Mr. Moss' reference to "a practically complete case" referred to the delib-erations of the Rosenthal grand jury, which is expected to hand up indictments against all the prisoners, including a re-Indictment against Becker, before Judge Mulqueen some time this afternoon.

Ald. Bennett Explains the New Order by Which Coal Will Be Routed Via Chatham Instead of London by the

The order issued by the Pere Marquette Railway with reference to a new routing of coal, is not considered seriously in some quarters at the city hall, where absolutely no investigation has been made, but even a casual glance at the order issued by the company will convince any unbiased citizen that the earnings of the London and Port Stanley Railway will be seriously affected by the new order. Railwaymen in close touch with the situation claim that the change will reduce the revenue of the city from this line at least one half.

Lake Erie Coal Company.

All the coal for the Canadian Northern Railway, the Canadian Pacific, the T. and N. O., and the Galt, Preston and Hespeler lines, from Rondeau are routed through Chatham instead of through London, as was formerly the case.

A BIG LOSS.

As for the Grand Trunk, there were twenty places, or rather sections of the system, served from London with coal from Rondeau. Under the new rule but six of these places are served, the city of London losing the revenue from fourteen. It can be seen that the six remaining cannot be reached by any other way.

In regard to Port Stanley, as in the case of the Rondeau, all the coal for points on the Canadian Northern, the Canadian Pacific, the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario, and the Galt, Preston and Hespeler line, are handed over to the various companies at St. Thomas, not at London, as was formerly the case. This cuts off more than half the haulage from the Port.

As for the Grand Trunk Railway system, there were twenty points or sections served from London. Under the new arrangement, this number has been reduced to ten, and these would not be served from

CUT EARNINGS IN TWO.

The most casual observer can readily understand that the earnings of the London and Port Stanley Railway will be cut in two at least by the new order of things. A very small percentage of the freight that formerly came from Rondeau will come to London, and more than 50 per cent of the freight from Port Stanley will not come further than St. Thomas.

"The new order is now in force," said Ald. Bennett. "In my opinion, it is the delay of the council in not providing sufficient siding accommodation for the Pere Marquette. I brought the question up last year, and took the council to inspect the location. The plan seemed to appeal to the aldermen, but nothing whatever has been done to provide accommodation for the company. All along the line coal is stored, and still there is not half enough room. Tired of the delay, the Lake Erie Coal Company made other arrangements, I understand, and as a result, the earning capacity of the city's line will suffer. We will lose revenue, and the London and Port Stanley Rail -.way will not be nearly so valuable a proposition as it should be, or as it was. There will be a big loss of revenue. It is more serious than many people imagine at this moment."

THE TIME LIMIT.

No information could be obtained regarding the time limit of the present arrangement. It is understood that it will run as long as the balance of the lease, when it is expected a different arrangement will be made. 



PALUG'S CAT AND ARTHUR'S DOG

Did you ever hear of "Palug's Cat" This sounds like the title of one of Dooley's stories, but the cat in question is not Irish, but Welsh. It is not a modern cat either, for it flourished away back in that ancient time when King Arthur and his knights were out on gallant quests. It was Kay, Arthur's seneschal, who met "Palug's Cat' on one of his knightly expeditions. We are told in an old Welsh poem, "The Black Book" that Kay (or Kei) slew nine witches, then he went to Mona to destroy lions, and it was after he had got through with the lions that he came across "Palug's Cat." This cat moved in an atmosphere of mystery; it was capable of performing extraordinary feats, and had all the Welshmen of the day thoroughly scared. But Kay was not afraid. He fought against this cat. Unfortunately we are not told whether he killed it or not. Like all other felines, "Palug's Cat" had nine lives, and probably managed to get away from Kay. The poem states that the doughty Kay's drinking powers were equal to those of any four men. Maybe that tremendous struggle of his with "Palug's Cat' was only one of Kay's quadruple alcoholic imaginations.

"Palug's Cat" would have been an excellent hearth-stone companion for Arthur's dog, the famous Cabal. Cabal, the king's dog, reached the zenith of his reputation, if we may be permitted to supply such a metaphor to a dog, when he went after the famous boar Troit. Troit was the most terrible porker that ever haunted the woods of Wales. He was impervious to the thrusts of ordinary swords, and to the teeth of ordinary dogs. But he could not stand up against such a combination as Arthur's sword, Excalibur and his dog, Cabal. But there were many other heroes on the trail of Troit and the old Welsh poem "Kulhweh and Olwen" describes with gusto what must have been one of the greatest boar-hunts of early Britain. The story is not without incidents, which try the credulity of the modern reader. Cabal, for instance, was feeling so strong that day, when he pursued the monster with the great tusks and the steel bristles that he left the print of his foot on a stone. Years afterwards Cabal passed on to the happy hunting grounds, and who was proceeding west on Dundas King Arthur piled up a cairn over his remains, and on top of this pile he set the stone, which bore the print of his dog's foot. 



Shoe-bags for travelling are made of many materials, but Canton flannel seems to be the most satisfactory. Half a dozen of these bags make a neat addition to the trunk. They are simply made. 




