The Roman Catholic Church prescribes certain rules as to fasting during Lent, which all its members are commanded to observe. According to these directions, only one full meal can be eaten in a dayeither at noon or in the evening. In the morning nothing is allowed but a piece of bread with coffee, tea or chocolate; for dinner there may be served a full meal; then for luncheon or tea what is called a "collation," that is to say, a light repast is permissable.

The hygienic excellence of these rules is beyond dispute, and the only quarrel the physician has with them is that they are binding only upon them for only six weeks out of the fifty-two.-From the "patent insides" of a Protestant weekly.
