- John Taylor \& Co., denlers in West Indin goods, Halifix, are olfering their creditors 75 cents on the dollar, at $3,6,9,12$ and 15 months, unsecured. It is thought the offer will be necepted. Their liabilities are nbout $\$ 160,000$.
- The insolvent firm of Haldimind \& Co., to whom reference was made last week, have offered their creditors 35 cents on the dollar, which offer has been unanimonsly accepted.
- The Iumber firm of Benard, Bastien \& Oo., of this city; have had $a$ writ of attachment disened against them: Linbilities $\$ 100,000$, assets nominally the same:
- A syndicute is being formed to work the Q. M. O.\& O. Ratwhy The scheme comprises theerection of abridge across the Ottawa, above the Ohaudiere Falls, and of a station in the neighborbood of Jaeques Cartier square in this city.
- A writ of attachment has been issued against J. V. Dugas, boot und shoe dealer and scwing machine agent, Quebec, and his creditors are called together for Saturday. His linbilities foot up to $\$ 13,800$, about $\$ 2,000$ of which is priviliged.
- Wm. Richardson, fish merchant, Halifax, is in difticulties, but he hopes, with anextension, to be able to pay in full; as he has real cstate worth far more than his liabilities, which amount to $\$ 30,000$. A committee of his creditors are looking in to the condition of his affairs.
- A cable despatch from London says that the Grand Trunk are able, after the payment of
ali preference charges, to pay $n$ half yents dividend of three per cent on first preference stock on the 1st of March. Canadian Rationy stocks are firmer in conseginence.
- A steambont engineer has inventea a rotary boiler broom for eleaning boilers while the boat is under way. It is operated by turning a small crank which moves the broom in the boiler forward nud back, sweeping the boiler clean, it is claimed, in five nibutes, and dropping the mid and scale intonareceiver.
- Alex Mefntosh, forwarder; ot Ottawn, who was imprisoned at Albany at the instance. of certain American creditors, having been tried before a Justice nnd liberated, has returned to his home. He intends to bring an netion foe damages agains hose who, it now appears, unlawfully detained him.
-The investigation into the peppers fito at Fredericton, N. B., his been concladed, and the Mayor has expressed ail opinion hat it was the work of an incendiary, nid that Peppers knew all about it. The house was worth $\$ 1,200$ and was iusured in the "Queen" for $\$ 1,000$. Further proceedings will probably be taken by the Company.
- Although the Napanee Gas Company has had a writ of attachment issued against it, the people of the town are not lefin darkitess, the works being in operation as usual. It is expected that they will be sold, and that a company composed of pretty much the same stockholders will buy hhem in. It is only about in year since the works commence $l$ operntions.
- Regis Deziel of this city, clothier, whose difficulties have been chronic for the past three yents, has been attached at suit of a leading dry goods firm. There aresome unfavovable features which rendered this netion necessary, and will likely prevent Mr. Deziel getting a setticment. Liabilities outside the house referied, are not very large.

- C. A. Parent, hardware merchani of Quebec, whose suspensio:, consequent upon that of Mullinland \& Baker, we haventready noticed, has assigned. A setilement at the rate of to cents on the dollar, payable in $4,8,12$ and 16 months, and secutel by Messrs. Elliott \& Phillips, has been agreed to by the necesoary majority, and the assignment is merely to confirm the compromise.
- At the meeting of creditors in the matter of Woods \& Oo., shoe dealers, Nutre Dame street, held last Wednesdny, the liabilities were shown to be $\$ 18,069$. The insolvents were not prepared with any offer, and the creditors accepted an offer of 50 cents for the stock, and 51 cents for book debts, mate by Mr. Thomas Samuel, who is himself a creditor.
-. The faiture of J. \& J. Hegan, extensive dry goods mermants of St. John, N.B., is announced. They hive trusteed to John Boyd and J. L. Dinn ; linbilities stated at $\$ 130,000$... The firm dissolved in September last, when James Hegan retired, and statted alone in the carpet and bouse furnishing line, the old business being continued by his brother nnd their former partner. Mr. James Hegan is also reported to have assigned in trust.
- Messrs. Furaer, Livingston \& Co., of Hamilton, wholesale miliners, have resumed business. Their affairs were enrefully and thoroughly examined by a committee of their Canadian creditors, and the deficit in their business having been satisfactorily accounted for, their offer of 40 cents on the dollar was unanimously accepted. A satisfactory feature connecred with their suspension was the absence of accommodation paper.
- The failure is announced of Messrs. Girdlestone, Orris \& Co, pork packers, Windsor, Ont, whose establishment we noticed at length some time ago. Their liabilities are understood to bi over $\$ 200,000$. They altribute their diffculties to heary losses incurred last season. C.H. Girdlestune \& CO , tobacco manufacturers,

We understand the decision of the Police Magistrate committing him to prison is to be appealed agniust.
- The printed list of liabilities in the matter of J. \& J. Wordley, slooe manufacturers, Quebec, is in most furmidable showing. The direct linbilities reach $\$ 267,948$, of which $\$ 6,450$ aze privileged and $\$ 38,200$ secured; the indirect, divided among four binks and various of the principal creditors, are $\$ 218,320$, making a graud total of $\$ 486,268$. Some seventeen Montreal houses are interested to the the of $\$ 85,000$, and there are a good meny sore heads among them, consequent upon their powerlessness to unset the arrangement of 33 z cents, spoken of in our last issuc.
$\therefore$ Two men named Carroll and McNally, who professed to hail from Guel $h$ h, appeared in Londou a few months ago, and opened a flour and feed store A shorl time since it was observed that their store had not been opened for some days, and an examination of the premises showed that all the stock hnd $b$ en removed. - The assignment of Jeremie Morrier, a prominent storekeeper of Actonvale, is agnia a anounced, Through over expansion ho was obliged to suspend in December, 1876, with tiabilities of about $\$ 18,000$. His affairs were $n$ long time in suspense. A compromisent the rate of 75 cents was proposed in Februnry, 1877 , but fell tbrougli, and it was not till host June that a settlement was effected providing for the payment of 40 cents in $4,8,12$ and 16 months. It is his inability to complete this arrangemont we presume thit has necessitated his assignment.
- At the solicitation of the Montreal Bonrd of Trade the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has promised to granl a supplementary approprintion of $\$ 5,000$ towards the construction of a telegrapli line from Matane to Fox River, on the Gulf shorr. A previous grant of $\$ 10,000$ was made, it being expected that Montreal and Quebec would grant whateverfurther sum was required. They faited to do this, and the Government has agreed to maine up the required amount. The line will be proceeded with at once. It will be of immense advantage to the shipping interest.
- Ihere is apparently no recourse but liquidation in insolvency for the estate of Samuel Woods \& Co., whose difficulties wereannounced some weeks ago. It wasat first thought some private mode of settlement contd be arrived at, but this has not been possible, and two attachments have been issued, one at the instance of Messrs. M. Fisher \& Sons, addressed to A. M Perkins, and the second by Messri. A. Young \& Oo., an English firm, addressed to L. J. LajoieThe liabi lities, diret nud indirect, are in the vicinity of $\$ 15,0 n$, white the assets will faill very far below thee lisures.

 385\& 387ST.PAULST., MONTREAL.- The firm of Stephen, Davius \& $\mathrm{Co}_{0}$, im porters of dry and fnncy goods of this city, have been troubled with intermal dissensions for some days past, and it is impossible as yet to say what the result may be. A writ of attachment was issued some days ago but was settled and withdrawn; it has been reported that another had been issued, but uy to the moment of writing it had not been served, and an evening contemporary has been threatened with an action of damages furpublishing an item to the effect that the writ lind issued. Atall erents the partners are quarrelling among themselves, but it is to be hoped some arrangement may be arrived at before it is time for creditors to step in to protect their own interests.
- Geo. Orain, of Otawa, a builder, and also a member of the late firm of Code $\&$ Crain, woollen manufacturers, of Innisville, is in insolvency. Mr. Crain has been a large coutractor to the corporation of the city of Ottawn, and has had disputed clams agninst the city reaching to some $\$ 60,000$ before the courts some time, With varying success; we believe the last decision was in favor of the city, but Mr. Urain appealed to a higher court, and the mater is still in suspense. In the meantime Mr. Crain has become involved through his woollen mill interest, and has been attached by J. Harvie \& Uo., of Hamilton. His liabilities are between $\$ 50,000$ and $\$ 60,000$, and, apart from the claims abore-mentioned, his assets are not large.
- We regret to learn that the efforts of the senior partner of the wholesule dry goods house of Gcorge Winks \& Co. to obtain some concessions from their English creditors have not been successful, and thit the firm have been led to make an assignment. It is to be hoped, however, that eventually some arrangement may be made whereby the business and name of this hitherto most respectable house may be preserved to more prosuerous times, to enable them to retrieve their lost position and fortunes. The accounts of the firm have been accurately kept, and there is no trace of necom-
E modation japer or oller illegitimate dealings, such as have characterised so many failures during the past year.

 INSPECTION ANYTED.- Following quickly on the heels of J. \& J. Woodley's failure comes the annoutcoment that a demand of assigument las been made upon Joseph Woodley, also na extensive shoe manufacturer of Quebec, and until within a year or so a member of the firm of J. \& J. Woodley: His carcer alone has been of a decided, butterfy chancter. When he left the firm of $\dot{0}$ \& J . Woodley be was supposed to be worth $\$ 20,000$ to $\$ 30,000$, andafter $n$ recent investigation or his affaits, occasioned by the circulation of some unfavorable reports, it was stated lie showed $n$ surphus of over $\$ 50,000$, so that the news of his failure was quite unexpected. It is now stated that his nominal surphus is smail, and it is a difficult mater to reconcile this statement with previous ones. Montreal houses are interested largely, and will have the concern wound up in insolvency if possible.
- A meeting of creditors in the case of Messrs. H. Mathewson \& Co., wholesale grocers, was held on Wednesday morning, at which the following. figures were presented as showing forth their position. The direct liabilities foot up to $\$ 66,952$, indirect $\$ 64,878$, or a total of $\$ 131,830$; the assets, of which the principul items are stock $\$ 31,448$, good accounts $\$ 12,887$, and doubiful dito $\$ 26,076$; show a nominal surplus of $\$ 7,039$ upon the direct liabilities, which in course of realization would, beyond doubt, resolve itself into a very considerable defisiency. As far back as last June rumours tere current pointing to the possibility of Mr. McGillivray's emburassment, and were revived in the fall, but until the present he has been able apparently to fight off the evil day. With reference to his endorsements, it is stated that to one cuncern alone he has given the use of his name to the extent of over $\$ 500,-$ 000 , and the nomount of his other endorsations caunot as yet be ascertained, hut is understood to be heavy. His own direct indebtedness: will probably not excecd $\$ 25,000$, but until after the meeting, to be held on the 5 th of March, nothing definite can be said regardiug his aflatrs. It is

## THE TRADE REIURNS.

We took occasion in our number of the 18 th January to point out the importance of examining the tracle returns in their details if it be desired to chaw from them any reliable conclusions. We have since received the returns for the past year, and, although we have not yet been able to give them as thorough an examination as we conld desire, yet we are confirmed in the general remarks which we made in the article refer red to, on the chamater of the imports. The largest amount of imports during the 10 years ending with 1877 was in 1873, the yen which we took by way of illustration. In that year the total imports were $\$ 127,514,594$, which included British Columbia, but the free goods including coin, were $\$ 56,101,466$; whereas, in the year encling 30 th June, 1877 , the free goods were only $35,380,523$. The total imports into Prince Edward Island were $\$ 1,380,878$, principally dutiable. The dutiable goods in 1873 were
$\$ 70,387,358$, but it is important to bear in mind that in that year tea and coffee of the value of nearly $\$ 8,000,000$ were included in the free list: With this allowance, and allowing likewise for the free goods imported into Prince Edward Island, the difference between the importation of free goods in 1573 and 1876 would be about 13 millions of dollars. The most important branch of the free imports is grain, including wheat, indian corn, barley, \&c., and flour, meal, \&c. 'lhe aggregate imports under these heads were, in 1873, $\$ 14,252,159$, against $\$ 13,855,879$ in $1877-$ the difference being under $\$ 400,000$. In 1573 the free import of metals, more than the half being railrond bars, amounted to $\$ 12,845,569$ whereas, in 1876 , the nmount was little over 4 millions, so that $8 \frac{1}{2}$ millions of the excess must be set lown to metals free of duty. : The coal imported in 1577 was over a million in excess of 1873. Ship's materials, on the other ham, were abont a million more in 1573 . Wool was $\$ 1,540,000$ in 1573 against $\$ 900,000$ in 1877. Coin and bullion was a million in excess in 1873 over 1877 . We have permaps already waried our readers with details under this head and will now tum to the dutiable articles which were, omitting Prince Edwad Island, nearly 60 mil lions in 1877 against 70 millions in 1873 , to Which must be added $S$ millions for tea and coffee deducted from the free list. In the 5 per cent. list, consisting chiefly of bar, rod, hoop, and sheet iron, and books, the import in 1873 was nout $1 \frac{1}{2}$ million in excess of 1877. The chief items of decrease in 1877 of dutiable goods are tea, cottons, woollens, havd. ware, silks, satins, and velvets and fancy goods, aggregatingabout 13 millions. We shall have occasion to refer again to several of these articles, but we desire, in the first place, to call attention to the difference between 1873 , the year of the most inflated imports, and 1877, when importers were limiting their orchers to the utmost possible extent. Fxcluding tea, and 5 per cent.iron, the diminution in the leading articles mentioned would be under $\$ 10,000,000$, and it. would be interesting to learn how much of that amount should be set down to shrinkage in value. The most interesting suhject of enquiry in connection with the trade returns is the course of trade with the United States and England. We shall devote the remaining portion of our remarks to a consideration of this subject, which is full of interest. The United States is a country which, under a rigid protective policy; has developed manufactures to a considerable extent, and has to conmete in our markets on equal terms with the
manufacturers of Great Britain which, for many years, have commanded the principal markets of the world, including Canacla. We shall glance at such items of the impoits from the United States in 1877 as we thinls likely to interest our readers. 'I'se first article' to which wo shall refer is cheese, one of our great Canadian staples; and we find that, in 187\%, a very large quantity, upwards of 1,500 ,000 lbs ., of this commodity, was imported into the Province of Quebec, nearly all of which appears to have been in bond at the close of the financial year. The whole quantity on which duty was paid, was 57,681 lbs. The circumstance seems worthy of notice. The duty which is specific is equal to about 20 per cent., and we hadly think that our neighbours ean compete with us on such terms. The importation of lard has increased very much of late years. In 1877 it was $2 \frac{1}{2}$ millions of lbs., valued at $\$ 202,000$, agilinst aboul $\$ 40,000$ in 1873. "Meats," also, have increased considerably, and are now above a million, paying a duty of $\$ 123,000$, although we are exporting cattle in large quantities. "Cabinetware," "caruages" and "coach and lanmess fumiture" are all important artieles of import. We come now to the leading article of "cottons." We have elsewhere noticed the fallingroff in the importation from the year of inflation, 1873. That falling off, however, has not been from the United States. On tlie contrary, in some of the most important branclies of the manufacture the United States mamfacturers are driving the British out of the field. In 1873 the nagregate imports from Great Britain were nearly 10 millions, while those from the United States were under $\$ 500,000$. Last year, 1S77, the British imports had lallen away to little over 4 millions, while those from the United States had increased six fold, being over 3 millions. In bleached and unbleacheal coltons, the imports from the United Slrates were $\$ 868,000$ against $\$ 446,000$ from Great Britain, and in "printed" they were $\$ 1,030,000$ against $\$ 1,605,000$ from Great Britain. This is cirtainly an extraordinary result. "Glassware" calls for no other remark than a notice of its being imported mich more largely from the United States than liom Great Britain. The trale in "hats and caps" is worthy of notice. In 1873 Fingland had nearly double the trarle of the United States in these articles. Last year the United States had clouble the tritue of England. In the various branclies of the hardware trade we find the same result. Tliere has been a falling off in 1877 as compared with 1873 , but the inports from the

United States have nevertheless inerensed, while those from Great Britain have fallen off nearly $1 \frac{1}{2}$ millions. We now come to a leading Cana lian manufacture, viz., "boots and shoes." In 1873 the imports of these articles from Great Britain exceeded those from the United States by nearly 50 per cent. In 1877 the imports from Great Britain were little over onethitd of those of 1873, while those from the United States had increased over four foll. The aggregate imporvations were about double what they were in 1873. "Paper" is in the same category. In 1873 the imports of paper from Great Britain were over 50 per cent. in excess of those from the United States, while in 1577 the imports from the United States were fully 75 per cent. in excess of those from Great Britain. In "stationery" although the change has not been so remarkable it has been sufficiently instructive. In 1573 the United Stutes sup. phed us with about. 13 per cent. of our aggregate imports of stationery while Eingland supplied 87, while last year Great Britain supplied 51 per cent. and the United States 49. The next article that we shall notice is "small wares," under which head there was an increase of imports in 1877 over 1873 . The imports from Great Britain, however, declined, while those from the United States were considerably in excess. Th 1573 they were 9 per cent. of the total imports; and in 1877 nearly 30 per cent. We shall close this tedious notice with a reference to " woollens," the most important bruch of our imports in the $17!$ per cent. list. We have already noticed the great reduction in the aggregate imports of woollen goods in 1877 as compared with 1573 , but this was entirely in the imports from Grent Britain, those from the United States being very largely in excess, having gone up from $\$ 135,000$ to upwards of S000,000. We fear that we shall have almost exhansted the patience of our readers with so many figures, but there is one more comparison that we think should be drawn between the trade of 1873 and 1577. In 1573, which was the year of the largest trade, the aggregate umports from Great Britain were $\$ 68,459$, 744 , had from the United States $\$ 47,731$, 746. In 187t, the aggregate imports from Great Britain we:e $\$ 39,572,239$, and from The United States $\$ 51,309,479$. The dutiable goods imported from Great Britain in 1873 were $547,443,203$ and from the United States $\$ 10,078,80 \overline{5}$, while in 1877 the dutiable goods from Great Britain were $\$ 32,910,776$ and from the United States $\$ 23,520, \$ 46$. The free gools from Great Britain anounted to S2l,0i6,iT1
and from the United States to $\$ 31,052,941$ in 1873. In 1877 the free goots from Great Britain were $\$ 6,055,463$ and from the United States $\$ 27,798,033$. We cannot close this notice of the trade returns without bearing testimony to the continual efforts of the commissioner of customs, Mr. Johnson, to improve the returns, and to give a good deal of valuable information in a separate form in his report.

## TIE BUDGET.

The Finance Minister's statement has been made, and has been oriticized at considerable length, and on the whole in a good spirit by Dr. Tupper. The two political parties have fairly joined issue on the question of the fiscal policy of the country, and it may be hoped that the tendency will be to diminish the personal asperity whith clitutererize the debate on the address. The speech of the Finance Minister will probably canse neither surprise nor disappointment. The deficits were well known, and it was haidly expected that any new scheme of taxation would be proposed during the last session of a Parliment. It may be inferred from the language of the Finance Minister that he is of opinion, that wo have seen the worst; and that there is reason to hope that the revenue of the current year will be sufficient to meet the expenditure. He eritertains similar expectations with regard to the year for which supplies have now to be voted. We sincerely hope that these anticipations may be realized, but we cannot shat our eyes to the danger of permitting successive delicits wiblout providing additional revenue. Mr. Cartwright him self is evidently not blind to the danger to which we have adverted, for he has dealt with it in the following passage of his speech :-
"Now, Sir, under these circamstances, it may not umaturally be asked by some members of this House whether it would not be advisable, in view of the fact that we have now had for tivo years considerable deficits, to adopt such precautions as would render it impossible for another deficit to confront us in this year. Well, Sir, I would say at once that if we possessed in Canada any tax fairly equivalent. to the income tax now in use in England, probably I would not hesitate to advise the House to have recourse to that means of increasing the revenue in sonse degree, that being a tax which can be raised or lowered with a minimuni of disturbance to the various commerial interests of the country."

It is true that we have no tax in this country of the same character as the income tax, but there is always a mode of increasing the revenue without creating
any serious disturbance to the commercial interests of the comtry and withont rendering it necossary for the Government to depart from that fiseal policy to which it is pledged.

We readily admit that it would be unreasonable to expect the Govermment, during the last session of a Parliament to make material changes in the tariff, but when it is bome in mind that it is on all hands admitted that it is expedient to mise a considerable portion of the revenuo by customs' duties, we can discover no olyection to a uniform increase to those dutios in the form of a percentage suff. cient to raise the amount required. Such an increase to the customs revenue was sunctioned by Parliament in 1S70, and was not met with the objections that wero raised to specific duties on particu. Iar articles. The ardition of 10 per cent. to all the customs daties would give nearly $\$ 1,400,000$ additional revenue without violating any principle whatever, and it could be reduced either to 5 per cent. or taken ofl altogether precisely as the income tax in Jugland eain be increased or reduced according to circum. stances. Such a tax would have removed in all probability the danger of a deficit during the current or nest yeur, and even if the revenue of those years should be adequate to meet the expenditure, the deficits which have already occurred would justify the increase.

We are sory, and entirely without reforence to the general question of the fiscal policy of the Government, that some step, has not been taken to increase the rovenue, and thus to prevent the possibility of any reflections being mace else. where as to our willingness to provide the necessary means to keep the revenue at-least equal to the expenditure. We are not disposed to criticize the expenditure too closely. The charges for interest and management of the debt, including the sinking fund, and for tho collection of the revenue camot be reduced, and we are not sanguine that the most economical Government that we aro likely to have, would effect any savings, worthy of serious consideration, in the other branch. es of expenditure.

Wo are not inclined to medulle in the country between the Govermment and its assailants on the various details of the expenditure. We are quite willing to assume that no Government is desirous of increasing the expenditure beyond what is absolutely necessary for the efficient carrying on of the public service. The deficiency after all is a mere bagatelle in itself. No difl. culty would be found in obtaining the
required increase, either in the way which we have already suggested, as one which would be consistent with the financial policy of the Government, or by analtern. tion in the tariff.

We have already had occasion to refer to the clirect clallenge given and acoepted by the rival parties who aspire to govern the Dominion for another term of years. It is however $\Omega$ question whe ther all those who incline to the opinion that our exist. ing relations with the Uniled States are unsatisfactory, are prepared to go the length to which Dr. T'upper has committed his party. Dr. Tupper has hinnself pointed out that the duties on coal and flour were disapproved of by many of the conservative members, and that it was owing to their junction, with the present Ministerial party that Sir John A. Macdonald's Govornment was compolled to consent to the repeal of those duties. We are inclined to the opinion that the feeling of opposition to those duties has not mate. rially alated, and that the amouncement that they will be re-imposed in the event. of the success of the conservative party at the general election will be damaging to its interests Be this as: it may, the leaders of the party hive no doubt fully considered the position and are prepared to stake their chances of success on the advocacy of protection to all the various interests, agricultural, manufacturing, mining, dc. The discussions of the present session will be carried on with a view to influence the elections, and for many months the provinces of the Dominion will be agitated first with the pre. parations for a general election, and afterwards with a contest for political supremacy for the next five years betiveon the rival parties.

## TIE FISHERY MONEY.

It was with extreme regret that we noticed in the speech of the LieutenantGovernor, at the opening of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, a reference to the probable distribution of the money. awarded in compensation, of the fishery clains, specially to Nova scotia. The time has not arrived for offering any opinion on the subject of the distribution of this money, and we only advert to the Licute-nant-Governor's speech to point out the inconvenience of local soyernments prematurely committing a Dominion officer like the Lieutenant Governor on a guestion of Dominion policy, The LieutenantGovernors are appointed by the Dominion Government, and most certainly ought not to commit the latier in a formal Bpeech at the opening of the Legislature.

Of course it may be said that the speech is not the Lieutenant-Governor's, but his ministers'. In reply to stich an argument we would reply that the ministers can only constitutionally deal with matters confided to them by the constitution. They have nothing whatever to do with the Fishery award, and if they have any representations to make; as to the special claims of Nova Scotia, they should be made at the projer time to the Government of the Dominion, but not embodied in a speech addressed to the Legislature ly the Lientenant-Govemor. Such proceedings may be productive of mich inconvenience hereafter, and therefore we think it desirable to call attention to the irregularity, to use a veiy mild expression, which has been committed by the Lieintenant. Govemor of Nova Scotia, minegularity to which he slomid have refused to be a party.

## THE NEW YORK LIFE INSURANCE THOUBLES.

Those who ceemed the strictures upon certain features of life insurance business in the United States, which appeaved in these columns about a year ago, as too severe, will have some reason for modily. ing their opinions in view of the recent diselosures at Albaiy. It will be remem. bered that, owing to the finudulent failures of the Continental Iife, the New Jersey, the Atlantic Mutibl Life and others, the older, more respectible and presumably strong companies at first vesented but afterwards cotirted the immediate investigation ordered by the govermment, and one or two went so far as to have anextra examination at their own expense. Statements based unon these investigations have since made their appearance, herald. ed forth with trumpet flourishes. It appents now that, in several instances, large sums of money were disbursed in the course of these examinations, the bills: having been certified by the superintendent of insumance, although the authority to do so rests solely with the Controller of the State. Of this Mi. Smyth could not have been ignotant, for immediately after his appointment, more than a year ago, he made a request to have this power. vested in himself, which was refused by the governor.

Mr. Smyth is now charged with mal. feasance in office, and has been dismissed from his position. The Controller of the State in his address to Governor hobinson, atter quoting the provisions of the law in such cases, says :

This statute imposes dities and restrictions upon the Superintendent of the Insurance De-
partment in the matter of the presentation and collection of bills for the expenses of examimations of insurane compmies. It also easts upon the Controller the duty of auditing all such bills, and makes that audit a coudition preceaent to their legality. The prescriptions of this ach were in force at the time when I entered upon the duties of my office; they are included in my official outh. Tliey were likewise in force when the present Superintendent of the lusurance Department qualified; he was sworn to perform them. How importatit the Legishate regarded these statutory restants is evinced hy the fact that their violation by the Superintendent or his subordinates was made a disdemeanor. For some time jinst the Controller has been prevented from discharging his, duty under the haw by the wilful withlobling of such bills hy the Superintendent. In repeated fustances bills for very large nnomms have been made out by attorneys and apmaisers of the Insurance Depurtment, certified by the Superintendent, presented and collected without the knowledge or andit of the Comitrolere. Similar bills have been presented nud collected without the certificate of the Suprintementent, but with his knowledge and consent These repeated and notorious viobations if the law leave no doubt that the course of the Superintendent is a deliberate athempt to cevale tlie audit of the Ontroller and prevent ile dis:elunge of the duty imposed upou him by the haw above cited. Fimby convinced of this intention, I chnrge John F. Smyth, Superiment. cat of the Insumbe Deparment, with malfonsatce and viohtion of his onth of ollice in the following particulars:
That he las lonowingly and wilfoly presented or cansed to be presented, bills of attorneys of the Insurance Diphrtment to insurance companias not bearing the approval of himself as Superintendent.
That he has knowingly and wifhely presented, or coused to be presented, similar bills not bearing the andit of the Controfler.
That he has knowingly and wiltully presentad or cansed to be presented, to insurance co mpaines bills of uppraisers of the hasmance Department not bearing his aproval as Superintendent.
That he has knowingly and wiffilly presented, or catsed to be fresented, to insurance companies bitts of aprinisers of the Insurance Department not bearing the audit of the Controller.

That upon such bills large amomets of money have been paid, in violation of the for going statute, with the linowledge and ensent, procurcment and comivance of said John $F$. Smyth.
Upon these charges I respectfully ank jour Excellency to talie such acton as may sem to you legal and proper.

The Controller in answer to a resolution of the House of Assembly, dated the 7 th ult., in regard to bills created by the insurance department from January 1st, 1877, to February 9th, 1878 , gives delails amounting to $\$ 9,851.91$, fll audited by himself. This was employed in counsel fees, searches, appraisers' fees and pro:
curing evidence respecting certain companies, comprising the Continental Life, Universal Life, Atlantic Life, Metropolitan Life, New Jersey Life, Hope Mutual Life, American Popular Life, Buffalo German, Clinton Fire, Equitable Life, Mamhattan Life, Mutual Life, New Yook Life, Washington Life, Security Life, North American Lite, United States Life, \&c., ©c.

In order that he might learn whether bills had been paid not audited by him, the Comptroller addressed the following letter to each of the companies named in the resolution, embracing the New York, the Metropolitam, \&e.:

You will also phense furnish the degniment with a detaited list of bills which jou lave diclined to hy, if any such bills have been refused mayent, and the nume or mames of the partios to whom such tills are alleged to be due, and the service dhamed to linve been tendered. It any bills have becu cut down or dectensed, you will state the origime amome chamed as well as the nomome pide. If any amount has been paid for which no wncher has been taken, state the amoint so paid had to whom and for what purpose. These inguines are brouland comprehensive, in erder to thite before the assembly the thllest intormation obtanable. Most truly yours,

Ii response to this inquiry, letails of the folluwing totals wero suppliod, none of which bore the Controller's audit: New York Life, $\$ 32,781.61$, of which nearly $\$ 25,000$ was patid to one firm ; the Motropolitan paid $\$ 4,074.40$, and the Manhattan $\$ 6,314.30$. The hist named retused to pay some $\$ 10,000$ more for: bills which were presented by apponisers. The total bills not andited amoint so far to $\$ 55,011.21$.

It is to be hoped that our translineal consins, who generally are not slow in administering justice, will not forget, while treating with Mr. Smyth, that any investigation, to be satisfactory, should inclute the agents, abettors and associates in the transuctions, and also the offecers of the companies who prid the money. "We appreciate," stys it New York daily, " the embarassment which the members of a compray believed to be prosperous will feel when asked whether submission to irregular and extortionate charges had
any connection with the rendering of a favorable report as to its condition; but the inquiry, in spite of its unpleasant ness, forces itself upon the mind. 'The alverse report rendered respecting the Universal Company seems to operate aginst the suspicion thus generated, but thie afterproceedings of the Superintendent in sanctioning the continuance of an insol. vent company in hands that were directly responsible for the insolvency, sustain the unfavorable hypothesis. Whether literally correct or not, it is certainly not improbable. And hence the propriety of making the trial of Mr. Smyth the oceasion of testing the bona files of investigations which the policy-holders nre expected to trust implicitly. The inability of Mr . Smyth to form an independent judgmenton the subject,-his dependence on others in every part of the business, and his proneness to choose as auxiliaries persons in whon the public repose very little confidence,-must be regarded as detracting materially from the value of any report over his signature. . If, in addition to incompetency, sinister considerations have room for almost unchecked play, it is evident that the removal and punishment of Mr. Smyth, and the punishment of those who have profited by his lawlessness, will but imperfectly sutisfy the requirements of the situation."

Tho leading companies, generally those doing business in Canada, should assist by every possible means in tracing this matter to its source. There is somewhere a wrong to be righted. But the policyholders should not grumble if a small portion of their property bo employed in making investigations in which they are more interested than the puilic at large.

## THE NATIONAL INSURANCE COMPANY.

The National has had a hard time of it from the outset. Launched in 1876 by E. II. Goff, of Canada Agricultural fame, the rosult of the first you's business showed an impairment of capital of nearly $\$ 50,000$, out of $\$ 73,000$ paid-up, the result of the first ten per cent call. Two more calls, of ten per cent each, have since been made, and the total now paid up, according to the report on another paige, is $\$ 195,000$. The business of the past year has been still more discouraging, owing to heavy fire losses, especially that of St. John, N. B., and somewhat to the expensive horde of inspectors maintained by the company. We imagme that the staff organization of the National could be considerably reduced without any material loss in efficiency, As it is,
whatever of prosperity the company may meet with in the future will be chiefly owing to the gentleman presiding at the head of its aftaits, whom the shareholders have almost solely to thank for any success hitherto attendant on the offorts of the fuil concern in which he has been prevailed upon to ombark, in riding out the stom. Ihe expenses made during the year in obtaining gross premiums of $\$ 113,450$ amounted to $\$ 42,805$, or about 38 per cent. The amount paid for fire losses was $\$ 190,952$, almost wiping out the total puid-up cash capital of $\$ 168,025$, including oven the proportion paid up by promissory notes of 827,298 . All gone save honor, pluck and organization.

It is to be hoped that the National may suecced in avoiding any future hard knocks of the momentum of the St. John disaster, where, howover difficult it was, they honorably and promptly paid all clams against the company, amounting to $\$ 151,556$, and we have no hesitation in saying that all future claims will be paid with equal readiness as long as the worthy president and the majority of his co-shareholders are liable for a single dollar. The compray has commendably applied to Parliament for an Act to enable them to reduce the original authorized capital of $\$ 2,000,000$ to $\$ 500,000$, thus lessening the gross liability to the public.

The National has, from its inception, been foremost in the laudable eflorts to advance rates, but apparently with little success, so far as its own are concerned. Instructions to agents are supposed to indicate the maximum rates that will be ac cepted. We observe that convents and other such first-class risks are takon at 75 cents for three years, a rate which we fancy is not likely to bo very profitable to the company, and is merely heaping up liabilitios without any appronch to remunerative prices. But, as Hudibras says,

> "What's the worth of any thing,
> But just so much as it will bring?"

There has bean something said as to an amalgamation with one or two other home companies. If one strong company could be formed from such a combination, the sooner it were done the better. As it'is, the weekly business troubles all over the Dominion are making heavy inronds on the aggregate strength of stock-lists, making it all the harder for thoso that remain, and in one or two cases compelling the few strongest to cary the entire lond on their shoulders, with little prospects of any return adequate to the risk, but with the doubtful prospective comfort that the weaker will ultimately sliare equally in any prosperity that may be de veloped in the dim future. As far as amal-
gamations are concerned, it can be pinve. i by an algebraic formula that if one mimus term be multiplied into another minus term, the product is a plus term com: pouncled of both. For example : Let-a be the National, while-cand-crepresent two other home companies. Then- $a x$ $-2 c=+2 a c$, or simply $2 a c$, which was to be demonstrated; an exhibit which we would commend to the attention of the elever secretary of the company.

## THE DOMINION SAVIVGS AND NVESTMENT SOCLEIY.

The fifthannual report of the Dominion Savings and Investment Society of London, Ontrrio, reproduced on this page, shows that the Institution contributes its quotr to the genemal prosperity which chatacterizes the financial enterprises of the Forest City. As compared with the business of the previous year, there is an increase of $\$ 81,4 \mathrm{co}$ in paid-up stock, of $\$ 102,-$ Sto in investments, and of $\$ 194,517$ in deposits. The net prolits of the year, after paying two hatf-yearly dividends at the rate of ten per cent., were $\$ 5,291: 90$, of which $\$ 5000$ have been added to the "Rest," which now amounts to $\$ 74,000$. The investments of the Society appur to be carefully made, being in first mortgnges on real estate valued at considerably more than double the lonns on the basis of a forcedicash sate, and the constant services of their efficient valuator in this respect should enable the executive to produce as good results for the shareholders in the future ns they have in the past. The Manager is surely to be congratulated, who, in such an exceptional era of depression, can assert that the Society has not been obliged to write of a single dollar of their in vestments.

## THE DOMINION SAYINGS AND INV EST-

 MENT SOCIETY.
## Anvual Meetng.

The annara general meeting of the Dominion Savings and Investiment Society wis held on Tuesday, the leth ult., at the oftices of the Contpauy in London:

The President, Mr. D. Macfie, occupied the chair, and Mr. F. B. Leys, the Manger, neted as Secretary. There was a harge attendance of stoekholders.
The Chairman called on Mr. Leys to read the anuual report as follows :-
To the Shareholders of the Dominion Savings and huvestment Sociely.
Gentlemen,-Your Directors, in presenting this the lifth annual report take pleasure in calling your atiention to the continned and everincreasing prosierity of the Society.
By comparing the bisiness done in the different branches during the past year with that of the preceding one it will be seen-notwithstanding the financial crisis througll which the country is now passing, and consecuent scarcity: of money and general depiessinu of trade-that very considerable progress has been minde.
There has been pmid on stock $\$ 81,46007$, making the total amount of prid-up stock, on 31st December last, $5502,625.76$. And we have now invesied in first mortgages on real estate S1, $032,835.45$ as against $\$ 889,99506$ in the previous year: the estimated value of which, at at forced cash sale, is $\$ 2,479,525$.

The most striking increase in our business has been our Savings Bunk; the deposits during the been year reaching to the large sum of $\$ 1,190$,$149: 75$, and the withdrawals to $\$ 1,073,083.58$, leaving a balance of \$123,0c6.17, making total amount in Savings Bunk on 31st December last

S451,106.02, as compared with $\$ 396,678.99$ the previons year. This result is the more gratil'y ing when it is considered that some of our large kindred institutions, instead of an incretse, have to record a loss in this branch.
The net profits for, the year, after payingtwo half-yenrly dividends'at the rate of ten per cent per minum, and all expenses of"every kind, have beron $\$ 5,291.96$, of which $\$ 5,000$ has been placed to Reserve Fund, which now amounts to $\$ 74,000$; and the balanee, $\$ 291.90$, has been carried to credit of Comtingent Account, amoniting now to $\$ 1,593.24$.
Our Valuator is constanly engaged in viewing properties, offered as security for loans, and in re-valuing property aliendy held by the Society. It is to bis great care and pridence that we may, in a great measure, attribute the fact that we have not had occasion to write off a single dollar of our investments.
At the last annumb neeting of the sharcholders the number of Directors was reduced from twelve to seven; whose term of office now expires, but who are eligible for re-election. The retiring Directors are D. Macfie, Henry Taylor, Wilina R. Meredilli, Samnel Peters, John, Burnett, Dr. Cattermole, and $W_{m}$. Duflield.
The Mmager and other officers have performed the ir dutes to the satisfaction of the board. D. MACFIE, President: TRANE. B. LESY, Manager.

Your Directors haye devoled their best energies to meet the cmerg ucies thas arisitg, and, taking all circumstances into considerition, have deemed it prodent to follow ant a move conservative policy, teducing the anount. of risks carried, and circumscribing the tiela of the Oompany's operations. Tlese means, vith the strictest possible ceonomy in expetinliture, will, it is trusted, bring aboui : nore satisfictory future.
The statements now submitted show gioss assets of $\$ 947,995,14$ and $\Omega$ surplus, as regards policyholders, of $\$ 851, G 68.87$, the invesiments being ealculated at the actual marliel ralue on the 3lst December, This surplus, combined With the strength of your proprielary, so thoroughly proved in the payment of recent calls, affords ample grounds for jublic confiCence. ${ }^{4}$

Mr. Joln Ostell, said-Gentlemen, in the report which you have just hat presented to you for jour informaton and consideration we have endeaverred to hay before you as succinetIy ats possible, the exact position of the company at this moment. We hate not gone back mot the pist listory of the commang. We have hatd losses the sume as every other insumate cumpany, but we have endeavoured to arrive ut what is a sound basis fur the present position of ue company, not oily for the information of you, the shatehulders, but likewise acemate information to the policytholders in the company. As yout will see by the report, you have, in ruund ligures, $\$ 851,000$ of ussets belonging to your Company which have been braught down to bottom, prices, laring been estimated at their reail market value. We think that you can teel assurd that so fir you have gut a correctIy ascertained value of what the means of your Cumpay nreat the present time. These means- $\$ 851,000,-$ combined ats they are with the cousiderable value of the pruprietorabip of the shareholders, which has been so well and
fally established and proved by the promptness with which the recent calls were puirl, ought to be ample security for any one wishing to do business with the Oompany. Of course, the circumstances of the past year have not been so plensant or agreenble as might be desited. Your Directors have, therefore, devoled themselves to giving particular attention to a system of economy, and. likewise in ieducing the aren of country in whieh they do business. With that in view, a number of agencies both in Canada and the United States havo been closed in order to briag business into better slape. The serious mercantile sulfering that has passed over this continent has nocessarily had a serions eflect upon the insurance business, which always suffers in a greater ratio from that cause than any :other business. It is to be hoped that recumi ng prosperity with our industrial and mercantile branches, there will be increased prosperity for your Company. You have recuived the abstract account; the details of those statements are all lying on the table, buth with regard to the working of the Comprany and the securities that the Company hold. 1 don't know that I can say anything further than simply move the adoption of the report, which I have great pleasure in doing. If any gentleman has any enquiries to make we shall be ghad to give him all the information in our possession.
Mr. Pierre A. Fautenx seconded the motion.
Mr. Jomathan Hodgson-Have yon any idea, sir, what proportion of the last calls still cemains unpaid?
Mr. Ostell-Onc-sixth is the proportion of the last two calls.
Mr. MeCarthy-Regarding the Marine insurance departnent, how dues that stand with respect to losses or benefits to the Comping.
Mr. Ostell-You are aware, gentlemen, that changes were made in the mangement of the marine deparment which became necessary in the interests of the Company; and the new manager who took charge from the lst of February last sear brings forward a statement by which he carries the whole of the outstand$\mathrm{ing} ~ \$ 34,000$, and slows. $\$ 17,000$ to the credit of his management. (Hetr, hear.)

Mr. Wm. U'Brien-Have you taken any steps to collect the whole of this one-six th?
Mr. Ostell-The cuergy of the Board is being exerted to bring in the ontstanding calls. Every step consistent with the condition of business is being taken, and we consider we shall get in a considerable portion of the unpnid bihnce. (Hear, hear.)
Mr. McUarthy-Respecting insurance in the United States, ure you extending it?
Mr. Ostell-Uh, no, sir. I stated urendy we have circumscribed considerably and red.ced the amount; the business is being brought within a closer limit altogether.

Mr. J. B. Qughlan-There is one question I Wuuld like to ask before the motion is put. What is meant by bills receivable shown in the repurt as assets?
Mr. Ostell-Bills receivable are for marine premiums.

Mr. Wood (Toronto)-said that through the lindness of the dir ctors he had been uble to look orer the detitils of the accounts. The income, spea!cing in round numbers, was $\$ 857$,0 on , less cancellation $\$ 190,000$; the marine income, less cancellation, $\$ 250000$; making the gross a little over $\$ 800,000$. The losses during the year had simply been enormous, so far as tire insurance business in Canada was concerued; outside St. Johins they had not been so unfortunate. With respect to the management of the business for the past year, he was satisfied that the Company had bean placed in a very much improved condition by reducing the lare lines of insurance. The businiss ingontreal, he thought, should be largely increased through the resident shareholders, and not through brokers, to whom they hat to pay large commi-sions. These conmisisions were sutficient to almost support the head oflice. The great trouble with the business of the Company in the United States, especially in New York, was the enormous expenses that
were incurred, and the point to which they must louk to fur putit was the reduction , $\mathrm{f}^{2} \mathrm{x}$ fenses there.
Mr. John Ostell-At the present moment the New Yock business shows a profit less the queslion of re-insurnnce.

Mr. T. R. Wood said that so far as the marine busincss was concerned, pursonally he Was not alamed. He was always afraid ff: disaster happening in the Gulf. They miyh insure twelve vessels at one Lime, and the whinh. of them might be in the Gulf together und med with sonie misfortunc. At the same time lue was willing to allow matters to remnin as in present in the mirrine depratment. He w.s convinced they had now got the Camadian business in hand; the next thing for them to do was to get the immeriean business well whiler control. They had much better do half the anount of business and make money than meet with any losses.
Mr. Hodgsun-I understand from what M: Wood says that be would not recommem? carrying on the matine department.

Mr. Wood replied to the effect that pers $11-$ ally lie felt afinid of the character of the busine-s but still recommended its continuance as at - present, but would not favor ibcurring add.tional expenses. He regretted that the business in New York was not more remumerative. Ile felt that the Royal Ganadian was a commerciat company, and shonld have no sympmthy with anybody, and, above all, eschew polities. They were orgranized to make money, and if his own brother was connected with the come pany in my oflicinleapncity, and neglected 10 work for the interests of the whole he wonlet oppose him. In clusing his renarks, the spenker made use of Mr. MeNamee's name.

Mr. MeName desited to know what he lasi spenker was taking about. Was it to him he Was talking or the chatiman of the meeting?
Mr. Wood said he referred to Mr. McNamese because he had taken lim to task.
Mr-MeNamee lad yet to learn that he liat spuken one word before. (Laughter.) 'llue Howery flow of eloquence the gentleman was tseating them to did alarm him a little it they liked ; he showed him a ghost (langhter), anit if he did feel a little aharmed at it that was no reason why he (Mr. Wood) should brancti olf into religion und polities. (Laughter).- This he thought was a meeting of the Rojal Canat dian Iosumance Uompany, but he had not the slightest doubt Mr. Weod had got sliglinly mixed. (Laughter.) Boots and Shots.-A stendy but rednced trade is doing. Retailers are giving their orders With catution, nud manufacturers are not disposed to press sales. Prices are withont material change, but concessions cati be obiained by No. l buyers.
Coal-The fate advance in the price of conl in the United Siates, owing to the doinge of the Goat Gombination, has encommged deaters in this city to raise the price of American coal. Some are also charging higher prices for hower Port, but the lumercolonial Conl Company continucs to deliver conl at former rates. The mice of eoke has also advanced. The atiticipations of severe winter weather later on no doubt contributes to kecping up a deninnd for winter goods. A very fitir number of orders liave been received here during the past week, but from what some travellers are snid to report we infer that a good mayy merchants in Ontario are looking for some special fares being offered by the milway people in Marelt and $A$ pril, as they kindly did last fill, so, should such be the case, large numbers will likely visit our city. Hence the unwillinguess to order from sample, it being as a rute so mitel more satisftetory to pick out one's own stuff from stock. Remittances, some of our friends say, are a tirn better this week than last: others say, no apparent improvement is noticeible.

Finewoon.-The continuanice of mild weather causes a much smaller consumption of firewood than is eitlier pleasa it or profitable to those denlers who Inve a large funntity on hand. Thu Q M: O:CO. Railway is a! st bringir er
about 1,000 cords per week to the two stations at Mile End and Hochelagra, or nearly halt as much as is consumed in the city. Dart of this is green wood, which will not be used till next summer. Nost of this wood is brought out from the St. Jerome branch. A good deal of firewood on the St. Lin branch has not yet been brolght out for want of cars. Owing to the Inte ndvance in the miee of Ameriean coal, there is no likelinood of any decline in the price of firewoorl. Good dry maple is sold at the stati in at $\$ 5.50$ per cord. The fillowing are the prices of firewood per cord, delivered anywhere in the city: Maple, 57 ; birch, 55.50 to $\$ 0.50$ - becel, 55.50 to $\$ 6$; tamarac, $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 4.50$.
