The Portia's Rough Voyage.

The s.s. Portia, Capt. T. Fitzpatrick, arrived here at 1.30 p.m. yesterday from the westward after a very stormy trip. Leaving here on Wednesday, the 10th inst., she met a W.N.W. blizzard, and did not reach Cape Broyle until 4 p.m., and then a terrific snow storm raged until 3 a.m. Thursday, the 11th, during which time the ship lay in port. She reached Ferryland at 10 a.m., and then continued on to Fermeuse. She left there at noon and took 7 hours to get to Trepassy. Trepassy harbor was filled with ice and the ship forced her way to the wharf and landed her freight. There being only 11 feet of water there, the ship caught fore and aft and was aground for about an hour. Later the ship put out two anchors and rode out a heavy storm until 4 a.m. Saturday. Before she reached St. Mary's another snow storm overtook her with a gale of S. E. wind, which lasted until 4 p.m. She then went up to Salmonier and on returning to St. Mary's went up to Riverhead and remained until 4 a.m. Sunday, then started for Placentia and was there at noon and had to haul to the railway pier, the Roads being blocked with ice, and here a number of passengers were taken on board, including the crew of the wrecked schooner Portland. She left Placentia at 1 p.m. Sunday and the following Wednesday left Port aux Basques for Bonne Bay, where she arrived at 1 p.m. Thursday. The ship could not get up the Humber owing to ice. She left Bonne Bay Thursday night and was at Port aux Basques at 3 p.m. Friday on the return. Before she reached Rose Blanche she met dense fog Friday night and did not get in until daylight Saturday. She was at Richard's Harbor at midnight Sunday and arrived at Placentia at 6 p.m. Monday. Here she had a S. E. snow storm and in an hour the wind veered to N.W. with snow squalls. Tuesday night she met another snow storm and remained at Fermeuse all night, but after that had a good time to port. She brought a small freight and these passengers: Const. Gardiner, Capt. While working on the S. S. Kanawha. While at work on the S. S. Kanawha repairing the engine Mr. Geo. Kepple was seized with an attack of illness yesterday at noon and as he crossed the dock to go to his home he suddenly collapsed and fell. He was taken up tenderly by his fellow workmen and carried into the Branch Customs office near by. A police call to the Station brought Head Constable O'Leary, Sergt. Byrne, Sergt. Noseworthy. They worked the first aid system for nearly an hour but could not restore the vital spark. Dr. Cowperthwaite by this time arrived, and after examining the man pronounced him dead. Deceased who was 58 years of age was a faithful and trusted employee of the R. N. Co. 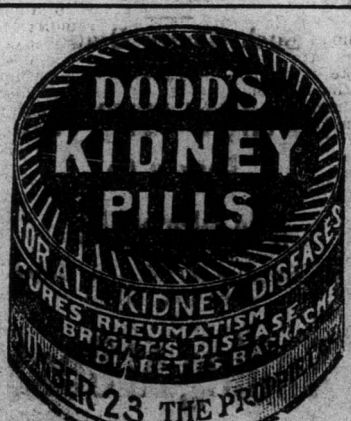

LONDON, Jan. 24.
So far no action is announced by the British Government with regard to the seizure by Italians of a number of Turkish officers, including the famous Colonel Piza Bey, from the British steamer Africa, in the Red Sea. As the Declaration of London, which permits such seizure, has not been ratified by Britain, a move may be made by the British Government at any time. The stoppage of the Austrian Lloyd steamer Bregenz yesterday in the Red Sea is regarded as likely to lead to exchanges between Austria and Italy.

PARIS, Jan. 24.
Italy's reply to France will agree to give up the Turks surrendered by the French steamer Manon, when that vessel was detained by Italian authorities; but as an act of homage to help France, without prejudice. According to a special despatch from Rome, examination of the prisoners at Cagliari by a committee of doctors sent by the Italian government, showed that two possessed regular physician's diplomas, one a surgeon's diploma, and the other prisoner's were ordinary ambulance attendants and nurses. It is not known whether they will be able to prove their identity.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Jan. 24.
The activity of Italian war vessels in the Red Sea is causing increasing uneasiness in shipping and insurance circles. Several large insurances have been effected during the past few days at Lloyd's in this connection. A premium of 5 per cent. is accepted to cover the risk on the outbreak of hostilities between France and Italy in the course of the next four months, although there is no apparent reason for such an occurrence. A premium of 6 per cent. is paid on risk of an outbreak of war between Britain, France and Germany within the next six months. The Italian action in stopping steamers, irrespective of nationality and searching them for officers and contraband, is believed to be evidence of the determination of the Italian Government to put an end to Turkish existence in Tripoli as speedily as possible. It is thought, however, that the Italian activity may give rise to complications with those

European Powers whose shipping is being thus put to inconvenience.

BIRMINGHAM, Jan. 24.
The annual conference of the British Labor party opened here to-day. Ben Turner is the President of the Conference. The address of welcome to the delegates stated that the past year had been one of industrial unrest, which had redounded to the benefit of labor. Apart from Parliament, the workman has been able to secure higher wages, fewer hours and better regulations. It has been a glorious year, said the President. Our business, he continued, is to make the Labour Party the dominant political party in the State. Slowly and surely we are developing in favor of public ownership. Scores of thousands of workmen who have joined trades unions have become Socialists.

MALTA, Jan. 24.
King George and Queen Mary, on their arrival on board the Medina from Bombay, will be accorded a great Anglo-French welcome here. Besides the British Mediterranean fleet, which will be present in full strength, a squadron of French warships will join in the greeting, and thus mark the friendship existing between Britain and France. The city of Valetta is thronged with British and French visitors, especially to participate in the festivities. The King and Queen intend to remain here until Jan. 27th.

LONDON, Jan. 24.
The United States minister at Peking has called in all Americans living in the outlying parts of the city, according to a news agency despatch from Tien Tsin received yesterday. The Imperial Army and Yuan Shi Kai's force of Chinese troops is constantly increasing and a serious conflict may be precipitated at any time.

Bait Depots Required.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick of the Portia we learn that there is plenty of codfish up on the West Coast, but during the past two weeks stormy weather has prevented the men getting on the ground, except for two days. There is a fair complement of bait brought from Bonne Bay and Bay of Islands and a considerable reserve of salted squid. There are no hering either at Portune or Connaigre Bays and the outlook for hankers getting early bait is poor indeed. Capt. Fitzpatrick says it is a crime that there is not a supply of frozen squid in cold storage depots on the S. W. coast. These fish are on the coast in myriads from August until late in November, but beyond a few taken and salted, none are cured for bait purposes. Next spring fully 100 bankers, he says, will be ready to prosecute the voyage by the latter part of February and the 1st March. Having no squid, these vessels, manned with 1,500 men, will be idle for 30 days, whereas if cold storage depots for squid were in existence, they could go to the Banks with their fresh frozen squid and would take big fares. He thinks that each of these vessels in that period would average 500 qts. cod, which would realize \$300,000 at least if they had the frozen squid bait. This is a great loss both to the people of the places along the S. W. coast and the country generally.

Gold Found Near Manitoba.

Manitoba, Mann., January 17.—This village, 60 miles north of Winnipeg is in the throes of great excitement as the result of finding gold nuggets north of the town in the black sand. All shops are closed. Two hundred claims have been staked and the rush has apparently only begun. A Klondyke prospector was on the ground and claims the find to be the richest in his experience. He examined the nuggets and pronounced them genuine. Some black sand was washed and also showed traces of gold.

Honest People.

The Portia this trip took to their homes from Placentia the crew of the wrecked schooner Portland. The captain of the vessel paid a well deserved tribute to the honesty of the people of Placentia. While the vessel was there wrecked the people who salvaged the cargo never touched any of the men's belongings and not an article of apparel or even a rope strand was stolen. As a matter of fact the residents extended every help to the crew in the matter of securing their clothes and effects, and the skipper of the vessel said he would never forget their kindness.

There passed our house the other day a man in a cart leading two horses.

One of these horses was hanging back with all his might and main, fussing at the bit and altogether having a most terrible time. And, of course, the hard-

er he pulled the worse it hurt him, and every now and then the man in the cart had to yank the rope to get him along at all.

The other horse was being hustled along at the same pace, of course, but he never lagged at all, and consequently his bit wasn't pulled, and he looked quite comfortable and cheerful. Yes, horses can look cheerful, dejected, or cross. If you don't believe they have expression, it's just because you never really looked at them.

I suppose you could see this paragraph coming before you reached it, but, really, wasn't there a perfect an-

alogy in that little scene to the way human folks act?

Household Notes.

A few drops of paraffine added to the shoe blacking will impart a good polish to damp shoes and also help to preserve the leather.

Combs will soon warp and break if washed with water. They should be cleaned with a good, stiff, dry toothbrush or nailbrush.

A variety may be secured by baking potatoes with a slice of bacon inside. The bacon is put into a hole made by an apple corer.

Meat loaf of chopped veal or beef can be made more moist if three or four tablespoonfuls of cream are added just before baking.

Few skins can stand glycerine, and it should never be used without being diluted. Otherwise the skin will become dry and parched.

A few tiny pieces of lemon rind added to a cream sauce for oysters, fish or lobster, give a decidedly piquant and dainty flavor.

Washing soda should not be used upon china, as it will take off the glaze. Try clear hot water, but not hot enough to crack the china.

A French dainty, possible from canned goods is sliced French goose liver, served on lettuce, with either French dressing or mayonnaise.

When running dates, figs or raisins through the food chopper, add a few drops of lemon juice to prevent the fruit from clogging the chopper.

To make a tough steak tender, rub it on both sides with vinegar and olive oil, thoroughly mixed, and allow it to stand for two hours before cooking.

A tasty salad is made of chopped celery, seasoned with chopped mint and mayonnaise. Put between slices of bread, it makes a dainty supper sandwich.

If table silver is placed in hot soapsuds immediately after being used, and dried with a soft, clean cloth, much of the work of polishing will be saved.

To revive root vegetables that have withered, slice off the end of each and lay in cold water. In a few hours they will be as hardy and healthy as ever.

Always lower the temperature of the oven somewhat fifteen or twenty minutes after a roast has been placed in it. This will insure that the juices will be retained.

Water may be added to the beaten white or beaten whole egg used for dipping croquettes. The proportion is a tablespoonful for the white and twice as much for the whole egg.

Brown bread, cut into thin slices and spread with strawberry jam or peach marmalade, and covered with a layer of cream cheese, makes novel and delicious luncheon sandwiches.

Though steam heat is cleaner, generally than a furnace, it will soil the curtains and walls much more, especially if the radiators are placed close to the wall or under the windows.

A dry shampoo of cornmeal is very cleansing if properly done. The meal should not be allowed to get too close to the scalp, and should be brushed out with a gentle, lifting stroke.

Electric Chair

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 16.—The recent agitation for the abolition of the death penalty in this state, which is favored by Governor Dix, and Col. J. P. Scott, superintendent of state prisons, resulted last night in the introduction of bills by Senator T. D. Sullivan and Assemblyman Kopp, of New York, which, if enacted, will banish the electric chair.

The bill makes the penalty for murder in the first degree life imprisonment. Similar measures also were introduced by Assemblyman Brooks, of New York, and Assemblyman Merritt, of Schenectady, the latter the Socialist member.

Last Night's Hockey Match.

An immense gathering of spectators were present in the Prince's Rink last night to see the hockey match between the Crescent and Victoria teams. Both were in good form and being excellent teams a good game was anticipated, and this was realized. Indeed, had the stick landed little further up on the temple the man would have been killed. R. Stick, seeing Herder hurt, went after his aggressor, and the three men were penalized. A strict enquiry should be held into this and the aggressor should not be given an opportunity to repeat such conduct.

The game began at 7.30 sharp, and the line up was:
Crescents—Thomas, goal; Herder, point; Marshall, cover; R. Stick, rover; Woods, left; Storey, centre; L. Stick, right.

Victorias—Yinnicombe, goal; Parsons, point; Tobin, cover; Bulley, rover; Shortall, left; McPherson, centre; O'Dea, right.

When the rubber was put in play the Crescents were quickly on it and Marshall had an unavailing attempt to score. McPherson being off-side, the Vics. lost a chance. O'Dea was put to the fence for fouling Woods, and both teams now put up lively work. McPherson and Herder now made clever shots for goals but were blocked. When after 25 minutes' play, Bulley hit up No. 1 goal for the Vics. The Crescents now worked hard to score but Yinnicombe saved well, and after Tobin was penalized for fouling, the half closed with the Vics, 1; Crescents, 0.

SECOND HALF.
At the opening L. Stick had a try but failed, when a mix-up occurred near Crescents' goal and Shortall put in No. 2 for Vics. Marshall hit up the first goal for the Crescents 2 minutes later and most exciting play on both sides succeeded. Yinnicombe was kept busy defending his goal for a while. Bulley was punished for fouling in a scrimmage, when soon after McPherson, with a good run, put up No. 3 for the Vics, following it a few minutes later with No. 4. McPherson soon after shot the Vics. 5th goal, and the game concluded a few minutes later. The game was fast and both teams put up a fine exhibition. Present refereeing was impartially given.

That Accident on the Portia.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick of the Portia we learn particulars of the death of the man Sesk which occurred at Ferryland on Thursday the 11th inst. The man was a passenger on the ship for Ferryland and had a skiff load of freight on board. He sent two friends who were on the ship ashore in the mail boat to call his sons and tell them to come with a skiff to take the freight and at 7 a.m. they loaded their skiff by the ship's side. The man's sons were in the skiff and Sesk was on the deck. The second mate told the men to drop the skiff along to the ladder so that the man might get into the skiff safely. Instead Sesk caught a rope hanging over the ship's side and as he went to drop into the boat lost his hold and fell striking the gunwale with great force. The mate called Capt. Fitzpatrick and told him the man's head was badly cut and bleeding profusely. The man was not unconscious. He was taken from the boat and brought into the ship's music room and Dr. Thompson of Hermitage Bay who was a passenger on board and Rev. Monsignor Walsh of Renew's attended to him. He was then wrapped up in rugs and quilts and sent ashore in the skiff. Neither the doctor nor the priest thought the man seriously hurt as he was conscious, but he died shortly after and before he reached his home.

Schooners Clear.

Seven American herring vessels which were frozen in at Bonne Bay since the 10th of January were towed out to open water by the S. S. Portia. Capt. Fitzpatrick, last week while the steamer was there on her regular call, Capt. Fitzpatrick took out a single one in the first tow and then two at each trip. It is likely that the vessels would be frozen in all the winter were it not for the action of Capt. Fitzpatrick. The vessels are loaded with herring for the Gloucester market.

"The Lights of London."

Here and There.

REPAIRS TO GASPE.—The repairs to the Gaspe are being rushed ahead as quickly as possible. A large number of men are now at the job. She left here last Saturday for Pernambuco and in a storm with all sail set had her head gear carried away and jib-boom smashed off, etc.

WEST COAST FISHERY.—Very little fishing has so far been done on the S. West Coast the past two weeks owing to stormy weather. There was a good supply of frozen herring brought up from Bay of Islands by the S. S. Portia. There is also an ample supply of salt squid on hand, and should the weather remain cool no doubt good work will be done.

HALIBUT FISHERY.—We learn from Captain Fitzpatrick that the halibut fishery on the West Coast has opened successfully. There is a good sign of fish on the grounds and with favourable weather the fishermen are hopeful of doing good work. At Francois Cove one boat's crew have done remarkably well. There is a brisk demand for the fish just now in Nova Scotia towns.

The Sad Fate of Wm. Sesk.

On the morning of the 11th inst. a sad and lamentable occurrence happened at Ferryland, when a fine sturdy fisherman, while trying to get his goods from on board the S. S. Portia, received serious injury and a chill, which resulted a few hours later in his death. The accident happened as he was letting himself down by a rope from the steamer's deck to his own boat, which lay alongside, partly loaded with freight, and just as he let himself over the ship's rail, the rope suddenly gave way, precipitating him into the sea where his head struck the gunwale of the boat in the descent. He was immediately pulled out in a half unconscious condition by the men in his boat. A storm, with intense cold, was raging off shore at the time, and the Portia, being further off in the harbor than usual, considerable delay occurred before he was got on shore to warmth and medical treatment. In fact, poor Sesk was chilled to the heart, and in as much danger from the chill as from his injury when they got him to his home. Captain Fitzpatrick is blamed for the delay in the landing of the unfortunate man, and the fishermen of this place are so aroused over the state of affairs in general, which led indirectly to the untimely death of their comrade, that a public meeting was held here on the 15th, when the following resolutions were drawn up and unanimously adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the fishermen of Ferryland, deeply deplore the sad fate of William Sesk, one of our most industrious and sober fishermen, who died a few hours after receiving serious injury and a chill while trying to get his goods from the S. S. Portia on the morning of the 11th inst.

BE IT RESOLVED, we claim that the late William Sesk was not under the influence of liquor when the fatal accident occurred.

BE IT RESOLVED, that we condemn the unkindness of Captain Fitzpatrick, who refused, when asked by Sesk's son, to move the ship near Messrs. Goodridge & Sons' wharf, to admit of his father being speedily landed to receive medical attendance, as there was a storm raging off shore and the men in Sesk's boat feared they would not be able to reach land without a lot of time being lost, they realizing, and rightly so, that delay under the weather conditions then prevailing, would possibly prove fatal to the injured man.

BE IT RESOLVED, that we deeply sympathize with his widow and orphans in the loss of their bereaved winner, a good husband and a kind father.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED, that we deeply deplore the want of a public wharf here and take this opportunity of calling upon our representatives to take this matter in hand during the coming session of the House of Assembly.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these resolutions be sent to the press for publication.

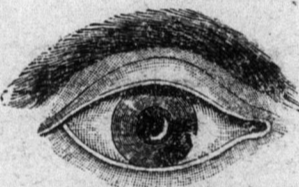

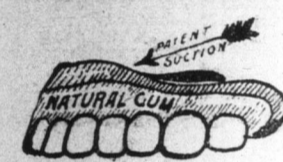

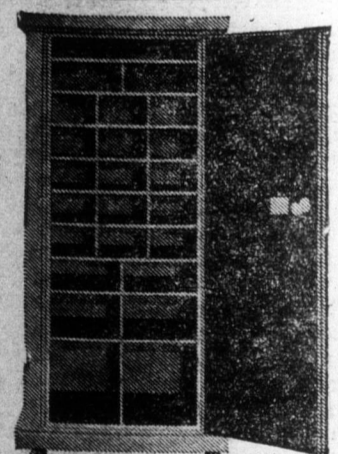
