MGR. SATOLLI SPEAKS FOR PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS.

Our able contemporary, the New World of Chicago commenting on a recent public utterance of Mgr. Satolli on the question of education, says: The Apostolic Delegate concluded his mission at the church of St. Mary Magdalen de Pazzi, Philadelphia, on Sunday March 26.

"The most interesting portion of Christianity, in regard to religious sentiment and matters of faith, and in regard to truly Catholic morals and every observance of the Catholic religion, we must hold firm. It is better to be well educated to an honest life than to be simply instructed. Nay, for us Catholics, education in a moral sense that is not Catholic is impossible. This is the supreme reason for parochial schools, namely, of those schools of ours which, besides teaching all that is useful to the domestic and civil interest, perfect it by means of moral and religious education."

AN UNJUST ACCUSATION.

A MEDAL of artistic design to be worn during the World's fair period, has been adopted for the Catholic school children of Chicago. It is heart shaped, with small projecting points representing a cross. The finish is gold. The central portion of the design represents a ship in full sail—suggestive of the caravel on which Columbus sailed from Palos. Around this figure is inscribed the following: "Catholic Schools, Chicago, 1893."

When the Robins Nest Again.

When Arbor Day again recurs there ought to be an effort on the part of the people not only to plant more trees, but to take proper care of them after they are put in the ground. There is a scientific and bungling way to plant trees, so that if they are not placed in the earth according to careful ways of doing such work they are lost as growths either to produce fruit or furnish shade. In addition to this, care must be taken to select trees for growth which will grow in dimensions to beautify localities where they are put in the ground. With anything like good judgment, practical knowledge of trees and how to arrange them in proper ways for adornment, streets can be made the most delightful promenades. Arbor Day will be an occasion when much of the work necessary to attain this condition can be done. It occurs this year in Manitoba on May 11th.
