BERLIN, April 18.—The criminal court in Oldenburg has condemned the Lutheran pastor, Muller, to 14 years' hard labor for the crime of obtaining money by false pretences and forgery.

The trial has been one of the most notable in recent years. More than 50 witnesses were summoned to testify to their losses through Muller, and about 75 more were present to witness the trial. He was convicted on the charge against the pastor was completed within two hours.

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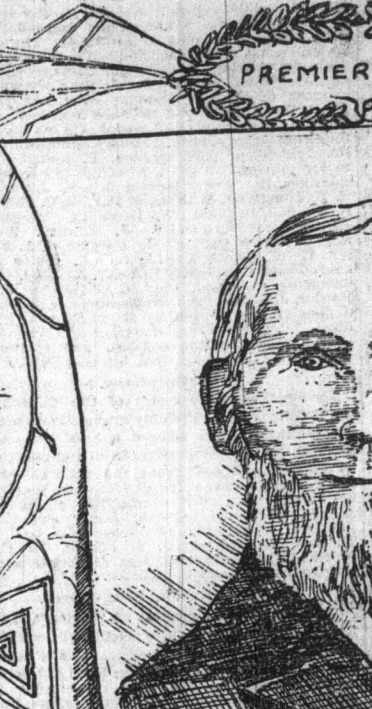

BRITISH LIBERALS WORRIED.

A FOURFOLD SPLIT IS NOW THE ANTI-PARNELLITES IMMINENT. Gladstone's Present Evapor Rupture by Outlining His Home Rule Scheme, in Case of His Return to Power—An English Clergyman Endorses Dr. Parkes' View—Weekly Announcements in London.

LONDON, April 18.—The Liberals are much disturbed in mind over the increasing dissensions in the Irish party. A prominent Irish member among them would declare of a fourfold split of the anti-Parnellites was untrue, but that trouble had been brewing in the ranks of the party since Mr. Gladstone's return to power.

There was, he added, no leader yet sufficient influence to rally the party together. There were various cliques, of which that headed by Healy was the strongest, the one least in importance. Many members were "on the fence" and would join whichever faction proved its ability to command the party.

Mr. Gladstone is being urged to give an outline of the Home Rule scheme that he has in mind to bring forward in case of his return to power. This, it is thought by many, would have the effect of keeping the Irish party together, as they would be looking to him for a common object of their devotion. Whether or not Mr. Gladstone will accept the challenge is not clear.

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
