



United States Exports for the Last Fiscal Year-Under a Lower Tariff.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 4.-Corrected tables, about to be published by the bureau of statistics, will show that the fiscal year ended June 30 was the largest in the history of domestic exports, the value of which reached \$1,-032,001,300. The next largest was the year 1892, when they amounted to \$1,015,732,011. The increase over exports of the preceding year amounted to \$168,800,813. Tenders Let for the Removal of the Stalls.

Market Clerk Wilson Up on the Carpet on Two Charges-Complaints About Street Watering.

A special meeting of the market committee was held last evening to open tenders for the tearing down of the old Market Bazar. By the terms of the specifications, the contractor shall carefully take down all the shops and stalls, doing as little damage to the original building as possible. The materials of which the stalls are constructed shall become the property of the contractor, except the interior fittings, which shall be the property of the tenant. Any dispute arising be-tween tenant and contractor shall be decided by the city engineer, and his decision shall be final.
