Berne, Sept. 2.—Telegrams concerning the floods in the Tyrol say that the flood area is much greater than it was in 1888, and the damage has been immense, although as yet but two human lives have been lost so far as it is known. 

LONDON COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE Mr. Little

for the Principality.

To the Editor of the ADVERTURE:

Kindly allow me to suggest to the Board of Education the advisability of appointing Mr. Little, the present classical master, to the principalship of the institute. His literary qualifications meet the requirements of the school law regulations for that position. He is an enthusiastic teacher, an excellent disciplinarian and organizer, and would command the good-will and co-operation of every member of the staf. His appointment would obviate the necessity of any further addition to the staff. According to the time table which I have before me, last term the staff had about twenty hours per week, or nearly the full time of one teacher, unoccupied. With a little readjustment of the table, for which there is ample room, a saving of at least ten hours more per week might be effected without detriment to any part of the work of the school. I am convinced that the interests of the school need not angler in the least by the proposed reduction in the staff, and that the principal would notwithstand ing have sufficient time at his disposal for general supervision. Indeed, I consider is a mistake to assume that a principal should spend the greater part of his time in supervising the work of the other teachers. The a mistake to assume that a principal should apend the greater part of his time in super-vising the work of the other teachers. The legal qualifications of those teachers and the test afforded by the results of their work is the best criterion of efficiency, and the less meddling on the part of a principal the better.

But to return to my suggestion, I might add that the appointment of a new man would be more or less of an experiment while the promotion of a promising member of the staff would not only be right in principle, but judicious in practice. Further, every department in the school is at present in charge of a specialist in accordance with the regulations governing collegiate institutes. If an outsider were appointed, his taking charge of a department, as he should, would disarrange the work of the whole staff. Again, with Mr. Little's knowledge of the circumstances and requirements of the school, it is questionable if an equally good, or even a better man, could handle the school to the same advantage.

Briefly, my arguments in favor of his appointment are the following:

1. Other things being equal, the principle of promotion is the proper one to pursue.

2. Mr. Little's past efficient services in the employ of the Board furnish a reasonable guarantee of his success in a position with the duties of which he is quite familiar, and in the discharge of which as first assistant he has already had more or less experience.

3. His appointment would insure har-

less experience.

3. His appointment would insure harmony in the management of the school, as he would unquestionably enter upon his duties with the sympathy and co-operation of both pupils and teachers.

of both pupils and teachers.

4. The appointment of a new man would necessitate a rearrangement of the departments and retard the work of the school in

consequence.

5. Dispensing with any further addition to the staff would effect a saving of at least \$1,200 per annum to the Board without detriment to the interests of the school. any suggestion in this time that I have expressed an opinion on any of the questions which have been agitating educational circles in this city for the past few years, but on this occasion I thought that my knowledge of the internal management of the school and its affairs warranted me in giving public expression to what I deemed the best course to be followed in this matter in the interests of the institute. I assure you that I have no personal motivo in writing upon the subject, and indeed I am not sure but that I am taking undue liberty in suggesting Mr. Little's appointment, as I have not met or communicated with him this season, and I do not know what his feelings are with respect to the vacancy. NOT A GAME AND NOT DEGRADING. bust of the Right Hon. John Bright, which had been presented to the town of Rochdale by the workpeople in the employ of the manufacturing firm of which John Bright was the head. In a speech of much power the noble Marquis warmly resented the attacks of those people who regard the men that take part in politics-who interest themselves in public affairs—as self-seeking persons. Mr. Bright's whole career, it was pointed out, rebutted the charge. When Bright and Cobden went forth to destroy the iniquitous Corn Laws, they were met with a storm of insult and invective, they had a storm of insult and invective, they had to fight most powerful classes and great interests. They fought unhesitatingly and unflinchingly, and won their battle. Mr. Bright also fought the battle of education, and of the extension of the franchise and among many other noble causes, that of peace. And while John Bright's force of character, constraining eloquence, powerful logic and earnestness were great, yet no one could call in question his honesty of purpos or simplicity of life. The Marquis of Ripon, taking Bright as an example of the type of manhood which many men had striven to reach and were still striving to emulate, believed the statement recently said he believed the statement recently made—that politicians generally regarded politics as a game—to be a most unjust calumny upon public men, and, although there might be in the democracy of Eng-land, as there had been in the courts of absolute monarchs, men who looked upon politics as a personal game, there had al-ways been signal examples that it was not those men who secured the confidence of the English people.

Therein have the British people set us in Canada a good example. While we follow it, let no one be so unpatriotic as to refrain from taking an intelligent interest in public use some discouraged one has failed to find the business of the people ed with as much efficiency or by as good men as he could desire.






