London, Thursday, Feb. 9 .- The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Express says that strikers and mutinous Polish reservists have torn up 1,000 yards of the Siberian Railway 20 miles east of Irkutsk. The strike has extended to the railway guards, with the result that 60 miles of the track of the railway is wholly unprotected. It is reported that there is little doubt that the Japanese have blown up the line between Mukden and Harbin.

Confusion at Mukden.

Tokio, Feb. 8.-Information from the Sha River indicates that the Russians are concentrating at Chitaitse and Tselinshu, west of the Hun River, apparently in anticipation of a movement on the part of the Japanese threatening their lines of supply. Otherwise the situation is unchanged. A general battle is not imminent. Mukden is crowded with the Russian

Aitken has just completed the orbit of this body. He found that it is sun once in seven years and four months. It is thus a member of our solar system. Its point nearest the approach of the sun is between the orbits of the earth and Mars, and its greatest distance from the sun is just outside the orbit of Jupiter. A COMMERCIAL QUESTION

Paris Says the Trouble With Sultan Is Not Governmental.

Paris, Feb. 8.-The officials say the complications with Turkey over the guns for the rearmament of the Turkish artillery are more commercial than governmental, although the authorities here are taking an active interest in the affair, owing to the magnitude of the French commercial interests involved. The official version

of the situation is as follows:
"Turkey, desiring a new loan, offered to give a contract for a hundred heavy to give a contract for securing the guns as an inducement for securing the loan. Thereafter a syndicate of German banks undertook to float a loan and arrange with the Krupps to furnish a hundred guns. It recently developed that the Krupps were not likely to be able to deliver the guns within the time Turkey desired, owing to the present extensive demand for artillery. Thereupon Turkey again turned to French banking and commercial quarters, which were unwill-ing to furnish the loan without also fur-nishing guns. The matter is now pending, with the expectation that the Porte, at a meeting today or tomorrow, may decide to reopen the question with the view of placing both the loan and guns with French firms. In the meantime Ambassa-dor Constans was given large liberty of action, the steps he has taken being in the main toward hastening a favorable decision. The officials continue to regard the question as largely commercial, al-though they are seeking to assist French

interests. 





SAYS BIBLE OUT OF DATE

President of Cornell Declares It Contains No History.

Ithaca, N. Y., Feb. 9 .- "The Christ of the twentieth century differs from the Christ of the nineteenth and preceding centuries." said President Schurman.of. Cornell, in an address to the students. "No longer will educated men go to the Bible as a text-book of physical science. It seems strange that should have ever regarded the Bible as such, but they did so only a generation ago. Now an educated man who would quote the Bible as an authority on any physical subject should be object of ridicule in the eyes of all educated men.

"I do not think that there is any history in the Bible, simply because the Hebrews never wrote history. I don't attempt to explain the miracles attributed to Jesus Christ by the Bible. But even today we have our faith cure, and our Christian Science, and who can say what influence Jesus Christ may not have had naturally over both the minds and bodies of men.

"Although we are recoiling from these dogmatisms of the Bible, yet I believe that no age since Christ came into the world needs the Gospel of Jesus Christ as does our own age, and no place needs it more than our own seats of learn-
