New York, Nov. 7.-The Press today says: Canadian detectives, with the assistance of two men detailed from the central offices, arrested Frank Frappier in Brooklyn last night on a warrant charging him with theft of \$40 from the Canadian Pacific Railway. The sleuths from Canada said the charge was technical, and that the prisoner had robbed the company of many thousands of dollars by means of "dummy" pay rolls, and a check system which he devised for paying en-



New factories spring up ing subpoena on Mr. Gamey, requiring in response to the extraordinary demand for goods. Labor is fully employed and becomes so scarce that it is imported. After a time there is a falling off in orders, which becomes more pronounced, until manufacturers realize they have been producing in excess of the present and prospective demand. There is glut on the market. Prices fall, the weaker factories close down, and large bodies of workers are unemployed. The volume of production has to be slackened until the surplus of goods has been taken off the market. This congestion is eventually relieved, but at cost of suffering to the working classes. How to prevent these periodical crises opens up a field of discussion as wide as the science of political economy. The Socialists say the condition speech is inseparable from the present industrial organization of society, and the individualists look for an adjustment by which the consuming power of the community will be equal to its produc-

Germany has recently gone through a crisis of this kind, and the United States appears to be approaching one. So long as population continues to pour into Canada at the present rate, filling up the prairies with agricultural producers, who are customers of the factories, there is little likelihood of a serious overproduction of goods and the existence of a large quantity of plant and labor than can be profitably employed. The expenditure of over one hundred millions on the Grand dustry has been rapid, but not feverish or abnormal. The shortage of labor has not been an unmixed evil, if it has prevented excessive production. At any rate it has been a fortunate thing that the bulk of the immigrants is hardly possible in the near future.

Then the boat is hauled across the river by a rope manned from the opposite side, and the horses necessarily follow.

At times the horses are exercised in bearing their riders across on their backs. The horse wears only the head collar and bridgen and the rider string.

> The Shipping and Tobacco Trust: Are Examples-English Magazine's Roast.

The editor of the London Pictorial Magazine punctures the vanity of the

average American as follows: On April 30, 1902, the newspapers on both sides of the Atlantic were red with headlines anouncing the formation of the great American shipping trust by Mr. Pierpont Morgan. It was announced that practically every British line which had share of the transatlantic traffic had been bought up. The Cunard did not come in. All the Dutch lines had joined the trust; the Germans were coming in. The trust was to control not only the traffic to the United States, but that to Canada as well. Ten millions serling was to be invested in liners within five years. Eighteen months have passed, and what is the position of the vaunted shipping trust? Where are its dividends? The Cunarders, subsidized by the British Govent, are running full every trip, while some of the shipping trust vessels have employed British labor in Britishhave been reduced to carrying cargoes of built factories, such as the Westinghouse sand! The Cunarders are building ships far more speedy than anything the trust owns or can expect to own. The German Lloyd and Hamburg-American Lines are flourishing at the expense of the trust. and the Danish Transatlantic Company has defied the autocrat of the seas, and beaten him on his own ground.

Where is that great American tobacco company which came over with banners flying, drums beating and almost gave away cigarettes, lavishing millions in an attempt to corner the entire British market? Its first move was to buy out Ogden's, Limited, at the rate of £1 5s for preference fl shares, and f2 10s for fl ordinary shares. In the ensuing year the American company lost a million and a October, 1902, were forced to capitulate Tobacco Company, which had successfully defended British trade against the Ameriback to the Imperial Company, and the latter was left in undisturbed possession of the trade of the United Kingdom.

With modern Americans, the old proyerb applies: "Fools rush in where angels fear to fread." And now that the first scare which was caused by Morgan's billions has abated, the fools are. most of them, returning home poorer, and, we will hope, wiser men. Here is another case in point: Three years ago a syndicate of American wallpaper manufacturers came over to wipe out the British manufacturers. They filled the country with travelers: they laid down new plants to manufacture the 21-inch wide patterns which we use, as against the 18-inch American patterns. They even copied the long and rather narrow for the length; British patterns. They stuck to it for two years. Then they issued a circular to their few British customers, regretting that they were unable to execute their orders for next season, and went home.







Twice since the road was completed slight eruptions have caused streams of lava to flow from the crater over the roadbed and to destroy several hundred feet. When the wind is in the right quarter a rain of cinders descends upon the railroad as well as the observatory, power house and other buildings, which would become ignited if the roofs were not built Mrs. of fireproof material. The smoke so dense and so heavily charged with fumes of sulphur and other gases, that the "trackmen," as well as passengers in the cars, are obliged to cover their faces to prevent being suffocated. Fortunately the air currents are continuously shifting, so that the clouds of smoke and gas as a rule do not linger any length of time.



# London's Municipal Headquarters Have Stood for Fully a Half a Century



London City Hall, the old pile of gray stone and brick on Richmond street, between Dundas and King, has for half a century been the corporations headquarters. Like all civic works it was talked about a long time before it was finally constructed. All through the municipal records as far back as 1848, and up to 1853, councilors and aldermen moved unsuccessfully "that a new town hall be built," to cost so much and so on.

It was not, however, until March, 1853, that the matter was taken up seriously. On the third of that month,

Mr. Samuel Barker, who was a councilor at the time, gave notice that at the next meeting of the council he would move that a bylaw be passed authorizing the raising of £20,000 (\$100,000) for the purpose of paying for lands purchased for the enlargement of Covent Garden Market, and for defraying the cost of erecting a town hall on the same, the principal of the same to be paid in 20 years. Edward Admas was mayor at the time and the councilors were Messrs. Barker, Carling, Oliver, Scanlan, Schram, Hyman and Cousins. At this time the city clerk of London drew a salary of £50, the treasurer £100, the tax collector two and

a half per cent of the amount collected by him; the assessors £25 each, the inspector £40, and the high bailiff £25,

On Monday, April 18, 1853, a building committee was appointed, being composed of the following: Murray Anderson, James Oliver, and Samuel Barker, W. B. Leather and S. Peters, architects, being delegated to prepare

Then, as now, all the people were not satisfied with the site chosen for the hall on Richmond street, and a largely signed petition was received praying that the hall be erected on Dundas street. This petition was referred to the improvement committee, who threw it out. Finally, on the 23rd of May, a special meeting of the council was held to consider the building of the hall.

Not much was done, however, no plans being submitted. Plans were called for again, and on June 27, 1853, the bylaw was passed for the work.

Things hung fire for a while, and on September 4, 1853, tenders were received and accepted for the hall. They amounted to £7,501 (\$37,505), and were as follows:

Cobblestone work—Miles & Scott, £350. Brickwork—Windsor & Greene, £1,460. Cut stone-Miles & Scott, £1,8 3. Carpenter, joiner and ironwork-Craig & Campbell, £2,624.

Plastering-Miles & Scott, £478. Painting and glazing-£473. This work was begun in 1853 on the present city hall, though London was but then a town, the city not being incorporated until 1855.

Though it has been many times painted and frescoed, and several times altered on the lower floor, the old city half stands pretty much today as it stood half a century ago, when London population was a scant 19,-In its day the old building has witnessed the rise and fall of scores of business men within its city's confines. It has seen thousands of municipal, Provincial, and Dominion political ambitions both gratified and stamped out. All the joys and sorrows of municipal politics it has known, and it has been a cold and silent spec-

tator for half a century of dancers' revels and scenes of death. In 1881 it was haunted by thousands of citizens who were seeking to identify victims of the terrible Victoria disaster. In the flood of 1883 it was a refuge for those people who had lost their all in West London, and on election day, 1898, the terr.ble accident happened within its stern old walls which caused the death Every now and then an energetic alderman comes forth with a proposal for a new city hall, but the pro-

posal is always frowned down. And it is not likely that the city will saddle itself with the cost of a new municipal building for some years to come. It speaks volumes for the enterprise of the council of fifty years ago that they built a hall which is today adequate to the municipal needs of London.

Must Resign. The Erie has issued an order calling for the resignation within 30 days of all members of the clerical staffs who have reached the age of 35 and have been in the company's employ only since May 1, 1901. Granville A. Richardson, secretary of the road, says the order affects few men. It has been made necessary by a departure from an old rule of the company which the last two years has permited the employment of clerks well along in life who should never have been engaged and whose places should have beer given to young men trained in the company's employ. The order really looks many years ahead because the Erie makes a point of taking care of veterans who have grown old in the service of the company. Men above 35, the Erie assumes, may become incapacitated after too few years of service as contrasted with younger men.

Although the Abo Pass, which the cutoff will have to climb, is 6,490 feet high, the summit will be approached by a maximum grade of 31.68 feet to the mile, with the exception of 25 miles near the summit, where the maximum will be 66 feet to the mile. 

Hammer Made of Water.

Take a small stoppered flask and fill it three parts full of water. Then, with the stopper out, set it upon the fire in a saucepan of salt water. Salt water boils at 109 degrees, and you will thus obtain enough heat to cause the water in the flask to boil. As soon as the escaping vapor has driven out the air remove it from the saucepan, cork it quickly and by means of sealing wax prevent the risk of any air re-entering. The vapor of water contained in the flask will condense as it cools down, and thus produce a vacuum sufficient to exemplify the socalled water hammer. Gently turn your magic flask upside down and then upend it quickly, or else shake it briskly to and fro. In either event you will observe that the water will strike the side or bottom of the flask as though it were one solid mass, making a noise as though a hammer had struck it. The reason of this is that the water is now no longer divided into isolated drops, as it would be if open to the air, but behaves exactly as though it were a solid body. Our apparatus also serves for another experiment. You can succeed in making the water in the flask boil by simply blowing on it.

CLUB CIRCUIT

In Hamilton and Torento just now the action of the Buffalo Jockey Club in fixing its dates to clash with the Canadian clubs is creating much discussion, and the organization across the line is being patted on the back by the American papers for scorning the other clubs. A Toronto horseman, who was in the city the other day, and who takes a prominent part in the running of the Woodbine Club, was among those indignant at the stand taken by the Buffalo club.

There is honor even among horsemen," he said to The Advertiser, "and the people across the border are not raising themselves much in the estimation of any of the good turf organizations. By deliberately conflicting with our dates, when it was unnecessary and derogatory to their own interests, they have put themselves in an unenvi-able position. The Canadian clubs are strong enough to stand the strain. however, and there are many American horsemen who would rather come to the Woodbine than go to Buffalo, where last year they failed to put up the quality of races, in spite of the best fact that they had good horses. As to the question of attendance, I think that the Woodbine's following will be loyal to it, and that not a great number Canadians will be attracted to Buffalo."

"The suggestion has been made that a jockey club circuit comprising the cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, and Windsor be formed, and I can see no objection to it. There would be considerable difficulty, of course, in getting enough people interested in the pro-ject, and it would need to be co-operative and necessarily well financed. If one club was weak the others would have to be prepared to hold it up till it could be seen whether or not the scheme could be carried out. If American horsemen could be convinced that they could start their campaign at Toronto and with moderate jumps wind up the season at Windsor, I think some of the best stables on the road could be secured. 
