The Municipal Elections. Time was when in our good town the candidates, especially for the higher offices, were not slow in announcing their intentions and ta-king the field. We have seen—and that not many years ago—when the town was kept in a ferment for six or seven weeks by opposing candidates and their friends, when ward meetings and public meetings and private caucuses were held almost every night, and when the aspirants for Municipal honours rushed frantically through the town, with book in hand, boring every poor fellow whom they happened to meet, and humbly soliciting his vote and influence. These citing his vote and influence. These candidate in Welland, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of members and ward politicians, who daily exhausted their eloquence and arguments in behalf of their pet candidate, and nightly drank deep to his success at some hole-and-corner meeting in some out-of-the-way tavern.


