

SHALL WE HAVE NICKEL MONEY IN CANADA?

There is some interest in parliamentary circles over the resolution put on the notice paper by Mr. McLean, member for East York, in favor of nickel coinage instead of

bronze, as now. It matters not to the average man or country, provided it can easily be exchanged for goods, and it is not liable to be debased. Iron was at one time extensively used as money in the east. Spartan iron money was clearly a survival of the older and in conjunction with copper iron formed the early money of the Chinese, as it was until recently the subsidiary coinage in Japan. Iron spikes were found in use as surrency in Central Africa, side by side with the shell money of the seaboard tribes. Even in Scotland, at one time, nails were used as money. In other lands lead has also served as money, as it does in Burmah now. Copper is a metal which has been more widely used than any of those before mentioned. The early Hebrew coins were chiefly composed of it, and it was extensively used down to 269 B.C. The sole Roman coinage was an alloy of copper, and till a very recent period copper formed the principal money of some of the poorer European States, notably Sweden. It was the subsidiary coinage of the United Kingdom and of Canada till the present system of bronze fractional coinage was introduced in 1860. Tin is not so good a material for currency, but the early English coins were composed of it, probably because of the existence of rich tin mines in Cornwall. In later years halfpence and farthings of this metal struck. Silver was until a comparatively recent date almost the only valuable metal used as currency, and still remains a formidable competitor of gold in those countries that use both coins. Silver formed the money basis of Greek coinage,

and was given up as unsuitable. The latter was used as an alloy, to which ac-count it has also been turned in the United States, hence the name "nickel" for United States 5-cent pieces. Skins, tobacco, cattle and other things have been used as currency, but have been discarded by civilized nations because of difficulty in moving them about, iron has been abandoned because liable to rust and too heavy, the fault also found with lead,

and it was introduced into Rome as early

as 269 B.C. The money of medieval times was largely composed of it. Platinum and nickel have also been used as

noney. The former was coined for

short time by the Russian Government,

and tin was abandoned because of its brittle nature. At first, almost every town in Britain had its own mint, but the system had its defects, and a uniform system, entirely controlled by the Government, was resolved on. This was rendered necessary because of the tendency to depreciate its value by means of alloys. In Ireland, for example, "copper" coins were at one time made of pewter! The material from which our present subsidiary coinage is made is bronze. It was first brought into use in 1860, when the copper coins in use in Britain since the time of Charles II. were withdrawn. This coin is made up of 95 pe cent. of copper, 4 per cent. of tin and 1

This being the fact, one is naturally prompted to ask why, in view of ou mineral resources, Mr. McLean reaches his conclusion that a change in the metal of our least valuable coin would improve the mining industry of Canada. It is true that Canada has nickel deposits, but it is equally true that she has vast copper deposits, even in the very district of Sudbury, where the nickel mines chiefly are. The Dominion has also zinc deposits at White Sand River, ten miles inland from Nepigon Bay, Lake Superior, and in the Sudbury district there are deposits of tin, which forms an excellent alloy. REDUCE THE TAX

One of the strongest indictments that has ever been made in Parliament was that formulated by Mr. Edgar the other night, when he described the cotton combine and demonstrated how it has destroyed co

petition in its products in Canada by means of a huge combine, made possible by the woman what kind of coin circulates in the granting of a charter by the Dominion Government last year. The arraignment, as given in another column, is most concluse. It should be read by every taxpayer of Canada, for it certainly affords an insight into the manner in which the public are fleeced under our present system system that had died out among the Greeks, for the benefit of a few. When such an accusation as is contained in Mr. Edgar's peech can be made on the floor of the House of Commons, and remain unanswered, the least observant of the trend of events can readily comprehend why it is there is such unrest in the country, and why the demand for a substantial reduction of taxation and for the combatting of the rings are being made by all sections of the community without regard to previous political affinity.

If one-half what Mr. Edgar says is true, and he says it is true, and has not been combatted in Parliament, surely no one will deny that the time for action by those in authority is now.

A SPECIMEN TAX.

One of the worst features of the present Canadian tariff is the tax on wall papers. Like many other taxes, it is so levied that the poor man who is compelled by circumstances to buy the cheaper variety has to pay the highest tax. Last year Canadians paid no less a sum than \$102,174 tax on wall paper, though but \$50,000 in wages was paid to the employes in the three wall paper establishments in Canada. One dealer in Canada paid in the last three years on \$62,226 worth of wall paper a tax of \$48,226, an average rate of duty of 771 per cent. Mr. Foster does not need to go on a pilgrimage to discover these facts. They have been proved to him time and again, but the wall paper tax remains.



The Garbage Question

Again Discussed by the Board of Health.

The Action Taken at Last Meeting Declared Illegal.

The Sanction of the Provincial Board of Health Necessary - A House to House Inspection Ordered-Useless Advice From the City Solicitor-Arthur Flanagan to be Prosecuted for Expos ing Diseased Beef for Sale,

Ald. Heaman (chairman), Moule, Parnell, Stevely and Scarrow, ex-Ald. Skinner, Dr. Gardiner, Dr. English, Dr. Hutchinson, Inspector Bell and Secretary Bell attended last evening's meeting of the Board of Health. The city solicitor's opinion on THE GARBARE CHISTION THE GARBAGE QUESTION
was read. The Public Health Act provided

The Fublic Health Act provided that whenever the Province appeared to be threatened with any formidable epidemic, the Provincial Board of Health might issue regulations providing for the cleaning of streets and yards by the local health authorities. No such regulations had been issued and at present the board had power only to remove dirt from private premises, and had no general power where no nusiance existed to enter private property for the purpose of compelling the removal of garbage.

Dr. Gardiner moved that the board concondemn the garbage as a nuisance.

Ald. Searrow thought that the action taken at the last meeting of the beard in letting the contract for the collection of garbage was illeged and should be rescinded although the contract had not been signed.

The mayor moved accordingly. The board could then proceed and formulate a new scheme.

Dr. Hutchinson stated that the garbage from hotels and principal boarding houses in the city was collected and paid for by private arrangements, and he did not think that the proprietors would consent to it being removed without remuneration.

Dr. Gardiner urged the necessity of keeping yards clean and said that the board would not be doing its duty if it did not provide for the removal of garbage and keeping the yards in a good sanitary condition.

The mayor stated that the expectation of a cholera epidemic did not justify an illegal proceeding. In Hamilton, Toronto and other cities the garbage is collected on the same plan as it was proposed collecting it in this city, but the mayor stated that Toronto got special legislation to allow them to do this.

Dr. Gardiner contested the opinion that the action taken by the board at the last meeting was illegal.

The mayor's motion carried, Ald. Parnell and Dr. Gardiner voting nay.

Dr. Gardiner moved that a house-to-house inspection be ordered to be commenced as soon as possible after the snow disappears and to be finished not later than June 15, and that all parties be notified to have their yards put in a sanitary condition, and that if they do not do so within ten days that the work will be done by the city at the citizens' expense. so within ten days that the work will be done by the city at the citizens' expense. Ald. Parnell seconded. Carried. The Provincial Board of Health will be requested to furnish this board with information as to the conditions under which the garbage is collected in Toronto and Hamilton, and also what would be necessary to make a house-to-house collection in this city legal.

THE CANCEROUS COW MATTER.

The city solicitor replied in answer to a communication from the board asking advice as to what should be done with regard to the recent exposure of diseased beef for sale on the market. He said that the person who offered the meat for sale could be prosecuted and that half the fine could be prosecuted and that half the fine could be paid to the informant and the other half to the city.

The mayor moved that the medical health officer prosecute, Arthur Flanagan, who exposed the beef, and that the city solicitor appear for the prosecution.

The city solicitor's communication was deemed a useless answer to the request of the board, and Mr. Skinner and Ald. Parnell moved that his letter be returned. The board expected advice as to whether or not this particular case should be prosecuted, and the reply was too general and indefinite.

He could not call these things to mind at the last meeting of the board, but on consulting his books he found these to be the facts.

In reply to Ald. Heaman the doctor stated that he had last visited the house the day after the last board meeting. Dr. Drake keep thim informed of the case up to that time.

Ald. Parnell, speaking of Dr. Hutchisson's statement, said that when such statements were made before the board they should be consistent with the facts.

Dr. Hutchinson, replying to Ald. Parnell, stated that he was sick on the Saturday, and had to be driven to and from the Market Square. The doctors did their duty very well as regards reporting infectious diseases. He thought it was too had to deprive a poor man of his right to work when only a mild case existed at his house.


