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

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

Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL. To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immerdiately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun bering before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clean; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

The lebate in the House of Lords on the second reading of Lansdowne's bill for the re-construction of the Upper Chamber indicated that the leaders f the order will fail to coerce many Unionist peers into voting for neasure involving their own political extinction. Baron de Broke declared that the House as at present constituted was the best the country ever nad and that the peers were going to continue to present their programme. Those peers who supportthe bill lacked enthusiasm and were listened to in silence. Lord orley spoke insisting that the passage of the Veto Bill must precede any settlement by comprise with re hrew out the significant suggestion at in any reconstruction of the louse of Lords, the number of memers would be restricted to one hundred. This is regarded as foreshadowing the purpose of the Government when the Reform of the House of Lords comes up for consideration.

Schooner Capsized.

CREW HAVE CLOSE CALL \$700 CASH GOES TO BOTTOM.

The schr. Minerva, coming from ound Cove, B.B., capsized in a squall Pound Cove, B.B., capsized in a squall off Torbay Head about 6 o'clock last evening. The crew, consisting of the skipper, Peter Greene, Thos. Greene, James Davis, Robert Sturge and Frank Howell, were rescued by a boat from Fleming's schooner, which was coming along to St. John's also. The Minerva left Pound Cove at 1 o'clock Sunday morning, and was coming along with a clipping wholesail breeze when a squall off the land at Torbay Head threw her out on her beam ends before the man at the wheel had time to put her up in the wind. The four men on deck ran the wind. The four men on deck ran to the weather rail and clung on. One of the crew was in the forecastle and had barely time to scramble on deck when the water poured down in a torrent. When she careened the ballast shifted and in a few minutes barlast shifted and in a few minutes her keel was clean out of water. The boat was on the lee quarter and of course could not be got at. Skipper Eli Sheppard's schooner Salva, of Indian Islands, which was about half a mile to windward, was seen putting about and coming down to their rescue. The arrow on her had o their rescue. The crew on her had een the Minerva go over and made no delay in putting about. Skipper the Minerva's crew off An attempt was made then to get at the men's boxes and other belongings but without success. A heavy lop was on and there was a risk of the boat getting stove against the side and they rowed back to the Salva. The wind had increased in the meantime and after double reefing the sails they reached port safely. The Minerva is insured but the crew lost all their property. The skipper had \$350 in his box, his brother \$250, and J. Davis \$70. The other members of the crew had small amounts ranging from \$10 to \$30. On arrival the wrecked crew called on Hon. S. D. Blandford, who made arrangements to send out a tug in order to search for and tow in the Minerva. The Ingraham sailed accordingly at ight. The Minerva was in her ordinary ballast and had no cargo.

Capt. Rose of the tug Ingraham who had the skipper and crew of the Minerva on board with him, searched for two hours in a circuit of ten miles off Torbay Head. They saw no sign of the schooner and the skipper and crew realized that she must have gone down with the weight of her pallast. The Ingraham then returned to port and meeting the tug Daisy in the Narrows, the Minerva's crew were put on board her and brought in. The Minerva was 34 tons burthen and was built in Gooseberry Islands in 1890. The Telegram had an internorning at Steer's wharf. He believed the crew of the Minerva would have lost their lives if he had not peen so near them when the vessel went over. The Minerva's boat was on the lee side and the fore boom fell n her and stove her side when the schooner capsized. Skipper Sheppard was watching the Minerva when she went over. He at once lowered a oat and put two of his crew in her after he had come down upon her The Minerva's crew were then clinging to the bulwarks aft, and the schooner was fast settling. ten minutes from the time the were taken into the small boat by the wo men from the Salva, so that the little skiff was so overloaded that she was in danger of being sunk, especially as there was a strong wind and heavy lop. By careful manageequest of the skipper of the Minerva three of the crew went back to the wreck in the small boat, hoping to get their boxes in order to recover their money, but the sails, which being flat on the water kept up the vessel, had now become sogged with water and she had sunk down so 'ar that the companion could not be got at. The foresail of the Salva was this moment carried away by a quall and it was deemed well not to nake any more delay, so they came on board and trimmed down the Salva for St. John's.
