

WHEREAS a Water Works Sys-tem for the Village of Watford has been completed at the cost of Fourteen thousand dollars in addition to the estimated cost thereof which

AND WHEREAS the present existing debt of the said Village of Watford secured by debentures is the sum of \$73776.36 and no part of the said sum is in arrears.

AND WHEREAS for paying off the principal sum of Fourteen thou-sand dollars and interest, it will be necessary to raise in the several years during the currency of the debentures the following sums,—

1. That it shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality, for the purposes aforesaid, to borrow the said sum of Fourteen thousand dollars, and to issue debentures of the said Municipality to that amount in sums of not less than One Hundred

for the payment of interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date, and shall be issued within two years after the day on which this By-law is passed and may bear any date within such two years, and shall be payable in twenty annual instalments during the next twenty years after the time when the same are issued, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such twenty years shall be as set forth in the recitals

hereto.

3. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality, and he is hereby authorized and instruchereby authorized to be issued, and to cause the same to be signed by the Treasurer of the said Municipality, and the Clerk of the said Municipality is hereby authorized and directed to attach the seal of the said Municipality to the debentures. The interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer, and his signature may be printed, stamped, lithograph-

do or engraved.

4. The said debentures shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Watford. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of six and one-half per cent. per annum, com-puted from the First day of Janu-ary prior to the date of issue there-




