To the Editor of the Monitor PERSONAL PARAGRAPHS. I find there is some misunderstanding among the ratepayers of the Town as to the rate of traxation of \$1.25 on the hundred dollars, fixed by the Town Council for the G. T. Bohaker, of Annapolis, was in town Mr. A. M. Houre, of Halifax, was in town

dollars, fixed by the Town Council for the ensuing year. I would ask those ratepayers who think their taxes higher under incorporation than formerly, to take into consideration, in the first place, that our expenses the first year are considerably higher than they will be in subsequent years. For instance, the cost of purchasing a set of town books and seals is considerable, and would not be incurred again for some time. The expenses of two or more elections, in-stead of one, is another extra item of expen-diure; and so there are a number of small items which come into the estimates for this diture; and so there are a number of small items which come into the estimates for this year which will not have to be provided for again. They must also remember that the Coun-cil in this year's estimates had to tax the ratepayers for school purposes for eighteen months instead of tweive. The school year, as fixed by statute, is from Jalu until July, and the town year is from January to Jan-uary. In order to save complication in book-keeping, the Council thought it wise to make the school year and the town year the same, and instead of levying a rate for school purposes for only sufficient to meet school expenses from July last, (up to which time we had paid our school taxes into the county and from which time we were liable as a separate school section) to July 1898, a fund

they carry no armor. Their weapons con sist only of two large torpedo guns and a half dozen rapid fire pieces. The torpedo deetroyer, or chaser, is a submarine boat about seventy feet in length. It is circular in cross section, is propelled by six screws and has very great speed. Its crew will be four men. The torpedo gun is about twenty inches in calibre, and the torpedo is loaded much upon the usual principle. At the target firing angle the torpedo will attain a distance of about two and one-half miles, when it drops into the water, unless a quicker follinger ared by giving the point the controlling effect required. At the moment the projectile touches the water the steel case is detached, and the projectile gives itself a forward mation at the rate of about a mile a minute. The automobility of the torpedo is secured by a mechanism which functions the screw, and this is so arranged that when the torpedo hits its target its apparatus reverses quickly and gives a return motion of such velocity that the weapon is clear of the target before the delayed action of the fuse is in operation

Dangerous Diseases.

The terms contagious and infectious are not synonymous. A disease is contagious when it is transmitted from the sick to the well by personal communication or contact more or less intimate, and all contagious diseases are infectious-i. e., they are due to the introduction into the body of a suscep-tible individual of a living germ. But all infectious diseases are not contagious. Thus smallpox, scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria, influenza, etc., are infectious diseases which are contagious, while malarial fever, typhoid fever, yellow fever, cholera, pneumonia, itis, etc., are infectious diseases which perito are not contagious-at least they are only contagious under very exceptional circumstances and those in close communication with the sick as nurses, etc., do not contract these diseases as a result of such close association or contact. The generalization that all infectious dis-

eases are due to the introduction into the bodies of susceptible individuals of living germs capable of reproduction is based upon past 20 years as regarded the specific infection agents or germs of a considerable number of the diseases of this class. In some infectious diseases however, no such

positive demonstration has yet been made. 


