

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Arms at Halifax, this 28th Day of December 1795; in the 36th Year of His Majesty's Reign.



#### Thursday, 3d March, 1796.

A Message from his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by Mr. Secretary Bulkeley.

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency commands this House to attend his Excellency immediately in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker with the House, went up to attend his Excellency, And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, That the House had attended his Excellency in the Council Chamber; where his Excellency was pleased to make a Speech, of which Mr. Speaker said, he had to prevent Mistakes obtained a Copy; which he read to the House, and is as follows, viz.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Assembly;

T is peculiarly fatisfactory to me, that I should again on the assembling of the Legislature be called to congratulate you on the general Prosperity of the Province, which demands our humble Thankfulness to the supreme Giver of all

Among the Bleffings derived from this Source we cannot but instantly advert to the Preservation of the sacred Person of our most Gracious Sovereign from a late daring and attrocious Attempt, which excites the utmost Detestation in the Breast of every faithful Subject, and therefore must sensibly affect the good People of this Province, whose Loyalty and attachment to his Majesty, his Family and Government, has been truly conspicuous.

It will be a Matter of great Pleasure to You, that I communicate the good Effects of our Regulations respecting the provincial Revenue; which having answered the Expectations formed from them, in a defirable Reduction of the public Debt, and the new funded Debt being extinguished, induce me to recommend to your Consideration some Relief of his Majesty's Subjects from such of the existing Taxes as may be most judiciously dispensed with: It being always my Wish to diminish their Burthens, consistently with their general and permanent interests, and the support of Government, more especially, as I have the fullest Reliance in their Zeal, Liberality and Wisdom readily to supply for any future Ex-S 2

igencies

igencies that may arise. In these Arrangements you will at the same time keep in View the Expediency of providing for erecting of public Buildings and Bridges, improving of Roads, and encouraging Agriculture; and if means could be adopted for reducing the high Price of Bread, which at prevent falls heavy on the poorcr Part of the Community, this, also may deserve your most serious Regard, to which I shall gladly give my Aid.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Affembly,

I shall with Confidence rely on your providing the Supplies necessary for his Majesty's Government; to which end all necessary Papers and Estimates shall be communicated, and you may depend on my best Care in applying your Grants.

Mr. Prefilent and Gentlemen of the Council.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Affembly.

My Experience of your Zeal, Wisdom, and good Temper in our legislative Proceedings, fully justifies me in expecting, that the same will distinguish your present Deliberations.

On Motion Ordered, That Mr. Sterns, Mr. Wallace, and Mr. Howe, be a Committee to prepare an Address in Answer to his Excellency's Speech.

Refolved, That no Petition of a private Nature be received after Monday the 14th Inflant.

Ordered, That Mr. Cochran, Mr. Mc Monagle, Mr. Sterns, Mr. Dewolf, and Mr. Wallace, be a Committee of this House for the Purpose of examining the public Accounts jointly with a Committee of his Majesty's Council, and reporting thereon, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

A Message was received from the Council informing the House, they had appointed a Committee to join the Committee of this House to examine and report on the public Accounts, and that their Committee was ready to meet the Committee of this House in the Committee Room of the Council immediately.

Ordered, That the Committee do attend Accordingly.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at Eleven of the Clock.

#### Friday, 4th March, 1796.

... PRAYERS,

Mr. Sterns, reported from the Committee, appointed Yesterday, to draw up an Address; to be presented to his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that the Committee had drawn up an Address accordingly, which they had directed him to report to the House; and he read the same in his Place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where the same was read, and is as follows:

#### To His Excellency

SIR JOHN WENTWORTH, Baronet, L. L. D.

Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief, in, and over His Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia, and its Dependencies, &c. &c.

The ADDRESS of the House of Representatives, in GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

May it please your Excellency.

WE his Majesty's faithful Commons of his loyal Province of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to approach your Excellency, with our sincere Thanks for your Speech, at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly,

The great Prosperity and Happiness this Country enjoys under a mild well administered Government, and the interposition of divine Providence, in protecting our most gracious Sovereign, from the Effects of a late daring Attempt on his sacred Person, claim our most grateful Acknowledgements, to the supreme Author of all Good.

It is with great Satisfaction we learn, that the System of Revenue, heretofore adopted, has proved not only sufficient to supply the current Expences of the Government, but has effected so considerable a Reduction of the public Debt, as may enable the Legislature consistently with Prudence to relieve the good Peoples of the Province, from some Part of the Burthens, which our former Exigencies rendered it necessary to impose: We shall however, in all Arrangements we may propose, keep in View, the necessary Services of creeking public Buildings and Bridges, making and improving Roads of Communication, and promoting Agriculture in the Country.

The present Scarcity and consequent high price of Grain in this, and all the neighbouring Countries is truly alarming, and must, unless some effectual Remedy is provided, bring great Distress on the less opulent Parts of the Community; we shall therefore make it a Subject of immediate and very attentive Consideration, to devise and apply the most efficacious Means in our Power, to prevent or alleviate a Calamity so much to be depricated.

We shall most chearfully grant the Supplies necessary for the Support of his Majesty's Government, as we have the sullest Considence, from past Experience, that they will be faithfully applied by your Excellency, to the Purposes for which they shall be appropriated.

Your Excellency may be affored, that we shall continue assiduously to cultivate that Harmony and good Understanding, which happily subsists between the different Branches of the Legislature, and that our best Endeavours shall be exerted to support the Honour of his Majesty's Government, and to advance the true Interests of the Province.

Resolved, That the said Address be presented to his Excellency, by the whole House.

Ordered, That Mr. Secretary Bulkeley, do wait on his Excellency to know his Pleafure when he will be attended, by this House.

Ordered, That Mr. Sterns, Mr. Tonge and Mr. Millidge, be a Committee to report what Laws are near expiring.

On Motion of Mr. Sterns, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into Consideration that part of his Excellency's Speech, which relates to the present high price of Bread.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Belcher, took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made some progress in the Business to them referred, and that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to sit again on the surther Consideration of the same, which Report the House agreed to.

The Treasurer pursuant to Order, presented to the House, an Account of all Monles

received by him into, and Payments made from the Provincial Treasury, from the 4th April 1795, to the 29th February 1796.

Ordered, That the said Account do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Mem.

bers of the House.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at Eleven of the Clock.

#### Saturday, 5th March, 1796.

#### PRAYERS.

Mr. Secretary Bulkeley, reported to the House, that his Excellency having been waited on pursuant to the Order of Yesterday, to know when he would be pleased to be attended by this House; had been pleased to appoint this Day at One o'Clock, at the Government House.

On Motion the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further Consideration of that Part of his Excellency's Speech, which relates to the present high price of Bread.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Belcher took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made further Progress in the Business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to two Resolutions thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the Report in his Place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows;

Refolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that a Committee should be appointed for the Purpose of preparing and bringing in a Bill, to prohibit for a limited Time, under certain Penalties the exportation of all kinds of Bread Corn, out,

of the province.

Resolved, That it is the Opinion, of this Committee that a Bounty should be allowed and paid on all Wheat, Rye, Indian Corn, Barley, Meal and Flour the growth of this Province, which shall be brought to Market and actually sold in certain Towns, to be designated during the Years 1796 and 1797; which Resolutions being severally read, a first and second time, were upon the Question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Sterns, Mr. Tonge and Mr. Pyke, be a Committee to prepare, and bring in a Bill, agreeable to the first Resolution reported by the Committee.

Ordered, That Mr. Tonge, Mr. Sterns, Mr. Howe, Mr. Pyke and Mr. Archibald be a Committee to prepare, and bring in a Bill agreeable to the last Resolution reported by the Committee.

On Motion of Mr. Belcher, refolved, That this House will on Monday next resolve itself into a Committe of the whole House, on the further Consideration of that Part of his Excellency's Speech, which relates to the high Price of Bread.

Mr. Speaker, and the House attended his Excellency with their Address pursuant to the Resolution of Yesterday.

And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, that his Excellency was pleased to give this Answer.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Affembly,

I cannot sufficiently express my grateful Sentiments on your truly obliging Ad-

dress, which demands my fincerest Thanks. Nothing can afford me greater pleafure than your kind Consideration of my Endeavours for the public Good, and affectionate Expressions toward me, which you will be assured I reciprocate with You most cordially.

Then the House adjourned till Monday at Eleven of the Clock.

#### Monday, 7th March, 1796.

PRAYERS,

Mr. Tonge pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill to enable the Inhabitants of the several Townships of this Province, to raise Money by Assessment for public necessary Purposes, and the same was read a first Time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second Time.

The Order of the day being read.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further Consideration of that part of his Excellency's Speech, which relates to the present high price of Bread.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Belcher took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made further Progress in the Business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to a Resolution thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the Report in his Place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table. The Chairman also acquainted the House that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to sit again, on the further Consideration of the Business to them referred, which Report the House agreed to.

The Resolution reported by the Committee was read, and is as follows;

Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that a Committee should be appointed for the Purpose of preparing, and bringing in a Bill to ascertain a general Assize for Bread throughout the Province, and also for repealing the Laws now in force respecting the same, which Resolution being read a first and second time, was upon the Question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Millidge, Mr. Tonge, Mr. Sterns, Mr. Pyke, and Mr. Wallace, be a Committee, to prepare, and bring in a Bill agreeable to the foregoing

Resolution of the Committee.

Mr. Tonge, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill to enable two or more Justices of the Peace to bold Plea in certain Actions of Trespass, and the same was read a first Time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second Time.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at One of the Clock.

### Tuesday, 8th March, 1796.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Hartsborne, reported from the Committee, to whom the Bill to quiet and confirm the Possession of Lands within the Township of Digby was referred in the last Session 5

Session, that the Committee had examined into the Matter thereof, and are of Opinion a Bill to that Effect should pass this House, which Report the House are greed to, and thereupon,

Ordered, That the Committee do prepare, and bring in a Bill accordingly,

The Bill to enable the Inhabitants of the several Townships of this Province, to raise Money by Assessment for public necessary purposes, also the Bill to enable two or more Justices of the Peace to hold Plea in certain Actions of Trespass, were severally read a second Time, Resolved, That the said Bills be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

A Petition of Messes. Foreman and Grassie, Merchants in behalf of Richard Cumberland, Esq; late Agent of this Province was presented by Mr. Sterns, and read; setting forth, That the Petitioners are at present the lawful Attornies of the said Richard Cumberland, and as fuch authorized by him to receive for his Use, whatever Sums of Money may be due to him in the said Province. That the Petitioners have in their Postsession, a Warrant on the Treasurer of the Province, in favour of the said Richard Cumberland, for the Sum of £100 Sterling, for his Services as Agent before mentioned, bearing date the second of January 1790. That by means of some Mistake or other Accident, the faid Sum of £100, was neither paid to the faid Richard Cumberland or his Agent, nor entered at the Treasury, as part of the new funded Debt, of the Province, agreeable to the Directions of the Law; in consequence of which, the Petioners upon Application being made by them, in behalf of the said Richard Cumberland, were refused Payment of the same, by the Treasurer. That the Petitioners have also in their Possession, two other Warrants, on the Treasurer, in favor of the faid Richard Cumberland, for his Service as aforesaid, each for the Sum of £100 Sterling, which faid Sums of Money, were entered by Mistake, in the new funded Debt. as Currency of the Province, instead of Sterling, by means of which Mistake, the faid Richard Cumberland, has not received the full Amount of the faid two Warrants. And praying the House will take the Premises into Consideration, and grant Payment of the Amount of the first mentioned Warrant, as well as the Balance due on the two Warrants last mentioned, to the said Richard Cumberland.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to Mr. Millidge, Mr. Beleber and Mr. Sterns, and that they do examine the Matter thereof, and report the same to the House.

A Petition of Meffrs. Foreman and Grasse Merchants, in behalf of George Murray, Esq; Vice Admiral and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships of War on the Coast of America; was prefented by Mr. Sterns, and read, setting forth: That in the Month of June last, a certain quantity of Claret Wine, was brought into Halifax in a French Ship of War called the La Raison, Prize to his Majesty's Frigates the Thetis and Hussar. That the said Wine was received by your Petitioners: at the Request of the Captors, and deposited in their Stores, at Halifax aforesaid, under the inspection of the Officers of Excise. That in the Month of July his Majesty's Ships of War, then in the Port of Halifax, requiring a supply of Wine, application was made to the Petitioners by direction of the Admiral, for the Clarge Wine before mentioned: That the Petitioners did accordingly fell the same to the Admiral for the Use of said Ships of War, the value thereof being fixed by Appraisment at One shilling per Gallon, and the provincial Ducies imposed thereon at fifteen-pence per Gallon being secured by the Petitioners. That 3204 Gallons of the faid Wine in Casks, were delivered by the Petitioners, under the Inspection of the said Officers of Excise to the different Ships of War, then in Port, and Receipts for the seperate Quantities of Wine given by the Officers of each Ship, to the Petitioners, which Receipts if required, the Petitioners are ready to produce; and praying the House will take the Cale

Case into Consideration, and exempt the said Wine from Payment of the Provincial Duties.

Ordered, That the Petition do lie on the Table.

Mr. Hartshorne pursuant to Order, presented a Bill to quiet and confirm the Pessession of Lands within the Township of Digby, and the same was read a first Time.

Resolved. That the Bill be read a second Time.

Mr. Sterns reported, from the Committee appointed to prepare a Bill to prohibit the Exportation of all kinds of Bread Corn, out of the Province; and accordingly presented a Bill to probibit the Exportation of Wkest, Rye, Barley, Indian Corn, Flour; Rye, and Indian Corn Meal for a limited time, and the same was read a first Time.

Resolved, That the Bill be now read a second Time, and the same was read accor-

dingly.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

On Motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the several Bills, which stood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair. Mr. Skinner took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made some Progress in the Bill to them referred, and that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to sit again, on the further Consideration of the same, which Report the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at Eleven of the Clock.

#### Wednesday, 9th March, 1796.

PRAYERS,

A Petition of Richard John Uniacke, his Majesty's Solicitor General, was presented by Mr. Beleber, and read; fetting forth, that in the Month of June 1794, Francis Green, Esq; exhibited a Petition to this House, accompanied with an Affidavit of one Benjamin Green, and containing false and scandalous Accusations against the Petitio-That in Consequencethereof, the Petitioner had presented to the House & Petition denying the Matter, stated in the Petition and Assidavit before mentioned to be true. That the House had appointed a Committee to wait on his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to request he would Order the Attorney General to apply to his Majesty's Supreme Court, for an Information against the Petitioner and other Persons named in the said Francis Green's Petition. That the Attorney-General, in Obedience to such Orders, did apply for an Information against the Petitioner and others, and after a full hearing, the Supreme Court, in Easter Term last, dismissed the Application, severely reprehending the Authors and Contrivers of an Accusation so faise, malicious and unfounded. And praying the House will be pleased to remove the Stigma, which appears against the Petitioner on the Journals of the House, and also reimburse him for the great expence, and trouble he had been put to, in defending himself against the Prosecution.

A Petition of the Magistrates and Inhabitants of the Township of Argyle, was presented by Mr. Skinner, and read, setting forth; That the present Situation of the U2 Courts

Court House for the Townships; of Argyle and Yarmouth, is inconvenient for a majority of the Inhabitants of those Townships; and praying the House will take the the same under their Consideration, and grant Relief in the Premises.

Ordered, That the Petitions do lie on the Table.

The Bill to quiet and confirm the Possession of Lands within the Township of Digby, was' read a second Time.

Refolved, That the Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

On Motion the House refolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the several Bills, which stood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Skinner took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had gone through the Bill to prohibit the Exportation of Wheat, Rye, Barley, Indian Corn, Flour, Rye and Indian Corn Meal, and had made several Amendments thereunto, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the report in his Place, and afterwards delivered the Bill with the Amendments in at the Clerk's Table. The Chairman also acquainted the House, that the Committee had directed him, to move for leave to sit again, on the further Consideration of the Bills, which stood committed; which report the House agreed to.

The Amendments to the Bill were read throughout a first and second Time, and upon the Question severally put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the Bill, with the Amendments be engrossed.

A Petition of Messers. Cox and Walter of Shelburne, Merchants, was presented by Mr. Humpbrys, and read, fetting forth. That the Petitioners in the Month of July 1703, exported in the Schooner Elfey, Peter Robinson, Master, from the Port of Shellurne, to the Island of St. Peters, four Puncheons of Rum, containing Four Hundred and Seventy three Gallons, the Duty on which was duly paid, or fecured at the Excife-Office in Liverpool, as appeared by a Permit from the Collector of Impost and Excise of Liverpool, lodged in the Collector's Office at Shelburne. That the Petitioners obtained the necessary Vouchers for the said Rum being duly landed, at St. Peters, from! the Naval Officer there, as well as the Master's Assidavit taken before the Collector of Shelburne aforefaid, which Papers were transmitted by the Petitioners to the Clerk of the Commissioners of the Revenue at Halifax, for the Purpose of obtaining a Drawback of the Duties on the faid Rum. That the Petitioners have been deprived of receiving the faid Drawback, as they apprehend, from the Papers above mentioned being missaid in the Office of the said Commissioners; and praying the House will be pleased to examine into the Merits of their Case, and grant them Relief in the Premifes.

A Petition of Susanna Green, Widow of the late Benjamin Green, Esq. deceased; was presented by Mr. Belcher, and read, setting forth; that the Petitioners late Husband was Freasurer of the Province for many years, and had discharged the Duties of his Office with Integrity, and to the Satisfaction of the Public. That immediately after the decease of her said Husband, the Joint Treasurers with the Honourable Alex. Pryme, examined his Books and Accounts, and stated a balance due from him to the Public, which the Petitioner immediately discharged, since which by a surther Examination into his Books and Accounts the sum of £150 more, has been stated as a

Balance, part of which the House remitted, but the Remainder is yet demanded from the Petitioner, who is left with a numerous Family of Children, and is unable to pay the same without selling Part of the real Estate of her late Husband, which is all the Petitioner has to support herself and samily; and praying the House will be pleased to take the Services of her late Husband, and her distressed Situation into Consideration, and grant such Relief in the Premises as to them may seem meet.

Mr. Tonge reported from the Committee, to whom fundry Papers relating to Expences, incurred by the Militia, on Service last Season, were referred on Saturday last; and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows.

That the Account exhibited by Joseph Bell, for the Expences for Provisions furnished, and Medicines and Attendance supplied, for a Party of the Accadian Militia of Scissabou, when Sick at Tarmouth, on their return home, from working on the Fortifications at Halifax, appears to be just and reasonable, and that the Sum of £49 14 4, is due to the said Joseph Bell.

That the Account for Provisions for the Militia of Digby; and the Accounts of standry Expences incurred by Thomas Barclay in sending down part of the Nova-Scotia Legion to Halifax, and the Memorial of Rennie Sorrie, appearing to the Committee to depend on a general Principle, they are desirous that the Sense of the House should be taken on the Question, and therefore have not particularly investigated those Claims.

Pursuant to leave given, a Petition of Messirs. Foreman and Grassie, in behalf of Rod-dam Home, Esqr, Captain and Commander of his Majesty's Ship of war the Africa, and other Officers of the said Ship, was presented by Mr. Hartsborne, and read, setting forth; that on or about the 20thDay of December last past, the said Roddam Home, and other Officers of the said Ship, purchased of Joseph S. De Franca, of Halisax, Merchant, for their own Use, 364 Gallons of Madeira Wine, in Pipes. That the said Ship Africa was at that Time laying in the Harbour of Halisax, bound to the West-Indies, and the said Joseph S. De Franca, did immediately after the Purchase of the said Wine

as aforesaid, lade the whole Quantity thereof on board the said Ship, for, and on Account of the said Captain and Officers, and pay the Provincial Duties imposed thereon, as will appear by certain Documents relative to the said Purchase, now remaining in the Office of the Collectors of Impost and Excise. That soon after the Shipment of the said Wine, the said Ship Africa, did quit the Port of Halisax, and sailed for the West-Indies, with the said Wine on board of her, and has not since returned. And praying the House will be pleased to allow the said Captain and Officers, a Return of the Provincial Duties, on the Wine so purchased, on Security being given, that the same shall not be relanded in this Province.

The Petition of Messrs. Foreman and Grassie, in behalf of Richard Cumberland, and also the Report of the Committee, to whom the same was referred, were read and considered, and thereupon,

Refolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that Mr. Cumberland, be paid the Sum of £22 4 5, with Interest from the 1st July 1789, his Warrants being short funded that Sum, and that no more is now due to him, having had by Mistake, a Warrant for £100 Sterling, dated 22d July 1791; which Warrant states, that it is in lieu of One drawn for the Year 1784, which was not provided for by the Legislature; there being no Agent for that Year.

The Petition of Richard John Uniacke, was read, and considered, and thereupon, Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Report of the Attorney General, as entered on the Journals of the House, on the 7th April 1795, contains a full acquittal of the Conduct of the Petitioner; the rule obtained against him and others in the Supreme Court, having been dismissed, with Costs.

The Petitions of Messes. Foreman and Grassie, and also the Petitions of Lawrence Hartsborne, were severally read, and considered, and thereupon,

Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Duties on 3204 Gallons Wine, purchased and supplied by Messrs. Foreman and Grasse, for the use of his Majesty's Ships of War, by Order of Vice Admiral Murray, amounting to £200 5, should be remitted; and that the same be provided for in the Appropriation Bill of this Session of the General Assembly.

Resolved, That is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Duties on 364 Gallons Wine purchased by the Captain and Officers of his Majesty's Ship Africa, for their own use, amounting to £22 15, should be repaid them agreeable to the Prayer of the Petition of Messrs. Foreman and Grasse in their Behalf, and that the same be provided for in the Appropriation Bill as aforesaid.

Refelved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Duties, on certain Quantities of Wine, amounting to 4268 & Gallons delivered on board his Majesty's Ships of War by the said Lawrence Hartshorne, for the Use of the Officers and Seamen, amounting to £266 15 74, should be remitted, and that the same be provided for in the Appropriation Bill as aforesaid.

The several Letters of Correspondence, between his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and Vice Admiral Murray, were read, and considered, and thereupon,

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the Commissioners of the Revenue, should be authorized to remit the Duties secured on all Wines, which hereafter may be supplied for the Use of his Majesty's Navy as an Allowance from his Majesty, to the Officers and Seamen serving on board his Majesty's Snips of War, on this Station, upon the same proofs being made, which are by Law required, for the Exemption from Duties of Spirituous Liquors, so allowed and supplied to his Majesty's Navy.

The Petition of Susanna Green, was read, and confidered, and thereupon.

Resolved, That as it appears to this Committee, that the Sum of £160 18 1 was paid by the Public Officers to the Petitioner, as a balance found in the Treasury, over and above what was due the Province, and that the Petitioner had expended the same in the Interment of her Husband, and providing Mourning for her Children, and that she is now unable to repay the same therefore Resolved, that it is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Commissioners of the Revenue; should be directed to strike out the above Balance, in the Statement of the public Accounts, and that the Petitioner, and also the Heirs of the late Benjamin Green, Esq, be released from the Payment thereof.

The Petition of Joshua Sandford, and others, was read and considered, and there-upon,

Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Committee, that the Sum of £140, should be granted and paid to the Managers and Directors, who may be appointed by the Petitioners, to superintend the erecting a Bridge over the River Kenetcook, and that a further Sum of £60, be also granted and paid to the Managers and Directors, who may be appointed as aforesaid, to superintend the erecting the Bridge over the River Cockmegun; which several Sums shall and may be drawn for by Warrant, from the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, on a Certificate from Commissioners to be appointed by the Governor Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, to inspect the said Bridges when com-

Mr. Millidge, reported from the Committee, to whom the Bill for the Relief of James Kavanagh of Halifax, Merchant, was referred, and read the Report in his Place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows.

That it appears to the Committee, that a Petition was presented to the House, by Messes, Kavanagh and Sherlocks, in December 1785, praying to grant him a Remission of certain funk Duties, which was deferred to further Consideration; and on the 1st December 1787, it was resolved by the House, that the same should be dismissed, the House not having it in their Power to dispense with the Law. That in the Month of June 1791, another Petition was presented by Mr. Kavanagh, on the same subject requesting the House would be pleased to hear him by his Council; upon which the House resolved, That the Petition be dismissed, it not being in the Power of the House, to consider the same, the Merits having been repeatedly decided upon by the House. That another Petition, in June 1792, was presented to the House, in behalf of Mr. Kavanagh, of the same import with the One last mentioned, and the House entered into the same Resolution. That it also appears to the Committee, that in April 1793, another Petition was preferred by Mr. Kavanagh, praying, that the House would be pleased to remit the Sum of £42, being a part of the before mentioned Duties, for which Execution then remained against him, and the House having confidered the Petition, dismissed it. That Mr. Kavanagh, having appeared before the Committee, in his Defence, produced a Paper to them, importing to be, an Entry of the Ship John and Ann, in the Month of April 1785; from which it appeared, that a great Quantity of Articles, imported in that Ship, were landed at the Port of Halifax, and that what remained on board of the Cargo, was allowed to be exported free of the Sunk Duty. That Mr. Kavanagh, produced another Paper to the Committee, enumerating the several Articles imported by him in the Year 1785, in the Brigantines, two Brothers, Parr, and Nymph, subscribed by Messrs. Newton and Selby, and bears to be a true Copy from the Manifest Book, at the Excise Office. That by an Account of Rum, imported into and exported out of this Province, by Mr. Kavanagh, in the Year 1785, made up by Mr. John Selby, from a Blotter, kept in the Office of the Collectors of Impost and Excise; it appears to this Committee, that 14,187 Gallons of Rum, were imported; and 10,206 Gallons of Rum, were exported, but no Permits appear of the Exportation of more than 5192 Gallons, as per Paper marked No. 9. That Mr. Kavanagh further produced to the Committee, an Account of Molasses, Coffee and Sugar, exported by him in the year 1785, copied from his Books, by Mr. Selby, on which he had paid a Sunk Duty of £63 2. No **Permits** 

Permits were produced of the Exportation of these Articles, but Mr. Selby assured the Committee, that the above Account was copied from Mr. Kavanagh's Books, which appeared to him, to have been fairly, and regularly kept. That the Solicitor General was examined by the Committee, and his Examination taken in Writing, to which, with all the Papers before enumerated, they refer to the House. That it surther appears to the Committee, that a Prosecution was entered against Mr. Kavanagh, on his Bonds, given for the above Sunk Duty.

On Motion, refolved, That the above Report, with the Papers respecting the same, and also the Bill for the relief of James Kavanagh, be now committed to a Committee of the whole House, and thereupon.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House accordingly,
