THIRD SESSION OF THE TWENTY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

---

Thursday, February 21, 1861.

**T**HE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business ;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by James B. Cooper, Esquire, acting Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber ;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which, Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, and which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows :

*Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;*

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;*

The period being arrived at which the business of the Legislature is usually resumed, I have called you together, and have much satisfaction in again meeting you, in Assembly, to deliberate on the affairs of this Colony.

Nearly six years have elapsed since a Census of Prince Edward Island was taken. I would therefore, direct your attention to the propriety of, this year, renewing that Census; more especially as the Imperial Government, having determined on taking one of Great Britain, in April next, considers it desirable, that in all the Colonies a similar course should be simultaneously adopted. A Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, and Documents on this subject, shall be laid before you.

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;*

The Accounts of the past year, and the Estimates for the present, shall be duly submitted to you. All Financial arrangements, connected with the public service, have been framed with a due regard to economy.

The usual Expenses of the past year, which were incurred, principally, by the purchase of the Estates of two non-resident Proprietors, are not altogether met by the Revenue.

I would direct your most serious attention to the fact, that the Revenue, as regards the Imposts on Spirits, has, in some measure, decreased in the face of increased duties.

It is to be feared, that a system of Smuggling extensively prevails—an illicit traffic as destructive to public morality, as it is injurious to your finances.

The Land Commission, which your Address to Her Majesty procured, has, as you are aware, investigated with the utmost care and diligence those questions submitted to it. The award of the Commissioners will, I am assured by them, be made as early in the ensuing Summer as practicable. That a decision so important, and so anxiously looked for by you, should have been delayed, is a subject of regret both to the Commissioners and to myself. Such delay was, however, unavoidable. It has arisen as much from the laborious and responsible character of the task which the Commissioners undertook, as from frequent interruptions;—your own Referee having, in his high official position, other onerous duties to discharge.

*Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;*

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;*

A Despatch which I have recently received, acquaints me, that the Colonial Minister gladly acknowledges the promptitude with which the Legislature of this Colony hastened to give effect to what, they supposed, was the desire of Her Majesty's Government, that the award of the Commissioners, when given, be rendered valid and binding. The Colonial Minister did not, however, anticipate, that the Legislature, with this object in view, would have proceeded to pass an Act of Assembly antecedent to the making of the award. As it, therefore, appears to His Grace, the Duke of Newcastle, that such legislation is premature, His Grace does not consider it advisable to submit, at the present moment, this Act for Her Majesty's assent.

You will be gratified to learn, that the purchase of the Selkirk Estate—sanctioned by you last year—has been attended with the most satisfactory results. The great majority of the Tenants on that Property have, in a manner highly creditable to themselves, come forward and paid the deposit of the purchase-money requisite for the redemption of their leaseholds. The large amount of the sum deposited, is an earnest of the self-sustaining character of the transaction.

In consequence of a clause in the Land Purchase Act, restricting the Interest on Debenture Loans to five per cent., it was found impossible to negotiate these, while Treasury Warrants yielded six per cent. I was, therefore, compelled, in order to meet our engagements, to avail myself of the temporary expedient of issuing Warrants to the amount required. A considerable proportion of these Warrants has been redeemed, and I confidently look for your approval of the course I adopted.

In the absence of all Military Force, for the protection of the Colony, I have endeavoured to organize, throughout the Island, Volunteer Rifle and Artillery Companies. My efforts have been seconded, in a praiseworthy manner, by numbers of spirited young men, who have enrolled themselves in these corps. I trust, that a patriotic feeling, similar to what prevails at home, and in the adjacent Provinces, will prompt you, liberally, to support the movement, and enable me to complete the efficiency of these Volunteers. As the present Militia Law is not applicable to them, I would direct your attention to the necessity of legislating

in reference to this valuable acquisition to our Military Forces.

The past year will be long remembered, as that in which our Queen sent her eldest Son to visit Her North American subjects. In your reception of the Prince of Wales, you testified an attachment to Her Throne as gratifying to His Royal Highness, as it was characteristic of the deep-rooted loyalty and fidelity of those whose pride it is, that they form a portion of the Great British People.

May your counsels be guided by an All-Wise Providence, that the prosperity of this Colony may be advanced—and the happiness and contentment of its People secured.

Mr. *Speaker* laid before the House a letter from each of the contractors for printing the Journals of the House for the Sessions of 1859 and 1860, respectively, and which were read by the Clerk as follows:—

I beg to inform you for the information of the Hon. House of Assembly that the Journal which I contracted to print will be completed and handed in to you, in a few days. The printing is finished, with the exception of one or two days' work, and the binding is progressing rapidly. The volume will be an unusually large one, and the great quantity of matter it contains, has caused considerable delay, in completing it.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

*Ordered*, That Mr Owen, Mr Beer and the Hon. Mr Longworth do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr Howat, Mr Davies, Mr Ramsay, Mr Montgomery and the Hon. Mr Haviland do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr Macaulay, Mr Howat and Mr Holm do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

## Friday, February 22, 1861.

### PRAYERS.

**M**R Speaker laid before the House, a letter from the Speaker of the House of Assembly of Newfoundland—with an enclosure—and which letter was read by the Clerk, as followeth :—

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, NEWFOUNDLAND,  
January 29. 1861.

Sir,

The House of Assembly of this Colony have deemed it necessary to adopt the accompanying Resolutions, which embody a protest against a proposal which they believe to be entertained to abrogate the right conferred on the British North Ame-

rican Colonies, in the despatch of Mr. Labouchere, to the Governor of this Colony, dated 26th March 1857, a copy of which was, at the time, transmitted to the Legislature of your Province.

Being equally interested with this Colony, in the maintenance of the right in question, I forward for the information of your Legislature, a copy of the proceedings this Assembly has adopted on the subject.

*Ordered*, That the same do lie on the table.

*Resolved*, That Mr David Laird be appointed Reporter to this House.

*Resolved*, That Mr James D. Gordon be appointed additional Reporter.

Mr *Speaker* acquainted the House that he had received a letter from John Knight, Esquire, resigning his seat as a Member for the first Electoral District of King's County, and that he had notified His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor thereof, in order that a new Writ might be issued for the election of a Member to fill such vacancy, as the law directs.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House,—the impression to consist of seventy-five bound copies, and six copies in sheets, for each Member of the House, in all two hundred and fifty-five copies.

*Ordered*, That Mr *Howat*, Mr *Davies*, and the Hon. Mr *Perry* do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journal of this House for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr *Haviland*, Mr *Ramsay* and Mr *Sinclair* do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That no petition praying aid for roads, bridges or wharfs, or for any object of a local or private nature, be received after Wednesday the thirteenth day of March next.

*Ordered*, That the said Resolution be inserted in all the Newspapers published in Charlottetown.

The Hon. Mr *Gray* moved that the following rule be adopted and added to the standing rules of this House, *i. e.*

“That the Speaker do take the Chair punctually, every morning, at ten o'clock, and that this House, at its evening sitting, do rise punctually, at six o'clock.”

*Resolved*, That the postage on all letters and printed papers, both foreign and inland, to Members of this House, and the postage on the same, when inland only, from Members of this House, be charged to the contingent accounts of the House.

*Ordered*, That the thirteenth rule of the House be suspended; and thereupon,

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr *Haviland* have leave to introduce a Bill to consolidate and amend the laws relating to Grand and Petit Jurors in this Island.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time, to morrow.

Then the House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

Mr *Macneill* from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, reported the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee; and he read the same in his place and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read.

Mr. *Macneill* then moved that the said draft Address be committed to a Committee of the whole House, to-morrow.

The Hon. Mr *Thornton* moved in amendment to the motion, to leave out the word "to-morrow," and insert "on Monday next," in lieu thereof.

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

### PRAYERS.

**A** PETITION of Andrew Ellis and divers other inhabitants of Township No. 36, was presented to the House by Mr. *Cooper* and the same was received and read, praying for a return or list of Writs that have been issued out of the Supreme Court against tenants for rent, or arrears of rent, and that an Act may be passed to render null and void all Promissory Notes and Bonds given for such, and that all further proceedings on the Writs, Declarations and Processes in the Supreme Court, as well as all executions and proceedings in the Small Debt Court at Cove Head and elsewhere in this Island, for the recovery of rent or arrears of rent, be stayed; also that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor praying

the dismissal from office, of the Attorney General, for dereliction of duty and contempt of the Royal Prerogative and Land Commission.

*Ordered*, That the said petition do lie on the table.

*Resolved*, That a Special Committee of fifteen Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every petition relating to paupers and lunatics, to examine the same and report thereon; and also to report on all cases of pauperism brought under the consideration of the House, whether by petition or otherwise, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

*Ordered*, That Mr *Howat*, the Hon. Mr *Yeo*, the Hon. Mr *Laird*, Mr *Macneill*, Mr *Owen*, the Hon. Mr *Macaulay*,

Mr. Davies, from the Committee appointed to ascertain what progress has been made towards the completion of the Journals of the House for the last two Sessions, presented to the House the report of the said Committee,—which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to ascertain what progress has been made towards the completion of the Journals of the House for the last two Sessions, have to report, that having examined Mr William Malone, contractor for printing the Journal for the Session of 1859, he stated that twenty-four copies of the Journal of that Session, bound and finished, would be laid on the table of the House, on Tuesday next, and the residue would also be ready for delivery at the end of next week.

Mr. James Barrett Cooper, contractor for printing the Journal of the Session of 1860, has handed in a few unbound copies of that Journal, containing part only of the Appendix, and states that owing to the scarcity of workmen he was unable to complete the work, but will do so as soon as possible, and in the meantime begs the indulgence of the House.

Your Committee recommend that tenders from the said parties, for the present Session, be not entertained, and also that in future no indulgence whatever be given to contractors.

Mr. Howat, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the debates of the House, for the present Ses-

sion, presented to the House the amended report of the said Committee,—which report was again read.

*Ordered*, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Haviland from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journal of this House, for the present Session, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read.

*Ordered*, That the said report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Macneill* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,—

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Macneill* reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the special Committee, without making any amendment thereto; and the said report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

*To His Excellency* GEORGE DUNDAS, Esquire, *Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

1. We Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Representatives of the people of Prince Edward Island, thank your Excellency for the Speech with which your Excellency has been pleased to open the present Legislative Session.

2. We will consider the propriety of making provision for taking the Census of this Colony, and what enactments may be required to effect that object.

3. We thank your Excellency for having directed the Accounts of the past, and the Estimates for the present year to be laid before us; and it is a source of satisfaction to learn that all financial arrangements connected with the public Service, have been framed with a due regard to economy.

4. We are aware that the Expenditure of the past year has been increased principally by the purchase of the Estates of two non-resident Proprietors.

5. Our most serious attention shall be directed to the fact that the Revenue as regards imposts on Spirits has decreased, in the face of increased duties, which it is to be feared is caused by an extensive system of smuggling.

6. We are gratified to hear that the Land Commission, which our Address to Her Majesty has procured, has investigated with the utmost care and diligence all questions submitted to it; and although it is to be regretted that the Award of the Commissioners has from various causes been delayed, yet we are pleased to learn that it will be made as early as practicable, in the ensuing summer.

7. We observe that the interpretation put by the Legislature of this Colony upon the views of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, regarding the necessity of a measure to render binding the decision of the Land Commissioners and to give validity to that decision, and which led to the passing of the Act to which your Excellency alludes, was different from that which His Grace now states was his intention, as expressed in his Despatch on this subject; but we feel assured that when the Commissioners make their Award, Her Majesty's assent will then be given thereto.

8. We are gratified to learn that the purchase of the Selkirk Estate has been attended with satisfactory results, and that the great majority of the tenants have availed themselves of such a favorable opportunity of becoming freeholders; and that the amount of deposits already received is a proof that the purchase of that Estate will not entail any loss to the Colony.

9. Under the circumstance of your Excellency not being able to negotiate Debentures at five per cent., in accordance with the Land Purchase Act, whilst Treasury Warrants yielded six per cent., we approve of the course adopted by your Excellency in issuing Warrants for that service.

10. We are pleased to learn that your Excellency's efforts in organizing Volunteer Rifle and Artillery Corps have been responded to in a praiseworthy manner by numbers of spirited young men enrolling themselves. We will cheerfully make such provision for supporting and encouraging the movement as our limited means will afford, in order to enable your Excellency to further their efficiency. Your Excellency's suggestion respecting the Militia law not being applicable to them, shall receive our best consideration.

11. It is pleasing to know that the reception given to the Prince of Wales by the People of this Colony was gratifying to His Royal Highness, testifying as it did, an attachment and loyalty so characteristic of its inhabitants.

12. We cordially unite with your Excellency in the fervent hope that our deliberations may, with the favor of Divine Providence, conduce to the honor and welfare of this Island.

And the first to the fifth paragraphs inclusive of the said reported Address being again severally read, were, on the question being separately put thereon, agreed to by the House.

The sixth paragraph of the said Address being again read.

The Hon. Mr. *Whelan* moved to amend the said paragraph, by striking out the whole thereof, and inserting the following in lieu of the same.

“We are not insensible to the importance of the investigation made by the Land Commission, and we readily join with your Excellency in expressing regret that the award should have been delayed. We deem it advisable, however, in the meantime, that some measure should be adopted to stay proceedings for the collection of arrears of rent, from which proceedings,—since the closing of the Commissioners’ Court in this Island—many of the tenantry have been subjected to great expense and hardship. Such a measure as this, would give practicable effect to the unanimous recommendation of the Commissioners at the closing of their Court; it would also afford great relief to the tenantry, and be hailed with satisfaction by the inhabitants of the Island generally.”

COMPANY P.

To the Adjutant General.

SIR,—In reply to your enquiry whether in any correspondence relative to this Company, it was stated or implied that there was an intention on the part of the Government to exclude Roman Catholics from Volunteer Companies,—I have to inform you that nothing of the kind was ever in any correspondence of mine. Nor could it be, for as you well know, no orders were given me by my superior Officers, nor by the Government, publicly, or privately, nor by any other person or authority, to exclude any man from the ranks on account of his religious opinions.

On the contrary, it is within your knowledge that when, as Captain in the 4th Prince County Regiment, I was raising a Volunteer Artillery Company, it was your suggestion and my own wish and endeavour to attract to it some of the Acadian French Roman Catholics, as being light, handy fellows who would make good riflemen; and in furtherance of that object, I, (acting under instructions from my superior Officers) made it my duty to smooth, instead of irritate the petty feelings and jealousies that exist in a community of mixed races and faiths.

Apart from the Official returns to your Department, the only letter ever written on the subject of this Company was a short note addressed to the Rev., now Bishop Macintyre, and which was called forth by a seeming hesitation on the part of some of the men to associate as comrades, with my French neighbours on Mill River, producing of course, a like feeling of hesitation and distrust on their part, and causing them to hang back from enrolment.

The note was endorsed "private," but as it has been referred to in the House of Assembly, a certified copy of it is appended to this report.

Rev. and Dear Sir,

When I was last here, I called at your residence in the Village, but failed to see you. The subject of the visit was briefly this: A military company is being organized in this District. There appears some slight disposition if it were encouraged, to exclude the *French* and others of your people, on grounds which have nothing to do with the bearing of arms.

I do not share in these class prejudices; on the contrary, I *like* our French neighbours, and always do the little in my power to enable them to hold up their heads and assert themselves; besides, as Captain of Militia, of the District, I dare not recognise any distinction of men, in a compulsory calling out of the force, and certainly would not in a voluntary one.

Therefore, knowing the great value of your influence, I beg to ask you to express yourself favorably towards the movement, and

In these Despatches, were enclosed three petitions, or memorials against the "Act to give effect to the award of the Commissioners to be appointed on the land question." But the memorialists, in placing their petitions in the hands of the Lieutenant Governor for transmission to the Colonial Minister, did not furnish him with copies to be laid before the Legislature.

The Lieutenant Governor, however, is enabled to furnish the House with a copy of the prayer of the

petition of Charles Wright, Esquire, referred to in the accompanying copy, Despatch No. 61, and also a copy of the prayer of the petition signed by Robert Bruce Stewart, Esquire, and others, referred to in the copy, Despatch No. 62.

The memorialists appear to have petitioned against the Act in question, on the ground, that if it passed into a law, they would be bound by the award of a Commission, while they were not consenting parties to the submission upon which that award was to be founded.

The Lieutenant Governor will, by the first mail, make application to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, for copies of these memorials, in order to lay them before the Legislature.

And the said Message and accompanying papers having been read by the Clerk,

The following words spoken by the Hon. Mr. *Whelan*, in debate were ordered to be taken down,

The farmers are also busily employed in preparing for fencing and other spring work,—and altogether the present time for the Court is most burdensome and inconvenient for Jurors, Suitors, and all obliged to give their attendance. They would suggest the propriety of changing the time for the commencement of the term, to the second or third Tuesday in February, or at all events not later than the fourth Tuesday in that month. They understand that a former Grand Jury made a similar representation, and trust that this Session of the Legislature will not be allowed to pass without the required change being made.

The Hon. Mr *Haviland*, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, presented to the House a communication of the Post Master General, with enclosures, on matters relating to the Post Office department, and which communication was read by the Clerk as followeth:—

GENERAL POST OFFICE,  
Charlottetown, 14th March, 1861.

Sir:

I have the honor to enclose you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, a statement of the amount of postage collected in each Post Office in this Island, during the year ended December 30, 1860; also the amounts paid the several Postmasters in grants, salaries and commissions, during the same time.

Six new Offices have been established since the commencement of the year, and one Office has been closed, making a total of Eighty-two Offices in the Island.

The receipts for the year, at some of these are small, particularly in that of Skinner's Pond, on Lot 1, and Goose River, on Lot 42. The former one, Skinner's Pond, is maintained at an expense to the colony, of—for the past year, including cost of carriage—£10 0s. 10½d, less the amount of postage collected in the same time, £1 4s. 11d. and the number of Newspapers sent to this office, averages eight in each week; the loss in the office at Goose River, is not so great, being on the main post road to St. Peter's Bay, by the North side, to East Point.

Some of the Postmasters in the Island, receive a small grant from the Legislature, in addition to the yearly salary paid to all Postmasters, and I consider that Mr Benjamin Rogers, the Postmaster at Cascumpec, is intitled to a small grant also, collecting as he does, more than some who receive grants.

The Postmaster at Port Hill, also, is not so well paid, for the amount of labor performed, having

to remain in his office at night, twice in each week, to receive the mails from Charlottetown, and also, during the summer months, he receives, assorts and forwards mail matter from Tignish, West Cape, Lot 11, and Cascumpec, to be forwarded, via Summerside, to Shediac, the amounts of which do not appear in his accounts.

The system of payment of outward postage by stamp, having been adopted last year, the necessary stamps or postage labels have been distributed to the various Postmasters; and no provision being made to remunerate those who sell postage stamps, I have agreed to allow all postmasters a discount or commission of twenty per cent. on the amount sold by them,—that being the commission they are entitled to, on postage collected by them;—and to every person who will sell stamps in Charlottetown, a discount of five per cent.; I would recommend that three or four persons be appointed in Charlottetown for this purpose.

On the 1st of June, 1860, the system of compulsory prepayment of letters passing between the United Kingdom and this Island, came into operation. Letters wholly unpaid, or insufficiently prepaid, are charged with the deficiency of postage, and a fine of sixpence sterling, in addition thereto; one-half of the fine is placed to the credit of Great Britain: the other half is accounted for to the Government of this Island.

I have already forwarded you a communication from the Postmaster General of Nova Scotia, in which he recommends that a system of compulsory prepayment of postage by stamp, be adopted in the Colonies of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and this Island. That the Post Office department in each Colony collect and retain the postage on all letters prepaid in and addressed to places within, or for delivery beyond their respective Colonies.

I beg to recommend this system, in so far as it relates to the other Provinces; but consider its adoption on correspondence posted in, and addressed to places within this Island, will, just now, cause much inconvenience and, I may say, dissatisfaction.

I also wish to recommend that a system be put into operation for the transmission of small parcels by mail, similar to that introduced by the British and Colonial Post Offices, by which a parcel

closed at the ends and sides, may be posted at any Post Office in this Island for any other Office in this Island, provided it is prepaid by stamp, at the following rates, and subject to the following conditions:—

For anything less than one pound	£0	1	3

Two pounds, and not exceeding three		0	3 9

The weight of a parcel not to exceed three pounds, nor the size, one foot in breadth or length, or six inches in thickness, nor to contain any letters or any explosive or brittle matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the Mails. I enclose a memorandum of rules for the regulation of the parcel post.

The contract for conveyance of the Mails in summer, between Charlottetown and the neighbouring Provinces, will expire in 1862 or 64; and I beg to recommend that the Government advertise for tenders from parties willing to convey the Mails between Pictou, Charlottetown and Shediac, to enable persons in this Island, if their tenders be accepted, to build or purchase a suitable steamer to place on the route, at the expiration of the present contract.

A great advantage would be derived by having one steamer to ply between Shediac and Charlottetown twice in each week, calling at Summerside on her way up and down the Straits, and another small, smart Steamer to ply between this Port and Pictou, three times in each week.

It would be a great assistance to this department, and much time would be saved if a letter carrier be appointed for Charlottetown, to deliver

letters to persons residing within its limits.

The Bill to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the conveyance of real estate by married women during their coverture, was according to order, read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

3. Hon. Mr *Yeo*, and the same was received and read, praying for aid to improve the road leading from Summerside to the Town road and joining the said road near William Williams.

*Ordered*, That the said petition do lie on the table.

The Bill to incorporate the Trustees of Saint Dunstan's College in Queen's County, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr Macneill took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr Macneill, reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, without making any amendment thereto; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

*Oedered*, That the said Bill be engrossed and that the title be *An Act to incorporate the Trustees of Saint Dunstan's College in Queen's County, and for other purposes therein mentioned.*

of divers inhabitants of North River, head of West River, New Bedeque road and others, setting forth that James Treanor the present occupant of the premises at Morshead's corner Lot 32, did in accordance with law, obtain the sanction of a large majority of the inhabitants of the School district in which he resides, to keep a tavern on the said corner; that on applying to the proper officer for a licence to sell spirituous liquors, he was refused on the ground that the two nearest Justices of the Peace had not signed the necessary papers relating thereto, and praying for that redress to which they—the petitioners—and the travelling public generally are entitled.

clauses in the law for the recovery of small debts, and for such enactments in the premises as may be deemed necessary.

*Ordered*, That the said petition do lie on the table.

*Ordered*, That the order limiting the time for the reception of private petitions be suspended for this day; and thereupon

The following petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz:—

By the Hon. Mr. *Perry*,—A petition of divers inhabitants of Miscouche and its vicinity, praying aid to repair the road from Miscouche road to Linkletter's mills.

By the Hon. Mr. *Longworth*,—A petition of divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 23 and 24, comprising Cavendish, North Rustico, and others, praying for

the establishment of a ferry at Hunter River, at a place where a ferry was formerly kept, as also for a grant to procure necessary boats and to construct a small jetty at the landing on each side.

*Ordered*, That the said petitions do lie on the table.

Read a third time as engrossed the Bill intituled *An Act to incorporate the Gulf Express and Telegraph Company*.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled *An Act to incorporate the Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown in his Diocese*.

*Resolved* that the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr Longworth do carry the said Bills to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

The Bill to amend the Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the laws of this Island, was, according to order, read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr Sinclair took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Sinclair reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill and made several amendments thereto, which amendments were again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill as amended be engrossed, and that the title be *An Act to amend the Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the laws of this Island*.

Mr. Cooper from the Committee to whom was referred the plan and specification of the proposed wharf at Red point, Township No. 46, as also the petition of divers inhabitants of Little harbour, in the same Township, relative to roads at Black pond, to examine the same, and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred certain papers in relation to a proposed wharf at Red Point, (as it is next to impossible to haul produce to Souris, from the steepness of certain hills,)—and also a petition of inhabitants near Black Pond, Lot 46, to close a road—have to report that a new line of road has been opened, and a bridge built over an arm of Black Pond to avoid some of the hills, but even on this new line of road, there are steep hills, over which it is difficult to transport produce without a considerable outlay of money; now, the inhabitants of East Point are fairly entitled to have a wharf for the shipment of their produce, if a wharf can be made to answer the purpose, or otherwise to have a road fit for the transport of produce to Souris; but the proposed wharf would be open to the sea, and it is questionable whether it could be made to answer the purpose intended, and several of the inhabitants who gave up their land for the new line of road, expected the old line of road could be closed; but as this road must be kept open to a mill, and by keeping both new and old roads open, the tongue of land between them requiring to be fenced on all sides, would, in a manner, be lost to the parties through whose land it runs. Your Committee, therefore, having considered the interest of the several parties, recommend the appointment of some person or persons to inquire into and report as to whether the proposed wharf would be likely to resist the action of the sea, or be sanded up, and whether it would be safe for vessels to lie at the wharf; and also an estimate of the cost of such a wharf, and then to take a survey of the old line of road (which was intended to be closed), and make an estimate of the cost

of cutting through the hills and mounding up the hollows to reduce the ascent of the hills to an angle not exceeding twenty-five degrees, and report as to whether it would be most for the benefit of the inhabitants to improve the old road or build a wharf, or to improve or close the new road,—all of which is respectfully submitted.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor requesting he will be pleased to appoint a Commission, in order that the recommendations of the foregoing report may be carried into effect.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Cooper, the Hon. Mr. Hensley and the Hon. Mr. Coles do compose the said Committee.

A petition of Neil Macphee was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Hensley, and the same was received and read, setting forth the destruction by fire, in the month of July last, at Big pond, by persons who had set out fire to clear their wood farms, of his barn and all his farming implements, together with nearly all his growing crop, and praying for aid.

*Ordered*, That the said petition do lie on the table.

A petition of Thomas Robson of Sackville in the Province of New Brunswick, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Haviland, and the same was received and read, setting forth that he obtained Letters Patent under the Great Seal of this Island bearing date the 21st day of November 1854, whereby the full and exclusive right of making, constructing, using and vending the invention or discovery of a Fog bell and Horizontal Windmill (described in the said Letters Patent,) and everything relating thereto, were granted to him (the petitioner) until the third day of April, 1862, and tendering to this House and the Government, the free use of the present or any renewed patent

for such Fog bell, and of his best exertions in directing and aiding the construction thereof, in case the House shall adopt the same, and praying for the passing of an Act authorising the grant to him of Letters Patent, for such further period as to the House shall seem meet.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be withdrawn by the Hon. Mr. Haviland.

A petition of George Lawson and others members of the Presbyterian church at Cove head, in connection with the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr. Longworth, and the same was received and read, praying for the passing of an Act of incorporation.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to a Special Committee to examine the same and report thereon by Bill or otherwise.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, the Hon. Mr. Laird and the Hon. Mr. Haviland do compose the said Committee.

A motion being made that the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the different petitions praying the House to take some action to prevent distraints for rent and arrears of rent being made, until the award of the Commissioners appointed on the Land question shall be made known.

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved in amendment to the motion that all after the word "that" be left out and the following substituted, "the House do now adjourn."

Then the House adjourned for one hour,

And being met—

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole

House to take into further consideration the different petitions praying the House to take some action to prevent distraints for rent and arrears of rent being made, until the award of the Commissioners appointed on the Land question shall be made known.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

A petition of divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 42 and 43, was presented



to the House by Mr. *Cooper*, and the same was received and read, praying for the opening of a new line of road from Archibald O'Hanley's at Oar River, to John Maccormack's, Naufrage, instead of the present main Post road, which is circuitous and otherwise expensive to maintain, and also, longer unsheltered, and dangerous to travellers in the winter season.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to the members for the first and second Electoral Districts of King's County, viz : Mr *Cooper*, the Hon. Mr. *Hensley*, the Hon. Mr *Whelan* and Mr. *Sutherland*, as a Committee to examine the same and report thereon.

By the Hon. Mr *Gray*,—A petition of divers inhabitants of Townships No. 50, 57, 58 and 61, praying for the re-establishment of the Ferry at China point, and for a grant sufficient to enable a man to keep the said ferry, and provide a Scow or a horse boat for the same.

By Mr *Beer*,—A petition of Peter Gregor, praying to be reimbursed for expenses including medical attendance in a case of a pauper family at Brackley point.

*Ordered*, That the two preceding petitions do lie on the table.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled *An Act to amend the Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the laws of this Island*.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr *Longworth* do carry the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

*Ordered*, That Mr *Beer* have leave to introduce a Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House; and the same was read the first time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every private Bill, to examine the same and report thereon.

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the several petitions praying the House to take some action to prevent distraints for rent and arrears of rent being made, until the award of the Commissioners appointed on the Land Question shall be made known.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *Beer* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. *Speaker* resumed the Chair;

And Mr *Beer* reported that the Committee had gone through the consideration of the several petitions and other papers to them referred, and had come to a Resolution thereon, which resolution was again read, and is as followeth:

WHEREAS this Committee is of opinion that it would not promote the welfare of the tenants of this Island to pass a Bill at the present time to suspend the collection of Rents, but on the contrary would bring ruin and distress on many of the said tenants, and whereas this Committee are desirous to protect the true interests of the tenantry in a legitimate and constitutional manner.

RESOLVED, therefore, that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor requesting him to use his influence with all the Proprietors of this Colony and their Agents, in order to induce them to suspend the collection of all arrears of Rent, until the Royal Commissioners on the Land question have made their award.

The Hon. Mr *Coles* moved to amend the said reported Resolution by striking out all after the word "Whereas" and inserting the following in lieu of the same.

"On the first day of October, 1860, at the closing of the Court of Her Majesty's

High Commission appointed for the settlement of all differences existing between landlord and tenant in this Island, they, the said Commissioners, unanimously recommended the proprietors of land to abstain from harsh proceedings in the collection of rents, and to practise forbearance and moderation towards their tenantry, while the latter were enjoined to pay the then accruing year's rent. The Commissioners having on that occasion expressed a very decided opinion that it would be a misfortune "to the Colony," if the rents and arrears were hastily and harshly collected by the proprietors.

And WHEREAS it has come to the knowledge of the House of Assembly, that the recommendation thus addressed to the proprietors has been in many instances disregarded by them, proceedings at law having been instituted in many cases for the recovery of arrears of rent, by which, great hardship and suffering have been brought upon the tenantry, who were generally disposed to comply with the recommendation of the Commissioners as regards the payment of one year's rent.

And WHEREAS numerous petitions have been presented to the House of Assembly during the present Session, praying that some measure may be devised by the Legislature of this Island, to prevent further proceedings at law for the recovery of arrears of rent, pending the award of the land Commissioners; and it is the opinion of this House, that a hope has been generally entertained that the award of the Commissioners would shortly be made known, and relief thereby afforded to the tenantry, but it is evident from the tenor of a Despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, bearing date 2d January, 1861, and published subsequently to the signing of the aforesaid petitions, that the Act passed last Session for giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners will not be submitted for the Royal assent, it being consid-

ered too general in its character, in consequence of which objection, it will be necessary for the Legislature to pass another Act in its next Session, should the Award be given in the course of the ensuing summer, and thus the settlement of the land question will be necessarily postponed to a late period of the year 1862, when a second Act may receive the Royal allowance, if the Award be such as to meet with the approval of the Crown :

It is therefore **RESOLVED**, that the House of Assembly be recommended to pass a short Act embracing or carrying out the spirit of the recommendation of the Royal Commissioners above referred to, with the view of preventing distraints or executions to issue for arrears of rent, until the Land Commissioners shall make their award, and the same be ratified by such a law as may receive the assent of Her Majesty the Queen."

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

"His Grace the Duke of Newcastle has said that while assuring proprietors that the award of the Commissioners will

not be enforced against proprietors who have not consented to refer their claims to arbitration, (which was intended to define the rights of proprietors and tenants,) yet they should bear in mind that such refusal may materially influence the conduct of Her Majesty's Government, if called upon to support them in any future dispute with their tenants: And **WHEREAS** there is no Act or bond to bind either party to abide by the award of the Commissioners, or any security given that the award will be put in operation: And **WHEREAS** all the tenantry should be equally protected until their rights are defined either by the award of the Commissioners or by law.

*Resolved*, therefore, that proprietors shall claim no more than the one year's rent as recommended by the Commissioners until the rights of proprietors and tenants are defined and confirmed by the award of the Commissioners or by due course of law.

The House divided on the motion of amendment :

And the names being called for, they were taken down as in the last preceding division.

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on private Bills, having under their consideration a Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown, submit—that the Bill is of a private or local nature, but inasmuch as it has not hitherto been the practice to charge fees on similar Bills, they recommend that the said Bill be exempt from such fees.

The Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown, was then read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *Sinclair* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein.

Mr Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr *Sinclair* reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, without making any amendment thereto; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the title be *An Act to amend the Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown*.

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House to take into further consideration the report of the Commissioners appointed under the Act intituled *An Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the laws of this Island*.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr *Sinclair* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. *Speaker* resumed the Chair;

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had come to a resolution which he was directed to report to the House.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again,—which the House agreed to.

The resolution reported from the Committee was then read by the Clerk, and on the question being put thereon, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

**RESOLVED**, That it is expedient to consolidate and amend the several Acts now in force relating to Education, that is to say: the 15th Vic., cap. 13, the 16th Vic., cap. 2, the 17th Vic., cap. 8, the 18th Vic., cap. 12, the 20th Vic., cap. 17, the 23rd Vic., cap. 14 and 23rd Vic., cap. 15.

*Resolved*, That the same Committee who were appointed to prepare and bring in Bills pursuant to the resolutions reported from the Committee of the whole House, on Tuesday last, be a Committee to prepare and bring in a Bill pursuant to the above reported resolution.

The Hon. Mr *Longworth* from the last preceding Committee presented to the House a Bill—as prepared by the Committee—to consolidate and amend the several Acts relating to Education; and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time, to-morrow.

Then the House adjourned for one hour,

And being met—

At half-past five o'clock, the House adjourned until to-morrow at ten o'clock.

## Wednesday, April 3, 1861.

### PRAYERS.

ON motion of Mr *Owen*,

*Ordered*, That the rule adopted this Session limiting the time for the sitting of the House to six o'clock, be amended, and that the House do rise at seven o'clock during the remainder of the Session.

The order of the day for taking into consideration the several private petitions before the House being read,

The House proceeded accordingly to take the same into consideration.

The petition of divers inhabitants of Township No. 17 and its vicinity, praying aid to improve the new road leading from Summerside to the Town road, joining the said road near William Williams', was taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to the Members for the District for consideration, in the subdivision of the moneys appropriated for the service of roads, bridges and wharfs.

The residue of the petitions praying aid for the service of roads, bridges and wharfs, were then severally taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petitions be severally referred to the members for the different Districts for consideration, in the subdivision of the moneys appropriated for the service of roads, bridges and wharfs.

The petition of William Ryan and other Revenue Officers, praying for an increase of pay, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to the Committee of the whole House, when in consideration of Ways and Means.

The petition of Daniel C. Campbell, Land Waiter and Preventive Officer, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to a Special Committee to examine the same, and report thereon.

*Ordered*, That Mr. *Macneill*, Mr. *Davies* and the Hon. Mr. *Wightman* do compose the said Committee.

The petition of divers inhabitants of Prince County, praying for a grant to the Micmac Indians, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to the Committee of Supply.

The petition of Donald Morrison, Minister, and other inhabitants of Strathalbyn, praying the House to lend its influence to have Tuesdays and Fridays appointed as Market days, instead of Wednesdays and Saturdays, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to a Special Committee to examine the same and report thereon.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Holm, Mr. Beer, and the Hon. Mr. Hensley do compose the said Committee.

The petition of James Keefe, Township No. 47, Bailiff for the Small Debt Court at Souris, was taken up and again read; and thereupon

Mr. Cooper moved that the said petition be referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Beer moved in amendment to the motion that all after the word "that" be struck out, and the following substituted "the petition be referred to the Members for the District to provide for."

*Ordered*, That Mr. Beer have leave to withdraw his motion.

The Hon. Mr. Hensley then moved in amendment to the motion that all after the word "that" be struck out, and the following substituted—"the petition be referred to a Special Committee to examine the same and report thereon, with power to send for persons, papers and records."

And the motion being seconded and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House, and

*Ordered*, accordingly.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr. Hensley, Mr. Macneill and Mr. Cooper do compose the said Committee.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Macaulay,

*Ordered*, That the further consideration of the residue of the private petitions be deferred until the afternoon's sitting.

A message from the Council by Mr. Cooper.

Mr. Speaker;

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled *An Act to incorporate the Gulf Express and Telegraph Company*, with an amendment to which they desire the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

And then he withdrew.

The Hon. Mr. Macaulay then moved that the House do come to a Resolution as followeth:

WHEREAS, during the debate in this House on the afternoon of the 26th February last, the Hon. George Coles, Member of the Third Electoral District of Queen's County, did rise in his place and then and there made use of words to the following effect:—"What shall we say when we find Her Majesty's Representative descending from his high position and degrading his Commission by penning a false despatch, in plain English, writing a lie to the Secretary of State; and allowing himself to be instigated thereto by his constitutional advisers:"

And WHEREAS, in the published report of this debate, the expressions then made use of are not set forth in their proper order and form, as spoken by the Hon. George Coles aforesaid; therefore

RESOLVED, That the Reporter be called to the bar of this House to give his explanation of the said omission.

The Hon. Mr. Whelan, moved to amend the said proposed Resolution by striking out all after the word "despatch" in the eleventh line of the preamble thereof, to the end of the said first preamble, and substituting the following:

"But the Lieutenant Governor is not so much to be blamed or held responsible for the statement in the Despatch, as the Members of the Government, or those

from whom he received the information, for it cannot be expected that His Excellency can be otherwise acquainted on any particular evening, with the proceedings of the Legislature during that day, than from the Members of his Council."

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

The Hon. Mr *Haviland*, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, presented to the House, an Account of disbursements, of Theophilus Stewart, Esquire, Indian Commissioner to sick and indigent Indians from the 26th day of March 1860, to the 1st day of March 1861, also a Report of the said Commissioner accompanying such account.

See Appendix (S.)

*Ordered*, That the said disbursements' accounts be referred to the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, to examine the same and report thereon.

A motion being made that Theophilus Stewart, Esquire, one of the Indian Commissioners be heard at the bar of this House, on matters relating to the condition of the Mic-Mac Indians, on Friday next.

The House divided on the question.

YEAS: 14.

NAYS: 8.

So it was carried in the affirmative, and

*Ordered*, accordingly.

Pursuant to order, Mr David Laird Reporter to the House appeared at the bar and gave the following evidence:—

1. Question. Did you report the proceedings of this House on the 26th February last?

Ans. I was reporting at the Reporter's desk, that evening.

2. Ques. Did you in that report now before the House, of the debate on the 26th February last, embody all the particulars of what was ut-

tered by the Hon. George Coles towards the latter part of the afternoon's proceedings?

[The Parliamentary Reporter for 1861, p. 23, being shown to the witness,]

Ans. No, and I rarely ever do in any debate I report in this House.

Ques. 3. Did you omit any important particular on that occasion?

Ans. None that I had down in my notes.

Ques. 4. Can you refer to your notes of a speech made by the Hon. George Coles, just before the adjournment on that evening?

Ans. I can, but the report as appears in this published report, contains everything that is worth extending from my notes. I was fatigued, having been reporting several days previously. I was almost exhausted by taking notes of three hours' continuous debate, and as it was near the adjournment, and the question was put on the amendment a little previous, I thought as the second paragraph on the land question had been discussed, this would wind up the report of the day, and so I was not very attentive. In Committee the division is not taken down by the Clerk, and it is necessary it be taken down by the Reporter; the Reporter has no time to take down the names then, he has to do it afterwards; and I was engaged in looking round to see who had voted for and against the motion, when the Hon. Mr. Whelan moved an amendment to the following paragraph which was in connection with the former; he made a few remarks, which I did not fully take notice of. So far as I can remember, during the time the Hon. Mr. Whelan was reading his amendment, I turned to complete taking down the names in the division on the former amendment; while engaged in that, and after he had made his few remarks, and thinking the House would not enter into discussion on that point as it was discussed in connection with the other; the Hon. Mr. Coles arose, and not thinking probably his remarks would be of any consequence at that late hour, I had not proceeded to take down his speech until he was fairly under way, and made some of the most offensive expressions. In his speech I noticed he fell into some remarks about misstatements in despatches. I continued then taking down notes. I gave the substance. I believe he used other expressions stronger than

I had in my notes. Observing that they were strong expressions, I did not consider it advisable to put them down, as I had them not in my notes, thinking probably there would be a question about them.

Ques. 5. State as nearly as you can recollect, the offensive language to which you refer as uttered by the Hon. Mr. Coles on that occasion?

Ans. I can scarcely give evidence from mere recollection; as I said, I was engaged part of the time, and do not feel inclined to give evidence from mere recollection.

Ques. 6. From your recollection, were the offensive words used by the Hon. Mr. Coles and referred to by you, a personal charge against the Lieutenant Governor, or otherwise?

Ans. As an opinion, I consider the words reported here, are personal; His Excellency is here spoken of as an individual. I consider the words used before, to be still more personal, as far as I can recollect.

Ques. 7. Was there no qualification made by the Hon. Mr. Coles, to what you call personal words?

Ans. Subsequently there was, but I do not consider that does away with the personality of it; the statement stands by itself; every statement stands by itself.

Ques. 8. How long subsequently? Was not the qualification referred to, made in the same speech?

Ans. Of course it was the same speech; it appears in two or three sentences subsequently; I believe there were intervening sentences.

Ques. 9. Was the letter dated "Protestant Office, March 4th," a copy of which is now shown to you, written by you.

[The letter referred to in this question, was perused by the Witness, and is as followeth:—

(Copy.) "THE PROTESTANT OFFICE,  
" March 4, 1861.

"DEAR SIR,—In answer to your letter of this morning, requesting me to furnish you with the exact words you made use of in that part of the debate of Tuesday last, which referred to the Despatch written by His Excellency on the 30th April last, stating that the Bill to give effect to the award of the Commissioners had passed both Houses—I have to write, that after alluding to



the support of the new members in the Council; or upper branch of the Legislature, you spoke to the following effect:—

“ I cannot say that this Despatch, containing such a statement, was the reason that His Grace the Duke of Newcastle thought the Royal assent should be withheld for the present from the Bill; but there is no telling what may have been the result. He is well aware of the uncertainty of legislative action. In no matter do we know what may happen in a day. A nation may be ruined in a day. Such a course as that Her Majesty's Representative should pen a falsehood to the Colonial Office is dishonorable to one holding his high position. But the Lieutenant Governor is not so much to be blamed or held responsible for the statement in the Despatch as the members of the Government, or those from whom he received the information, for it cannot be expected that His Excellency can be otherwise acquainted on any particular evening with the proceedings of the Legislature during that day, than from the members of his Council.”

“ Yours very respectfully,

“ DAVID LAIRD.

“ Hon. George Coles.”

Ans. I should prefer the letter itself; however, so far as I remember the words, it appears to be a true copy; there may be a word or two wanting. He asked in his letter for the exact words. In writing, I did not say that I used the exact words, but wrote “ you spoke to the following effect.” I did not pretend I had given the exact words; he used a great many.

Ques. 10. Does the extract from the Hon. Mr. Coles' speech as quoted in the letter just read, correspond with the passage marked in the Parliamentary Reporter, page 23?

(The passage marked and alluded to in this question is as follows: “ Now, sir, I cannot say that this Despatch containing such a statement, was the reason that His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, thought the Royal assent should be withheld for the present, from the Bill, but there is no telling what may have been the result. He is well aware of the uncertainty of legislative action. In no matter do we know what may happen in a day. Such a course as that Her Majesty's Representative should pen a falsehood to the Colonial Office is dishonorable to one holding his high position; but the Lieutenant Governor is not so much to be blamed or held responsible for the statement in the Despatch as the Members of the Government, or those from

whom he received the information, for it cannot be expected that His Excellency can be otherwise acquainted on any particular evening with the proceedings of the Legislature during that day, than from the Members of his Council.”)

Ans. All, with the exception of the words “ Now sir,” at the beginning of the sentence; what follows is the same.

The witness then further stated.

I was going to state, so far as I can recollect, that he made a charge of falsehood in the first part of his speech, then he alluded to the new members of the Legislative Council, and afterwards referred to the falsehood again. It is evident from this report that something of the kind stated about the falsehood was alluded to before. It is this statement I wish to make,—it was the last allusion to the falsehood and not the first,—which I took a note of.

Ques. 11. Can you produce your notes to support the statement just made and read to you?

Ans. Of course I cannot produce it from my notes when I was attending to something else, as I stated. I said the first reference made to the falsehood, I did not report, as I was taking down the division.

Mr Laird then withdrew.

On motion of the Hon. Mr *Whelan*.

Mr James D. Gordon, Reporter to the House, was called to the Bar, and gave the following evidence:—

Ques. 1. Were you Reporter to the Hon. House of Assembly on the 27th February?

Ans. I was; I am called here to answer to a report given on the 26th, but on that day I was on my way to Charlottetown.

Ques. 2. Can you produce or refer to your notes of the debates of the morning of the 27th February last?

Ans. I can. (On being asked to produce his notes, Witness says “ they are not here;” he withdraws and returns with his notes.)

Ques. 3. Please to examine your notes of the Speech made by the Hon. Mr Coles, on the morning of the 27th February last, in answer to a Speech made by the Hon. Col. Gray, in reference to certain words spoken by the Hon. Mr Coles,

on the previous day, and say whether those notes are correctly transcribed and printed in the Parliamentary Reporter, page 25, at the passage beginning with the word "On" and ending with the word "matter."

Ans. I took these notes down with a pencil; some of the words are blotted out, I cannot read it very well, (Witness reads from his notes the passage referred to in the last question, which passage as published in the Parliamentary Reporter, page 25, in the following words, was acknowledged by the House to be substantially the same as that read by the Witness, viz:)

"On the next day e. g. if the Legislative Council had only one of a majority, the opposition might have mustered their forces and thrown it out. Or suppose one of the Councilors had died before the next day, would the Bill have passed? It would not. I expected this would be the excuse. It is the Government however, I hold responsible. How did His Excellency know it had passed unless told so? His Excellency could have no idea it had passed unless he had been so informed by one of his Councillors, for he is a Gentleman of too high standing to pen a falsehood in reference to this matter." (The Clerk having read the foregoing from the Parliamentary Reporter, Witness says, "that is correct according to my notes")

Ques. 4. Please examine your notes and say whether the Hon. Mr Macaulay in the course of the same debate, and after Mr Coles had spoken, used the following language, or language to the same effect as reported by you: "The matter at present before the Committee is the charge brought

against the Government by the hon. member, viz:—that the advisers of His Excellency caused him to pen a falsehood"?

Ans. There was a good deal of interruption at that time. (Witness reads from his notes.) "The matter before the Committee is this, the consideration of certain charges made by hon. member against the Governor, that the advisers of the Governor advised His Excellency to write a falsehood to him. Words of this nature should not be passed by this Hon. Committee without ascertaining their truth or falsehood. If he brings charges of this character against such a gentleman, he should be satisfied about their foundation. I contend the words of the Despatch will not be found meriting the censure which he has imputed to His Excellency."

(The above passage having been taken down by the Clerk and again read to the witness, he says, "it is correct according to my notes.")

Ques. 5. What do you mean by the words just read from your notes that "His Excellency's advisers advised him to write a falsehood to *him*?" Did you understand that the Colonial Minister was referred to by the word "him"?

Ans. Sometimes in writing, I put down a pronoun to save the writing of two or three long words. I have put down "him" here, I think, to represent the Colonial Minister, for the reason I have stated.

Mr Gordon then withdrew.

Then the House adjourned at half past six o'clock, until to-morrow at ten o'clock.

## Thursday, April 4, 1861.

### PRAYERS.

**MR SPEAKER** communicated to the House the following letters from the Reporters and which were read by the Clerk, viz:—

THURSDAY, APRIL 4, 1861.

To the Hon. the Speaker of the House of Assembly,

SIR,

Having this morning carefully considered the proceedings of the Hon. the House of As-

sembly yesterday, in reference to calling the Reporters to the bar of the House to answer for the correctness of their reports of the 26th and 27th of February last, in the course of which proceedings it was publicly stated by an Hon. Member, that "the report was incorrect all through"—a statement as yet unretracted; and as I was on the afternoon of yesterday, summoned to the bar of the House, and said to be put on my trial, I have to inform the Hon. House through you, that I have no desire any longer to occupy a position where my veracity may be impugned publicly, without having the privilege of a public reply, and of being subjected to trying ordeals in reference to other men's unguarded statements. I feel called upon to state that I am loth to transcribe any more of my notes of the debates of the present Session, in which there are so many personal attacks, every word of which is important in the view of some Hon. Members; and as I have not attained that proficiency in the phonographic art as to claim to be a verbatim reporter, particularly when hon. members speak at the rate of 150 words per minute, and as I cannot tell how soon, if I continue reporting, I may again be called upon to answer for an omission in some hon. member's speech, I beg to tender my resignation as Reporter of the House for the present Session.

Hon. Sir;

I wish to make a remark in reference to a speech delivered by the Hon. Mr Macaulay, which to-day I read from my original notes.

As this speech stands in the *Parliamentary Reporter*, the word "Government" occurs in the first sentence; but to-day I believe I read "Governor." This discrepancy originated in the following circumstance: In phonography the logographs for the words *Governor* and *Government* are alike, and, not being quite collected at the time, I suppose I read the one word for the other.

On looking carefully over my original notes, since, (I say *original* notes, for I copied off the Speeches delivered on the forenoon of Wednesday

February 27th, in the Corresponding style of Phonography, shortly after they were delivered, and from these I transcribed what appears in the *Reporter*,) on carefully looking over my original notes, then, I find that *Government* is the word which Mr Macaulay used.

If I read "gentleman" a little further on in the Speech, instead of "Gentlemen," it was because these words are also written alike, the only distinction being in their position,—vide the *Phonographic Manual*, page 80; and the *Phonographic Magazine* under the letter G—The word in the original notes is in the plural and reads *Gentlemen*.

If the House be pleased to receive this explanation, I merely request the privilege of having it mentioned, or the proper word or words—if there are two—inserted. I may say, too, that I think any short-hand writer would say that it was unfair that I should have been called upon to read *ad promptu* from my original notes, speeches delivered five or six weeks ago, especially when all the speaking on Wednesday morning of February 27th was not very deliberate.

I must now state, Hon. Sir, that I am ready and willing to resign my situation as one of the Reporters to your Hon. House, at any moment; for it is contrary to my principles to serve any man or body of men after my fidelity is doubted, and much more so when it is publicly impeached.

If I have forfeited the confidence of your Hon. House, of course I will not be expected to appear any more at the Reporter's desk,—at least not until an explanation be given.

Mr. Coles, contained the whole of the remarks made by that Hon. gentleman upon the occasion referred to.

A motion being made that the Hon. Mr. Longworth have leave to withdraw his Resolution.

*Resolved*, accordingly.

Mr. Cooper from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 42 and 43, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :

Your Committee to whom was referred a petition from the inhabitants of Townships Nos. 42 and 43, North side, praying that a road may be altered about half a mile inland from the present road, have to report that on the present line of road every small brook has steep banks and high bridges which are costly to keep in repair; that Cow river and Naufrage bridges are upon the sea shore and are frequently damaged with storms and high tides; that the houses of the inhabitants being now near the centre of their farms are far from the road; now the inhabitants with two or three exceptions, offer their land sufficient for a new road, and their assistance to make the alteration over cleared land comparatively level, where few bridges of any extent would be necessary, and the road would pass near the dwellings of the inhabitants; your Committee therefore recommend that the Government appoint a fit person, who together with the Commissioner, may in October next, survey a line of road from Archibald O'Hanley's, Oar river, to John Maccormack's, Naufrage, and enquire of those persons who might feel themselves injured by said road, what compensation they would require for right of way, and estimate the probable cost of each bridge which would be necessary on the new line of road, and report their proceedings to the Government.

*Ordered*, That the same Committee who prepared the report be a Committee to prepare an Address to His Excellency, in accordance therewith.

*Ordered*, That the order limiting the time for the reception of private petitions be suspended; and thereupon—

A petition of divers resident householders of the Uigg School District, Township No. 50, was presented to the House by the Hon. Mr *Gray*, and the same was received and read, setting forth that there are within the bounds of the district upwards of one hundred children between the ages of five and sixteen, of whom eighty-three are on the roll of the school, and from sixty to seventy in daily attendance, and praying the House to adopt such steps as may be necessary for the purpose of allowing the school an assistant teacher.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every petition relating to Schools and Education, to examine the same and report thereon.

The following petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz:—

By Mr *Howat*,—A petition of divers inhabitants of Tryon and adjacent settlements, setting forth that so much of the Act passed last Session as abolishes imprisonment for debt for sums under ten pounds, has had in many instances, a very injurious effect; that such enactment was premature and will operate materially against the poor of the community, and praying the House to remedy the evils complained of.

By the Hon. Mr *Wightman*,—A petition of divers merchants, traders, mechanics, and others of Georgetown and its vicinity, setting forth that the forty-first section of the present Small Debt Act provides that no person shall be imprisoned for any sum under ten pounds, upon any action that shall have commenced after the first day of April in this present year; that they consider this very injurious to the poor of the country, as it is

causing numerous persons to be sued who would not be, and if all debts now due have to be collected by force of law, it will be ruinous to hundreds of families; that it will also prevent them (the petitioners) from accommodating persons who may be in want, at any future time, and praying the House to repeal the said section of said Act, or to defer the time so limited, for at least two years, so as to allow the collection of all debts now due.

*Ordered*, That the two preceding petitions be referred to the Committee of the whole House, to examine the same and report thereon.

*Ordered*, That the petition of divers merchants, traders and others of Bedeque Summerside, St. Eleanor's and others, laid on the table on Saturday last, praying for a similar object, be referred to the said Committee.

The amendment made by the Council to the Bill intituled *An Act to incorporate the Gulf Express and Telegraph Company* was then read the first time and is as followeth:—

Folio 2,—line 11,—after “hereditaments” insert  
“not exceeding in amount the sum of three thousand pounds currency.”

*Ordered*, That the Tenth rule of the House be suspended in this case; and then the said amendment was read a second time.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. Mr *Thornton* do carry the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

The House of Assembly having had under their consideration a petition from the inhabitants of Townships Nos. 42 and 43, north side, praying that the road along the north side of said Lots should be removed half a mile more inland than the present road, have adopted the report of a Special Committee on the subject, (a copy of which is herewith submitted to your Excellency,) respectfully request that your Excellency will be pleased to give effect to the recommendations herein contained.

**Ordered,** That the said Address be engrossed.

**Ordered,** That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Mr Cooper from the Committee appointed to prepare an address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in pursuance of the recommendations contained in the report of the Special Committee appointed to report in relation to the proposed wharf at Red Point, Township No. 46, and roads at Black Pond, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the said Committee, which address was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:

*To His Excellency GEORGE DUNDAS, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

The House of Assembly have had under consideration the petition of certain inhabitants of Township No. 46, residing near Black pond,

praying for the closing of a certain old line of road leading to Anderson's Mills near Black pond, together with a counter petition from certain inhabitants of Townships Nos. 46 and 47, praying that said old line of road should be kept open; also a petition from divers inhabitants of Townships Nos. 46 and 47, praying for the erection of a wharf on the south side of Lot 46, at the end of the line of road leading through to Priest pond on the north side; and now respectfully request that your Excellency will be pleased by the appointment of some person or persons to cause proper inquiries to be made as to whether the proposed wharf would be likely to resist the action of the sea, or be sanded up, and whether it would be safe for vessels to lie at the wharf, and also a full and careful estimate of the probable cost of such a wharf; also to take a survey of the old line of road sought to be closed, and make an estimate of the cost of cutting through the hills and filling up the hollows on the old line of road, so as to reduce the ascent of the hills to an angle not exceeding twenty-five degrees; and also to report as to whether it would be most for the benefit of the inhabitants to improve or close the old road, or to improve or close the new line of road round Black pond referred to in the petitions, and whether it would, after such improvements, be still advisable, and for the benefit of the inhabitants, to have the proposed wharf constructed, and whether the benefit to be derived would be adequate to the amount of money required to construct such a wharf. That as Souris Bridge, although twenty-one pounds were expended upon it last year, again requires extensive repairs, for which the sum of fifty pounds is asked. The House further requests your Excellency that the person or persons so to be appointed, should be also instructed to examine Souris Bridge and report upon the state and condition thereof, and the mode in which the same may be best secured, for the instruction of the Road Commissioner or other person to whom the superintendance of the repairs may be entrusted; also to examine the site of a proposed Breakwater in Souris, the construction of which has been commenced by the inhabitants, and to report upon the practicability of completing it, and benefit likely to be derived therefrom, and whether the same is not deserving of a grant from the public funds.

*Ordered*, That the said draft Address be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

A petition of Charles Palmer, Parker Merrill, George Macnutt and others, friends of Temperance throughout the Island, setting forth that they are fully convinced that a large proportion of cases brought before the Magistracy of this Colony, for their adjudication, originates in the use of intoxicating liquors ; and it is an acknowledged principle in every free country, that those whose office it is to execute the laws, should not be engaged in any employment or calling evidently calculated to bias their judgment in the discharge of their duties ; that the petitioners believe the manufacture and sale of such liquors, by a Justice of the Peace, is a violation of this principle, inasmuch as he is frequently called upon to try individuals guilty of misdemeanors, occasioned by the use of alcoholic drinks, which he himself has supplied, and praying the House to make such an enactment as will remedy the evil complained of.

Mr *Holm* from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of Donald Morrison, Minister, and other inhabitants of Strathalbyn, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee ; which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of divers inhabitants of Strathalbyn, Scotch Settlement, praying this House to lend its influence to have Tuesdays and Fridays appointed as Market days in Charlottetown, instead of Wednesdays and Saturdays, as at present, for reasons therein stated, have to report :

That by the Act 10th Victoria, chapter 16, and the Act 14th, Victoria, chapter 23, the Market days in Charlottetown, are enacted to be on Wednesday and Saturday in each week ; but, by the Act 18th Victoria, chapter 34, incorporating the City of Charlottetown, the Council of that City are empowered to establish and regulate Market days and fairs ; your Committee therefore consider that the appeal of the petitioners should have been made to the Council of the City of Charlottetown, and not to this House ; at the same time, they desire to express their concurrence in the views set forth in the petition as to the desirableness of a change being made in the time of holding the Markets in Charlottetown, at all events, so far as the same relates to the discontinuance of Saturday as a Market day, as your Committee conceive that this alteration would tend to a better and more perfect observance of the Sabbath day.

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Bill to provide for the organization of a Volunteer force for the defence of this Island.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr *Perry* took the Chair of the Committee ; and after some time spent therein,

Mr Speaker resumed the Chair ;

And the Hon. Mr *Perry* reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made several amendments thereto ; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

Your Committee to whom were referred the several petitions praying for the opening of new lines of roads have to report :— That your Committee recommend that inquisitions be held under the Act 14th Vic., cap 1, in consequence of the prayers of the following petitions, viz :—

1. The petition of certain settlers on Lot or Township No. 25, praying for the opening of a new line of road from the Princetown road on the old County line, to the new Bedeque Road; also, a counter petition from Alexander Smith, Andrew Hughes and others, praying that the road prayed for, may not be sanctioned, on the ground that the opening of the said road would much injure the farms of the last named petitioners.

2. The petition of certain inhabitants of Lots Nos. 35 and 36, praying for the opening of a new road in a direct line from MacConnel's wharf, through said MacConnel's farm—a distance of about 25 chains to the road leading from St. Peter's road towards said wharf.

3. The petition of inhabitants of Township No. 26, praying for the opening of a new road from the County line to what is called the Taylor Mill bridge, and crossing the road that leads from Lewis's towards George Wright's, near the North brook, a distance of nearly five miles.

4. The petition of inhabitants of back settlement, Lot 15, praying that a new road be opened from Victor Arsneaux's land on Fifteen point road, to the said back settlement, a distance of one mile, the right of way, except a length of 13 chains, being given up to the public.

5. The petition of inhabitants of Tryon and vicinity, praying for widening and opening a proper highway between John Clark's and William Lea's farms, from Tryon to Crapaud wharf, the present pathway being only 20 feet wide.

6. The petition of inhabitants of Lots 25 and 26, and adjacent settlements, setting forth that the petitioners experience great inconvenience for want of a road, between the head of the Loyalist land on Township No. 26, and land owned by the Messrs Thompson, and crossing Dunk River, from the Freetown road to the backwoods' settlement.

7. That it be recommended to the Government to appoint a Commission to open a road on the division line from Hooper's to John Richard's farm, Lot 15, the same being recommended by the Commissioner of Public Lands.

8. The petition of the inhabitants of Whim road, Montague settlement and vicinity, setting forth that the only road which can be of any service to petitioners, from the Whim road to the Montague River, is one commencing on the line between Frederick Suckles' and Alexander Campbell's farms, where 40 feet in breadth is already reserved for a road as far as the rear of said Suckles' and Campbell's farms, and thence to be continued north, in a line between the farms of James Campbell Senr. and the late Robert Dewar.

9. The petition of certain inhabitants of Townships Nos. 51, 52, 59, and 66, praying for the opening of a road from the Georgetown road past Macdonald's mills, to the Union road, and Montague road.

Your Committee recommend, with regard to the four following petitions that the respective Road Commissioners for the Districts, be instructed to report on them, namely, viz :

The petition of inhabitants of Conovoy settlement, Township No. 38, for opening a new line of road between the farms of Benjamin Farquharson, and Edmund Coffin, to the St. Peter's Road, a distance of about 1½ mile, one half of which said line is given gratis.

The petition of Thomas Craig, John Waddell, and others, praying for the opening of a new Road near the residence of the said John Waddell, and thence to the public highway, Township No. 27.

The petition of certain inhabitants of Township

No. 29, praying for the opening of a new Road from Melville road to Sandy Point.

Your Committee recommend that the petition of the inhabitants of the Eastern portion of Lot 21, Millvale Road, praying for aid to open 1½ mile of the Millvale Road, commencing at the boundary line between Lots 21 and 22, running direct to the road which leads to the Malpeque Road, about half way between Millvale and Haslam's, be referred to the Members for the District.

Your Committee recommend that in future all petitions praying for the opening of new lines of roads, ought to be accompanied by a certificate of recommendation from the respective Road Commissioners, and also a sketch or plan of the contemplated Road.

**Resolved,** That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to give effect to the recommendations contained in the said report.

**Ordered,** That the same Committee who prepared the report, be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

**Ordered,** That the thirteenth rule of the House be suspended, to enable a Member to introduce a Bill; and thereupon

**Ordered,** That the Hon. Mr Haviland have leave to introduce a Bill to repeal certain parts of the Act consolidating the Election laws, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof.

The Hon. Mr *Haviland*, reported that the managers had been at the conference, and had complied with the instructions given them by this House.

A Message from the Council by Mr Cooper.

Mr *Longworth*,—A petition of William Heard, Chief Engineer, and of William Macgill and other Engineers of the fire department of the City of Charlottetown, setting forth the total inadequacy of the Engines belonging to that department, to grapple with the contingencies that in all human probability may soon occur; that a suitable Engine with hose and hose reel will cost from three to four hundred pounds, the half of which sum may be raised by public subscription, provided the other half is granted by the House, and praying for a grant of such sum for the said purpose, as shall be deemed meet.

By Mr *Davies*,—A petition of William W. Lord, R. R. Hodgson and others, Merchants and ship owners, setting forth that they have for several years past, been subjected to a very oppressive tax on their ships in the Gut of Canso, while in the prosecution of their voyage to the Atlantic, whether anchoring there or merely passing through; that in the Session of 1825, the House deemed this matter of so much importance to the prosperity of the Colony, that a series of Resolutions were adopted, a copy of which is herewith submitted; that they have good reason to believe, were

the merits of the case properly represented to the British Government, an immediate stop would be put to the further exaction of this unparalleled tax, and praying the House to take the premises into careful consideration, and adopt such measures for the protection and relief of the shipping interests of this Colony as shall be deemed advisable.

*Ordered*, That the said petitions do lie on the table.

The Hon. Mr *Perry* from the Committee to whom was referred the petition of Peter Francis on behalf of himself and other resident native Indians, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of Peter Francis, on behalf of himself and other Micmac Indians, setting forth, that in or about the year 1847, the Island called Indian Island in Murray Harbour, was sold on account of the non payment of Land Assessment, and praying the House of Assembly to adopt such measures as will speedily restore to them the said

Island,—have to report that they have been informed from reliable authority that the said Island was in the possession of the Micmac tribe upwards of Seventy years; and that it appears by the Journals of the House of Assembly, April 6, 1843, a sum of fifty pounds was granted and placed at His Excellency's disposal for the purpose of purchasing the said Island, to be reserved for the use or occupation of the Aborigines of the Colony, but in consequence of the then claimant of said Island, deeming the sum not sufficient, he did not dispose of it to the Government and it was subsequently sold as above stated, for non-payment of Land Tax, and is now in possession of two families named Herring.

Your Committee submit, that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to ascertain whether the parties in possession would dispose of their claim thereto, and the amount of compensation looked for, with the view of restoring to the Indians the said Island, to be occupied by them as in former years.

*Ordered*, That the said report do lie on the table.

#### SECTION A.

“Any party executing a warrant of Attorney, on which Judgment is proposed to be or can be entered, may, if he think fit, in the defeasance to the Warrant of Attorney, dispense with the two years’ notice or advertisement of sale in the case of freehold estates, or the one year’s notice or advertisement of sale in the cases of leasehold estates, as is now by law prescribed, and limit the time notified or advertised, in either case, to any lesser period, not less, however, than six months; and any lands or tenements, whether leasehold or freehold, taken in execution under any such Judgment, entered on any such Warrant of Attorney as in this section mentioned, shall and may be sold after

notice or advertisement of sale shall have been given for the length of time specified in such Warrant of Attorney.”

#### SECTION B.

“Leasehold estates and interests in lands shall also be bound by Judgments entered up of record in Her Majesty’s Supreme Court of Judicature, in the same way and manner, and to the same extent as freehold and other estates and interests therein are bound or affected thereby, under the provisions of the Act passed in the twelfth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, Chapter two, or other Acts relating to Judgments in the Supreme Court, in all cases where in the defeasance to the Warrant of Attorney on which any such Judgments shall be entered, it shall be declared by the party defendant who executed the same, that it is his intention and desire that his leasehold property should be bound by the Judgment; and such leasehold estates and interests shall, when afterwards taken in execution, be levied upon, advertised, and sold as now by law required and pointed out respecting leasehold estates.”

#### SECTION C.

“The party Plaintiff, or his Attorney, shall, where the Judgment is intended to bind leasehold estates under the provisions of the last preceding section, deliver to the Prothonotary, with the Warrant of Attorney, a note or docket in writing notifying him thereof, and the Prothonotary shall, on entering up the Judgment, and noting the same in the Index Books, make a minute or note opposite the same, showing that it is intended to bind leasehold estates thereby as aforesaid.”

Your committee to whom was referred the petition of Patrick Bambrick, praying to be remunerated for forty-two days' labour performed by him in assisting the Surveyor General in surveys on the public lands,—have to report:

That they have examined the late Surveyor General, Joseph Ball, Esq., and the Commissioner of Public Lands, the Hon. John Aldous, regarding the correctness of the statements set forth in the petition,—a report of whose evidence is hereto annexed,—and your Committee are of opinion from a careful examination of this evidence, that the claim of the petitioner is a just and equitable one.

It will be seen from the testimony of Mr Aldous that the reason assigned for refusing payment of petitioner's claim is, that the certificate of the Surveyor General (also annexed) was too vague, no dates having been furnished as to the time when the work referred to, was performed. But this defect has been remedied by a written statement furnished to your Committee by Mr Ball, which is likewise annexed, from which it will be seen that Mr Ball gives the particular days, months and years in which the petitioner performed his work.

Folio 21, line 22.—Strike out the Fifteenth Section.

Folio 22, line 9.—After “names,” insert “other material matter.”

Same folio, line 14.—After “names” insert “other material matter.”

Folio 54, line 8, (Schedule D.)—Strike out from “money” to “and,” in line 10, and insert “for the last

year the same shall have become due next before the day of holding the said Election, together with the Overseer’s certificate.”

satisfaction, that the work has been made a durable and substantial one, and has procured at average tides, a depth of at least ten feet of water on the bar;—the Government not to be liable to be called on for the payment of the said amount within a lesser period than two years after the work is completed in conformity with the terms of this resolution.

4. **RESOLVED**, That a sum of Fifteen Pounds be granted to Emma Sherlock, the widow of the late Joseph P. Sherlock, deceased, Surgeon, to compensate her for the loss of certain personal property which was destroyed in consequence of having been used by a small pox patient, in the year 1859.

And Mr *J. Yeo* reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had amended and then adopted the same, and the report so amended, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts for the past year, having examined the several matters to them referred, have to report that the Revenue from all sources, for the financial year ending 31st January, 1861, amounts to £43,113 13s. 5d. The expenditure for the same period was £61,794 12s. 9d. The excess of Expenditure over Revenue £18,680 19s. 4d. This excess added to the balance standing against the Colony on 31st January, 1860, exhibits a debt due on 31st January, 1861, of £62,129 18s. 3¼d. This balance includes all Treasury Notes, Warrants and Debentures issued up to that date, as will more fully appear by reference to table A, in this statement. No credit has been given to the Colony for Public Lands unsold, nor for any balances due thereon.

Your Committee have compiled and appended the usual Tables, numbered from B. to E. inclusive, which contain the particulars of the Revenue and Expenditure of the last year, and other useful information:

An apparent increase of the Revenue of the past year—as compared with the year 1859—will be observed; but as the receipts from the Selkirk Estate have been included, no actual increase, from ordinary sources, has taken place.

As compared with the year 1859, a large decrease has occurred on the duties received on imported spirituous Liquors and Tobacco—which decrease, in the opinion of your Committee, is attributable to Smuggling.

As compared with the year 1859, a falling off has taken place on the duties received on Tea, Sugar, Molasses, Coffee and Sole Leather, amounting in the aggregate to £750, and an increase to the extent of £2,500 on goods subject to an advalorem duty.

The receipts for Light duty, as compared with 1859, have also decreased to the extent of £244 16s 4¼d.—this decrease has occurred at the Harbors of Richmond Bay, Cascumpec and Georgetown, and your Committee are informed may, in some measure, be attributable to fewer American vessels calling at these Ports than in previous years; but principally to the fact that those vessels which did put into said Ports, refused payment of the duty.

In reference to the Expenditure for the past year, your Committee have to report that the sum of £13,987 16 7d. was paid for the Selkirk Estate and Lot 54—£2,991 16 9d. to the Prince of Wales' Reception Committee—£304 12s. for expenses of the Land Commission—£158 2s 6d. for Military stores and Volunteers—total amount £17,742 7s 8d.—which your Committee submit ought not to be considered as forming part of the ordinary Expenditure of the year, and which, if deducted from the total amount of Expenditure, would reduce it, in round numbers, to £44,000.

Your Committee have also to point out an increased outlay for Education to the extent of £1,550 4s 4d., over the Expenditure of 1859.

The receipts from Public Lands, for the past year, amount to £4,782 19s 11d., and £277 10s 5d. from Crown Lands. £2,078 14s 9d. of the above amount has been received from the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, and £2,704 5s 2d from the Selkirk Estate. No returns appear from Lot 54. The expenses of the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, for the same period, including loss of Land tax and Interest, were £1,923 1s 3d.—of Selkirk Estate, including Commissioners' expenses, examining property, loss of land tax and interest, £340 5s 5d.—on Stanfield Estate, being loss of land tax and Interest, £77 5s.; on general account, £347 3s 7d. 3,206 acres of land have been sold during the year on the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, at an average price of 8s 6d. per acre. 34,239 acres remain unsold on the Worrell Estate, and 4434 acres on Lot 11, and 26,582 acres on the Selkirk Estate. The Stanfield Estate is represented as containing fully 13,000 acres. No sales had been made thereon up to the end of the past Financial year. The balances due on Lands sold, and on Bonds, were £15,880 2s 6d. on Worrell Estate and Lot 11.—on Selkirk Estate £10,631 4s 7d.,—bearing Interest.

Your Committee submit that the Statistics of the past year indicate a healthy state of trade, from which your Committee infer that the country is recovering from the distress caused by the partial failure of the Wheat Crop for so many years, as well as the depression of the Shipping interest.

The domestic affliction, which has befallen our Gracious Queen,—in the death of Her late Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent,—has called forth your respectful expression of heartfelt sympathy. I have transmitted your address of condolence on this melancholy event, to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

I have great pleasure in giving my assent to the Bill which provides for the organization of our Rifle Volunteers,—and I thank you for the grant you have voted for their support. No effort shall be wanting on my part to promote the efficiency of this Force.

In Her Majesty's name, I thank you for the Supplies you have granted for the public service.

*Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :*

occurring among a neighboring people,—a people having the same language, and claiming a common ancestry with ourselves.

While we cherish the hope, that these sad differences may, without further bloodshed, be allayed, and harmony be restored to the American people:—we cannot but feel the advantages, which, under the British Constitution, we are permitted to enjoy,—and I am confident, that, on your return to your several homes, you will vie in promoting and confirming by your influence and position, that spirit of Loyalty and good feeling, which under the Divine blessing, prevails throughout this Island.

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said:—

Gentlemen;

**Resolutions adopted by the House of Assembly on the Convention in course of Negotiation between Great Britain and France, on the subject of the Newfoundland Fisheries.**

**RESOLVED**, That the House has heard with surprise and alarm that the convention in course of Negotiation between Great Britain and France, on the subject of the Newfoundland Fisheries, is not to be submitted for the assent of the people of this Colony.

**RESOLVED**, That such a procedure on the part of Her Majesty's Government, would be a violation of the pledge given by Mr. Labouchere, in his Despatch dated March 26th, 1857, in which it is declared, that the consent of the people of Newfoundland is regarded by Her Majesty's Government, as the essential preliminary to any Modification of their maritime or territorial rights.

**RESOLVED**, That this pledge, which has been aptly styled the Colonial Magna Charta, cannot be withdrawn without a breach of faith on the part of the British Government towards all the North American Colonies, and would necessarily awaken a strong feeling of indignation in the breasts of those communities of loyal British Subjects.

**RESOLVED**, That we most firmly and earnestly pray the Imperial Government, not to disturb the Sacred right of the Colonists in the matter in question, for apart from its injustice, we should deeply regret the stain it would inflict on the honor of the Imperial name.

**RESOLVED**, That an address, embodying the foregoing Resolutions, be prepared and forthwith transmitted to Her Majesty's Government, and that Copies be sent to the Legislature of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island for their information

**RESOLVED**, That if it should seem necessary, this question should be brought before the House of Commons, in order that no means shall be left untried for the vindication of our rights.

CIRCULAR.

DOWNING STREET,  
11th June, 1860.

SIR,—With reference to my predecessor's Circular despatch of the 5th of February, 1859, forwarding a volume of Statistical information prepared by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, I transmit to you a further volume of the same kind, which has been subsequently published by their Lordships.

In forwarding these Statistics for transmission to the Colonies, their Lordships renew the expression of their desire to receive in exchange for the Statistics forwarded by them, a copy of such official Statistics as may be printed in each Colony, and express their disappointment at not having received such information from any other Colonies than the Cape of Good Hope, New South Wales, and New Zealand.

They anticipate that a regular interchange of official Statistics between this country and the Colonies, will be attended by many mutual advantages, but they observe, that in order to obtain any useful results, the reception of Statistics from the Board of Trade should be followed by a systematic communication of such corresponding information as it may be in the power of the several Colonies to afford.

Their Lordships further request, that with a view to their more certain arrival at their destination, the Colonial Statistics destined for the Board of Trade, may in future be specially addressed to that Board.

I have to instruct you to carry out as far as lies in your power, the wishes expressed by the Lords of the Committee

for Trade. The high and increasing importance which in this country is attached to information regarding the Colonial Possessions, renders it very desirable that their Lordships should be enabled to publish as full and accurate information as possible regarding each Colony.

SIR,—I have had under my consideration your despatches No. 15 of the 16th of April, and No. 22 of the 30th of April. In the former despatch you enclose a resolution in which the Assembly agrees to the proposed appointment of Commissioners on the subject of the tenures of Land—binds itself to abide by the decision of those Commissioners or the majority of them, and pledges itself to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision. In the second despatch, you inform me that a short Act has since passed through both Houses giving effect to the foregoing resolution.

I cannot do otherwise than express my sense of the promptitude and completeness with which the House of Assembly has

thus given its support to the plan devised in the hope of putting an end to the differences which have prevailed in Prince Edward Island.

In Mr. Howe, the Assembly acting in behalf of the Tenantry, have selected a Commissioner whose known ability and prominent public position must well qualify him for the proposed enquiry.

From Sir Samuel Cunard I have received a letter of which a copy is enclosed, naming as the Commissioners selected by the Proprietors, Mr John William Ritchie of Halifax, who I doubt not, will honorably discharge his functions.

I have written in exercise of the choice belonging to Her Majesty's Government, to request Mr John Hamilton Gray, of New Brunswick, to undertake the remaining office of Commissioner. Mr Gray has recently conducted another public enquiry with a degree of ability, carefulness, and justice, which fully entitles him to the confidence of all concerned in the intended investigation.

Although the privilege of selecting each Commissioner has been conferred on a separate authority, so as the better to ensure satisfaction with the composition of the Commission. Yet, it is my view, and I doubt not, will be that of the Commissioners themselves, that none of them ought to be regarded as the special advocate of one interest, but rather, that the whole should devote their efforts to framing such recommendations as shall be demanded by the equity of the case, and be conducive to the general good of all classes of the community. Their conclusions, whatever they may be, will possess double weight, if happily they should be unanimous.

The time of meeting in Prince Edward Island, will be best determined by the Commissioners themselves, who will be able to communicate with you on any points which they may wish to ascertain as bearing on the question of the most convenient period for the purpose.

It will be desirable, that previous ar-

rangements should be made, as far as practicable, for having at hand all witnesses and all documentary evidence which the Commission is likely to require, so that the time needed for their actual sittings in the Island, may be reduced within the most moderate compass consistent with the due and complete accomplishment of their enquiry.

I shall take an early opportunity of forwarding to you a Commission under the Royal Sign Manual, containing the appointment of the several Gentlemen named to serve on the Commission.

I am directed by the Secretary of State to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 27, of the 14th of May, reporting the satisfactory progress which has been made in the formation of Volunteer Corps in Prince Edward Island.

The spirit of self-reliance which has thus been evinced by the Inhabitants of the Island is very gratifying to Her Majesty's Government. They do not think it advisable at present to send out Guns for the Volunteer Artillery ; but the General Officer Commanding in North America will be at once instructed to provide a competent Officer for the duty of training the Volunteers and 3 or 4 non-Commissioned Officers as Drill-Instructors, and Major General Trollope will be directed to place himself in communication with you on the subject. The Colony will be required to provide such extra allowances as are reasonable and proper for the Officer who will be detached from his Regiment on this Service, and the entire Pay of the Drill Instructors.

Sir,—I have received from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a letter from Rear Admiral Sir Alexander Milne, on the subject of the removal of Buoys from the place assigned to them in the Admiralty Surveys and Charts.

Sir Alexander Milne more particularly adverts to the removal of a Buoy which marked the entrance of the channel in Hillsborough Bay, leading into Charlottetown Harbour.

It is obvious that the removal of any sea mark, without due notice, must for a time render the Admiralty Chart comparatively useless, and might be accompanied by considerable risk to Her Majesty's Ships upon entering the Harbour.

I have therefore to request, that with a view of preventing the consequences which might result from altering the position or character of objects referred to in the Admiralty Charts and Sailing directions, all changes hereafter made in the position of existing Buoys, or in the laying of new ones, in the erection of Standing Beacons, and in the establishment of Lighthouses or Light-vessels anywhere in the harbours or rivers of the St. Lawrence, may be reported to the Secretary of the Admiralty at the time of making such changes, with a complete description of them and their position, and that a similar report may at the same time be furnished to the Naval Commander-in-Chief on the Station, for the information of Captains of Her Majesty's Ships.

SIR,—I have had under my consideration the two Acts passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and enclosed in your Despatch, No. 56, of the 1st of October last, entitled No. 1025, "An Act to authorize grants of the shores of this Island," and No. 1026, "An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners to be appointed on the Land Question."

I feel some doubt as to the object with which the first of these Acts was passed. I do not see what Lands it will affect, at least above high water mark, unless it was intended to operate on the Fishery Reserves.

At the same time, as the treatment of those Reserves is a question on which Her Majesty's Government have expressed a decided opinion, and which at the instance of the Prince Edward Island Legislature, is now under reference to the recently appointed Commission, I can hardly imagine that the Legislature would have passed an Act calculated to anticipate the judgment of their own referees, or that you would have submitted it for Her Majesty's confirmation, without any notice of its intended effect.

I have therefore to request that you will furnish me with information on the following points:—

1. Whether there is in the Island any land above High Water mark, upon which the Act would operate, except the Fishery Reserves; and if so, what in general terms may be supposed to be its extent.

2. Whether it is intended, or supposed, that the operation of the Act would be confined to those Lands, if any, and to the Land below High Water mark; or whether the Act was intended to apply to some or all of the Fishery Reserves.

3. What are understood to be the present powers of the Crown respecting those Lands not comprised in those Reserves, and what the additional powers which it is intended to confer, in respect of those Lands by the proposed Law.

4. What effect, if any, the Act is intended to have upon the Fishery Reserves.

5. And lastly, whether there is in the present circumstances of the Island, any ground, for expecting that "Commercial enterprize" will be much encouraged (as stated in the Preamble of the Act) by making such grants on the Sea Shore as would be authorized by the proposed Act, and would not be authorized without it.

I must add, however, that whatever answer may be furnished to these questions. I cannot advise the Queen to assent to the Act, while the subject on which it legislates is under the consideration of the Commissioners.

With regard to the Act for giving effect to the award of the Commissioners, I gladly acknowledge the promptitude with which the Provincial Legislature has hastened to give effect to what they have supposed to be the desire of Her Majesty's Government, conveyed in my Despatch of the 21st of March last, and I very much regret that an apparent misconception of my meaning has led the Legislature to pass a Law which appears to me premature.

My object was not to require immediate legislation for the purpose of giving prospective effect to the award of the Commissioners, but only to obtain from the House of Assembly, as representing the whole body of the Tenants, an unequivocal acceptance of the proposed reference, and from the Legislature a pledge that the Laws necessary to give effect to the Commissioners' award should be passed when it appeared what legislation would be necessary for that purpose.

But the present Act, or any other Act which could be passed at the present mo-

ment, might in the event prove either too sweeping or too limited for that object. It would be too sweeping if it were found that the referees promulgated decisions respecting lands belonging to persons who have not consented to the reference; or if they made awards respecting questions (like that of escheat) which did not fall within the scope of their enquiry.

It would be too limited, or at least inadequate for its purpose, if it failed to make such provisions of detail as were necessary to give practical effect to the general principles laid down by the Commissioners.

For these reasons it appears to me impossible to advise Her Majesty to assent, at the present moment, to any such general Law, as that which has now been forwarded. Nor do I see that any present legislation could be valuable, except such as may be based upon suggestions to be made by the Commission, with the view of defining the persons and questions to which their enquiry was to extend, or of conferring on them the powers (like those of compelling the attendance of witnesses, and examining on oath) which are requisite to enable them to carry on their enquiries to the satisfaction of all concerned.

I trust you will impress upon the Commissioners (if requisite) the necessity of avoiding, as far as possible, any steps calculated to excite unreasonable expectations, or to stimulate agitation. On the other hand, while assuring the Proprietors that the award of the Commissioners will not be enforced by Her Majesty's Government against any persons who have not either personally, or by their representatives, consented to refer their claims to arbitration, I should wish you also to observe to them that their refusal to concur frankly in a measure which was intended to compose existing differences, and which, so far as it has yet proceeded, has been assented to by a large portion of their body, may materially influence the

### Report of the Commissioners appointed for the revising and reprinting the Laws.

To His Excellency GEORGE DUNDAS, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

We the Commissioners appointed by your Excellency, under and by virtue of an Act passed in the last Session of the General Assembly of this Island, intituled "An Act to provide for the revising and reprinting of the Laws of this Island," have to report for the information of Your Excellency and the other branches of the Legislature; that upon a careful perusal of the said Act, shortly after the close of the last Session, preparatory to our entering upon the execution of the duties assigned to us thereunder, we discovered that owing to an error in the wording of the Statute, one of the first duties required at our hands became literally impossible of execution; we refer to that part of the Act, which required us within six months after the passing thereof, to deposit in certain specified public Offices, a full copy of certain Laws of the Colony, heretofore published, being the volumes printed at Charlottetown by the Government Printer in the year 1852, and the

several Acts passed since the year 1851, to the Session of the year 1861 inclusive, and published annually by the Queen's Printer; and which Laws were required to be deposited for the purposes of reference, so far as related to certain expired, executed or repealed Acts therein contained, by which Titles to lands might be affected. We therefore deferred making a deposit of any of the Laws referred to, until that part of the Act, (being the Sixth Section) should be altered by an amending Act, our opinion being that a deposit of part of the Laws referred to, while it could not in any sense be deemed a compliance with the Statute, would only tend to complicate the matter, by rendering it necessary afterwards, to call upon the Legislature to pass a Law, for the threefold purpose, first of legalizing our proceedings under the said Section, secondly of repealing so much of the clause as required the deposit of the Acts of the Session of 1861, (a Session which at the time of the passing of the Act had not arrived) and thirdly of enabling us to make a future deposit of the Acts of the said last mentioned Session.

By the course we have adopted, all that will be necessary on this point, will be simply to amend the Act by extending the

time for depositing the whole of the Laws referred to in said Sixth Section, to some specified period after the close of the Session of 1861.

We beg further to report, that after carefully considering the objects and requirements of the said Act, we deemed it a duty incumbent upon us, under the terms thereof to call for Tenders for printing and Binding Nine hundred copies of the Laws of this Island; we therefore caused an advertisement a copy of which marked (A) is hereunto annexed, to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, Newspaper, on the Twentieth day of November last, calling for such Tenders, agreeably to a specification therein referred to, and requiring such Tenders to be delivered to one of your Commissioners, on or before Saturday the Twenty-third day of February instant; which advertisement was continued weekly from the time of its first publication until the last mentioned day, being a period of upwards of Three Months, agreeable to the provisions of the said Act.

That the style in which the Act in question required the work, both as regards Printing and Binding, to be executed, was that of the two Volumes of the Laws of this Island, published in the year 1852, and accordingly we made those Volumes part of the Specification referred to in our said Notice; but upon instituting a careful comparison between these two Volumes, and the published Statutes at large of Canada, and the Revised Statutes of New Brunswick, as to their relative styles and characters of type, specimens of which are herewith submitted; and being convinced of the great superiority of the said Statutes, of both or either of those Provinces, over those of our own, in style of type, as adapted to a work of the kind, we determined upon adding those volumes, as far as regarded the printing, to the specification, so as to enable the Legislature to adopt the style of either the said New Brunswick or Canada Statutes, if it should so decide, in preference to adhering

to the Law as it now stands, requiring parties wishing to tender to state the rates at which they would execute the work, either in the one style or the other.—And with a view of effecting a large saving in the cost of the binding, without impairing the durability of the work, we also deemed it advisable to require the tenders for the binding of the volumes, to specify the rates per volume, at which Contractors would *full* and *half-bind* the work, *in calf* and *in sheep*, thus putting it in the power of the Legislature or Government, to have the Laws bound either in the one style or the other, or partly in each, as may be deemed expedient.

That under the advertisement so published by us, we have received three Tenders for the printing of the Laws, namely, one tender from Mr. John Ings, one from Mr. George T. Haszard, and one from Mr. William Malone; and one Tender only for the Binding of the work, namely from Mr. John S. Bremner;—a second document or paper was received by us purporting also to be a tender for the Binding, but not being signed by any person, we do not consider ourselves at liberty to treat it as a tender. It was handed in we are informed by Mr. Daniel Bethune.

That copies of said several tenders or papers are hereunto annexed, respectively marked (B,) (C,) (D,) (E,) and (F).

For the reasons we have already assigned, in regard to the comparative merits of the different styles of Printing, we have not as yet accepted any one of the said tenders, for the Printing of the work, our powers under the Statute being so limited as to preclude us from exercising a discretion in the matter, or deciding upon the selection of that style of Printing which we deem to be best adapted for the purpose. And we have therefore considered it to be our duty, to submit the question to the Legislature for its decision, and in order if our suggestions be approved, that the Act be amended so as to authorize

the adoption of the style of either the New Brunswick or Canada Laws.

On reference to the tenders, it will be perceived that Mr William Malone's tender is much the lowest, but apart from the material objection that it proposes to execute the work without reference to any specification, it is wanting in the all essential accompaniment of the names or signatures of two responsible persons, or indeed of any persons whatever, willing to become sureties for the performance of the contract.

We therefore recommend, that the Tender of Mr Ings, which is the next lowest Tender, and which proposes to print 900 copies of the work in the style of the New Brunswick Laws, or of the former Island Statutes, at the rate of £4 16s per sheet of 8 pages, 4 sheets or 32 pages being deliverable per week, or £4 18s per sheet, 5 sheets or 40 pages deliverable per week, be accepted.

We would here observe, that the sum paid to Mr George T. Haszard, for printing the last edition of the Laws of this Island, being 400 copies in the year 1852, was at the rate of 55s per sheet of 8 pages, an amount we are informed, about equal to the Tender of the said Mr Ings, considering the increased number of volumes now required to be published; although Mr Ings' tender is materially higher than that of Mr Malone's, yet we think it is not beyond such a remunerating price, as would insure a proper style of execution, and a proper quality of materials in the work to be performed.

The Statute also being so restrictive in its terms, as to prevent our adopting the most suitable style of binding, we have not as yet entered into any contract for that service. It is our opinion that a Law work half-bound in calf or sheep, if the work be well executed, is as suitable for all useful purposes, and we think as durable as a work fully bound, and we therefore recommend that the law be amended so as to enable us to adopt this improvement, and thereby save the un-

necessary expenditure of a considerable sum of money. We would recommend that a proportion, say one-half the work be half-bound in calf, and the residue half-bound in sheep. As a considerable part of the work will in all probability not be required for some years, we think that more than 650 copies, need not be bound up for the first few years.

The tender of Mr. John S. Bremner for the Binding, although much higher than the one without signature, we presume will have to be accepted.

We beg further to report, that in the discharge of the duties imposed upon us by the said Act, we have devoted considerable time and attention to the careful examination of all the Statutes of the General Assembly of this Island, with a view to our ascertaining, what Acts at present in force require amendment or alteration, or may with convenience be consolidated; and we now respectfully submit for the consideration of the Legislature, those matters which have presented themselves to our notice, during the progress of our investigation.

In the first place, with regard to Acts requiring alteration or amendment, we find that the Act 11. Vic. cap. 16, consolidating and amending the Laws authorizing the appointment of Coal Meters, &c., so far as it relates to Charlottetown, has been repealed by a law of the City Council of Charlottetown, passed under the powers vested in said Corporation, by Act 18 Vic. cap 34 sect. 37; but as the repealed portions of the Act in question are so interwoven with the part that remains in force as to prevent their convenient removal from the volume, we would suggest the propriety of the Act being remodelled, in order that the operative portions thereof may be re-enacted in a more convenient form.

Several other Acts we find have been also in part repealed by By-laws of the City Council of Charlottetown, for example Act 1 Vic. cap 14, "to prevent disorderly riding and to regulate the driving of

Carriages on the Streets and public Roads." Act 9. Vic. cap. 3. "to consolidate and amend the several Acts relating to dogs and the taxation thereon;" Act 11 Vic. cap. 14, "for the punishment of Drunkenness;" and Act 14 Vic. cap. 23, intituled "An Act to provide for removing the Post Office of Charlottetown into the old Court House therein, and for other purposes therein mentioned," but as in some of these Acts the repealed enactments are wholly separate and distinct from the clauses remaining in force, and can therefore be omitted from the new edition, and as in others the partial repeal can be clearly explained by a marginal note so as to prevent mistake or misapprehension, we do not conceive that it will be necessary to repeal or re-enact any of the said Acts last referred to.

We find that in the preamble to the Act 19 Vic. cap. 17, amending the Act relating to the Charlottetown Ferry and the Wharf connected therewith, the reference made to the 15th Vic. cap. 35 is erroneous; it should have been to the 15 Vic. cap. 34.

The reference made in the Act to continue and amend the Free Education law 20th Vic. cap. 17, sec. 4, to the 17th sec. of 15th Vic. cap. 13, is also erroneous; the reference should have been to the 70th section of that Act.

The Act 22d Vic. cap. 13, continuing the Act of 14 Vic. cap. 8, for the better prevention of mugging, should be repealed. It recites that the said Act of the 14th Vic. cap. 8, would shortly expire, whereas the last mentioned Act was then repealed by and incorporated in the Revenue Law of the 19th Vic. cap. 1, which latter remains in force.

The Act 15 Vic. cap. 40, intituled "An Act to amend an Act relating to Statute Labor for Charlottetown, its Common and Royalty, and also to Nuisances in and about the same," in so far as it relates to the Royalty of Charlottetown, does not

appear to have been repealed, although it is evident that it was the intention of the Act 16 Vic. cap. 7 to supersede it,—the last mentioned Act containing separate and independent provisions upon the same subject, and also in express terms repealing the 12 Vic. cap. 11, of which the above mentioned Act 15 Vic. cap. 40 was an amendment.

To remove all doubt upon the point we would suggest the propriety of a short Act being passed expressly repealing it, so far as it relates to the Royalty. In regard to Charlottetown it has been already repealed by a By-law of the City Council, passed under the powers vested in it by the Act of Incorporation 18 Vic. cap. 34, sec. 37.

The Act of 16, Vic., cap. 16, incorporating the Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island Electric Telegraph Company, extends over several pages of the volume; it is doubtful whether the Company proposed to be incorporated by it, has now any legal existence, and as by the terms of the Act itself, any Company that might hereafter be formed would be literally unable to comply with its requirements, it is submitted for the consideration of the Legislature, whether it would not be advisable to repeal the said Act.

We think that the following Acts should be consolidated, and the law on the various subjects to which they relate, be thereby rendered more compendious and accessible.

In pursuing our examination of the Statute Book, we have struck out all those Acts which have expired or have been executed or repealed, and in all instances have made explanatory notes of the various Acts to be inserted in the margin; and have also made notes of reference to other Acts in force relating to the same subject; and in cases where it was declared to be necessary that the Royal allowance should be given, previous to the Act going into force, we have affixed the date of its publication in the Royal Gazette, or the notification of the disallowance, at the foot of the Act or beneath its title. We find that the whole amount of matter, which we feel justified under the powers vested in us, to remove from the Statute Book, will altogether comprise about 824 pages. We annex to this report, (see Schedule,) a list of the several Acts which have expired since the close of the last Session of the Assembly, or which will expire during the present year, 1861; and we would here respectfully suggest the propriety of extending the duration of any temporary Acts which have been found beneficial in their operation, preparatory to a reprint of the Statutes, to prevent future expense.

We beg respectfully to subjoin a statement of the probable expense of reprinting the laws.

The Statute Book, in its present shape, embraces about 3474 pages, as above

stated; we have removed 824 pages from it, being Laws executed, expired, repealed, &c., thus reducing the number to 2650 pages, and as the consolidated Acts with the addition of any new Acts which may be passed in the present Session, will not in all probability occupy more space than the Acts which will require to be removed from the Statute Book at the close of the Session, the size of the new Edition will not vary much from the above estimate of 2650 pages in the whole. This number at £4. 18s. per sheet of 8 pages will amount to

As to the time which will be required to complete the work we may remark that the printing cannot be commenced before the lapse of 6 or 8 weeks after the close of the present Session of the Legislature, as some time will be required to complete the marginal references to the various Acts, and make other necessary arrangements connected with the work.

Should Mr. Ings' tender be accepted, and supposing forty pages per week as proposed by him to be duly furnished, the printing of the 900 copies will occupy between fifteen and sixteen months. Two months will then be required for the preparation of the general Index after the main body of the work has been printed and pressed.

The binding will in all probability occupy four or five months more.

With these data before us we think that should no unforeseen impediment intervene, the first portion (viz: 650 copies) of the

work may be ready for delivery to the public within about twenty-three or twenty-four months after the closing of the present Session of the Legislature.

1. I have the honor to enclose a letter addressed to your Grace, which has been placed in my hands for that purpose by Mr. Charles Wright, a resident Proprietor in this Island.

2. This letter accompanies a Petition to Her Majesty from Mr. Wright, which he desires that your Grace may lay at the foot of the Throne.

3. The prayer of Mr. Wright's petition is, that Her Majesty will withhold Her sanction from an Act of the local Legislature of this Island, passed during the last Session, and intituled "An Act to give effect to the report of the Commissioners on the Land Question."

4. The object of my Government in the introduction of this Act was to give effect to the views contained in your Grace's Despatch, No. 12, of date 21st March, 1860, that the Legislature would, as far as possible, concur in any measure required to give validity to the decision of the Commissioners.

5. Mr. Wright's memorial proceeds upon the assumption that the Estates of those proprietors who were not parties to the Commission will, by this Act, be subjected to the investigation of the Commissioners, and be also bound by their award.

6. Your Grace will be able to judge whether this is the case or not. If it be so, the Petition drawn up by Mr. Wright explains the position in which he conceives himself to be placed.

3. I must direct your Grace's attention to a statement in this memorial calculated to convey an erroneous impression.

4. In the second page, the memorialists, referring to a letter addressed to your Grace, dated Bush Hill, 13th February, 1860, declare, that, "they were no parties to this correspondence; but that, on the contrary, when certain of them were afterwards requested to become so by the Lieut. Governor and others, they refused."

5. These expressions would lead your Grace to suppose that I had solicited certain of the memorialists to become parties to the arrangements agreed to by Sir Samuel Cunard, and other large proprietors resident in England, with respect to the Land Commission.

6. Mr. Bruce Stewart was the only person whose name is attached to the memorial with whom I had any conversation on the subject, and on one occasion I endeavoured to point out to him how desirable it was that all the large proprietors should act together harmoniously, so as to secure, if possible, the settlement of disputes injurious not only to their own interests, but to the general welfare of the Island.

7. I have already, in my Despatch No. 61, of this date, addressed your Grace on the subject of the Act in question being petitioned against by a proprietor not a party to the Commission.

8. What I stated in that Despatch applies equally to the case of Mr. Bruce Stewart.

“That the said Act, as explained by Counsel before the said Commissioners, may establish principles repugnant to the constitution, and certainly involves constitutional rights, which, from time immemorial, have never been questioned—namely: a married woman’s right of dower, or a widow’s security under her marriage settlement, and the testamentary provision for orphan children—also contracts entered into under seal—security for debt, whether by way of mortgage or of judgments in the Supreme Court, and various other obligations heretofore considered binding between parties, and the right of a subject to enjoy the use of his own property.

“And as your Grace’s memorialists are at present unable to learn how far their estates may or may not hereafter be chargeable under the award of said Commissioners, and as your memorialists never joined in the acquiescence already referred to, of Sir Samuel Cunard and others,—they therefore humbly pray that your Grace will recommend Her Majesty to withhold her Royal sanction from the said Bill till further representation can be made respecting it.

We the undersigned Justices of the Peace for Prince County in forwarding the accompanying account of expenses, beg to state for the information of the Government, the nature and circumstances of the case under which they were incurred.

Upon Thursday last the 27th, ult., we were called upon to take the depositions of John Craig and wife together with his three sons, all of whom had on the previous night been most barbarously assaulted and maltreated, so much so that some of their lives are dispaired of, the assailants personally unknown but known to belong to the

American Fishing fleet then in the Harbor, and some of them must have born marks of violence received from the assailed parties, being compelled to act in self defence, that evening we received indirect information that the guilty persons belong to three vessels, viz, *Caroline Steel*, *Ada Sporford*, and *D P. Gale*, all of Gloucester, U. States, but it was then too late to board them, we arranged to board them next morning, on proceeding to the beach between the hours of 5 and 6 o'clock, found the fleet underway proceeding to Sea, on Saturday evening the fleet returned and we were informed that some of the suspected vessels were amongst them, no time was lost on Sunday in getting a number of Special Constables and proceeded amongst the fleet, where we found the vessels named, the *Ada Sporford* and *D. P. Gale* and boarding them made a close examination, but not finding one with a mark of violence and not having any person to identify—and the Captains denying that they knew any thing about the matter, did not feel ourselves warranted in making any arrest.

The *Caroline Steel* on which the strongest suspicion rested, we did not find, but were informed that she had gone round East Point having several persons on board with marks of violence,—our information was altogether indirect and it appeared that the only persons belonging to the fleet who knew and were willing to inform on the guilty parties were deterred from coming forward as evidence from a fear that if they did so their own lives would hereafter be endangered—we were therefore from the indirect information unable to discover any person whom we could summons as a witness.

Report of Joseph Murphy, Commissioner of Highways, regarding the removal of bridge from Walshtown ferry to Lot 10.

Lot 11, February 5th, 1861.

My dear Sir ;

In a communication from you some time since, respecting the removal of the Bridge which has been commenced near Walshtown ferry, to Lot 10 River, and that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council has been pleased to refer the matter to me for my Report thereon. I have therefore to state to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, that the timber that was in the Bridge near Walshtown ferry was altogether too short to be put in the Bridge at Lot 10 River, as the Bridge at Lot 10 River is built on a much larger foundation, and on a much safer plan, which rendered the Bridge near Walshtown ferry, to be of no use to the Bridge at Lot 10 River.

And I have also to state that the great storm last fall took nearly all the Bridge near Walshtown ferry away, and scattered it about all over Cascumpec River ; and would not by any means pay to collect it. The new Bridge at Lot 10 River has

ble to proceed in the execution of Your Excellency's commands, conveyed to us by the letter of the Colonial Secretary, without waiting for Captain Macpherson, to whom we will transmit a copy of this Report for his consideration.

Having carefully examined the approaches to this Harbor (with which, however, we were both previously well acquainted,) we are of opinion that a good sound Buoy Boat, of sufficient size, and to be strongly moored, is required near the extremity of the North Bar, at or near the letter A., in the accompanying sketch; that such a Buoy Boat should be not less than twenty feet in length and twelve in breadth, with a mast and Beacon of sufficient height, and so painted as to be easily discovered by vessels about to enter the Harbor.

The Can Buoy, now moored at this spot, should be removed to mid-channel, on what is called the Ridge, at the spot marked C.

A small Can Buoy should be laid down at B., in line with the two former; and in the same line, at E, a Beacon should be erected in shallow water on four posts, with a platform above high water, and a mast of sufficient height.

These three Buoys and the Beacon, being easily brought in line, and visible from each other, would enable vessels having once made the outer or Boat Buoy, to enter the Harbor with safety, even during the night. As a proof of this, we are informed that it is a common practice with the Masters of Fishing Vessels to have a Boat, carrying a light, moored near the outer Buoy, when a large number of the same are about to enter the Harbor.

In order to mark out the channel (which is a crooked one,) more effectually, we recommend that a Spar Buoy should be placed at D, in the bight of the North Bar, and another at F at the extremity of the South Bar. The cost of these Buoys would be trifling, while they would add materially to the safety of the entrance.

There is a shoal inside the Harbor, called the Middle Ground, and a spit running out opposite to it, on which vessels frequently strike. Two or three Spar Buoys, properly placed, would denote its position, and often save the loss of two or three tides, which occur here only once in the twenty-four hours.

We beg to recommend all the foregoing suggestions to your Excellency's most favorable consideration. And we cannot conclude our Report without bringing under your notice the construction of a Lighthouse, so often and so earnestly pressed upon the consideration of the Legislature, at the North Cape. Although it does not come within the scope of your Excellency's commands to us, yet we take the liberty of expressing our decided conviction, that nothing would so materially contribute to the improvement of the Harbor of Cascumpec,—the safety of all persons engaged in the Fisheries, whether in boats or schooners,—and the preservation of the lives and property employed in the Coasting Trade of the Island.

A good sound Buoy Boat or Beacon Buoy, of the description mentioned in our former Report, of the length of twenty feet, and the breadth of twelve feet, built solid, of cedar, and with a mast of the height of eighteen feet, and a Beacon thereon not less than four feet in diameter, to be painted and ready to lay down,—at Seventy Pounds. The requisite Anchors and Mooring Chains to hold her in all weathers at the point A, in the sketch, and the expenses of mooring, Forty-two Pounds.—Making together the sum of One hundred and twelve Pounds.

The Can Buoy now moored at this spot, is worn out, and a new one is necessary. It should be placed at C, in the same sketch, and will cost Five Pounds.

The smaller Can Buoy must be repaired, repainted and laid down at B, at a cost of Ten shillings.

Another small Can Buoy should be made, painted, and laid down at D, which will come to Four Pounds Fifteen Shillings.

The proposed Beacon on four posts at E, would cost Ten Pounds.

The three smaller Spar Buoys on the Middle Ground and the opposite spit, may be laid down for Two Pounds each, or Six Pounds.

I also beg to report that the Ferry Boat at Orwell Bay, is now in care of Charles Nelson; that the said boat cost me twenty-seven shillings and sixpence, over and above the grant, besides a great deal of trouble, for which I have no remuneration.

Letter from Board of Education requesting permission to draw £150 for the purpose of procuring certain books on Agricultural Chemistry.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council,

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

The Board of Education being sensible of the very great importance to the Island generally, of a practical and scientific knowledge of Agriculture, would respectfully solicit permission to draw from the moneys returned into the Treasury from the sales of school books, under the Act 15 Vic. Cap. 13, Sect. 50,—a sum sufficient (say one hundred and fifty pounds) for the purpose of procuring for the use of the District Schools of this Island, before the close of the Navigation, the following works on the subject of Agriculture, viz:—

Johnston's Elements of Agricultural Chemistry and Geology.

Johnston's Lectures on the application of Chemistry and Geology to Agriculture.

Johnston's Catechism of Agricultural Chemistry.

These works are republished in the United States, at a reduced price; they can be had for \$2 50 cents (two dollars and a half.)

The Board would recommend that at least 200 copies of each work be obtained, and furnished to the teachers for the use of the schools, and that a public examination of such teachers as might wish to present themselves, be annually held in the presence of your Excellency and Council, and prizes awarded to the best answerer; that a copy of Professor Norton's elements of scientific Agriculture—a prize essay—with a copy of the above named works be furnished to each member of the Board, together with a set of Apparatus, to illustrate Johnston's Catechism,—price thirty shillings, sterling—for the use of the Board generally, as it is the intention of the Board in future, to examine all teachers who may come forward for re-examination, on some general questions, on so important a subject. The Board conceive that such a course will be of great benefit to the Island, and compensate, in some degree, for the want of a public lecturer.

Johnston's works are text-books in all the Irish national, as well as in many of the Scottish schools,—and are also extensively used in the United States,—in imparting, with the best practical results, a knowledge of elementary chemistry as applied to Agriculture.

Letter from Mr John D. Woodman, Harbor Master, Cascumpec, regarding the collection of Light and Anchorage duties, and the inadequacy of his remuneration, with list of vessels that evaded payment of Light dues, during the summer of 1860.

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esq.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

Having already in conversation mentioned the peculiar circumstances in which I have been placed as Collector of Anchorage duties during the past year, I trust I shall be excused for stating them in writing, and requesting your Excellency's favorable consideration.

I had the honor of receiving your Excellency's appointment to this Office early in 1859; during the summer of that year, I tripled the collection of the previous year, still a great number of vessels escaped payment for reasons which you will find stated in my letter to the Colonial Secretary, dated 17th Feb. 1860.

In that letter I urged the expediency of collecting the unpaid duties in Nova Scotia and the States, and I mentioned a mode by which payment could be obtained in the latter Country.

The two strongest reasons urged by the Americans for non-payment of the duty, were, 1st, the want of sufficient Light Houses on the Island, and 2nd, the fact of so many escaping the charge, which led to dissatisfaction on the part of the owners, with those captains who did pay.

In the letter before mentioned, I pointed out both these causes, and stated that unless they were remedied, there was a fixed determination on the part of the American masters, not to pay the duties in future.

In the past season this has been carried out. I annex a statement of the number of vessels boarded by me, and of the sums received, and I can assure your Excellency that I have not relaxed in my exertions, except during a short time that I was unavoidably absent from illness.

I requested the Collector of Excise to act for me should a fleet come in at this time, which he did, for one day only. I found him a boat and two men on this occasion, and paid him 10s. for his time; he collected £4 17s 0d and boarded twenty vessels, but unfortunately did not keep the names.

I have now to call your Excellency's attention to the great inadequacy of my remuneration for the past year. I have provided a boat, sails, &c., at my own cost,

which I could hire out at 30s. per month. I have to find one man to assist me in rowing and managing the boat while I am collecting, and I have necessarily hired a man on my farm during my absence, which is at the busiest time of the year. I have made a short statement at the foot to show your Excellency at one view, how this matter stands.

You will observe that the deficiency in the collection arises from no fault of mine, but partly from the insufficiency of the existing law, and partly the undoubted fact of the want of Light houses and Buoys on the Island shores. I have shown in my official correspondence how this may be remedied.

I have now £14 12s. in my hands, partly in money and partly in orders on American Houses and owners of vessels, of the payment of which I have not yet been advised.

In submitting this statement I make no claim for remuneration, but am perfectly satisfied to leave the matter in your Excellency's hands, to apply such remedies as may be deemed most advisable.

### SPECIFICATION OF A WHARF INTENDED TO BE BUILT AT RED POINT, TOWNSHIP No. 46.

Said wharf to be built in the following manner, that is to say, the part below high water mark by joining blocks close to one another to the height of low water mark, say four feet from said height to the top, the whole of the wall to be combined together as represented on the Plan, by laying every course of timber close to one another, and shifting the scarp, the said scarp to be  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet long, and bolted with  $\frac{3}{8}$  in cihron, every course of timber to be fastened one to the other with  $\frac{3}{8}$  iron, at the distance of two feet apart. The corner of block to be dovetailed, and bolted, the interior part of the wall to be divided in the centre, from the outer end to high water mark, and also divided across at every 20 feet distance with Tie Beams, the said Tie Beams to be dovetailed into the said pieces and bolted with  $\frac{3}{8}$  iron, and between the main division other pieces to be laid across under the ballast floor and two tie beams opposite said cross pieces as represented on the Plan, and the block to be filled up under the ballast floor, laying first a tier of brush about one foot high and stone to the floor, and the part above the floor to be filled up with stone to the top of the wall, then to drive piles all around the wall at the distance of ten feet apart, said piles to be driven as far down in the sand as possible, say four feet, and to be bolted in every second course of timber with  $\frac{3}{8}$  iron. In accordance with instructions received from you of date Nov. 29th 1860, under sanction of the House of Assembly April 11, 1860 that a Wharf may be built at Red Point, Township No. 46, I have forthwith called upon some of the petitioners from Red Point, and with them proceeded to the shore in order to make an examination and ascertain where would be the most suitable site for the contemplated Wharf, and having done so I find, should the Legislature grant a sum of money sufficient to construct a Wharf at said Red Point, that the party who holds the land has agreed and is willing to give a right to the site of said wharf. In the mean time petitioners have procured a plan and specification together with an estimate of the probable cost of said wharf, being, including subscription list sent on to the House of Assembly last session, between the sums of £500 and £800.

I would suggest that it is my own opinion that a wharf built according to the plan furnished would stand, for any body of ice coming in from the southward would ground on a bank that makes in the direction of Harvey's Point from a ledge which lays south east from said site, and further I would observe that though a little improvement has been made on the Road from Souris to East Point by bridges, a branch of Black Pond is as yet, and I believe always will be, a matter of much difficulty, and great hardship to send our produce to Souris for shipment, which we have very often to do because it is a matter of some delicacy to get a vessel to take in a cargo in the fall of the year on a lee shore. I believe the proposed wharf would in a great measure obviate this evil.

The mercantile portion of this community complains hard of paying in to the Revenue a considerable sum of money, and no convenience in shipping their produce, or encouraging their trade.

## Statement or reasons of the Attorney General explanatory of the object of two Bills, forwarded for the Royal Assent.

### C A P . 24 .

“An Act to authorize grants of the Shores of this Island.”

The Legislature deemed it expedient to pass this Act, in order to invest the Government of the Colony with power to issue grants of portions of the sea shore of the Island, and of the shores along the Bays and Rivers thereof, to individuals for the purpose of building Breakwaters, Wharfs, Slips, and other such useful and necessary works and undertakings, and thereby to facilitate commercial enterprise.

This Act authorizes the Lieutenant Governor to issue the grants for the purposes aforesaid, either with or without conditions, restrictions or limitations, and either in fee simple, for life, or for a term of years, and at and for such price or yearly rent, to be expressed in such grants or leases, as to the Governor in Council shall appear just and reasonable.

The Act contains a suspending clause until Her Majesty's pleasure therein shall be known.

Sir ;

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of to-day's date, enclosing an extract from a Despatch recently received by your Excellency from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, on the subject of “An Act to authorize grants of the Shores of this Island,” submitting for my consideration the following questions:—

1. Whether there is in the Island any land above High Water mark, upon which the Act would operate, except the Fishery Reserves; and if so, what in general terms may be supposed to be its extent?

To this query I have to reply, that this Act does not apply to any land above high-water mark, nor does it in any way interfere with the Fishery Reserves contained in the original grants to Proprietors of Township lands in this Island.

2. Whether it is intended, or supposed, that the operation of the Act would be confined to those Lands, if any, and to the Lands below High Water mark; or whether the Act was intended to apply to all or some of the Fishery Reserves?

## APPENDIX (O.)

The Act was intended solely to apply to the sea shore, which has been defined in Law, to mean the land between the high and low water mark. The Legislature never contemplated any of the Fishing Reserves being embraced within its provisions, as they are understood to commence from high water mark, and to extend inland five hundred feet.

3. What are understood to be the present powers of the Crown respecting shore Lands not comprised in these Reserves, and what the additional powers which it is intended to confer, in respect of those Lands by the proposed Law?

Shore lands not comprised in the Fishery Reserves, are supposed to be vested in the Crown as Trustee for the Public. This Act was considered necessary to authorize the Government of this Island to issue grants of the Sea Shore for the purposes mentioned in the Act, although the grants might in some instances conflict with the ordinary shore rights of the Public.

4. What effect, if any, the Act is intended to have on the Fishery Reserves?

It was never intended by the Legislature in passing this Act in any manner to interfere with the Fishery Reserves.

5. And lastly, whether there is in the present circumstances of the Island, any ground, for expecting that "Commercial enterprize" will be much encouraged (as stated by the Preamble of the Act) by making such grants on the Sea Shore as would be authorized by the proposed Act, and would not be authorized without it?

This Act was passed by The Legislature in consequence of applications having been made to the Executive Government, praying for grants authorizing the erection of wharfs or breast works on the shores of Rivers and Bays in this Island, by the owners of land bounded by the said Shores, which applications the Government did not feel justified in acceding

to, without the authority of an Act. It would no doubt tend to encourage and increase commercial enterprise, if grants were issued, authorizing the erection by companies and private individuals of works of this kind, to facilitate shipping, and exporting fish, and the Agricultural produce of the Colony.

### CAP. XXVIII.

"An Act to give Effect to the Report of the Commissioners, to be appointed on the Land Question."

The Government of the Colony introduced this Act, and carried it through the Legislature in pursuance of a suggestion contained in a Despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, bearing date the 21st day of March last, and addressed to The Lieutenant Governor of this Island.

The policy and object of the Act are so clearly set forth in the preamble thereto, that it is unnecessary to enter into any further explanation of the reasons for passing it.

The Act provides that the report or award to be made by the three Commissioners, or any two of them to be nominated and appointed by the several parties respectively, and to be authorized and empowered by Her Majesty, agreeably to or in conformity with, the suggestions contained in the Duke of Newcastle's said Despatch, when in all respects signed and completed by the said Commissioners, or any two of them, shall be delivered to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, who shall endorse thereon, under his own

hand and signature, a note of the day and year when received; and it shall thereafter be registered, at full length in the office of the Registrar of Deeds in this Island, and the original part thereof after being duly registered, shall be filed and kept in the office of the Colonial Secretary of this Island.

The Act further provides and declares, that the said award when so completed and delivered, shall be deemed and taken to be final and conclusive, and the rights interests and estates of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, of, in and to all the Township lands, tenements and hereditaments, in so far as Her Majesty stands seized therein or vested therewith, on behalf of the Government or inhabitants of this Island, and so far as the said rights, interests and estates shall be submitted to the consideration and determination of the said Commissioners, and the rights, estates, rents, issues and profits of such estates, liberties, franchises and interests of all and every person and persons whomsoever, of, in, to, out of, or concerning the said Township Lands, tenements and

hereditaments, whether acquired before or after the making of the said award or Report, shall be and become subject to, charged and chargeable with, and bound by the award and report of the said Commissioners, or any two of them, in such manner and to such extent, and for such time, as shall in the said award or report be awarded or required.

The Act contains a clause, authorizing the award or report to be pleaded in any Court of Law or Equity in the Island, by any person whose estate or property may be affected thereby.

The Act provides for the appointment of new Commissioners, in case of death, resignation or incapacity, before the final making of the award or report.

The Act contains a suspending clause, declaring it shall have no force or effect until Her Majesty's pleasure therein shall be known.

## Despatch on subject of an Act for better apprehension of certain offenders.

I have had under my consideration an Act recently passed in Prince Edward Island, intituled "An Act for the better apprehension of certain offenders."

The Act of the Imperial Parliament 6 & 7 Vict. c. 34, as amended by the Act 16 & 17 Vic. cap. 118, provides a process by which persons charged with having committed treason, or felony in any part of the British Empire may be apprehended in any other part, and sent back for trial to the place in which the offence was committed.

This Act is expressly applied to all Her Majesty's dominions, and is therefore in force in Prince Edward Island.

The Colonial Act now forwarded provides, that in case of persons charged with either of the above offences in British North America, the Bermudas or the British West Indies, a somewhat different process shall be pursued—the functions assigned by the English Act of Parliament to the Governor or acting Governor being transferred by the Colonial Act partly (Sec. 2) to the Executive Government, (a

somewhat general term) and partly (Sec. 3) to the chief justice, or any one of the assistant judges of the Supreme Court. It also enlarges the time after which the alleged offender is either to be deported or set at liberty, from two to three months; and by repealing the concluding sentence of the Imperial Act, it enables the Supreme Court to endorse the Warrant, authorising the apprehension of an offender without examining into the evidence against him.

As the local legislature is not competent to alter a British Statute, the result of this enactment, if it were to remain unrepealed would be the following:

Persons having committed offences elsewhere than in the Colonies above specified, would be claimable in Prince Edward Island under the Act of Parliament 6 & 7 Vict. Persons having committed offences in the specified Colonies would be claimable certainly under the Act of Parliament, and possibly also under the local Law.

I do not see why a different process is to be authorised in the case of the specified Colonies from that which will continue to exist in regard to the rest of the British Empire. And I think, that the existence of two alternative processes, with regard to those Colonies may lead to confusion and inconvenience.

But I also feel much doubt whether the authorities of any other Colony could legally receive from the Government of Prince Edward Island, and transport across the sea into their own jurisdiction an offender arrested, and delivered into their hands under authority of a mere local Act, the effect of which is confined within Prince Edward Island. And as Imperial Legislature has very properly provided a mode of effecting this object of which the legality is unquestionable, it is very undesirable that Colonial officers should be encouraged to any more doubtful procedure, I think therefore that this matter should be allowed to rest in the position in which the Imperial Parliament

has placed it,—unaffected by Colonial Legislature. And I shall therefore feel it my duty to advise the disallowance of this Act.

It will of course remain in force until disallowed by Her Majesty in Council, but I think it best to lose no time in apprising you of the course which I shall find it necessary to pursue

1st, of the Treaty of Peace, Friendship and Commerce concluded between Her Majesty and the Emperor of China on the 26th June, 1850, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Peking on the 24th October last.

2nd, of the Agreement and Tariff made by the British and Chinese Plenipotentiaries on the 8th Nov. 1858, in completion of the Treaty.

3rd, of a convention between Her Majesty and the Emperor of China, signed by the British and Chinese Plenipotentiaries on the 24th October last, which, according to the 7th Article was to come into effect without ratification as soon as the ratifications of the Treaty of 1858 should be exchanged.

### RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF A PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, may be posted at any post office in Prince Edward Island, for conveyance to any other Post Office in the Island, at a reduced rate of charge, subject to the following conditions.

1. No letter or letters shall be enclosed.
2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquid, or other matters likely to injure the ordinary contents of the Mail.
3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed three pounds, nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.
4. Parcels *must* be prepaid at the following rate, *and by Postage Stamps, not by money.*  
For any weight not exceeding one pound 1s. 3d.  
“ “ “ over one pound, and not exceeding two, 2s. 6d.  
“ “ “ more than two pounds, not exceeding three, 3s. 9d.
5. The parcel may be registered on prepayment, also by Stamp, of a registration fee of three pence, in addition to the above rate. When registered, the receiving Postmaster should grant a receipt, and the delivering Postmaster should take a receipt on delivery to the person addressed.
6. The parcel should have the words *by parcel post*, plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the number of Township and name of Settlement in which the Post Office is situated.

The following is an example of the mode of address recommended.

<i>By Parcel Post.</i>

7. If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the Sender, on payment of an additional rate for the return conveyance.

8. If the number of Stamps affixed on a parcel be insufficient to prepay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of sixpence in addition.

### Letter from the Postmaster General, inclosing a Letter from Postmaster General of Nova Scotia, on prepayment of Colonial Postage.

---

GENERAL POST OFFICE,

Charlottetown, 1st November, 1860.

SIR;

I have the honor to enclose a communication received from the Postmaster General of Nova Scotia, in which he informs me that the system of compulsory prepayment of postage by stamp, has been adopted in that Province; and he recommends, that, for the more satisfactory working of the system, a scheme may be arranged that the same method be adopted in the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and this Island, that the Post Office department in each of these Provinces be compelled to collect and retain the postage upon all letters posted, addressed to places in or beyond their respective Provinces.

I am convinced that such a system, if adopted in this Island, would materially lessen the duties of this department, and also be a convenience to the public.

I will thank you to bring this matter before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, at your earliest convenience.

SIR;

The system of pre-payment of Letters by stamp, came into operation in Nova Scotia on the 1st of October instant. As, however, its operation is at present confined to letters posted and delivered within this Province, I have considered that it would tend to the more satisfactory working of the system, if some general scheme could be arranged,—without any breach of faith, and for the common advantage,—between Canada, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and this Province. And with this end in view, I would suggest that the system of compulsory pre-payment by stamp, be generally adopted; and that the Post Office Department of each of the Provinces interested, be empowered to collect and retain the postage upon all prepaid letters, whether such letters be addressed to places within or beyond their respective Provinces. Such a system would, I am satisfied, materially lessen the duty and simplify the Accounts of each Department.

Having been directed by the Government of this Province to bring this matter to your notice, I shall be glad to be favored with your views thereon, for their information, at your earliest convenience.

Report of Theophilus Stewart, Esq., Indian Commissioner.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 4th March, 1861.

SIR ;

The crippled state in which as an Indian Commissioner I have the last twelve months been placed, leaves me bare of materials whereon to form a report as contemplated by the sixth section of the Indian Act, 19th Victoria, cap. 10 ; no provision being made in the last Session of the Legislature to provide these people with a team of oxen, without which, as well as their being placed or settled in fixed habitations, it will be worse than useless to look for any permanent improvement in their general condition, or for the education of their children, while their bodies remain unprovided with food and clothing. It may not be out of place here to briefly review the present position of our Indian population numbering in men, women and children, about three hundred souls. They are the descendants of the Aborigines, the original possessors of the soil, and should be considered as inheriting their ancestors' right to so much of that soil as may reasonably suffice for their support, and that of their descendants. We find the greater number of them in possession of Lennox Island in Richmond Bay, where a Chapel for public worship has been erected by them over a period of forty years ; at this early period, it is well known, travellers were comfortably lodged and entertained at the house of their then Chief, the late Capt. Francis ; in subsequent years, from one cause and another, the absence of any legislative provision for their protection probably contributing thereto, these Indians instead of remaining on the Island during the season of winter, removed to one or more of the neighbouring Townships, whence on the return of Spring, they again returned to the Island ; becoming weary of this migratory life, and probably influenced thereto by the known intervention of the Government in their behalf, several families of late years, have put forth extraordinary exertions in order to provide themselves with fixed habitations ; on a recent visit to the Island, I noticed several substantial buildings, some of which have been nearly finished, others remain in an unfinished state, with a considerable clearance attached to each of the buildings. I have ascertained that it is the anxious desire of the parties concerned to permanently occupy their respective houses as soon as they shall be completed, and to abandon their wigwams or camps. Under such favorable circumstances as these, I am induced to renew the application made last year, for a Team of Oxen, and necessary accompaniments, to enable them to make a fair start as agriculturists.

There is another matter to these people of the first importance, and which they have requested me to bring under the consideration of the Government; I allude to the marsh attached to the Island, which annually produces a considerable quantity of hay, of which they have been and continue to be deprived. It will readily occur to the Government and Legislature, that unless the Indians are privileged to keep cows, and other description of stock, an insuperable barrier will thus be raised to obstruct their progress onward; with the right to use and appropriate the marsh hay, the road to a state of comparative independence would be speedily opened up, and numerous families, if not the whole of them, would be found availing themselves thereof. I shall leave the matter thus hastily brought forward in the hands of the Government and Legislature, in full confidence that they will be prepared to concur in any measure necessary to the placing of our Indians, (natives of this Island,) on a like footing with their brethren in each and all of the other British American Provinces.

I forward enclosed herewith, my annual account of Disbursements for the last year, and up to the 1st March '61, showing a sum to be provided for in the present Session, in addition to the grant for the present year.

### Report of the Superintendent of Public Works on the state of the Light House at Panmure Island.

To W. H. POPE, Esq.,  
Colonial Secretary.

SIR ;

I have carefully examined the Light House at Panmure Island, and find that some repairs are requisite. The lower floor of joists and sills is much decayed for want of proper ventilation, but might do for another year. The windows leak very much in consequence of not being properly secured with zinc, when the building was erected ; a considerable quantity of snow had drifted in over the floors in consequence of the walls not being properly barked or papered, before the outside finish was put on.

The whole of the outside of the Light House and Keeper's cottage will require to be painted, and some new glass is required in the lantern. I have ordered a new spout for the bottom of the lantern, as the old one has become entirely useless, and also a cupboard for the Keeper to put his lamps and reflectors in, to prevent them from being destroyed by the damp. The land about the Light House would require to be fenced, to prevent the pigs from the neighbouring farm rooting away the foundations of the buildings, which the Keeper has got neatly sloped off and sodded, and drains cut to carry the water away from the building. A boat would be desirable for the accommodation of the Keeper, as there is no means of communication between the Island and Georgetown, except by a circuitous route, which would not be convenient in a case of emergency. An additional flue is also required in the Keeper's cottage, as the present one is in the centre of the cottage, and when the lamps are being boiled out, the smell of the oil is very offensive. Three additional lamps are also required, as those in use at present are nearly burnt out, one of which I have brought away to be repaired. If glass reflectors with the silver run inside could be procured, I think they would be preferable, as they are more easily kept clean.

The propable cost of painting of the building, the fence, the flue, and repairs to the windows, may be estimated as follows :—

IX.—All Masters of Ships, coasting, fishing, and of all other vessels whatsoever, whether laden or unladen, coming into any harbour, port, river, creek, or any other part of the Coasts of this Island, shall, before breaking bulk, or landing passengers or baggage, and within twenty-four hours after their arrival, make report in writing, upon oath, to the Collector of Impost for the Harbor or District wherein such Vessel shall have arrived, and the Masters of all Vessels having on board any Wines, Gin, Brandy, Rum, or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, Tea, Tobacco, Goods, Wares or Merchandize of what nature or kind soever: shall also specify in said report the kind of casks, packages, parcels, boxes, trunks, bales, and all other manner of things in which such Wines, Spirits, Tea, Tobacco,

Goods, Wares and Merchandize shall or may be contained, together with the marks and numbers thereof, and that they have not landed, nor suffered to be landed, sold, bartered, or exchanged, any Wine, Gin, Brandy, Rum or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, Tea, Tobacco, Goods, Wares or Merchandize at any port or place within this Island, or on the coasts thereof, since their sailing from the port or place where the same were laden on board any Ship or Vessel for exportation, which oath the said Collector is empowered to administer in the form following :

“You, A. B. do swear, that the report which you have made (read or heard read, as the case may be) and subscribed, contains a just and true account of all Wines, Gin, Brandy, Rum, or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, Tea, Tobacco, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize laden on board the \_\_\_\_\_ at the port of \_\_\_\_\_ or any other Port or Ports, or elsewhere, before or since your sailing from \_\_\_\_\_ and that you have not landed, nor suffered to be landed, sold or delivered, bartered or exchanged any Wine, Rum, Brandy, Gin or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, Tea, Tobacco, Goods, Wares or Merchandize, at any Port or place within this Island, or on the Coast thereof, since your sailing from \_\_\_\_\_ or since your sailing from any other place.

I have had under my consideration the Act of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island transmitted with your Despatch, No. 66, of the 26th of November, Cap. 20, intituled “ An Act to enable the Controller of Navigation Laws in this Island to grant and issue Fishery Licences to citizens of the United States for Vessels built in Prince Edward Island, and owned by them.”

A question arises whether the object of this Act is within the power of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and whether of the Fisheries in question be British Fisheries and not Colonial, any departure from the present Law would not be a matter for Imperial Legislation,—but before Her Majesty’s Government can form an opinion on this point, it is necessary that they should be apprized on the nature and precise territorial limits of the Fisheries to which the Act refers.

## SCHOOL VISITER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1860.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

In conformity with your Rules I respectfully submit to you at this meeting, an abridged Report of my official labors for the year, together with such other information as I deem necessary, to enable you to furnish in an abstract form, each branch of the Legislature with such extracts of facts or statistics relating to the District Schools, as you may deem advisable to select for that purpose.

I shall endeavour to condense for the practical use of the Board, a suggestive summary, together with a supplement, detailing my labors in Prince County. I have been engaged in the usual routine of duty in this section of my circuit, since the 11th February, and in consequence of instructions forwarded to me by your Secretary, relative to the investigation of matters of a complicated character in dispute, in several Districts, demanding immediate inquiry, almost during the whole of that time I have been unavoidably involved in extreme difficulties, and exposed to fatigue and danger from the extraordinary inclemency of the weather, but I regret the hindrances that occurred, much more than the hardships I endured.

The past year has been remarkable for intense excitement in the public department under your supervision, and the improvements inaugurated should be succeeded by persistent efforts to advance our schools to the requisite standard of excellence. The agitation among teachers to pass the ordeal of the examination, and to obtain a higher status, raised a real revival of Educational discussion.

As all the Schools, with few exceptions, were closed at irregular periods, in every section of the three Counties,—from one or two days to one or two months,—according to the circumstances of the respective teachers, I was myself also involved in the inconveniences arising from this temporary suspension of the Schools. Dissatisfaction, induced by the Policy adopted in the administration of the law for the advancement of Schools, has been more prevalent in the past year than usual. Penurious, selfish persons, refuse to pay their portion of the assessment, necessary to raise funds to defray the expense incurred by Trustees, for books, furniture, repairs, improved accommodations and the supplementary salaries of teachers. Factional disputes about the sites of School-houses or the boundaries of districts have deprived schools in several localities of the liberal support indispensable to sustain them in efficient operation. Cases of an aggravated character in their tendencies, and originated by the opposition of local prejudices, have been submitted for your decision. It is to be regretted that grievances producing such pernicious consequences, cannot be effectually checked without inflicting injury and injustice on youth. I have adverted to this subject in my preliminary remarks, from the deep impression made upon my mind, in the course of my experience in the investigations ordered by the Board. Judging from the facts ascertained for your special information, I

am convinced that the authorities to whom this department of the Public Service is entrusted, have no prospect of the abatement of the annoyance accruing from similar controversies, until the laws are revised and consolidated. The differences to be settled in King's County, have already been brought officially, by me before you, but I beg leave to re-iterate my reference to Marie and the Head of St. Peter's Bay. The most prominent difficulties of this description existing in Prince County are at Birch Hill, Trout River, Egmont Bay, the Brae and Platte Districts.

There should be two high schools in Queen's County, and three in each of the other Counties: to qualify youth in the Districts, having taste and talent for literary pursuits, for the curriculum of Prince of Wales College.

The Reports of J. Macneil, Esq. and J. M. Stark, Esq. develop minutely, in appropriate details, the theory and general principles of our system; and, as these standard documents are accessible for reference, the principal duty that now devolves on me is to present facts, expose errors and offer remarks suggestive of improvements.

With this aim in view,—although I was aware that any alteration in the usual routine of my Office would probably provoke strictures—implying censure on my conduct, yet, this consideration did not deter me from following, so far as practicable, the principle indicated in the precedents, established by the distinguished authorities, in Paideutics, already cited. Acting upon this conviction in my circuit of inspection, I embrace every opportunity that occurs for professional consultation with teachers, and also, as far as time will allow, to seek out means of *quickeni*ng if possible—the desire for improvement where it does not already exist. I deem this to be the proper method of carrying out in *letter* and *spirit*, the purpose of my appointment; and, I trust the efforts already made in this direction, will be followed by beneficial results.

The members of the Board are doubtless anxious to propagate a practical knowledge of the most approved methods of teaching elementary branches in the district schools, and with the intention of promoting this object so far as my humble abilities and circumstances enable me, I submit to the decision of your judgment—outlines of exercises illustrating the processes of my examinations. But, it must be understood that my collection of examples has been selected from Manuals on Methods of Teaching pursued in Training Schools, and other publications; modified for the special purpose of supplying our teachers with Hints for their guidance in arranging a series of Lessons, the value of which, will, of course, be proportionate to the zeal, skill and aptitude of the compiler.

Encouraged by the enthusiasm manifested at several Teachers' meetings, more especially in Prince County, where this experiment was fully tested, I entertain sanguine expectations that, with the sanction of your authority, and the direction of your wisdom, the plan I adopted will diffuse zeal to acquire skill in the science of education, and to introduce improvements in the art of teaching. In this connection, a few preliminary remarks, explanatory of the exercises that I purpose to give in an appendix may be necessary to show the mode of questioning on the reading lessons. To give a more definite idea of this method of illustrative analysis, allow me to submit, specimens of the system I introduced. The meaning of all the important words in the lesson is clearly brought out, the whole class or family of words, to which the principal word belongs, are introduced and their significations given. The pupil not only gains a knowledge of the meaning of all the leading words contained in his exercise, but also of their roots, derivatives and compounds; and thus is prepared to make the proper discrimination between analogous words, whenever he may hear or read them on future occasions. For instance, suppose the word "circumscribe" occurs in the lesson; the teacher asks from what Latin word it is derived, and being answered, he then asks what other English words are formed by the help of the Latin preposition "*circum*." This leads to an explanation of such words as *circumspect*, *circumvent*, *circumjacent*, *circumambient*, *circumference*, *circumflex*, *circumfusion*, *circumnavigate*, *circumstance*, *circumlocution*, &c. &c. The same thing would then be done in reference to other etymological component of "*circumscribe*" viz. "*scribo*"

and here the specific meaning of the words, *describe inscribe, transcribe, ascribe, prescribe, superscribe, subscribe, &c. &c.* would be given. After this might come the nouns, adjectives, and adverbs, into which this word enters as one of the elements, such as, *scripture, manuscript, &c.* The teacher says, give me a word which signifies to copy? *Pupils.* Transcribe. *T.* To write in a book or on a tablet? *P.* Inscribe. *T.* To write upon, or on the outside of, as on a letter? *P.* Superscribe. *T.* A man goes around to obtain names for a book or newspaper; or to get promises of money for stocks or for charity—what does he want? *P.* Subscriptions. *T.* And what are those called who give him their names? *P.* Subscribers. *T.* And what is a copy called? *P.* Transcription. *T.* Or by way of abbreviation? *P.* Transcript.

The same is done when a derivative of the Latin word "*pes*" occurs, as in the words, *impediment, pedestal, pediment, impede, expedite*; or of the word "*duco*" in, *induce, produce, traduce, reduce, adduce, conduce, inducement, induction, deduction, reduction, production*; and then the names of the agents or persons performing these several acts are given.

So of the words in which the Greek "*grapho*" is an elementary part, as *geography, chirography, graphic, paragraph, telegraph, graphite, (mineral) &c.*

Suppose the teacher to be hearing his class in a reading lesson, and that the word "impediment" occurs, something very like the following scene may take place. *T.* Impediment, from what Latin words? *P.* *In* and *pes*. *T.* What does it mean? *P.* To oppose something against the feet;—to keep them back. *T.* How is the word *pes*, used in statuary? *P.* In pedestal—the block on which a statue is raised. *T.* In architecture? *P.* Pediment. *T.* In music? *P.* Pedal, a part of an organ moved by the feet. *T.* In botany. *P.* Pedicle or footstalk of a flower. *T.* Give me a verb? *P.* Impede. *T.* A noun? *P.* Impediment. *T.* An adjective which imports despatch in the absence of obstacles? *P.* Expeditious. *T.* An adjective meaning desirable or conducive? *P.* Expedient.

This sketch, given as a criterion by which to form a judgment of the wisdom of the plan adopted in the examination of a reading class, shows that it is comparatively an easier task to arrange a Schedule of Statistics, than to give in writing, a complete description of the process I practise.

As the great body of our teachers attended the Central Academy before beginning to teach school, and have also had several years' experience in the profession, and are now graduates of the Normal School, they are perfectly competent to instruct in this manner; but a degree of caution is necessary, lest this mode of teaching may be carried too far, as many of our words, though wholly or in part of Latin or Greek derivation, have lost their etymological signification, and assumed a conventional one. Much general information may be conveyed incidentally in reading lessons, but as long as the recitation of the lesson—perpetually interrupted by questions—constitutes, as it now often does, what is called a reading lesson, no real improvement can be expected. Children must, of course, be catechised, to ascertain their knowledge of the subject matter; but if it is intended to teach them how to read with fluency and expression, let this end be the first consideration.

The teachers who realize their responsibilities, will know the limits within which they should confine such exercises; but the indolent and inexperienced in the business, need generous sympathy and special judicious directions as to what ought to be taught and how to teach it, in order to give each branch of study, its proper share of attention. In such cases, appropriate apparatus should be afforded to acquire a practical knowledge of the best methods of teaching, and elicit a praiseworthy spirit of professional ambition. In my peculiar circumstances, a sense of justice to myself makes an elaborate exposition of the plan I pursue for this purpose unavoidable; but I regret that this predicament imposes a heavy tax upon your patience. The details of my examinations are complicated, and require minute illustrations to give comprehensive outlines of the principles on which they are based.

From these explanatory observations, I proceed to describe the course I pursued. In most of the schools visited, I gave some exercises illustrative of methods of teaching, always endeavoring to ascertain the routine in each, which the want of time would not permit me to witness; and; from a desire expressed by individuals for fuller explanations of the exercises, I resolved to arrange for holding general meetings in a central school—where teachers might meet in groups. Great results could not be reasonably expected, but the objects at which I aimed were attained. I was provided with a portable substitute for a black board (enamelled cloth) with a ball-frame and some text-books, so that classes in the school where the teachers assembled, were examined, and these auxiliaries used to shew the principles involved in the exercises, by simple processes of explanation. The first steps of teaching the alphabet, spelling and phonetic analysis, were also exemplified with a set of the Boston Primary School Tablets and Langley's Phonetic lessons. I am happy to acknowledge that the disposition manifested by all the teachers to co-operate with me in my proceedings on such occasions, were gratifying to me and creditable to themselves.

### GRAMMAR.

In my last circuit of inspection, when opportunity occurred I attempted the introduction of J. D. Morrell's method of analysis in the place of the old and formal method of parsing. The example in the Appendix, elucidates the *Modus Operandi*, as well as I was competent to exhibit it, with the intention of giving a faint idea of Professor Inglis's method; deeming it advisable that pupils in the district schools would be instructed in a manner assimilated to that practised in the Prince of Wales College. The distinguishing feature of this new method is, to view the sentence as the fundamental starting point instead of the word, and following up the development of the sentence as the guiding idea of all grammatical teaching. This method affords ample scope for mental training: but the study of words and their inflections is continued, and whatever is valuable in the old mode of parsing must be retained.

Here, it may not be inappropriate to define the subsequent technical terms used in scholastic exercises embodied in this report, as it is supposed, it may be published for general consideration.

"1. To parse a sentence is to describe every word in it as a part of speech, and according to a rule of Syntax."

"2 To analyse a sentence is to divide it into those words, or groups of words, which form the chief divisions of it, and to examine the relations of the parts of which the groups consist."

"3. By Paraphrasing, as a scholastic exercise; we mean—an explanatory variation of a given portion of discourse, prescribed in order to ascertain the degree in which the pupil understands the passage, to promote in him the habit of general attention to the meaning and spirit of what he reads, to cultivate his power of discerning the force and beauty of literary composition, and to assist in making him skilful and expert in the expression of his thoughts."

### AN EXAMPLE AND ILLUSTRATION OF PARAPHRASING.

#### *Extract from Gray's Elegy.*

"Beneath these rugged elms, that yew tree's shade  
Where heaves the turf in many a mouldering heap,  
Each in his narrow cell for ever laid,  
The rude forefathers of the hamlet sleep."

Remark.—These lines though beautifully arranged, as regards sentiment, must be read upwards to shew the direct grammatical arrangement, in so far as the syntactical relation of line to line is concerned.

The paraphrase may be written thus:—The simple forefathers of the hamlet, each consigned for ever to his narrow resting place, are lying there where the sod rises over the numerous heaps of mouldering earth, beneath these shapeless elms, and that yew tree's shade.

### GEOGRAPHY.

The majority of the schools are supplied with a map of the World, some have one or more other maps, but Cundall's map is not yet generally introduced as ordered by the Board. In my opinion, the common method of teaching geography is defective. This remark, is not made in the cavilling spirit of criticism, but with the intention of drawing attention to the expediency of adopting a rational method of teaching this important branch. The prevalent error is that of insisting and dwelling upon information quite useless, and neglecting what is important. Scholars in our district schools, would be more profitably employed, in acquiring real, practical knowledge, than scientific details of measurement and distances, and burdening their memories with a great many hard names. Children may be able to give the exact position of the leading towns in the world—and be little the wiser for the knowledge—I have met with many pupils in several districts of each country, familiar with the topography of Europe, Asia or Africa and who could repeat dry facts concerning commerce and governments, in the Eastern Hemisphere; while most of them know nothing of the adjacent provinces, or other places with which they will likely have personal communion before many years are past; and they were even ignorant of the history, and geography of P. E. Island.

In the science of education "the point of commencement is the stand-point of the learner" in every branch. The knowledge possessed by the pupil however limited, is the foundation on which we must build. We have been accustomed to begin at the wrong end in giving instructions in this branch, and reverse the order nature dictates; but so soon as the Hand-Book, prepared under the auspices of the Board is published, it may immediately be made available with Cundall's map, for commencing the study of geography on the rational process of proceeding from the "known to the unknown."

### ARITHMETIC.

Exercises in this very important branch, are performed in a large majority of our schools with accuracy and dispatch. However, in general, I observed that scholars who worked fractions with ease, were almost ignorant of the rationale of fractional arithmetic; but in most cases this deficiency in their knowledge of principles, could not be fairly attributed to inattention or incompetency on the part of teachers, who have no time for illustrative examples—and must leave the learners at their desks, working from books—and often waiting for a chance to get directions from the master when "they cannot get the answer." It is to be regretted that mental arithmetic is not a prominent branch in district schools; as it not only induces a habit of correct and rapid reasoning but is most frequently used in business life. In fact regular drilling in mental calculations and the four elementary rules on the judicious plan practised in the Normal School by Mr. Webster, will be found nearly or quite sufficient for practical purposes especially where pupils cannot spare time to acquire a thorough scientific knowledge of the science of numbers. When I attempted illustrations, I used

the black cloth and Numeral Frame. By means of the balls, tangible aid is available in such exercises, combining amusement with instruction, and J. F. Bumstead's simple contrivance for lending a hand to teach young children to count, I found to be, when time permitted, a pleasing variety and an attractive expedient.

### DICTATION AND WRITING.

Though there are some schools—comparatively few—in which, from deficiencies beyond the control of the masters these important branches cannot be properly taught, yet, in many, as much time as can be afforded without neglecting other classes, is judiciously occupied in teaching them, so that progressive improvement is perceptible.

Within the last two years, special attention has been given to dictation, scholars are exercised alternately in oral and written spelling lessons; but it is to be regretted, that from want of time, writers are apt to acquire careless habits, being in haste—they regard correct spelling more than the regular formation of letters; and as I could not give practical instructions in perfect model examples, I exhibited Philbrick's Table\* repeating his directions for copying his specimens of all the script letters, small and capitals, in fair legible characters, carefully following his rules for position and pencil holding. But, considering inconveniences in furniture, and scarcity of suitable materials for writing either on slates or paper, such exercises are fairly performed, and taught by some teachers remarkably well. Several favourably reported by my predecessors, are still in the profession, and devote assiduous attention to this and the kindred branches of secular instruction.

### ATTENDANCE.

One great drawback in the efficient progress of schools, is irregularity of attendance. Every register and every examination proves it. This evil is not confined in its results to scholars who are occasionally absent; it causes derangement in several classes, and general disorder in the schools, besides being most perplexing to the teachers. This fact should awaken serious enquiry. It is true that there are, at certain times, when out-door work presses, cogent reasons for the absence of such scholars as are able to render efficient services to their parents or friends,—but, as this irregularity often occurs, when there is no necessity for it, stringent restrictions are needed to remedy this evil.

### SCHOOL HOUSES.

New buildings, some of them neat, and all of them capacious and convenient in arrangement, have been lately completed, or are now being erected, which reflect credit on the promoters—especially the new schools at Souris—New Glasgow Bridge—Crapaud and Tryon. It is to be hoped that all of them will be furnished and supplied with apparatus and due regard to internal comfort and convenience. There are, however, too many that call for improvement with respect to their size and form, for they are very insufficient, inconvenient, and otherwise unfit.

### INSPECTION.

The results of public examinations elaborated in reports, may be fruitful in the improvement of teachers, and also awaken in the public mind an increased interest in education. I venture to submit my own conviction of the embarrassments in *my case* resulting from the increased number of schools and other concurring causes. Such vexatious interruptions as have already been mentioned—*well known to you*—impose serious labour on both the Secretary of the Board and the Visitor—further, the irregularity of vacancies, and the engagements of teachers, cause frequent derangement in the discharge of other official duties which these subordinates are expected to fulfil. The remedy that I propose—in this particular—would result in the quarterly issue of warrants for teachers' salaries as well as in introducing facilities for the management of schools. No inspector can ascertain the real progress of the schools under his supervision, unless he can devote to each as much time as any peculiarity in its condition may require. I have resolved to proceed on a geographical plan—which my Prince County Report indicates, in order to give fair details of schools and shew the additional agency—from the increase of labour, necessary to make examinations bene-

ficial, and promotive of valuable emulation among trustees and teachers in their respective functions.

I humbly trust, that I may be excused, for bringing into prominence on this occasion, circumstances that I consider barriers to the systematic progress and beneficial inspection of district schools. It is also imperative on me to entreat your attention to applications from several sections of each county for *new districts*; and some of which claiming pecuniary aid, I am urged to submit for decision. I respectfully suggest the expediency of making some provision for the immediate organization of good Primary Schools in villages such as Mount Stewart and the Dock, Cascumpeque, where children must suffer hardships in attending the nearest schools.

In preceding paragraphs I humbly attempted to present to you an idea of what has been done in schools during the past year, and to make some suggestions as to their improvements. Teachers in Prince and King's counties have fewer helps and guides to assist them in the performance of their duties than those residing within a convenient distance of this city—where they may occasionally have access to the College, Normal, and the other Primary Schools to witness classes in the elementary branches drilled on improved plans. From the deep impressions made on my mind by the representations of "professional isolation" I believed the best remedy that in such circumstances could be proposed, was the organization of Teachers' Institutes, therefore I prepared to test this experiment, which I suggested last year, by procuring Manuels and other auxiliaries. Actuated by this motive, I held lately four meetings in P. County, viz: St. Eleanor's, Miscouche, Cascumpec and Tignish. The Acadian Teachers were exercised in illustrations on the Phonetic method of teaching English lessons, but my chief object was, to point out the benefits afforded by such associations, and to revert to what, in course of examinations I considered *mistakes* in teaching, and to give examples of improvements which I deemed more expedient, and less invidious than personal comments on *errors* except in extreme cases. I have thus endeavored to combine the features of the normal system with the duties of inspection; *shaping* the *subsequent* teaching, as well as ascertaining the *preceding*—believing that in organising and conducting such Conferences I was more usefully employed than in schools making cursory corrections that might raise prejudices against teachers, and embolden scholars to disrespect them.

If the Board approves of this course of procedure, certain authoritative regulations are necessary to perfect the plan proposed.

I submit for your inspection the set of Tablets I used, for which I am under obligations to one of my pupils in the C. Academy—Dr. F. Beer—who procured for me the friendship of eminent educators in Massachusetts, and I also include, in justification of my suggestion, a supplement of the U. Canada Journal of Education, indicating a similar movement in that province. Many of the N. School graduates have introduced vocal music into their schools; Mr Dagleish, Rustico Road, has rendered manifest services in cultivating the musical gifts of his scholars, and I was agreeably surprised when asked by an Acadian teacher, Mr John Arsneaux, Egmont Bay, if I would approve of a tune on the Melodeon—then, a smart pupil—ten years of age—volunteered to play. It so happened that the first tune in his collection was a *Scotch Strathspey*, which he executed with such remarkable taste and skill, that he not only awakened in my mind reminiscences of "Auld Lang Syne," but also, a conviction whilst watching the other children, that music is the most efficient means to enliven the dull routine of daily toil, as visible from the changes made on the countenances of the group then evidently cheered by the "concord of sweet sounds." The people of this district raised by a general subscription Eighteen Pounds to buy the Melodeon for the special use of their school. As this section of my report is suggestive of improvements, I observe that, in my opinion the principal deficiencies of public instruction in the City Primary Schools, arise from the system of organization established. Any faults existing, result from the evils accompanying the *district scheme*. It is evidently detrimental to a school to be composed of scholars of all ages, as the greater the num-

ber of classes, the less time can be devoted to each. The older and advanced scholars must be disturbed by the noise attendant on the proximity of the junior ones. There are, in general, *five or six classes*, and the teacher can attend but to *one* of these at a time, so while any one of them is being instructed the others must do as best they can, and the youngest cannot be learning while the teacher is engaged with their seniors. But if all the alphabet scholars of the several schools were to comprise one school, and so on, by such an arrangement the teacher's mind would not be distracted, the tuition would be systematic, and good discipline could be maintained.

My opinion of the Normal School, for pedagogic training, may be inferred from the foregoing remarks. There is no necessity of details of the methods practised by the head master and his assistant, whose unity of purpose and zeal, show that they are heartily ambitious to be efficient. The Normal System embraces the true basis of successful teaching, but so far as I have been able to form an opinion, graduates in charge of schools are in circumstances unfavourable to the development of their knowledge of it. I consider the recent strictures on it in the Education-controversy too severe. Pupils when admitted were in many cases deficient in attainments, and till lately, the prescribed course of study was only three months. There are not suitable accommodations and appliances for the *practising department*, so that the elementary branches can be illustrated by example and method in teaching, and including the *alphabet*, in regular gradation. In this connection I refer to P. W. College, from its relation to our common schools. It is to be hoped that the improvements contemplated in the district schools, will soon be in successful operation, so that several boys in the country of aptitude and taste for intellectual improvement, on attaining the requisite age, may be so instructed as to qualify them for enjoying the privilege of its excellent course of study. The advantages of such an Institution are not confined to those participating of its immediate discipline, the whole community is indirectly affected by it; this may not be at first apparent, but its influence will be expanding, as interest in the lower schools increases and extends. No one, who has lived in a community where a college has existed for a long time, can have failed to observe its beneficial impressions on the public mind, in elevating and refining the tone of society.

### Details of School Visiter's Report.

Sea Cow Pond, English; James Berrigan, Teacher; Register 30; attendance 24. The result of a careful examination of this school in presence of the trustees was very satisfactory. The Teacher by activity and consistent deportment is esteemed by the parents. The House is delapidated, but there is another house, once used as an Acadian School, which is proposed to be occupied till a new one is built. The pupils in all the classes are making respectable progress, and seem to be diligent and docile. M'Carthy and two other boys expert in ciphering, their copies were fairly written. I gavesome illustrative Exercises, Grammar and Mental Arithmetic, showing the use of the B. Board.

Sea Cow Pond, Acadian, vacant when visited.

Nail Pond, Irish settlement; Smyth, Teacher. Absent, School closed.

" " French, District; F. J. Gaudet, Teacher; Register 26; attendance 20. Mr. Gaudet has taught here for many years. Many of his scholars learning English were absent from sickness; those present were young, and newly beginning to spell. Copies and ciphering books were very clean and well written.

Skinner's Pond, Acadian, vacant when visited.

Pig Brook, " " "

Palmer's Road, " " "

Peter's Road, Patrick Connick, Teacher; Register 32; attendance 21. Closed for a day—repairs making; said to be well taught; inspected Register.

Tignish, English, Alex McLean, Teacher; Register 30; attendance 21. Teacher lately engaged; has had many years experience; esteemed for his character in other places. For reasons not told me, evident that the previous training and teaching were defective; present method good; examination minute, other teachers present. Children apt, intelligent and respectable. Patrons few, yet support given, liberal.

Tignish, Acadian, Frs. DesRasners, Teacher. Teacher a Canadian, from a Training Colegel, active and diligent. Deficiencies in English pronunciation, compensated by his tact otherwise. After examining the classes in English and Arithmetic, lessons in phonetic and Mental Calculations, with full time in Analysis.

St. Felix, Acadian; Gilbert Buote, Teacher; Register 60; attendance 38. By the teacher's system of classification, he manages to have certain lessons in rotation on alternate days; proficiency of pupils in English branches very fair—many neat copies were shown.

Kildare Capes, vacant when visited.

Kildare, I. G. Murphy, Teacher. Closed, as advised by Board, if harmony could not be restored.

Kildare River, John M'Kay Teacher; Register 43; attendance 30. Settled the dispute referred by Mr M'Kay to the B. of E. Examination of classes—results in most cases gratifying; Teacher has a fair knowledge of Greek, Latin, and practical Mathematics, and years practice in his vocation; his scholars are taught systematically, simultaneous spelling and reading practised, with analysis of elementary branches in routine.

Kildare South, Neil Woodside, Teacher; Register 35, attendance 31. Change of teachers since last visit; Incumbent attentive and diligent; trustees and some parents attended the examination, who expressed their satisfaction with the result, and a desire to have the plan I proposed for improvements to be adopted by the Teacher.

Union, Cascumpeque, Allan Matthews, Teacher; Register 54, attendance 21. The examination of this School was conducted on part of two days, as the teacher and trustees desired if time permitted me, to test the success of the efforts used to introduce on a small scale the Normal system. The experiment was creditable to the teacher, considering irregular attendance, and want of

Hill River, vacant when visited.

Campbellton, John Gavin, Teacher; Register 26, attendance 24. The teacher very lately appointed, therefore the organization incomplete. The Rev. A. Fraser attended with the trustees, during the examination, which showed that the present teacher followed the plan pursued by the former one who is reputed able and successful. A new house is being built.

Mount Pleasant, vacant when visited.

Richmond, Fifteen Point, D. M'Kay, Teacher, Register 29, attendance 20. This school in efficient order, enjoying the benefits of being taught by an experienced and judicious master, who has been almost actively employed in his profession for upwards of twenty-five years.

Miscouche, O. Gaudet, Teacher, Register 32, attendance 21. I visited this school twice; on both occasions was gratified; the discipline and practise in teaching, make it in some degree a model. The house, furniture and fixtures neat and suitable; there is a good assortment of maps. The teacher has a natural tact for giving instruction, I therefore selected this school for holding a meeting of the other Acadian teachers for the purpose already stated—Phonetic illustrations.

Lot 16, Western, J. M'Kinnon, Esq., Teacher, Register 34, attendance 27. Excellent order maintained, and the intelligence of the pupils generally high, considering their age and time in school. This teacher has been for years in his profession, and esteemed for his success.

Lot 16. Central, R. McDonald, Teacher, Register 38, attendance 32. Satisfactory progress made during the year; discipline mild, teacher respectable, and disposed to be useful.

Lot 16, Eastern, Dougald McLeod, Teacher, Register 37, attendance 24. The result of the examination in all branches, considering hindrances of irregular attendance, was satisfactory; the teacher endeavours to teach classes on the N. school system, and is pains-taking.

St. Eleanor's, North, Henry Lawson, Teacher, Register 45, attendance 30. Examination of this school most gratifying, evidently resulting from the master's enthusiasm. Intelligence of the pupils in all the classes developed in a way adapted to their capacity.

St. Eleanor's, J. D. Reid Teacher, Register 65, attendance 40. This teacher one of the Normal graduates, who strives to conduct his school on the training system, and seems active and attentive; but his classes are too numerous, and the daily attendance so large, that he cannot do as he would.

Linkletter Road, Miss Scales, Teacher, Register 38, attendance 23. Junior classes only present at Examination, who understood the sense of what they read; the Trustees present satisfied with the attention of the teacher, and regretted the irregular attendance of the scholars.

Platte, Jas. Brehaut, Teacher, Register 30, attendance 25. This teacher labours here with the skill and zeal for which he is proverbial. The school house small, the dispute about site settled, and a new one chosen, for new commodious house.

Summerside, N. McKelvie, Teacher, Register 75, attendance 60. Though this school is too crowded, the system of classification is such that the progress of the scholars is much greater than could be expected. Here was also plainly seen the benefits of training combined with aptitude and vigour in the master, who is really enterprising and indefatigable.

Wilmot Creek, J. Vanbuskirk Teacher, Register 43, attendance 23. With regard to discipline and method, the condition of this school is of like character with the preceding one just now described, but the accommodations are not so good. House small, furniture unsuitable, and attendance irregular. Scholars chiefly in the elementary branches.

Central Bedeque, Mrs Ross, Teacher, Register 36, attendance 30. When visited, Wright, J. Beer Esqs., Trustees, and several others attended the examination, and expressed their satisfaction with the progress made in the branches in which the classes were examined with care by Mrs Ross, Mr Byrne of Mount Stowe school, and myself.

- North Bedeque, Jno. McKinnon, Teacher, Register 33, attendance 25. The teacher of this school emulates successfully those near him, so that there is a striking coincidence in the condition of the schools in this section, and he enjoys also the benefits of succeeding skilful masters. When examined, the attendance was pretty large, and considerable time devoted to the exercises.
- Mount Stowe, Jas. Burns, Teacher, Register 44, attendance 30. Visited last summer,—order and arrangement good, and proficiency satisfactory—teacher assiduous—house comfortable and fairly furnished.
- Freetown, John Schurman, Teacher, Register 51, attendance 35. Efficiently taught in all the branches, and on examination his scholars very expert and well grounded in the elements.
- Upper Freetown, M. Ross, Teacher. Vacation when this District and neighbourhood was visited in my summer tour.
- Grove, Morrow, Teacher. Vacation as above.
- Kelvin Grove, Vacant, Teacher had completed his engagement a few weeks before visitation.
- South West, John Gallagher Teacher, Register 32, attendance 21. When examining this school in summer tour, the teacher was called away, his dwelling house being on fire, so the school was closed, as he had to leave and get all available assistance.
- Searletown, vacant.
- Carleton, George Muttart, Teacher, Register 51, attendance 22. Several Trustees present at examination. Minute inspection in all departments. Progress very satisfactory.
- Cape Wolfe, Miss Byrne, Teacher; Register 30; attendance 24. Vacant. Jas. Kinlay, Esq., who has been trustee for many years, speaks favorably of Miss B., and gave me the Return from the Trustees' Record.
- O'Leary's Road, T. Key, Teacher, Register 32, attendance 26. Examination in presence of I. McNeill, trustee; Mr McNeill's son very apt, especially in business calculations. House small but comfortable.
- Hamilton Road, vacant when visited; so for some time; Mr McPherson said they expected a master soon.
- Brae, vacant. Investigated the dispute on S. H. site, and arranged to have a magistrate to decide on the location.
- Mill River, Miss Forsyth, Teacher. Teacher absent from sickness, and not likely to resume duty.
- Foxley River, A. McInnes Teacher, Register 45, attendance 25. Day very stormy when first visited; on second, Teacher had closed to visit his parents; he accompanied me to Cross Rivers school,—also attended examination in Quagmire next day; he is anxious to adopt improvements. Inspected his Register.
- Frederick Cove, Miss E. Ramsay, Teacher; Register 55; attendance 40. Examination in presence of one Trustee, and Mr McKinnon teacher; method of teaching and discipline very good, as much as practicable on the Normal system; the result showed that Miss R. labors with zeal and skill. Trustee reported general satisfaction.
- Bideford, D. B. Smith, Teacher; Register 29, attendance 6. When visited weather bad—roads almost impassable. Inspected Register—attendance from 16 to 28; house good, education in the district.
- Trout River, vacant, site removed to a place named "Canada," but objections taken as some considered transient settlers voted—besides one householder is supposed nearer Port Hill than the new school.
- Port Hill, M. McKinnon, Teacher, Register 28, attendance 25. Examined in presence of Captain Richards Trustee—all classes taught with fidelity and activity; discipline good, and teacher re-engaged to resume in May.
- Birch Hill, Miss Lawson, Teacher, Register 36, attendance 27. This school in good order, Mr Birch, Trustee, witnessed a very searching examination of all the classes; some disputes about

the site which is believed should be removed towards the ferry—as more convenient for a populous section of the district.

Grand River Ferry, P. D. McNeill, Teacher, Register 45, attendance 25. This district too large; full time spent examining; spelling and meaning of lessons, fair; arithmetic as far as interest satisfactory. I gave explanatory exercises in presence of Mr M'Kinnon, who seemed pleased, and spoke much in favor of the teacher—scholars smart.

Cross River, Jas. McDougald, Teacher, Register 27, attendance 25. When visited first, teacher confined to bed, and again examined few pupils present; the progress of those scholars examined in spelling and reading fair—all in simple rules of arithmetic; some specimens of writing in copies of absent scholars passable. The master is respected by the parents,—not then in good health, which affected his school.

Ellis River, A. Beckford, Teacher, Register 28, attendance 18. Adventure school,—house so dilapidated that no teacher could be successful in it. Reading distinct, in spelling and knowledge of elementary rules of arithmetic better than I expected considering accommodations.

Quagmire, J. H. Fitzgerald, Teacher. All classes carefully drilled by the master, aided by Mr McInnes, Teacher, Lot 11. Mr F., who is well known as an old schoolmaster, complained of nervousness excited from the sudden death of a friend and neighbour buried that forenoon; the attendance then good, but often irregular from the embarrassments of parents.

## Evidence taken before the Committee appointed to examine and report on the Petition of Patrick Bambrick, 18th April, 1861.

Joseph Ball, Esq., late Surveyor General, examined—states in answer to a question that the certificate granted by him to Patrick Bambrick is correct.

**QUES.**—Is it usual to allow for services such as those set forth in the Petition of Patrick Bambrick ?

**ANS.**—Always.

**QUES.**—Is the amount mentioned in petition, viz :—5s. per day, the usual allowance for such services ?

**ANS.**—Yes.

**QUES.**—At what time did Bambrick perform the services set forth in his petition?

**ANS.**—Bambrick's services extend over a period of several years.

**QUES.**—Can you give the particulars of Bambrick's claim for the work mentioned in your certificate ?

**ANS.**—Yes—will give the particulars to-morrow.

Hon. John Aldous, Commissioner of Public Lands—examined.

**QUES.**—Can you give any information respecting Patrick Bambrick's claim ?

**ANS.**—Bambrick's certificate was presented to the Governor in Council by the Commissioner with the view of having it allowed to his credit on Land purchased by him, but the Government refused to entertain it on the ground that the certificate was too vague and unsatisfactory, as it expressed no date or years.

---

In reply to the question put to me by a Committee appointed by the Honorable the House of Assembly, "Can you give the particulars of Patrick Bambrick's claim for the work mentioned in your certificate ?" take leave to state in reply that no reference to my field book I find said P. Bambrick attended me as a chainbearer or axe man on the Government surveys on the Worrell Estate, as follows : that is to say, on the 13th, 14th, 15th, 20th, 29th, 30th, and 31st of March 1855,—2d, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, and 21st of April, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th May, and the 11th, 12th, and 13th of June also in 1855, and on the 25th and 26th April—August the 16th and 17th,—and the 6th, 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th September 1856, included being 42 days, agreeable to my certificate.

## Report of Superintendent Public Works on repairs required for Charlottetown ferry wharf.

To the HON. HEATH HAVILAND.

Sir ;

I wish to call your attention to the state of the docks and floats at the Charlottetown ferry, which require some additional outlay this year to keep them in reasonable working order for the accommodation of the public, and safety of the boat. The piles in the dock at the opposite side of the river are nearly eaten off, and twenty-five new ones will at least be necessary. The floats would also require considerable repair to keep them in good working order ; they will have to be striped and caulked anew. Two new piles are required on this side and also a new bed for the outer float to rest upon ;—as it is at present it sinks fourteen inches below the boat at low water, which is very inconvenient for carriages passing in and out of the boat.

The probable cost of the piles may be estimated at 27s. 6d. each,	£37	2	6

Campbell, P. officer of Montague River, I beg leave to state that Mr Campbell performed efficient service by stopping on board vessels during the discharge of their cargoes, and boarding others in Ballast, and I believe by so doing, saved a considerable sum to the Revenue that would be otherwise smuggled, were no Preventive Officer on board, or stationed at the bridge.

I always allowed the vessels entering at the Custom House in Georgetown having goods for Montague Bridge to go up without sending an officer with them, expecting of course Mr Campbell to meet them there.

I therefore hope Mr Campbell may be allowed a small sum for the past two years say ten or twelve pounds.

## Despatches in reference to Light-houses at East Point and North Cape.

(Copy.)

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,

Prince Edward Island, March 28th, 1861.

Sir;

Referring to my letter of date January 27th, 1860, I have again to invite your Excellency's attention to the absence of Light-houses on the East and North Capes of the Island.

The recurrence of accidents, since I addressed you on this subject, induces me again to urge the expediency of taking immediate measures for placing Light on these points.

As the trade from the two principal Harbours of this Island,—Charlottetown and Georgetown—is almost exclusively confined to countries lying to the Southward; the proposed Light-houses will chiefly benefit Vessels belonging to the adjoining Colonies.

The Government is therefore anxious to ascertain the views of the other North American Colonies, respecting the erection and maintenance of these Light-houses.

Should your Excellency think proper to bring this subject before your Council, and recommend that a sum of money should be granted for that purpose, the Government is prepared to ask the Legislative Assembly of this Island to vote a contribution for the same purpose.

The details and the expense to be borne respectively by each Province would be matters to be settled by Commissioners.

### **Extracts from a petition of Shipowners and Merchants complaining of the exaction of a tax on Vessels passing through the Gut of Canso.**

“ That the dues exacted from the Cranberry Island Light House upon vessels anchoring in the Gut of Canso, and adjacent seas, are and have been a heavy burthen on the trade and shipping of this Island.

“ That such dues have been imposed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia, on the assumption that the Gut of Canso is a port of that Province, and that a tax may therefore be collected from all vessels coming to anchor within its limits.

“ That the Gut of Canso is one of the principal entrances into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and is, of right, free and open to all Her Majesty’s subjects, for the purpose of navigation, without tax or impediment.

“ That the imposition of a Tax, by the Legislature of Nova Scotia, on the shipping of this Island, while anchoring in the Gut, and adjacent seas is an illegal exaction on property, no way subject to the laws of that Colony.

“ That assuming, but never admitting, that such imposition were legal, the rate of it is excessive, amounting to sixpence for every Ton, which far exceeds the amount of all the Light dues throughout the British and Irish Channels, and that the Cranberry Light is a very poor one.

“ That the mode of collecting these light dues, by boarding vessels on the high seas, is, to the last degree, dangerous and exceptionable, and may lead to risk and bloodshed among the crews of vessels, whose masters are either ignorant or doubtful of the legality of the demand ; and that several instances have occurred where the Collector of the Light dues has seized and taken part of the sails of vessels bound from this Island to Europe, to satisfy the same.

“ That this House is willing to sanction the collection of Light dues at the ports of this Island, in behalf of Nova Scotia, or any of the other adjacent Colonies that may erect Lighthouses, which are deemed beneficial to the trade of the Island, the rate of the charge being first submitted to the consideration of this House.

“ That the operation of this Light duty has been found to press with peculiar severity on the coasting vessels of this Island, which have been compelled to pay at the rate of sixpence per ton on every voyage ; while the same description of vessels

belonging to Nova Scotia are allowed to pass, by an annual payment of 20s, causing thereby a tax of sometimes five times the amount to be taken from a vessel of this Island, which is exacted from a like vessel belonging to Nova Scotia.

“That a copy of these resolutions be presented to his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and that he be requested to communicate with the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia on this subject.

“That if no satisfactory redress of this grievance shall be obtained through the correspondence of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, that His Excellency be requested to advise with the Law Officers of the Crown, and to adopt all lawful ways and means to resist this illegal exaction, and that this House will make good any expence attending the same; and that His Excellency be further requested in such event, to correspond with the Lieutenat Governor of New Brunswick, that the concurrence of the Legislature of that Province may be obtained in opposing an exaction that is alike injurious to the trade of that colony within the Gulf, and to the trade of this Island.”
