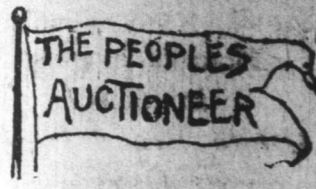

Household Notes.

A laundress says that one cannot be too particular to rinse the soap out of a garment in the washing, for it is the soap that causes the bluing to appear here and there in the garment.

A little melted paraffin wax poured round the corks of home-made pickle jars will prevent air from entering between the cork and the glass and keep catsup and chutneys fresh and free from mould.

Put a good-sized lump of salt into a cup of vinegar and put it into a vessel that is discolored and let it stand for half a day. Wash well with hot water and soap and the sediment will come off easily.

In making a skirt every seam should be pressed twice. As soon as the seams are sewed they should be pressed. They should be pressed again after being finished with the so-called tailor stitching.

An economical housewife has discovered that if lemons are heated by being plunged into hot water before squeezing the amount of juice obtained is surprisingly increased. The same is true of oranges.

When making collars for thin waists you will find that they will fit much better if a perfectly fitting collar of paper is sewed on the waist; first and the strips of lace and insertion are based on it.

If the wash goods are scorched soak at once in the lukewarm water. Sprinkle with salt and lemon juice as it dries. When the stain disappears wash thoroughly in cold water.

When sewing lace at the top of the collar so that the stitches will come on the right side, drawing the thread moderately tight. This will make the lace stand up neatly around the neck.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Stores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

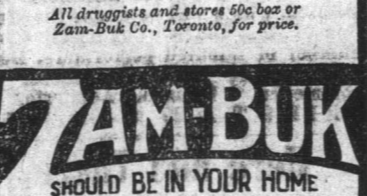

HONG KONG, May 15. Alarming rumours are afloat of a revolutionary uprising in Canton and surrounding districts, which is planned for to-morrow. One has a portrait of King George II., and the date, 1742, is very distinct. The other two are dated 1777. They are about the size of an old-fashioned American cent.

RECIPROCITY.

A few days ago we commented on the attitude of Secretary Knox towards Reciprocity. Apparently only in case of the arrangement between America and Canada being ratified was he disposed to open negotiations with Newfoundland. We pointed out that the main value of Reciprocity to Newfoundland was an arrangement in which Canada did not share. With this view Mr. Harvey concurs. This was our main contention. It had reference to both the salt fish and the fresh fish trade with the States. As to the later we pointed out that the Provinces had geographical advantages which would handicap Newfoundland if Newfoundland had no tariff advantage on a market where the Provinces were already established firmly and where there was no great bonanza in such perishable articles at the low prices we quoted yesterday.

As to Mr. Harvey's contention that the onus should not be on his side to produce facts and arguments, we differ. He proposes a change of policy, viz., the giving of bait to Americans. It is on him to justify such a change. The issue seems to be: is the decline in the marketing of our commodity in Porto Rico and the States, which Mr. Harvey fears, of sufficient importance to induce Newfoundland to give Americans bait and give them a chance of reviving their banking by having free access to Newfoundland? As Mr. Harvey thinks so, it is for him to make out a conclusive case.

Appeal Filed.

In the Supreme Court to-day, before the Chief Justice, Mr. Kent, K.C., moved for leave to appeal to H. M. Privy Council against the judgment of the Supreme Court in the case of the Attorney General vs. the Commercial Cable Company. Mr. Furlong, for the Attorney General, consented. Leave was granted. (In Chambers. Before Chief Justice.)

Nld. Pine & Pulp Co., Ltd., vs. Anglo-Nld. Development Co., Ltd.
This is an application on the part of the plaintiff herein for an order that the defendant be at liberty to deliver to the defendant interrogatories in writing and the defendant by Mr. Vincent Jones or other proper officer of the company do answer the

interrogatories as presented by Order XXVII.
Mr. Furlong, K.C., for plaintiff makes the application; Mr. Wood for defendant opposes. The Court will consider the application.

The Death of James Gallately.

We record to-day the death of James Gallately, the well-known marine engineer who passed away at Harbour Main on Sunday at the residence of Mr. C. Furey, his son-in-law. Mr. Gallately came to this country about 40 years ago as an engineer. He worked with the Reid Newfoundland Co. for many years, and left the S. S. Invermore a few days ago to visit his daughter Mrs. Furey, and passed away after two days illness. He leaves two sons and two daughters. Deceased was a native of Scotland, and of a genial disposition, popular amongst his fellow craftsmen and his death will be deeply mourned. The deceased was buried at the General Protestant Cemetery this afternoon. We extend the relatives our deepest sympathy. The body was brought in by train to-day and taken by undertaker Martin to his rooms where the funeral took place.

Maddened Bull Creates Havoc.

About 4 p.m. yesterday a large and vicious bull was landed from the Emma E. Whidden at Pitts' premises, and from the time it left the slings on the wharf it gave trouble. In fact while on the voyage down from Port Mulgrave the crew had to be careful in going near the animal, which tried to gore them, and for a while the intention was to kill it. Extra care was taken in landing the beast, but when being taken into the shed on the wharf he broke away from the men and dashed up Water Street at a great rate, scattering people in all directions with head down as he repeatedly charged in on the sidewalks. People had to take refuge in shops along the way to escape him, and opposite Steer Bros. he charged full tilt at a man who was coming towards him at a rapid rate on a bike. The rider of the machine jumped off and dodging behind a telegraph pole saved himself from death, while Taurus tossed the bike high in the air and again charged up the street with impetuosity. Men, women and children had to seek cover in all directions, and near T. Walsh's store a little boy barely escaped being gored but that a man grasped the child in his arms and rushed into a store just as the bull with head lowered passed the spot where both were an instant before. The beast then kept on his maddened career in Waterford Road, up through the West End, followed by a crowd of men from Pitts' with several of Mr. C. Lester's men, and from 1 to 6 p.m. the animal had charge of that thoroughfare. Repeatedly the men tried to capture the beast, but every attempt was a failure, as it charged them every few moments and scattered them in all directions, several barely escaping his horns. Mr. Colshaw drove along in his auto at 6 p.m., and when near the General Protestant Cemetery the bull, bellowing loudly, charged down on the "E. M. P." It withstood the shock well, but the front of the car was wrecked and the lamps were broken, though Mr. Colshaw fortunately escaped personal injury. The bull then turned into "Germondale" and destroyed 200 worth of property, tearing up fruit trees of all kinds, smashing hot beds and compelling the caretaker repeatedly to fly for his life, as it charged him. Before dark hundreds of people collected on the road. Taurus still held the fort and not till near midnight was he disposed of. The men who were trying to round up the brute had to come to the city and get guns during the night, but the difficulty then was to get a shot at the animal. As he charged several shots were fired at him, without avail, but just before midnight two bullets took effect. They wounded the bull but not mortally, and bellowing with pain he repeatedly rushed in and out the road. Eventually Messrs. Mr. Myler and his friends must certainly be thankful for this evidence of gratitude and fair play on the part of the Tory crowd.

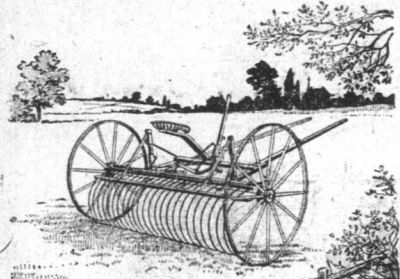

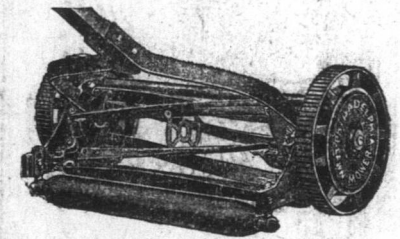

Veto Bill Passes House

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day.

The fight in the House of Commons on the Veto Bill ended last night, when an amendment moving the rejection of the whole bill was defeated by 363 to 243. A motion for the adoption of the bill on the third reading was carried by 362 to 241.

The announcement of the figures was received by tremendous applause from the cheering severals. Ministerialists called out to the Opposition: "Now toe the line and take it like men." The debate in the House of Lords on the second reading of the Upper Chamber indicated that the leaders of the order will fail to coerce many Unionist peers into voting for a measure involving their own political extinction. Baron de Broke declared that the House as at present constituted was the best the country ever had and that the peers were going to continue to present their programme. Those peers who supported the bill lacked enthusiasm and were listened to in silence. Lord Morley insisted that the passage of the Veto Bill must precede any settlement by compromise with respect to the Upper Chamber. He threw out the significant suggestion that in any reconstruction of the House of Lords, the number of members would be restricted to one hundred. This is regarded as foreshadowing the purpose of the Government when the Reform of the House of Lords comes up for consideration.

Blow Against Monopoly

Special Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.

The Supreme Court upholds the decision of the Missouri Court, ordering the dissolution of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. The Court holds that the Standard Oil Co. is a monopoly in restraint of trade and that the corporation must be dissolved within six months. Corporations whose contracts are now unquestionably restrictive of competition are not affected. Other great corporations whose acts may be called in question may be dealt with according to the merits of their particular cases.

Wild Exhibition Only One Open.

LONDON, To-Day.

The Festival of Empire opened with a grand concert of 4,500 voices, Clara Butt and Thorp Bates, being the soloists. Their Majesties the King and Queen were present. Amidst great enthusiasm the Royal Party afterwards drove through the pageant ground, but had not time to visit the Colonial Buildings. Our building only open to public on Friday. Schooner Capsized.

CREW HAVE CLOSE CALL—\$700 CASH GOES TO BOTTOM.

The schr. Minerva, coming from Pound Cove, B.B., capsized in a squall off Torbay Head about 6 o'clock last evening. The crew, consisting of the skipper, Peter Greene, Thos. Greene, James Davis, Robert Sturge and Frank Howell, were rescued by a boat from Fleming's schooner, which was passing when it struck. The Minerva left Pound Cove at 1 o'clock Sunday morning, and was coming along with a clipping breeze when a squall off the land at Torbay Head threw her out on her beam ends before the man at the wheel had time to put her up in the wind. The four men on deck ran to the weather and threw overboard. One of the crew was in the forecastle and had barely time to scramble on deck when the water poured down in torrents. Who else threatened the ballast shifted and in a few minutes her keel was clean out of water. The boat was on the lee quarter and of course could not be righted. Everyone on board was in a panic. The skipper, Peter Greene, and his son, Elton Sheppard's schooner Salva, of Indian Islands, which was about half a mile to windward, was seen putting about and coming down to their rescue. The crew on her had seen the Minerva go over and made no delay in putting about. Skipper Sheppard launched his boat and took the crew on board. An attempt was made then to get at the men's boxes and other belongings but without success. A heavy log was on and there was a risk the boat getting stove against the side and they rowed back to the Salva. The wind had increased in the meantime and after doubling round the sails they reached port safely. The Minerva is insured but the crew lost all their property. The skipper had \$350 in his box, his brother \$250, and J. Davis \$70. The other members of the crew had small amounts ranging from \$10 to \$20. On arrival the wrecked crew called on Hon. S. D. Blandford, who made arrangements to send out a tug in order to search for and tow in the Minerva. The Ingraham sailed accordingly at daylight. The Minerva was in her ordinary ballast and had no cargo.

Hon. John Harvey Replies to "Terra Nova."

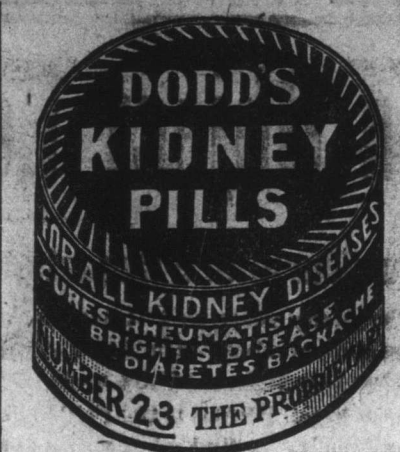

Sir—Parts of the letter of your correspondent "Terra Nova" seem to call for some reply from me.

In his letter he expresses the fear that we shall sacrifice too much if we allow Gloucester free bait. Does he not see that if under present conditions Canada obtains free entry for her fish, and if under that arrangement she is able to supply the American market with fish, as she will do, it can make no great difference to us whether we give the Gloucester bankers bait or not. All or most of the fish the American market will take will be caught on Newfoundland bait, not in that case Newfoundland will get nothing whatever in return for it, on the contrary there is every reason to suppose that it will be repaid that we shall refuse to give the Canadians any bait. But, there's the rub: I do not know where the rub is. As I pointed out in a previous letter that is our defence. It is a somewhat doubtful proposition upon which to bank however, and I must also point out once again that the question raised is not simply whether we want Reciprocity or not, the question is whether we want to see Nova Scotia getting it under present conditions with ourselves excluded, a very different thing.

Again, it is argued that we must not give Gloucester free bait because we do not do so ourselves. Now "Terra Nova" quoting your Editorial, appears to argue elsewhere (quite innocently, I think) that because only 20,000 qts. of Newfoundland fish go to Porto Rico, we shall lose very little indeed, if we lose that market.

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much their own way and were "act" the matter to which, up to a few months ago, we practically never shipped anything is of no moment whatever. Besides this your correspondent states that in any case we cannot cure our fish for, or ship it to the American market. If that is so then why worry, as your correspondent seems to do, about letting Gloucester have free bait, and how can we "handicap ourselves" any more in that market? The arguments, as such, do not carry much force.

The fact is that in realising our annual catch of fish, every little helps. The fact also is that, notwithstanding the moderate amount we ship there, Porto Rico is to-day a very important market for us. Three years ago, as every fish exporter in St. John's knows, Porto Rico demand, competing with the Brazilian buyers who apparently had things pretty "ing according," simply saved the situation from collapse. And at the present moment the price of Large and Medium Codfish is fully 50c. per quintal higher than it would otherwise be just because a few schooner loads of green fish were shipped to Gloucester during the late fall and winter. It is the small margin of excess or shortage on the normal, which within wide limits governs commercial values. Every additional consumer of our staple benefits us not alone by what he eats but, perhaps even more, through the competition which is excited by the fact of his existence.

I entirely differ with "Terra Nova" on some other matters. I say nothing whatever about fresh fish, but there is in the nature of the case no reason why fish cannot be cured here for the American market. Everyone is now demanding improved methods of cure and extended markets. There is no reason why Labrador fish or Bank or Shore fish should not be so cured, on the contrary there is every reason why they should. Your correspondent states, upon what authority I do not know, that the owners of Banking schooners in our Southern Bays are totally opposed to Reciprocity which includes free bait to Americans. I know some who think differently.

I must also point out once again that the question raised is not simply whether we want Reciprocity or not, the question is whether we want to see Nova Scotia getting it under present conditions with ourselves excluded, a very different thing.

The statement that "the Nova Scotia catch as given by me is erroneous," must have been made under some misapprehension for I never gave the Nova Scotia catch at all. Items from Montreal.

A recent fire in Longue Pointe Ward left eleven families homeless. The fire started in a grocery, and as soon as it was discovered an alarm was sent in. It is rumored that the firemen did not respond instantly; anyway, before they arrived on the scene other buildings had caught and no less than six adjoining houses were destroyed. Damages amount to \$18,000 with only \$3,000 insurance.

There is a good deal of opposition to the plan of city for paving the streets. The people are willing to have good streets but are not willing to pay.

The "Gazette" reports Sir Edward Morris discussing in New York the formation of a short line route between Liverpool, Newfoundland, and Cape Charles, Labrador. It will necessitate building a new railway line to the Labrador. It is also reported that Sir Edward has stated that if Canada and U. S. A. have Reciprocity he hopes to see it between U. S. A. and Newfoundland. Secretary Knox although quite willing, will not have anything to do with this question until it is decided what happens in the case of Canada. He would, he states, like to see the prohibition on pulpwood exported from Newfoundland to the U. S. removed. Is this a shadow, and do coming events cast their shadows before?

On the night of May 10th the question of Confederation between Canada and Newfoundland was discussed in the House of Commons at Ottawa. Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that no effort had been made in this direction since the offer of 1894 was rejected. Mr. Fielding added that it would be a mistake for Canada to take any step in the matter just now. The public men of Newfoundland know the sentiment of the Canadian Government in this matter and he thought any effort now would be misinterpreted by the people of the island.

The graduating students of McGill University held their valedictory banquet at the Royal Victoria College on Wednesday night. Representatives of each Faculty spoke eulogizing McGill and expressing regret at leaving. There are eleven graduating Master of Science; ninety-five Bachelor of Science; sixty-four Bachelor of Arts; sixteen Bachelor of Law. The Faculty of Medicine has not closed yet.

An early closing bill in connection with public houses and liquor saloons came into force on Saturday night last. This was the first dry night Montreal has ever known. The effect was greatly noted.

A case of small-pox developed in Westmount recently. It was transferred to a hospital and is being treated there. This has caused quite a scare in that section of the city.

The Governor-General opened the twelfth Annual Horse Show here on May 9th. The number of spectators was greatly in excess of that of previous years, and it is expected that this will prove the most successful show yet.

On Thursday last a drunken maniac became possessed of a revolver and proceeded to shoot at the crowd passing through the street. Before he was disarmed he had shot and wounded a policeman and a citizen.
