





It is true that no more than half a grain' is sufficient to destroy life, so hat a single pound of the horrible substance would be capable of causng the deaths of more than 15,000. But there are other drugs that are even more deadly, although luckily, they are never found outside the laporatory of the professional toxicolo-

Tetanine is one of these. It is what scientists call a microbic poison, the product of the microbe of tetanus, or lock. A fatal dose of tetanine would be but a fifth part of a similar dose of hyoscin. Or put another way, while a pound weight of hyoscin would suffice to kill above 15,000 people, a oound of tetanine would kill over 75, 000. By actual experiment it has been proved that a fifteen-hundreth part of a grain of tetanine will kill horse 600,000,000 times its own weight.

It is probable that this is the deadliest poison known, although there are several others that run it a fairly close second. For example, pure hydrocyanic acid (not that usually sold in chemists's shops, which is only a ner cent. solution) is so exceedingly poisonous that the mere inhalation of its emanations will causes instant death, and in fact, Scheel, its discoverer, lost his life in this manner.



#### Wreck of the Schr Torpedo

The crew of the wrecked schr. toredo, whose loss we refer elsewhere, had a perilous time of it before leav-ing her. She was coming from the Labrador coast to St. John's when she struck the big gale of Monday night, about 20 miles south of Groais Is. The vessel was badly battered in the ements, had all her canvas torn into shreds and the seas made a clean to shreds and the seas made a clean sweep over her as she ran before the biast, everything movable was swept off the decks, the booms were broken and one of the masts were sprung, while it was dangerous in the extreme for the men to hold the decks. The vessel laboured so heavily in the sea that the topping lift gave out, the sheets of the main boom pulled the sheaves out of the blocks, when they gave way the boom had full play and came very near killing one of the erew named Snelgrove who was standing in the companion and hauling him overboard. To make matters orse water was discovered in the hold, the vessels seams opened, and all hands had to man the pumps to try and keep her afloat. For hours the men worked hard at this, and on Tuesday it was decided to run her for St. Julien's and beach her. About four hours before this was done the water had gained so rapidly that it was over the cabin floor, and if the crew were compelled to remain on her have foundered with them and all would have gone to bottom with her. They beached her in a gulch, and her men had a very difficult task to get cut of her safely in the high sea which ran. Capt. John Cook who was in command of her, and who has ade several foreign voyages, says it is the worst experience he ever went through. He and his crew of 6 men lost all their clothing and effects, and the captain lost a number of nautical instruments. It was a fortunate thing that the fish taken by the vessel was shipped away on the Labrador coast. She had a large quantity of oil on board and this was all lost. It was a difficult task to round the point off St. Julien's. Had she gone in there all would have been lost. Several other schooners were in company with the Torpedo and had their sails trn, booms broken and sustained other damage. The vessel was insured in the Bonavista scheme.

#### Work of the Storm

his morning about one o'clock increased in violence as the hours passed and was accompanied by heavy rain, alternating with snow showers. A tremendous sea runs outside and no craft could enter the Narrows this morning. The sea runs the entrance to port and a big swell is heaving in the harbor all day. Several schooners which left here last evening for the northward had to run back early this morning to the shelter of the port. In the lower part of the harbor there is a big un dertow running and vessels had to be given extra moorings to prevent their doing damage to the wharves at which they are tied up. Messrs. Walsh Kearsey and Squires, watermen, each had their boats destroyed by being beaten up against the breastwork of the King's wharf at an early hour this morning. One boat was driven in from the collar out in the Narrows and floated up the harbor bottom up, while it is known that some of the stages and flakes on both sides of the harbor are badly damaged and may be totally destroyed. The pilots owing to the big sea on could not attempt to run outside. The sea is sweeping in Blackhead and Freshwater Bays and it is thought will create much havoc in these places. People who came in from Torbay this forenoon say that there is a terrible sea running in that section and they believe that there will be a repetition of the destruction done there in the fall of last year. Several boats were broken up this morning and others swamped on the collars, and it is believed that mostly all the stages will be swept away at Torbay, Outer Cove, Pouch Cove and Flatrock. If such occurs it will be a great blow to the fishermen, as after last year's storm all the stages were rebuilt in these places. At Blackhead and Petty Harbor the fishermen were up all night getting their boats up on the beach out of the reach of the sea. ### Thinks It Is a Steamer Wrecked.

Passengers by the S. S. Glenco ow in the city say that the schooner Jubilee, which arrived at St. Lawrence, coal laden from Sydney, a couple of days ago after a passage of days on the run had an awful time of it, and the wonder is she did not founder. The deals which were picked up at St. Lawrence, Lamaline, Lawn and other parts of the S. W. Coast are very heavy and do not look as if they had been cut in this country. The Jubilee, when about 20 miles off the coast, was sailing through them for fully 5 hours. She reports that while in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during the night of the storm she passed a large steamer whose decks were piled with lumber and deals. The ship which evidently was from some Canadian port was making very bad weather and was deeply laden. The vessel evidently lost her deck load or foundered, and the belief is that these deals are a part of her cargo. The Jubilee was not near enough to get the name of the steamer, but she was a large three masted vessel. The Jubilee which was bound for St. Pierre but put in at St. Lawrence received a terrible buffeting. The sea ran mountains high and the wind blew with the velocity of a hurricane. The vessel was for the better part of 8 days hove to, and had to drift before the blast. Her foremast was carried away, the main beom smashed, the jaws of the main gaff broken, while the only sails left on her were the mainsail and large jib, all the rest having been torn in to shreds by the force of the wind. Portion of the deck was started by the working of the mainmast before it went by the board, and it is surprising that the vessel did not founder. Water got into the hold and the crew had to work the pumps often to try and keep her free. The foremast is also sprung, and it was only by the most skilful seamanship that she was nursed into port. 

What is known as wood-meal fodder for cattle is just sawdust, mixed into a mash with hot distillers' wash and flavoured with rock salt. It can te fed to the beasts in its fresh state, or it can be dried and pressed into moulds like oil-cake, or it can be baked in the form of dough. Similar sawdust dough is made into bread, and eaten by the peasants in some parts of Russia and Germany. Mortar made from sawdust is now






