The murderer then turned his attention to the wife of his victim, inflicting upon her wounds which will result in her death. Not satisfied with his bloody work he rushed from the house, and, meeting a young woman on the highway, cut and stabbed her with the sword which he still carried until he had killed her. The murderer was finally captured after a desperate struggle. He is believed to be insane.

The number of horzes sunstruck and causing temporary blockades of the crowded thoroughiares could hardly be counted. There were not enough horses in the entire police department to carry off the animals which fell during the day in and about the business center of the city alone. Outside help had to be called in for the ambulances, and the patrol wagons had all they could do in caring for the suffering people. The police were on the jump from early morning until midnight, and several efficer were prostrated. At the county hospitals the physicians were engaged with cases of

GONE UP IN SMOKE.

CINCINAT, July 27.—A locomotive on the switching tracks of the Cincinnati Southern Railway at Ludlow, Ky., late yesterday afternoon dropped a few coals of fire on some powdered rosin on the track, which set in flames the storage warehouses of the Standard Oil Company, adjacent to the track. The large warehouses contained 20,000 to 25,000 barrels of henzine. Eight freight cars, two tanks of turpontine and 1,000 feet of railway siding were also destroyed.

The entire business district and the buildings of the Northern Pacific and Dulnth, South Shore and Atlantic railroads were barned, together with most of the residence district. The loss is roughly estimated at \$200,000. The town was practically without protection. It was practically without protection. It was a mill town, and growing rapidly.





A case of great importance to druggists was heard in the Police Court at Toronto on Wednesday. E. A. Goodman was summoned at the instance of the Weights and Measures Department of the Dominion Government, charged with selling turpentine by the wine measure instead of by imperial measure, as required by the act. The wine measure makes a difference of fully four ounces against the purchaser. Defendant said the prescriptions of medical men were all made on the basis of sixteen ounces to the pint. In proof of this assertion he Druggists, Take Notice, the pint. In proof of this assertion he called Dr. W. B. H. Atkins, who showed that the medical profession always took sixteen ounces as a pint, and not the imperial twenty-ounce measure. The magis trate pointed out that in the case before the court it was not a doctor's prescription which was asked for, but a pint, and the purchaser got only sixteen ounce instead of twenty, as he was entitled to. A fine of \$2 without costs was imposed.

Amsterdam, July 28.—Settlers from Celbes give details of the recent eruption of the volcano Gunona on Great Sangir Island. The cruption commenced at 6 p.m. on a day early in June, and was unheralded by the slightest warning. Immense vol. umns of flame and smoke and masses of A more warning of the state umns of flame and smoke and masses of stones suddenly burst from the voiceancy. The stones fell about the island, killing hundreds of natives who were busy in the fields getting in the rice crop. Those who succeeded in reaching the supposed shelter of their homes found no roof, many houses having been crushed beneath the weight of the falling stones and roofs having collapsed under the weight of ashes, burying the inmates. In many instances whole families were killed. It is estimated that over 1,000 persons perished on the slopes of the mountain and many hundred more in the low lands, but the exact loss of life is not yet known. A week after the eruption had abated the inhabitants were still in a state of terror and would not approach the scene of the disaster. The island is now threstened with famine, all the crops having been destroyed. In many parts of the island good wells have become dry. The authorities are doing the best they can to alleviate the distress of the people. The inhabitants, though nearly demented with terror, are docile, and the authorities have met with no disorder. Villages and farm places along the mountain sides have been overwheelmed by the molten rock. The palm trees have been stripped of their leaves and fruit, but the trees still stand.
