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

EVERY CANADIAN IS INTERESTED

The decision of the Court of Queen's Bench of Ontario on the London Dominion voters' list case has excited much interest throughout the Province.

It is explained by the mouthpiece of the men who promoted the movement to prevent a complete revision of the voters' lists that "it has been a lawyer's battle entirely." This is simply not the fact. The Conservative lawyers who have fought so hard to retain hundreds of bad names on the Dominion voters' lists, on a miserable quibble, did not assume that attitude for the mere fun of the thing. Lawyers are not built that way. The lawyers fought the battle-it was a losing one from the start—but the meeting of Conservative bosses decreed money to pay the costs.

One might be tempted to enlarge on the significance of the lack of faith in the righteousness of their cause which such an attempt to stuff the voters' lists by these men portends. But that can be fitly left for another time. Let it suffice to give a few of the more notable points in the important judgment just given by the Court of Queen's Bench. On Tuesday, the ADVER-TISER, though not pretending to very deep legal acumen, strongly combatted the view that "not qualified" was an insufficient notice to a man whose vote was attacked. Common sense as well as common law, we then held, should affirm the rightiulness of that contention. This is how we reasoned the matter out:

"This being the case, it seems to us to be more just to the voter to insert the words 'not qualified' on the notice of objection, and let him come prepared to defend his right to vote from all attacks. The chief justice did not see much force in the contention. A man has a right to vote or he has not, he said, and he can tell what that right is. Then, as an instance of the way the voters' lists are made up, he remarked that people were on the lists with votes on property owned by him. "That is the way," he continued, "we know that the country is scoured, for the purpose of getting all the people on the lists who can be got, and it would be a violent assumption to say they were all on the lists by right." "I don't doubt," he added a moment or two later, "there are a great number of people put on the lists who have not the romotest notion of it."



Owing to the ravages of the saw-fly, tsmarack trees in Quebec are worth only half their former price for ship-building material. With its food-plant the insect must of necessity disappear, and in years to come the specimens preserved in cabinets will be regarded as rareties.

A paper on "Can in-sects survive freezing?" was read by H. H. Lyman, of Montreal. He was convinced that some insects were killed by being frozen, but that others (caterpillers for instance) survived frost. He spoke from personal experience, and cited authorities.
