THE WARNER COMPROMISE.
Since writing on the Silver Question last week, we learn that the Warner Bill has been worked into a shape that is acceptable to the officials at Washington, as the best compromise that can be looked for at present.
It is understood that the legislation proposed will stop the coinage of the standard silver dollar, and in its place provide that the Government shall receive silver bullion, and issue therefor certificates on the basis of the value of the bullion in gold, to be fixed either by the current prices realized in London or Newr York, or by an average of the sales in the month preceding that in which the deposit is made, as may hereafter be determined.

The certificates are to be payable in bullion at the option of the Government, or in lawful money if the holder so desire, and they are to be a legal tender in all transactions between the Governmentand the people, excepting the payment of bonds of the United States or interest thereon.

The Bill is also understood to provide' for the continuance of the issue of silver certificates for standard dollars as at present, and the extension of the lav to provide for the issue of one and two dollar certificates as well.
The strict limitation of the legal tender quality to transactions between the

Government and the people, and the absence of this quality in so far as payments between citizens are concerned will remove a strong objection to, and grave suurce of danger in the existing coingge arrangements. T'hese bullion certilicates, lacking the character of "lawful money," cannot be forced into general circulation and clog the channels of commerce, for the banks will not be bound to accept them in payment of their ordinary commercial loans and discounts, nor will they be able to pay in them their obligations to the public.

The issue of shlver certificates in desomiuations of oue and two dollars will lead to the absorption of a large amount of the present stock of standard dollars, for there has been a great dearth of small bille for some time past, which the cumbrous silver dollar, from its weight and inconvenience for carriage could not supply. Such a use as this might employ filty to a hundred millions. As we stated last week the coins now on hand might be borne with if further coinage were stopped, and the burden would be rendered still lighter if they are utilized as the basis for the certhficates of small denominatious which it is proposed to issue.

If, theretore, the Warner Bill is carried on the lines we have discussed, namely the cessation of the coinage of standard dollars, and the limitation of the legal tender character of the bullion certificates, the danger of a departure from a yold standard will be very renote.

What the fate of the new certificates may be it is hard to say. As tickets for silver bullion at the market price they would always raintain their value at or near par, subject to suck fluctuations as the opposing influences may create: the demand for the certificates for payments to the Government, or for obtaining bullion, the greater or less amount of bullion deposited, etc., etc. It is to be noted that these certificates must, in the first place, be putinto circulation by the owners of the bullion, and not, as in the crse of the coined sidver, by the Government; and that the bullion deposited will always be practically "in the market," and, as part of the supply, help to affect the market price. Coined metal, if the coins are tokens, that is, represent more money than the actual palue of the metal they contain, is entirely out of the market; sothat, whatever support is given to the silver market by the purchases of the American Governmentat prosent, will, in the event of the Warner Bill passing, be wilhdrawn. This is a leature which creates dubt as to the reliance to be pluced on
the promised support of the silver men for the Bill in its last proposed form.

## THE BANK STAIEMENT.

The atatements of the banks for the 31st August have been iasued by the $\mathrm{De}^{-}$ partment at Ottawa.
'The most striking change for the month is the decrease in losns and discounts, which have fallen off nearly $\$ 50,000,000$. About one-halr of the decrease is in loans to the Dominion Government, loans on stocks and bonds, and other miscella. neous advances, of what may be called non-commercial character. But the ordinary loans and discounts have also fallen off nearly two millions and a half, which, after making full allowance for payment of Canadian Pacific puper, indicates that the stagnation of business still continues, and that the longed-for revival had not become apparent before the close of the month.
Nearly the whole of the money which has been repaid from loans has been placed abroad. The net foreign balances on the 31st July were $\$ 13,400,000$ at credit; on the 3 Ist August they were $\$ 18$,000,000 . The banks that have thus accumulated fuads abroad are no doubt doing so without present gain, but we presume that the near approach of the date when sterling usually touches the lowest rates for the season will enible them to invest their idle funds at a good protit. We would, however, venture the prophecy that a portion of the large supply of unemployed capital in New York is more than likely again to seek temporary use and prolit in buying sterling bills, and that the exchange market will be thus buoyed up above what may termed a natural level. As the difference between demand and sixty-day bills at present represents an interest rate of $2 \frac{1}{1}$ per cent per annum, the purchase of bills at a point where a profit in the exchange may be looked for as well is a very good investment for fuads lying idle, or lorned at 1 per cent.

The circulation of the banks has increased during the month $\$ 500,000$; which indicates some activity in the movement of the crope. Deposits remain stationary as a whole, but those of the general public sre reduced about $\$ 1,100,000$, the decrease being offiset by an increase in the balances due the Government by a similar amount,

Taking the return as a whole, any indications of revival in trade, so far as these reflect themselves in the monetary position, are entirely wanting. They do no always show themselves here at once, but the returns are stroing corroboration of
the trade reports as to the general dullness. This and the succeeding months no doubt will show the improvement usual at this season of the year; but, as far as the monetary position is concerned, the yield from a failly abundant harvest, and the avails of the Government and Canadian Pacific loans in England will only bring additional money to coffers already overtlowing, which will not be relieved until euterprise and activity again resume their sway.
Still it cannot be gainsaid that it is as wholesome a thing for the people, as a whole, to pay off their debts, as for the individual ; and after these days of entored liquidation we may fairly look for a revival on a sounder basis. The outlook is to us one for dull times rather fthan bad times, and though some weak houses may fail and others go out of business, therr absence trom the ranks will but improve the general tone of the rest.
We subjoin our usual abstract of the statement, and comparisons with previous returns. Perhaps the inost striking comparison would be oile made with the statements ol May last, showing the folluw. ing clianges in a quarter of a year :

'Ihe "available assets," leaving out of consideration the "balances due to other banks in Canada," which are practically cancelled every day in the clearings, and taking the net foreign belances only, show a marked difference, being now $\$ 43,000,000$, as against $\$ 21,000,000$, than.
On the other hand, the increase in the investments of the banks, their loans, discounts, etc., show but a very moderate appreciation of their earning power.

## LEAD PENCILS. (2).

## (Concluded.)

The forming-press is composed of a cast-iron well, 8 inches derp and four inches in diameter, inside measure, having a follower or plunger, like an oldfashioned anuage-stuffer. The material is moulded into the shape of the inside of the well, by working it with the hands as the potier wolles his clay, placed in
the well, and driven anug down with a hammer and wooden plug; the iron follower then comes down slowly, driven by a powerful screw.
In the lower end of the well, which is upright, is an opening of the exact size and shape, equare or round, desired for the leads; and as the follower presses upon the material, a thread spins out below and coils itself upon a bonrd phaced
underneath to catch it. A sufficient guantity being spun out for convenient handling, the board is removed and another put in its place. From this coil the lead is drawn off and straightened out upon boards of suitable length for three pencils, the back edge of the board having ajraised, straight edge against which the first length is placed; the next length laid snug against the first, and so on, till the board is full. when it is placed care. fully away for the leads to dry. When dry they are very brittle, and are cut into lengths for jencils, placed upright in cruchbles of graphite, made for this use, with straight sides and fitted with covers.

When the crucible is full the leads are covered over with fine graphite to exclude the air, and, as a farther precsution, the cover of the crucible is well luted on. I'he crucibles are then heated to a red heat, taken out of the oven and cooled, and the leads removed ready for use.
The next step is the preparstion of the wood. Only a soft, close-grained rood will answer, and the best is the Florida cedar.
The wood is sawn into pieces of the right length for a pencil, of a width suittable for six, and of half the thickness for pencils.
These blocks run through a machine that planes and grooves them, the grooves being the depth of half the size of the leads. The leads are then laid into the grooves of one piece, while the other piece of cedar exactly like it is coated with glue and laid on the first. These double pieces, or blocks, are then placed in a press, many of them together, till dry enough to proceed. Leaving the press they are solid blocks containing six leads equi-distant from each other, ready to be shaped into six pencils, and these blocks go through the first machine, that brings them to size, and then through the next machine, similar to a moulding-cutter, coming out six pencils from each block.
The machine which converts the block into pencils is of a nature of a planingmachine with a series of circular cutters above and below, like the mouldingmachines for wood working.
The effect of the upper and lower rows of cutters is, respectively, to cut a series of six beads, the joint effect being to make six cylinders from the block, the parts and positions of the cutters being so ac curately gauged as to 'eave the leads in the exact centre of each ylinder (or hexagon, as the case may be), and leave no mark upon the edges of the pencils where the action of the upper and under series of cutters meets at the middle of each pencil.

The knives in these shaping machines in order to do the work well should revolve at the rate of 4,500 revolutions per minute, and must run absolutely irue, as any weakness or tremor will destroy the finish on the surface of the wood, and make it necessary to adopt the old process of sand - papering each pencil, as still practiced by some manufucturers. 'Itse finish obtained by the machine is such that sand paper would roughen them. The round and hexagon or other shapes are produced in the same way. The pencils. are now ready to receive the color and finish, according to taste, and are then stamped and packed for market. Great care must be taken to have the rood dry, and it is better air-dried than kiln-dried.

The machine for slaping turns out the pencils from the sblocks at the rate of 72 per minute, or over 43,000 per day 'The varnishing and coloring of the surface is done by a machine at the rate of 120 per minute, or 72,000 per day, and they are polished byia machine at the rate of 100 per minute, or over 63,000 per day. All of these machines are attended by girls of about twelve years of age, one to each; no skilled labor being required.

There are ten distinct grades of hardness in the leads, shown by the grade stamps, as follows: VVS, very, very soft, for the deepest heavy shading. VS, very soft, for very deep shading. S., soft, for rapid shading in sketching, the softest grade for office use. SML, zoft medium, for general sketching, the popular grade for office or pocket. MB, medium black, for drawing or general use. M, medium, for office or stenographic, professional or desk use. MH., medium hard, for finer desk use or fine lines in drawing, $H$, hard, for bank use, or finer lines in drawing. VH, very hard, for architects and engineers, draughtsmen, etc., YVH, very, very hard, for the finest lines.

The $S, S M, M, I F$, and $V H$ are the five regular oflice grades. The whole ten grades are for artists. The SML and M are only made in the round black pencils with the gold stamp, and in the miaroon finish both round and hexagon shapes. But the five regular office grades of leads are all made in round and hexagon shapes in both the cedar finish and the new satin finish, and the whole ten distinct grades of lead are made of the hexagon shape only, both of these styles of finish being for artists and technionl uses.
The old method of sawing them out of solid blocks of graphite produced leads of rectangular shape, and they have been continued in that shape to the present. day; but the Dixon Company has intro-
duced round leads in round wood-making a decided improvement. The round leads are more easily sharpened, are stronger than the fitt shape, and more in harmony with the exterior of the finished pencils.

## "IRENCLI AND ENGLISI."

We do not intend to write an article on the time-honored school boy's game, whose name we borrow for heading; nor, after the manner of modern analysts of ancient fables, to use it for a simile of the diverse ways in which the two national. ities are believed (in some quarters) to be pulling. But we wish to say a word or two in deprecation of a certain tendency, which has of late shown itself on both sides, to say hard things of one another.

That the two races on the whole do not pull well together in this province is a fact we cannot but recognize; and it is one we regard with regret, in its bearing on our material interests, which alone are within the purview of this Journal. The two races are not necessarily antagonistic, as we see from the friendly manner in which they dwell together in other parts of Canada and. in the United States, but they do not readily combine. The Frenchman, gay, light-hearted and mercurial on the one hand, industrious, frugal and contented on the other, finds little to sympathize with in the slower Englishoman, with his harder qualities and his ambition and enterprise; nevertheless there is no reason why each should not respect the good. qualities of each other, and find, if not sympathy and liking, at least kindly toleration.

In our own city, at any rate, harmonious working is desirable and profitable on both sides. Leaving out of consideration the value to the community of the French commercial and manufacturing houses, we have a direct interest in the material well-being of the great laboring class. The existence of a large number of frugal and industrious people within the city, who depend on daily labor for their subsistence, has attracted manufactures, and built up certain industries on a làrge scale, which, in turn, provide the means of livelihood for numberless families.

The manufucturers could as ill dispense with the cheap, labor which makes their existence possible, as the laborers with the employment which provides them and their families with food and shelter and clothing. In our social fabric, therefore, the interests of both nationalities are closely interwoven.

For this reason, and in the interests of the commercial progress of the oity, we do counsel moderation on both fides, and
mutual forbearance, and friendly co* operation, especially at the present juncture. We are confronted withan epidemic which injures the fair fame of the city, and the material interests of citizens of every class. The weight and influence of the English-speaking business community should be used to its fullest extent to enforce measures for the public health, and to remove the illsavor which attaches to the city's good name, but let it be done without irritating and unkind words, which do harm and not good.

People in whom a horror of smax l-pox is ingrained, and who have grown up to regard vaccination as the ordinary and safest remedy, find it difficult to bear patiently with those whose traditions and customs are exactly contrary. But patience is here the first requisite, for no one will surrender his personal liberts in so personal matter, against his owin convictions, without a struggle, and a struggle to which, from its nature, we must accord some respect. But in saying this it must not be eupposed that we are disposed to relax the requirements of the law or of individual employers of labor with respect to vaccination ; far from it. We believe that employers in making such demands are taking the very best course to check the spread of the disease.

But we can get on faster by moral suasion than by force. We may force a man to be vaccinated, and so protect him from disease in bis own person, but we may fail entirely to secure his willing and intelligent help in preventing the spread of the contagion by himself or others.

The best results can be obtained by the co-operation of the two races, and we hope the only strife between them will be that friendly emulation and struggle for the pre-eminence which marked the $w_{0}$ sides in our school-day games of "French" and English."

## AMERICAN NEWS.

The statement of the New York binks for the week ending on Saturday last reflects tho improvement in trate, whieh, however, has not bern more than fairly maintained. There has been a continued demand for money from tho interior for the movement of crops, and a consequent increaso of loans and decrease of legal lenders.
The reserve of the banks is now $\$ 47,000,000$ above the legnd requirements, being a decrease of $53,000,000$ for the week.

The New York elearing house reluras show that the transactions for the week liad slightly fallen off, being $\$ 480,000,000$, against $\$ 484$, 000,000 in the presious week.

The inereased demand which we lave a rendy recorded continues in most lines of business. In dry goods a fair amount of activity is reported, with an upward tendency of prices, and a marked absence of speculation, generally speaking. Ihere lins been a stendy though moderale deniand for staple coton goods. The trade in woolen goods remnins unchanged, rith prices firmer all nlong the line, owing to the recent adyance in wools and yarns. Foreign goods are also in fair demand.

In brendstuff prices have been somewhit firmer, but no active export trade cen be looked for, while prices aje comparativoly higher in New York than in Livernool.

The iron trade has sagged somewhat, and manufacturers speak less enconragingly, but there is still a large business being done, and in some special lines the demand is good ; nails, wrought-iron pile, sheet and plate iron especially.

Apropos of the Warner Bill, to which we have elsewhere referred, the N. Y. Bullefin pertinently asks, "Can it have accurred to Mr. Warner to ask if the treasury can possibly have nuy legal warrant for engrging in a busimess of this character $9 . . . .$. To the Government, silvor bullion, except when intended for coinage, can be no more than pig iron or ingol copper...... The ecrice demanded could be looked for as properly by the metal trades, or the grain trade, or the cotion trade, making the Government the buyer and depository of all products which the markets cainot dispose of without a depreciation of their value."

Prescmiotion of Bank Derosits.-A ense involving $a$ point of importance to bankers and their clients was recently tried in Minneeota. The defendants were $n$ firm of private bankers, who had nccepted n deposit from a customer many years ago. After the Inplse of 11 years, the depositor thrned up and domandedjpayment, which was refused, on the ground that the debl was outlaired. The matier ultimately went to the Supreme Court of the State, where it was held that the Sfatute of Limitations only ran from the bate of the demand. In delisering judgment the judge pointed out that the debt of a banker ditiered entirely from that of an ordinary debtor, inasmuch as it was not his duty, as in ordinary cases, to find his creditor and pay orer the mones, but, by the custom of bnkers, and the implied contract between himself nnd his enstomer, ho was bound to hold the money and pay it as the customer required. The money was therefore not due until demand was made for it, and the time for outinwry could only be counted fromin the date of the demand.

The decline in the market price of silver continues, with rery serious effect on the finances of India, with which conntry trade is indeed nlmost at a stand-still. The disturbance is reflected in all cointries using silver as the standard money, notably those in South Americi and the Enst. The decline in the last four weoks has been no less than 47.8 cents per oz;, or nbout $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
This must be little short of disastrous in many quarters. the eflect of the deprecintion on the
$\$ 200,000,000$ worth of silver which has been bought and coined by the United States, and most of which lies locked up in the treasury vanits, is to reduce its intrinsic value about $\$ 10,000,000$, a loss which the people at large have practically to hear, in addition to all the other injuries which the silver coimge lons inflieted on the community. In England the cotton trade is serionsly aflected by the dis. turbance in the Indian funanees, and this, in turn, reacts on the cotton market in the United States, where cotion is now held above Liverpool prices.

The stery olfan attempted fraud on the Sandy River National Bank of Fumington, Me., is not withont its warning for Gunadian banks. One Wanzer deposited $\$ 5,000$ with a reputalile bank in Boston, ubtained a deposit receipt therefor, and aeked the bank authorities to arrange for its repayment through the bank at Farmington, which they did by letter. Wrazer drew the monery at the later point, crsually mentioning that he expected another remillance from the same source. A day or two after a telegram was reccived by the Farmington Bank purporting to be from that in Boston, "asking thom to cash Wanzer's chepue for $\$ 5,000$.

The enshier, blinded by the previous trans action, honored the instructions, but fortunately gave Whazer a bank draft for the amonnt. Jmmedintely alterwards, fecling nervous, be telegraphed to the Boston Bank, nud found that they knew nothing of the matter, whereupon be at onco stopied payment of the draft,
It was discovered that Wanzer had 'cut in' the delegraph line just outside the town and, by using a poeket relay had sent the telegram himself, in the most expert manner.

## ENNGLISH NEWS.

The Monery Mankzt.-The latest advices by mail indicate that the canses noted $n$ fortuight sinco linve combined to impart a slightly firmer tendency to rates for money. Gold shipments to Egypt have continued, and 2500,000 was sent to the Bank of lreland, becnuse of a malicions run on its brach at lippernry. The bank reserve stand at $£ 14,000,000$; and in view of the usual autumn demand for money, and the position of the American Exchanges, it is felt that the bank must protect itself ngainst further depletion, if necessary, by an increase in the rate, which may not now be far awny.

The market rate for the best three-months bills on 10 Sept. was 14 per cent, as ngainst 2 h 10 3 per cent for six-months bills; the inference being that a higher rate by nearly 2 per cent is looked for nt the end of the next three months. Last week the rates were $1 \frac{1}{2}$ and $2 \frac{1}{2}$ respectively.
On 2ud Sepiomber the English Government accepted bids for treasury bills amoming to $£ 3,171,000$. Those at 3 montlis were issued at a price equal to 1.57 per cent discoint, the six-months bills at the equivalent of 2.82 per cent. Inasmuch as the whole amount could have been phaced at three montios at the rate mentioned, Suglish popers nre asking why tho Goveroment have roluntarily paid equal to 4
per cent for the use of the money during the last half of the six monthe.
Since the dates covered by mail, rates linve somewhat receded ugain, altiough to a limated extent only.

Bank of Intanso.--In commenting upon the run on the Bank of Ireland, the Economist draws attention to the numalons practice of this institution, whic', although occupying a similar position in Ireland, as regards the Govermment business, as the Bank of England does in England, has never pablished any statement of its aflairs.

The run is alleged to have been slarted malicionsly, in revenge for the course adopted by the bank towards the Munster Bank.

The same journal calls attention to the large amount of bills presented for redemption, and money withdrawn, by the farmers. In the Irish land and landlord troubles the sume class represented themselves as poverty-stricken, and it thinks the run "has certainly disclosed a "command of money on the part of occupants " of small holdings which does not at all "aecord with, nud suggests doubts as to the "truth of, previous statements as to their " utterly impoverished condition."

Tue Shlef Thouble in Evaland.-In view of what we have else where said as to the effect on trude with India of the fall in silver, it is not surprising that all our exchanges put forward this subject as one of special importance The Economisl notes, however, some encouragiug features in the future prospects of the market. It is of opinion that, in view of the uncertain action of the United States, the low price of bullion, and the other disturbing inHuences, the Latin Monctary Union is unlikely to let its convention lapse at present, but that some more or less temporary arrangemest may be looked for. The expenditure for new railways in India, and in conuection with French operntions in Touquin will absorb more or less silver. There is a prospeet of considerable railway construction by the Ohinese Government, and that of Japan is discussing the substitution of silver for her deprecinted paper currency. From these and other sources new demands for silver may spring up, and it may be found that the East will absorb all that the West may send. That a settlement of the matter one way or ollier is desirable is rery clear. "It is not "so much the full in silver as the fluctuations "in its value that have unsettled trade, and "what is needed above all things is, that it "should be left to fiud its natural level... .. "Whether the price of silver rises or falls, the "commerce of the world will ultimately bene" fit."

The Royal Commission on Trade.-Tbis commission seems to have an extrnordinary amonnt of conlidence in the knowledge, industry, aud willinguess to-take-trouble, so to spenk, of the local Chambers of Commerce lhroughout England. It has innugurated its researelies into the condition of trade, and the canses of that condition, by issuing to the Chambers a set of questions calculated to tar the knowledge and powers of a Mulhall or a Giffen.

They cover the course of business for each of the past 20 years, the leading industries in the district, the capital invested in each, the amount of production, rate of wages, protit, relation between onpital and labor, and a host of other leading topics. There is no doubt that on many points valuable information will be elicited, and much light thrown on the diffeult questions of Free and Fair Trade; but from this disiance we should say that the commission has laid out its work on too large a scale to be useful. The work of yents would be necessary to completely digest and arrange the mass of infomation which their enquiries may olicit.

The Boamd of Trade Reromes.-The returns for August, which have just reached us, contain unny items of interest. The imports of the United Kingdom for August nmomited to £28,$\boldsymbol{y} 50,976$, being $\mathbf{x} 653,763$ less than for the same period last year. Nearly onc-half of the imports are food, and food-products. There was a heury decrease in two articles of great importance to us, namely, live stock and cheese, but weare glad to note that, while the total imports of cattle have decrensed, especially those from the United States, the imports from Canada show an increase of no less than $£ 165,000$ for the eight months ending 3ist August.

The average priees, as will be seen from the statement, remain nearly the same as lastyear; there is an average decrease of $13 s$ on ench animal.
In sheep the figures for the two yenrs are nearly equal.
We have not received the separate ligures for cheese mports, but the totals are as follows:

It will thus be seen that the importation has fallen off lilllo in quantity, but that there has been a very great shrinkage in value.
The main loss in the latter respect was of course made in the earlier spring months, al. though the shipments this summer lave commanded a low range of values.
In butter, another of our staples, both imports and prices are on the same level as last year.
A noticenble fenture in the returns is the enormous incretse in sugar receipts from the United States, from $702,000 \mathrm{cw}$ cs. in 1884 to $1,820,000 \mathrm{cwts}$. in 1585 , representing in money an incrense of $\$ 5,500,000$. The altered policy of the American Government on the question of the sugar bounty has apparently caused a change here, as the August shipments, although considerable, were below the average of the previous montias.
The exports for the month nmounted to E21,841,620 , being a decrease of $22,137,598$, as rompared with August, 1884, and for the 8 months of $£ 18,180,676$ as compared with the same period of last year. 79 per cent of the exports were goods of home production, and 21 per ceat re-shipments of merchandise imported.

We cannot do betler than call tho attention of our readers to a recent Euglish Blue-Hook centnining the report of the select committec on Forestry. The book published contains the evidence laken before the commitice, from which much may be leauned. No report on the subject was made, but they recommended that the committee be re-appointed at the next session to digest the evidence, and report fully on the whole subject.

There is, therefore, a deficiency in meeting the interest on the debenture bonds, and neither the "gunranteed" nor "lirst preference" stocks get any dividend. A year ago the revenue was sufficient to pry both in tull.

Upon publication of these tigures the two stocks named fell 7 to 8 per cont at one stroke, while the other issues sulfered to a correspond ing degree.

Some specimens of black bass from Canadian waters were taken over to England some time since and deposited in the Aquarium al the Invention Exhibition. Their introduction into English waters is deprecated by experts, on account of their voracits, notwithstanding the excellent sport they provide. It is thought that they would be dificult to rear, but those now at the aquarium have become acelimatised in a wonderful manuer.
In commenting on the Royal Commission on Trade the Lurojean Mail of this month says:
"We fancy that if the matter were left to the " High Commissioner of Canada, to the severn! "Agents General representing our Colonies, 'and, saty, to representative of the shipping, "mercantile, and manufacturing interests, "with lere and there a sprinkling, just to give "color, as it were, to the enquiry, of the in"dustrial chasses, we should come to learn "more of the true canses of the depression "with which we are beset than tlrough the " good offices of the gignntic commission "which Fer Majesty in her wisdum has decmed "it wise to nppoint."

Insumanes Clams.--An interesting case was recently tricd inEngland in which the difference betwee exaggerated and fraudulent claims on insurance commanics for losses by fire was the subject of legal discussion. A claim had been made. by the insured for a considerable sum, which the company refused to pay. The insured then redueed the claim, but the comphny still refused He then sued the company for his loss, adding a round sum by way of damages for their refusnl to pay, and gained a rerdict, notwithstanding. the company's plea that he was barred by his first çlaim, which they alleged to

Ne fraudulent. The court charged the jury lhat althougl the first claim, being formore than the value of the goods lost, might. be a morally repreheusible act, yet it was not fraudulent, especinlly as the claim had been subsequently reduced, and the jury found for the insured, with the full damages claimed. On appeal the latter consented to a reduction of the damages, and the court refused to order a now trial.
It is curions to note that the claimant stated in open court that he bad made his claim large because be kuew the company would not pay in full, nud hoped to have to submit only to a reduction which would bring the amount to a fair figure.

## OANADIAN NETVS.

Tu: Fur Tradm-The demand for manufactured furs has been fair, and the lending houses are fully employed. In conversation with the principal of one of the leading fur houses in this city it was learned that although this important branch of our trade seems to Lave been unjuatly signalled out for athek in connection with the unfortunate small-pox outbreak, no losses to spak of had mison in his experience, only a few trilling ovders being rescinded. Mr. Ooristine snid he was extremely gratitiod by the confidence reposed in him by his old enstomers, and as be had taken much trouble and pains and incurred considerable expense, not ouly in earning, but also in attempting to retain this confidence, he did not anticipaic any tronble from cancellations during the remainter of the scason. The anxiety fell about goods manuffecured in Montreal is not justified by the circumstances of the case as all who are acquainted with the topogreply of the eity must know. The great business warehouses and slores and many of the light industrial establishments are situated in one vast block in the centre of the city to the south, the streets of which are as deserted as a grave-yard during the night, the dwelling honse streets where the epidemic has made progress being finr awny to the north, and miles distant from the rail wity stations and steambiont landings, so thin as the large employers of labor are insisting that not only the iremployes but also the families of such slanl be vaccinaled, there can really be no danger of infection, and customers visiting the city on business are as safe as ever. Mr. Coristine kindly exphained the exceptional prechutions ndopled by him respecting his factories, and, under the circumstances, the goods manufactured by him must certainly be free from:any infection whatever. They do not employ outside lithor. The fur factory, which adjoins the warehouse, is a large delached building, spacions and well-ventilnted, affording nimple room for all the operatives. Stenm power is employed to operate the thr sewing and quilting machines, thus eanbling the firm to lave all ts seiving done on the promises. Messrs. Coristine \& Oo: employ a physician, who makes a strict house-to-house vigitation of all the homes of the omployes, twice a week. Every operative is furnished with a card by the doctor on his rounds, which must be produced as often as receved at head-quarters; or the operative is not allowed to work. Any employe is at once liable to suspension who is found to be living in an infected house or one in which proper sanitary precautions are not emplojed. If there is danger of infection at all, such may be said to exist where the sewing of linings, etc., is done in the suburbs and adjoining vilages, but no labor of the kind is employed by this house. It might also be stated that the factory and the manufactured goods have been thoroughly inspected by Dr. Coyernton of the Outario Board of Henlth; and
every shipment is accompanied by a certificat from him to the etfect that the groods are fre from infection. d'he system of precnutio adopted by us, sajd Mr. Ouristine in conclusion, enables us to protect onrselves nond cus tomers against any danger from infection, and we feel much gratilication in giving this manurance. Precantions similar tw hose adopted by the above well-known firm have nlso been taken by the other principna bouses in the fur trade, especinlly by the lending eatublishment of Greene d Suns Cumpary.

The transfer of the Norli Shore railway to the Canadian Pacilic Uompany was Comally completed on the 2 lst inst, on the bnis of terms arrived at on the previous Snturday, and in accordance with the act of hast Sission. The citizens of Quebee are rejoicing over this acquisition by the now grent inter-ocmanc line, which makes that city the eastern terminus of the system. The charges upon the transferred property inclute the 32 millions due the Gov crmment and $\mathrm{i}_{4}$ millious in bonds outstunding chiefly held by one person, and some half miljion for investments by the late owners. Ar a meeting of the Blanket Manufacturers Association, recently held in Toronto, each mem: ber produced a statement of the number of pairs of blankets mado by him this year, also the number of pairs now on hand. It was diacovered that the total quantily made was not equal to more tban one-quarter of last year's out-put, and was less than balf the quantity ench manufactures was entitled to make,part of the machinery having been run on other lines. The stock on hand is considerably less than at the end of 1884 . In consequence of the scarcity and enlanced price of blanket wools, it was thonght ibnt blankets should be advanced $2 \pi$ cents per lb., but the matter was left over. It has been learued that some odd lots of inferior goods by small makers have been offered at less than 45 cents, but no standard blankets will be sold this year under that price by the ussociation

Petholeum.- The market has been quiet but stendy; stocks are light for this season of tho year. la the West there has been an active demund, and a further advance is expected belore many days. The quality of the Canadian bils has been mueh inproved this year. The Guvernment insuection to ensure salety was formenly the only safegund to consumers and to the trade genemily. The trade was not proteeted, bectuse, while some firms torned ont a grood quality of oil, others did not, and the color and burning quality of their oil being defective wn unjust prejulice was created ngainst all Camudian petroleum, and consumers were templed to declare that Canadian oil was no good, and only the Ampricnn oil was fit to be burned. I'lis led the Canadian refiners this year to take tur impertunt step. They saw clearly that something, in addition to the Government inspection, was required aud, acting in concert, they have momed un inspector of their own, whose duty it is to see that no oil is marketed unless it reaches the standard of color and burning quality requived by the association, the safety test being still in the lands of the government oflicial. Gar lots in store are stendy on this market at $10 \frac{1}{8} \mathrm{e}$ and broken lots at $17 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$.

Thn schooner John $\boldsymbol{R}$. Noyes, bound from Kingston to Charlote, N.Y., to load coal, broke her tow Weinesday Iast in Lake Ontario and went ashore. 'l'he ressel is 344 tons burden and valued at $\$ 0,000$.

Tua merits of the Mosher attack on the A ceident Insurance Company of North America will receive due altention next week.

## LIABILITYY OF SURE'IIFS.

A question of great interest to bankers and to business men generally was involved in a recent English case before the vico chancellor. A firm of bankers brought an action nganst two surviving guarantors on a letter of gular. antee given by three, who becnme liable jointly, but not severally. The defendants set up that the guarantee was cancelled by the death of one of the guarantors, that the balance due the bank at the time of his denth had all been mid, nud contested their liability for the existing indehtedness, on which point Vice-Chancellor Bneon pronoumed against them.
They also alleged that the company for Which they hat become sureties had been dissolvel, and the business continued by a new
company bearing a rimilar name, which they established as a fact. But it was proved that the only notice the bankers had of guch a change was given in a printed (circular intimating that the company's business would henceforth be carried on in the name of the-manufacturing company, the word "manufacturing" being the only difference in the title. 'The guarantors (who were the officers of the company) continued to carry on the buginess of the new company, using the office and printed forms of the old company, without any notice to the bank tbat there was any other account than that to which the original guarantee applied. In deciding thas point in favor of the bank the Vice-Chancellor quoted tho words of Lond Desmar: " If a man by his words or conduct "wilfully causes another to believe the exist"ence of a cortnin state of things, and induces "him to act on thet behalf so as to alter his "own previous position, the former is con"cluded from averring against the latter a "different state of things as existing at the " same time."

## Clilld LIFE In CITY and oountry.

At the American Social Science Association in Suratogn an interesting paper on the above subject was read by Mr. Oharles D. Kellogg of the Charities Organization. He began with a reference to the economic value of a vigorous and robust citizen. The average age of tho European emigrant to the United Slates is wenty years, and his productive value was estimated by Prof. Thorold Rogers at $\$ 750$. Mr. Kellogg described the conditions of child life in cities as contrasted with the healthy surroundings of those in the country; and reasoning from the excessive and abnormal mortality rate in cities, and the fact that at least 75 per cent of the criminals who fill the prisons and add so much to the expenses of municipal and general government, are town-bred, he endeavors to estimate the money value of the loss.

He gave some interesting statistics as to mortality, otc. The dentlu-rate of the Peabody dwellings in London is only 17.22 per 1000 or 3.78 below the average for the whole metropolis. The gain in the ease of children transferred from the city to the country is enormous; and tho work of the societies engaged in this and kindred charities is highly commended ; especially that of the Children's Aid Society in New York, to whose efforts the striking decrease in the number of juvenile offenders in that city is attributed. "There is no cheapor, easier, or more eflective way," Mr. Kellogg concluded, "to counteract the deterioration of child life in cities, than to transfer it to the green fields of the country."

## UNREASONABLE COMPETITION.

Our contemporary, the London Grocer, in spenking of the unreasonable competition manong grocers, says that no such cutting of prices is ever found among butchers or bakers. Although they compete with each other for trade, their rivalry never extends to such a point as to cause selling of goods at unprofitable prices. The snme truth bolds good in this country, and the butcher and baker manage to get good protits in spito of all competitiou.

In support of this fact we would call attention to the comparatively fow failures that take place in these lines of trade. As wo go over the list of failures each week we can not help but note how few are the failures, and we believe the reason is because goods are sold at a profit. When the price of flour or meat goes up, how quickly the retailer follows suit, but when prices go down he is a very long time in fuding out that fact.

Now, how different it is in the grocery trade. Let tho price of some article go up, and the retuiler, instead of taking advantage of this fact to get a better profit, will continue to sell his stock on hand at the old prices, and perhaps advertise it to get more trade. Of course the time comes when bo is forced to put up bis prices, but he linds ita bard thing to do in the face of his advertisement. And, on the other hand, when goods go down the retailer marks down with a promptness that is remarkable. Sometimes they anticipate a falling market and mark down before the fall comes.

Now, competition that works such a course of action is not desirable, and the actions are not good business. This cutting of prices is an evil ensier to describe than op point out a remedy. If certain goods are sold without profit then it becomes a necessity to the dealer to make a greater profit on other goods. Unless ho does this, his business efforts will be but ranity and a striving after wind.-St Louis Grocer.

Graik Orop Notes.-The official estimate of the Spring Wheat crop in Ontario has been reduced for the month of September by over five million bushels, or over one-third, equal, without counting the deterioration of the remainder of the crop, to a lass to the country of about five million and a half dollars. The murky, moist weather wbich prevailed in August induced rust, which destroyed the crop in Western Ontario completely, and though that in Eastern Ontario did not suffer so much, yet it was attacked by midge and weerjl, so that the grain is small in quantity and poor and slaruaken as to quality. Ihe fall whent crop, which is the most important one, has not been injured; on the contrary, it is thershing out better than was generally expected, so that the estimate bas beenslightly, increased. The reports of the harvest in the United Kingdom, given in the newspapers, are, on the whole, fivorable. The crops in the south of England have been barvested without rain, and where the season has been rainy, it has been in, the northern districts, where the crops are not yet sulticiently matured to harvest. The onts, beans and peas are below the average. Barley is reported an average crop; wheat considerably above the average. The average yield of whent during the past ten years in Great Britain has been nearly 29 bushels. This year the estimated avarage is 30 bushels. A successful test of Manitoba hard wheat has been made in England On February 27th, of this year, a sample of No. 1 Hard Red Fyfe wheat from the Canada Pacific railway in Dunmore experimental farm, in the Canada Northwest, was forwarded by In. Alexander Begg, representing the Canadian pacific railway in Europe, through Mr. Dumam, of the Miller, to a farm near Colchester, Essex, England, and there sown in what was but poor, thin soil. The wheat came up well, and was gathered on August 12th. Thieéshing showed it to be well developed, very sound, and in every respect an excellent sample. Ou the London market the quotations for tle grain ranged from 34 to 36 shilliugs per quarter of 480 lbs, while the best red wheat was fetehing only 32 to 33 shillings; in otlier words, the Canadian North-West sample sown on poor English soil obtained " top prices."

Ohina and the Iuon Trade.-Rumors have again been current lately to the effect that the Chineso Government intond to authorize the
construction of railways within the Celestial Empire, and, in some quarters, the most roseate yisions have been indulged in as to the ellect of such a step on the iron and steel trades of this country.- Undoubtedly, were the building of railways commenced in Chinn, with its immense area and tecming population, it would not be without some effect on our industries but such influence may be readily overrated. We do not at all think that the experience of America would be repeated, The Chinese are of too deliberate a nature to set about nnything in the hot-haste fashion of our American cousins; and, moreover, should the construction of railways in Chisa actually become an accomplished lfact, it will be through the application of English capital, and that is not likely to be forthcoming in such manner as to foster anything like a "boom." But as the movement, if any, is likely to be of a moderate description only, there is all the more reason that our manufacturers should be prepared for it, so as to obtain the full benelit of any improvement in the demand for railway materin. To this end we should like to see some steps taken by the steel-race makers towards freeing themselves from the absurd and suicidal engagements which they have contracted with the makers of Germany and Belginm, and which would enable the latter to claim a certain proportion of the orders arising from this application of English capital, no matter whether or not the purchasers preferred having English rails, in much the same manner in which we have seen our colonial railways forced to placostheir orders on the continent, while English works are running only halftime, if even that.-London Iron.

Publio Revenue and Expenditure.-The revenue of the consolidated fund for August including Oustoms, Excise, Post office, Public Works, etc., was, $\$ 2,502,876$. Compared with August of last year the falling off in revenue is $\$ 534,871$, which occurs in the following
items: Customs, \$231,417; excise, $\$ 102,008$; post office, $\$ 33,275$; public works, including railways, $\$ 29,802$; miscellancous, $\$ 138,367$. The expenditure shows an increase of $\$ 1,031,-$ 797 over August last year, which is caused by the large payments made in connection with the North-west troubles. The following statement shows the amount of inland revenue acerued during the year ended the 30th June, 1885 ; spirits, $\$ 4,281,020$; malt liquor, $\$ 6,344$; malt, $\$ 477,184$; tobacco, $\$ 1,270,933$; cigars, $\$ 318,357$; inspection of petroleum, $\$ 27,521$; manufactures in bond, $\$ 44,900$; scizures, $\$ 1,256$; other receipts, $\$ 11,977$. Total excise revenue, $\$ 6,438$, 688 . Canals, $\$ 311,576$; slide and booms $\$ 63,996$; cutting timber $\$ 28$ 557 ; hydraulic and olher rents $\$ 20,881$; minor public worlss, $\$ 4,429$; inspection of weights and measures, $\$ 31,990$; insplection of gas, $96,-$ 290 ; law stamps, $\$ 2,223$. The San Fiancisco Journal of Commerce, in commenting on the incorporation of the American Sugar Refining Company, witha capital of a million dollars, observes: "This establishe ment goes into the hands of some of our leading wholesale grocers and importing merchants, some of whom have long been closely connected with the Hawaiian Island traffic, The capacity
of the present American Sugar Refinery is to be greatly enlarged, and it will, it is said, be a sharp competitor for the Sundirich Island sugar trade, which for a few years past has been largely under the control of Claus Spreckles $\&$ Sons. At present the island carrying trade, both by steam and sail, is largely under the control of the Spreckles faction. Still there is a wide and open lield for honest competition. Nor is there any lack of tonnage arailable for the successful prosecution of the Island trade. Tho Philippine Islands and other sugar-producing countries are open to all buyers; neither is the Hawaiian sugar to be Lad under any more inporable terms than ollers, although It is here admitted free of duty under the Hawaiian Treaty."

Prombitory Legislation in Georgla.-The Georgia Local Option Bill has become a law. It provides that upon the application for prohibition signed by one-tenth of the voters in any country, the Ordinary shall hold an election to determine whether or not spinituous liquors shall be sold in that county. If the result of the election should be rgainst the sale, the Urdinary shall give notice onco a week for four weeks, and the Act shall take effect as soon as the result is ascertained, except as to the vested rights of persons whose annual licease has not expired. If the result of the clection should be "for sale", no other election on the question slall be held in that county within less than two years. When any county rotes "against the sale" no person shall sell or barter, directly or indirectly, or give nway at his place of business, or furnish at any other public place, any alcoholic, spirituous ormalt liguors or any other drinks which produce intoxication. Nothing in the Bill is to prevent the manufacture, sale, ind uso of domestic wiues or cider, or the sale of wines for sacramental purposes, provided they are not sold by barrooms at retail. Licensed druggists will not be prevented from furnishing pure alcoliol for medicinal or scientific purposes.-New York Evening Post.
Stram Boler Applibnua.-A. patent bas been issued in the United States for a new safety appliance for steam boilers, which absolutely prevents the pressure of the stenm from rising above a previously fixed safety limit, and while effecting this desirablo end it is so simplo and inexpensive that the only wonder is that it was not thought of and used before. Safety valves are now used on all steam boilers for the purpose of allowing the surplus steam to escape when the pressuro reaches a certain fixed limit. This surplus is in many cases conducted into the chimney, for convenienco in getting rid of it, with the effect of incrensing the draft of the fire, and thus helping to kecp up the excessive pressure of stenm, and to this condition of things wo believe may be traced the cause of many boiler explosions. The now device consists in leading the waste steam from the safety valve into tho chimney and the of the boiler but blowing it agninst or in the reverse direction to which the gases from the fire are traveling, thus checking the dratt and filling the furnace with incombustible gases and suspending all combustion of fuel and preventing any increase of steam pressure. This also has twe effect of thoroughly clenning the flues and saving considerable fuel. This devico especially commends itself for use on steambonts and locomotives, where the noise of escaping sleam from safety valves is objectionable.

Tie Staron_Industay.-The Charlotetown, P.E.I., l'atriol regrets to learn that, owing to the depression in the potato gtarch business, five out of nine starch factories lecretofore doing business on the Island have decided not to operate during the approaching season, and
even those that will work have delermined to curtuil their busitues, and only receive potatoeg from sucli farmers as they are obliged to do under their existing contracts. "Considering the cerlainty that the gunntity manufactured will he smull, it is probatble that after supplying the cotton mills in Cumada there will be little or none of that product exported this season to Great Brituin."

A roowe man named Roy Dodson, of St Louis, lans recently invented an improvement on the maner of securing nuts on the side of rails where two bars come togetherat a joint. The PennsyIvamia Railrond is said to have offered him $\$ 30,000$ for the patent. A stock compmy has been organized in Birmingham, Ala., wilh nempital of si00,000 for mannhacturing the artiele ; lhe estatishument will be large enough to sumply the milrouds of America.
$\because$ A new edition of the British Plarmacopocin has just been isgued. In he plan of its construction it bears a close resemblance to that which it replaces but a few important changes will be observed. One of these in nomenchamere, is that the name of alknoids will now terminate in ine. No change has been made in the weights and measures employed in the processes. Comparntively few of the precesses have undergone material clange. On the other hand 113 new procesees and producis have been introduced, and there are only 21 of the old ones onitted.

An Americnn exchange suys:-The continued depression of the anthracite cond trade, in the fince of the general improvement in business and the growing ativity of the iron and steel and textile and other industries, is not remmekable when the incrensing use of matural gas fael by Western manufacturers, and the receat diversion of demand fromanthracite to bituminous conls, are taken into consideration.

## TIUE UTOPIA OF FIRE INSURANOE.

To the Editor of the Jounsal of Comamence.
Sir,-In your issue of 11 th September there Was published n letter signed "Reform" upon "rifu lasurance harift "a portion of whichthat rehting to co-insurnace-was deall with in jour article of sume date. There is no denying that the advance of rates under the present system hats been either merely monimal or nu ndvance at all, not becanse, as "Reform". remarks, "the honest insurers decrease their* i surnuce" but hecmase those who do not make agume of specalation of insumance pay for those who do ; and so long ns there is a chance-a very fair chance, too-of an, parian insumance covering a gecater limbility in propertion to the risk rum tarn at total insurance, this game of speculation will go on, with the odds-as ys a, Mir. Lditor, hatre repeatedly poined out-in finvor of the gambling insuress atod agninst the compmies. 'rlint the latler camot or will not see this conclusion is an astonishing mystery, and puts one in mind of a genteman at a race meeting making bets aganst a booknaker who heilges on the totat result.
Concerning "Riform" remedies or, as he expresses hinself, "avenues of relief" the Jounsab of Comarice las, if i remember aright, alway advocated co-insurance as the keystone of equitable whes for both the public and the compmies, and without rhich the entire archwny of tire insurance busian ss is neither sound nor safe. The conclusion of "Retorm's" letter fully bears out these views; he is unable to see binw the busness has been benetited by the arill when a reperted inerense of business of $\$ 33,343,748$ is only met by anadditional premium income of $\$ 403,076$.

The other remedy, or "avenue of relief" proposed by "Reform," is that that the Government should enlarge the powers of the Insuranco Deprorment to enable it to deal with the public as well as the companies, rensoning that the disgraceful and entirely unnecessary destruction of wealh by fire in Cmadn should be stopped. Now, while I quite agree with your correspondent in his hypothesis, and fait it "should be made possible to convict of arson by circumstartial evidence as it is to conviet of murder," I am free to maintain that this is more a question for common law than an Insurance Department to deal with; and as to "Reform's" propusition for propur building laws to be enforced, though no objection can be made to them, I incline to the belief that this should not affict tho insurance companies whuse business it is to charge a rate commensurate with the risk; and I think the companies themselves are to a great extent anstyerable for the dangerous class of buildings ammanly erected in Cunada, ima:much as by minimum rutings there is not sulticient inducement, so far ins insurance is concorned, for moperty bolders to improve the diflerent classes of buildings, since the rate is the same for all buildings according to their construction and oecunation, no matter whether that construction be finlty or first-class, or what the height or aren of the building may be. A cheap jerry built buidding of its chass is thas insired as cheaply as one of superior construction; and the companies certanly lave it in their own hands to rectify this nbsurdity by a system of sehedule rating formulating a first-chass standard for every deseription of hazard mad charging for every deficiencey benenth it. By such nsystem the companies would not ouly be working in their own interests and acting justly towards the respective insurers, but they would coufer a bedelit upon the public generally by cansing a better class of buildiugs to be erected, and thus lessening the danger of loss by fire and waste by conflagration,
If the Camadian Fire Underwriting associntion has buekbone enoturh to introduce the coinsumace clause into Umada, colphed with schedule rating, then may each office who cim lay the smallest claim to care in its management excham, with our old friend Horace:

## MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARRETS.

Sept. 24, 1885.
Business has improved in some lines and is less active in others, but, on the whole, the general volume is believed to be fully up to the average of recent weeks. The harvest in the West being about over the distribution of dry goods, groceries, metals and boots and shoes may be expected to show a steady iucrease, though the expansion, it is feared, will be less than in some previous years, owing to canses over which our merchans had no control. Already remitances have given signs of improvement. There has been a brisk museneat in wool, and the market for American authracite conl is more netive and higher, the rise being due to an advance of 15 to 20 cents per ton by the Delaware and Budson Company and enilanced freight rates bectween ports of hading and this city. The grain mavkets have been lirmer, owing principally to war rumors, a better expurt demand, and decreased shipments from India and Australia.

The trale has been anoped with the cancellation of a few orders on fricolous pxcuses, but, outside of this, there has been nothing to cause
complaint. Remittances lave been fair aud have visibly improved since the harvest Lenther--Business has been moderate until within the past few days, when it was quite dull, owing to the bad wenther.
Ooar and Wood.-American anthracilo has ahwared zac pee ton, owing to the advance in bont freghts, which have gone up from $\$ 1,25$ to $\$ 1.60$ yer ton, while sone are, it is said, demanding SL.75. Another rise of 250 or more miny therelore be expected before long. There are ferf wholesale lols selling, most of the harge establishments being already supplied, a good business is, however, beine done with householders. Soft conl is stendy and unchnnged, and there is no change in cordwoon.
