their continued existence, and the bill was lost by a majority of two. This vote, with the one taken last winter, seems to show that Liberalism in the Halifax Legislature is at an extreme point, and that the desire for a resting place felt by a politician whose usefulness is gone. This body of veterans having perpetrated their own existence a little longer, conceived to do something three fourths of a century ago. The act of theirs is the *reductio ad absurdum* of the Council.

From Ac Lun.—During the past week there was shipped from Ac Lun 7 cars of hay as follows: Howland Freeman, 2 cars; James Trevelyan, 2 cars; A. McQueen, 2 cars; James Patterson, 1 car; and 1 car of cattle for McDonald & Bros., of St. John. Besides the above car loads there was about ten tons of small freight shipped, of the latter about 2 tons of cloth from the Woolen Mills of J. Read & Sons, Port Elgin, to Donit & Millar, of Halifax. This factory is doing a rushing business since the introduction of the National Policy.—James Lowerison, Esq., of West Point can boast of the best pair of calves I think in the Dominion, they grow over six feet and are not eleven months old yet.—Com.

—Mr. J. G. McDonald, the contractor of the Dominion Penitentiary appears to be a pretty active man in the North West. The Manitoba Free Press of the 28th January says: "What last night manifested on the balance of J. G. McDonald's lots in block 3, Logan estate and subdivision of Lot 32 Point Douglas. Sixty lots aggregating \$37,000. The total amount of the two nights sale of the property was \$26,135. As yet about 100 people in Ontario say that the bottom has dropped out of Winnipeg."

A later paper states that the superstructure of the new jail has been awarded to him for \$36,000.

—Messrs. P. Hopper and W. T. Huggan were ordained elders in the Presbyterian church in this town yesterday morning, and Mr. W. M. McKee in the evening. The ceremony was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Hogg.—Times.

—A man named George Beshan was fatally injured at Hampton, on Friday, by an I. C. R. car passing over his leg. He died the next morning. The verdict at the inquest was to the effect that the deceased came to his death by being run over by the train while he was under the influence of liquor.
