The present municipal campaign will soon be a thing of the past, but about the last of the speeches has been made, the canvassers' returns are nearly all in, and the usual number of promises are in shape to be broken. All that remains to be done is to straighten up the books and get out the votes. As the many who have followed his lead have taken on to them their native sands by Anglo-Egyptian arms is apparently as remote a contingency as ever it was. It is true that reports of Gen. Stevenson's victories over them are frequently disseminated from Cairo, but the outside world has learned to liberally discount the value of these victories. They accomplish nothing permanent. The Arabs run away, but they return to fight some other day. They have nothing to lose by defeat, except a percentage of their lives which they value but lightly, and have much to gain, in the way of arms and booty, by any victory that chance may give them. An Egyptian official expresses the thoroughly oriental idea, that the cheapest way to settle them is by giving them a lot of schemes and a few medals. The difficulty with this scheme is that these robber chiefs will not say a word. The situation looks none of its perplexities by the effluxion of time. Should Mr. Gladstone come back to power shortly he would find the Egyptian question just about where he left it, but he would be resigned officer. We hear less of it now than we did then, only because it is overshadowed by questions that come nearer to the British heart and hearth than it does.

The Chinese in California. The Chinese are no longer so popular with the employers of California as they once were. One reason for this is that they have imbibed a number of the Mexican man's notions concerning the right to organize and strike for higher wages. Another reason is the discovery that what is bad for one class of the community is bad for all classes. The Caucasian workman is a customer. He sets up a home, supports a family, pays taxes, serves the commonwealth, and leaves what he earns and saves in the country. The Mongolian is of little account as a consumer and of no account as a citizen. What he saves he carries away with him to his own country, and he saves pretty nearly everything he gets. It is, therefore, a great mistake to suppose that the workingman is the only one who feels the pressure of Chinese competition. The cigar manufacturers of San Francisco are now bringing on hundreds of workmen from the east to fill the places of the Chinese who have been let go. This movement assumes the proportions predicted of it, it will do something to relieve the pressure on the overcrowded labor market of the east.

A cable dispatch which gives a detailed description of the condition of the British shipping interest, particularly that portion of it more intimately associated with the great Scottish ports, where scores of valuable vessels are said to be rusting away at their wharves, proceeds to say that the one bright spot upon the horizon of the ship owners is the report from the Clyde that few new vessels are in course of construction there. This is a very well for the ship owners, but it is quite a different thing for the ship builders, with whom business has been bad enough of late years.
