#### The Government **Must Trust the** Opposition.

We are pleased to find that the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, has seen fit to make a statement as to local conditions brought about by the Cowley, Mrs. Graff, J. B. Orr, C. war. We should have been far more pleased had he made the statement from his place in the House of Assembly. He assures us that the Gov-ernment is "prepared to put into ef-fect any measure tending in any way to improve the situation which the consensus of opinion considers to be desirable.' That is right and proper, so far as it goes, but it would have been much better had he the Legislature in session, and was obtaining from it legislative authority to exercise powers which may be necessary, but lack at present legal sand tion. Moreover, now that the Admiralty accepted yesterday the offer of the Newfoundland Government to increase the Naval Reserve to 1,000 men and that the offer of 500 men for land force has also been accepted, it be comes necessary to make proper financial provision for it. We agree with the Prime Minister that "it is time when we must all keep our heads and work together." We endorse the words fully, which relate to co-operation and trust in one another. The Government must trust the Opposition, and the Opposition will not be less backward than the the evil days which are before us. Sir Robert Borden is calling the Canadian Parlian ent together, and the Leader of the Opposition there has intimated he will support measures intimated he will support measures which the situation demands. Moreover, it was on the floor of the House of Commons that Bonar Law and John Redmond offered their spirited and cordial support for the common defence of the Empire. At the present time the local trouble, outside of war risks to shipping which are now falling, as the Admiralty is obtaining a greater command of the sea, in reality arises from the fact that owing to the moratorium prevailing in ing to the moratorium prevailing in England, the clearing of exchange is at a standstill in London, and as our markets in Brazil and the Mediter-ranean have the bills they give for our fish handled in the clearing houses there, there is a difficulty at present in obtaining payment for such fish as may be marketed. The letter from the Prime Minister, which we publish elsewhere in this issue, indicates that the British Government is taking steps to anord relief for like trouble, and the situation probably may be celarer 'n a day or two.

But we are by no means satisfied that it will cover the main difficulty far as we can learn the British Government has affered relief to cover exchanges for good sent to the British exchanges for food sent to the British Isles which will be consumed there. The relief we hear is primarly intended to facilitate the shipping of food there from other countries and is not aimed at facilitating exports from British ports to foreign ports such as the Mediterranean and the Brazil. We shall be pleased to hear to the contrary, but we fear the facts are as stated.

In any case, however, we commend to the attention of our readers the common sense words of another cor-respondent, who advises us all to economize and prepare to meet the days of trial which are before us.
