

The only thing that is not quite understood is that the Government should have deemed it necessary to issue an official denial of the report that connects the name of Prince George with that of Miss Mary Seymour, and there are people who are fill-natured enough to 'draw attention to the fact that the last occasion on which an official denial of this kind was made was during the reign of King George III., when it was held advisable to put a stop to the story that the Prince Regent, afterwards King George IV. had contracted a secret marriage with the beautiful Mrs. Fitzherbert.

Now, it has been proved over and over again by means of documentary evidence and other incontrovertible testimony that a marriage did take place between Mrs. Fitzherbert and the Prince Regent, and hence the parallel drawn between the two cases is rather to the disadvantage of the present denial.
