Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions: by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of his homestead, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

FOR THEIR MEN MORLEY DIES. Desperado Shoots Himself When Cornered by Posse. Robbed Same Bank Before and Killed a Policeman, N. Y. C. and Other Railways Pension Employees. Hundred Thousand Affected—To Cost Half a Million.

Desperado Shoots Himself When Cornered by Posse. Robbed Same Bank Before and Killed a Policeman, N. Y. C. and Other Railways Pension Employees. Hundred Thousand Affected—To Cost Half a Million. New York, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railway Company and Michigan Central Railroad Company, held to-day, a plan for a pension system for employees of these lines was adopted. The extension of this plan to the other principal lines of the system is also under consideration. Under the plan as adopted employees on reaching the age of 70 years are retired. The amount of pension is one per cent of the amount of pension for at least ten years immediately preceding their retirement they will be entitled to a pension. An employee who has been at least 20 years in continuous service, and has become unfit for duty, may be retired with a pension, although he has not reached the age of 70 years. The amount of pension is one per cent for each year of continuous service, based upon the average rate of pay received for the ten years next preceding retirement. The pension system becomes effective on January 1, 1910, and will be administered by a board composed of the following officers: Chairman, J. C. McLaughlin, Vice-President; A. H. Smith, Vice-President; C. E. Schaff, Vice-President; R. H. L'Hommedieu, General Manager; C. C. & St. L. Railway, General Superintendent; M. P. R. S. & M. D. C. Moon, General Manager; L. S. & M. D. C. Moon, General Manager. There are over 100,000 employees who will come within the provision of the pension system as they reach age of retirement. It is estimated that this will involve an annual expenditure of about a half million dollars after the plan is in full effect.

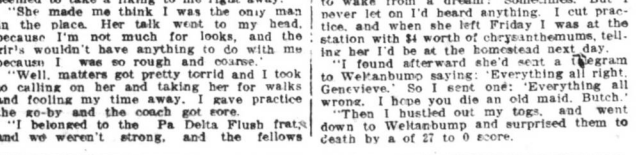

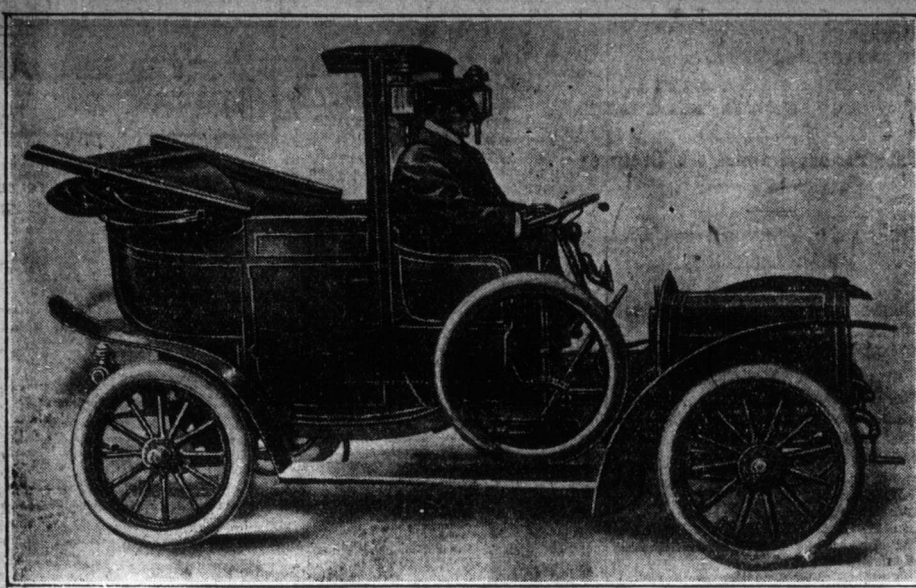

On the strength of this wonderful performance H. M. Hanna, of Cleveland, purchased her, paying John E. Madden the high price of \$50,000. Hamburg Belle's dam was Sally Simmons and her sire Axworthy. Her first mark was given her in 1907. It was 2:12 3/4, made at Mineola, N. Y.

NEARING END.

The Trial of Mme. Steinhil Drawing to a Close. Paris, Nov. 13.—The entire session of the Steinhil murder case yesterday was taken up with an impassioned plea by Advocate General Trouard Rielle for conviction.

Mme. Steinhil's counsel, M. Aubin, is yet to be heard. No doubt has arisen whether the fate of the woman will be given into the hands of the jury to-morrow. Throughout the day Mme. Steinhil seemed terribly depressed.

Two things must be remembered in connection with a French verdict. First, the majority vote prevails, the foreman of the jury having two votes if there is a tie; second, that the jurors are not confined, but are permitted to return to their homes at night, where they are subjected to the possible influence of their relatives. It is notorious that where a majority of the men here favor the acquittal of Mme. Steinhil, the women are practically unanimous in the belief that she is guilty.

Mme. Steinhil is being deluged with letters of every character, many of them offering of marriage if she is acquitted. Enterprising theatrical managers are trying to arrange for her immediate appearance on the stage after release, one having offered \$2,000 for 30 appearances. Mme. Steinhil is represented as having thrown these letters away in a rage.

As the prosecutor ended his resume of the evidence against the defendant, M. Aubin, jumping to his feet, exclaimed: "Are you upon your conscience name the accomplices at whom you have been hinting throughout your argument? Were they Marietta and Alexandre Wolf?"

The spectators who have watched eagerly for just such a bit of playburst into applause. When quiet was restored M. Rielle said: "I decline to answer." Neither Marietta Wolf, the cook, nor her son, Alexandre, was in the court room to-day, and there was a rumor that they might be arrested to-night.
