The Proposed Water Works System

Mr. F. W. Thorold, consulting engin-eer, Toronto, who was requested by the Council to make estimate of a water works system for Watford, presented his report at a special meeting of the Council on Friday evening. The report is a volumnious one of about 20 typewritten pages with maps and blue prints and goes fully into the matter. The introduction deals with the classes of fire risks as classed by the-Underwriters, and states that with /a proper water works system a much greatclasses of fire risks as classed by the Underwriters, and states that with a proper water works system a much great-er reduction than 25 cents per hundred will be granted for well-constructed buildings. To secure this reduction the Underwriters require two standard fire streams.delivering 208 gallons of water through 250 feet of hose. To obtain this supply would require seven 6 inch wells under the same roof. If this is not pos-sible an alternative of a steel storage tank to hold 350,000 gal. This would supply two streams for 14 hours. As fires in towns this size do not last that long, a smaller tank good for 3½ hours would do for Watford. A suitable tank for storage of water for fire purposes would be one 16 ft. in diameter and 71 ft. high, and a suitable tank for domestic purposes would require to be 16 ft. in diameter, 20 ft. deep and elevated about 70 ft. above the ground. By combining these two tanks in one we would have a common stand pipe 16 ft. in diameter and 90 ft. high, holding 113,000 gals. This system would be cheaper than concrete tanks in the ground. Before going further with the work it will be necessary to thoroughly test the

A concluding para-graph of the report says :-- "If there was no doubt about the quantity of water to be obtained and the permanancy of the supply, we would have no hesitation in ad-vising you to proceed with the construc-tion of this plant at once, but as we be-lieve there are some doubts to be cleared up first we think it our honest duty to up first, we think it our honest duty to advise a severe test of the wells, even at considerable cost, before any attempt is made at the construction of the system."
