


Special to Evening Telegram MALTA, Jan. 24.

Sir Halliday pleaded the doctrine of "extraterritoriality" - that is, the King's writ does not run in a Foreign Embassy. Lord Salisbury made short work of this. In effect he said, " have nothing to do with the Chinese Legation, but you are a British subject, and if you don't release this man it will be worse for you." This threat was effective. Two men were sen from Scotland Yard to the Legation and Sir Halliday Macartney was re quired to deliver the prisoner. He handed the key of the room to one of the detectives and showed them


