TUBERCULOSIS PREVENTION.

Some articles have appeared in the evening papers in which it is contended that the assumption by the city of any responsibility in connection with the scourge of tuberculosis would seriously injure and even "ruin" the city.

We hold that such a view is extreme and ill-advised. There need be no antagonism of any kind in the various efforts that should and ought to be made from many various points of attack, for the prevention of this deadliest of all our diseases.

It is quite clear that, however satisfactory the work of the National Sanitarium Association has been the ground is very far from being entirely covered. What is proposed to be done most evidently is an extension of present activities.

Before newspaper controversy goes any further, and without going into details, over which already there has been some acrimonious discussion, we consider it would be well for the leading men among the trustees of the association to arrange with the city authorities for the appointment of a committee to go into the whole question and bring in a report with a view to co-operative action between the city and the association.

We believe that every man engaged is only moved by anxiety for the public welfare. We know that the idea of closing up the National Sanitarium is the issue of a hasty judgment, and we know that those most intimately concerned with the conduct of the Sanitarium and with the city health department only desire thorough efficiency and the most comprehensive treatment of the problem.

We suggest, therefore, that the mayor and Mr. W. K. McNaught get together as representing the two bodies, and arrange for the appointment of a joint committee to report, as proposed above, after investigation.

IMPERIAL PENNY POSTAGE.

On May Day, Australia fell into line with the other British states by bringing into force a two-cent postage rate with the mother country and all other parts of the empire, including Egypt.

SIR JAMES THE TAXPAYERS' HOPE.

The Star and the Telegram can never figure out the incidence of taxation from the size of the figures on the assessor's roll. If the people having over \$2000 a year had to contribute the same percentage of their income in taxes that those getting under \$2000 a year would have tax reform inside a twelvemonth.

he can dig up all sorts of excuses and subterfuges to make himself believe that he ought to pay less in proportion than his hired men, who are put down for all they get, and are therefore honest by act of parliament.

There are people who think it would be iniquitous to expect people who have \$200,000 a year to pay as great a percentage of taxes as those who get \$2000 a year.

It has been shown that there is only one way of placing taxation with automatic impartiality and fairness, and they are taking that way in Vancouver.

One of these days our Ontario politicians will wake up to the fact that the men getting less than \$2000 a year have the most votes, and that it will be well to forestall the evil day when taxation may become a burden, and when the government that makes it a burden will be flung into the street.

The Globe thinks there is no use telling these things to Sir James Whitney. We believe he is more amenable to reason in matters of the public and popular benefit requiring progressive action than is the leader of the opposition. Once Sir James is impressed with the need for reform, he will see that it is brought about. Since his residence in Toronto, he has been too busy to see for himself the miserable injustice of the present systems.

TAFT ON EFFECT OF RECIPROCITY

Recognizing the adverse influence on Canadian sentiment following upon President Taft's declaration inferring that reciprocity will tend to withdraw Canada from the imperial band of British states reaching from England round the world to England again, the Dominion Government organs favoring that scheme, are now endeavoring to show that the president misunderstands the situation in the Dominion.

President Taft certainly understands the Canadian situation, otherwise his proposal for unrestricted free trade between the republic and the Dominion would never have been made. Because of his conviction that imperial preference was certain of accomplishment sooner or later and that the movement for closer imperial union was yearly increasing in strength he held, in his own words, that the neighboring nations were at the parting of the ways, and that the opportunity to detach Canada from the empire continentwards, would soon pass for ever.

The president may have been too sanguine when he remarked that "the greatest reason for adopting this agreement is the fact that it is going to unite two countries with kindred people and lying together across a wide continent in a commercial and social union," and he may judge wrongly when he holds that a union of this kind will weaken the strength of Canada's imperial connection.

Elsewhere in this issue of The World will be found the statement of the result of the business of the Sterling Bank of Canada for the year ending April 29 last, to be presented at the annual general meeting of the shareholders convened for Tuesday, May 16. From this it will be seen that the profits for the year, after deducting charges of management and making all customary provisions, totalled \$85,691, a substantial increase over the previous year.

The India Paper, Flexible Binding Format of the New Encyclopaedia Britannica

(11th Edition) The Interesting Story of India Paper

INDIA paper is the name given to a very thin and light but tough and opaque kind of paper used for making books of which it is desirable to reduce the bulk and weight to a minimum without impairing durability or affecting the legibility of the type. The name was originally given in England, about the middle of the 18th century, to a soft absorbent paper imported from China, where it was made by hand. The name probably originated in the prevailing tendency of those times to describe as "Indian" anything that came from the Far East (as, for example, Indian ink). In the whole world there are only nine mills that manufacture it—two in England, two in Germany, two in Italy, one in France, one in Holland, and one in Belgium.

SERMONS AND ROSES IN HONOR OF MOTHER

Quaint Custom Observed in Churches—Rev. Dr. Taylor Assails Ne Temere.

With observance in many of the churches, the old custom of "Mother's Day" was revived yesterday. Introduced into the United States two or three years ago by Miss Adams of New York, the movement has grown to a great extent, and last year when the day was first observed in Canada, a great deal of enthusiasm was worked up over the idea.

In Broadway Tabernacle yesterday morning a large number of the men wore flowers in honor of their parents. The red rose signified a living mother, while those whose mother had passed away, wore a white rose in their button-hole.

Berkeley-street Methodist Church was beautifully decorated with white carnations. The pastor, Rev. R. M. Burns, preached two special sermons in commemoration of the day.

"Honor should be given to one's parents, because it brings a blessing both personally and nationally." In Cooke's Church, Dr. Taylor spoke at both services, in the morning, dwelling on the place of the home in society, and in the evening showing the place of mother in the home.

"While we protest against such interference, we must not go to the opposite extreme, as some of our Presbyterian ministers are doing, by declaring that marriage ought to be a purely civil contract. No sooner do we hand over the making of marriages to the government, than we have over the annulling of marriages, and we will have the most undesirable state of affairs now existing in the State of Nevada."

Dr. R. T. Fraser spoke on "What we owe to Mother," at Bonar Presbyterian Church. The sermon was a masterpiece of the movement—a white carnation.

TREPRENER FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

Sentence Postponed to Try Objections Raised by Prisoner's Counsel.

THREE RIVERS, Que., May 13.—Hermelinda Trepanier was found guilty this morning in the court of King's Bench of the murder of Maurice Plouffe, whose body was found on March 2 last on the road between Three Rivers and St. Laurent de Nicolet. The jury was only 12 minutes in reaching its verdict, and there was no recommendation to mercy.

Sentence was postponed until Wednesday afternoon for the accused stated that there were certain motions to be made by his client along the line of objections raised during the trial.

The only points raised by the defence were that the confession had been obtained and that Plouffe had made insulting overtures to the women of the Trepanier family.

WILL RESIST CALL TO PAY UP

Shareholders of Farmers' Bank Prepare for Legal Battle.

Some, at least, of the shareholders of the ill-fated Farmers' Bank are preparing to fight rather than submit to the double liability call issued a few days ago by G. T. Clarkson, liquidator.

FURTHER TRIBUTE PAID TO DEAD ARCHBISHOP

Special Prayers Offered in Roman Catholic Churches Throughout the City Yesterday.

Impressive references were made at St. Michael's cathedral yesterday at both the morning and evening services to the memory of the late Archbishop McVay.

The prayers of all the congregations were invited by Rev. Father Whelan for the repose of his soul. The congregation of St. Michael's had been very responsive in material things, always giving in good measure anything the late archbishop had asked. It was hoped, therefore, that they would continue their generosity, in spiritual giving. They all felt his loss very greatly, and while they offered prayer to the God of Mercy for him at the same time ask Him, in His goodness, to speed his soul to heaven.

BIG OPIUM SMUGGLING CONSPIRACY DISCLOSED

Montreal the Centre of Distribution of Drug—Sold in New York at Large Price.

MONTREAL, May 14.—Following the arrest of an express messenger in Plattsburg, N.Y., the question of large quantities of opium from China into Canada and thence into the United States has been late from New York and Boston, the authorities here instituted search proceedings and discovered small quantities of the drug in the possession of twelve people here, two of whom are whites and ten Chinese. Letters and cheques of an incriminating character were also found in the possession of the twelve persons, but refuse to divulge their names. They are now awaiting developments.

The discovery of the plot came through the great news noted in the traffic of the drug in New York, which led to an investigation, as the result of which it was ascertained that the late President Diaz's resignation offers less difficulty than it did at first.

The business has proved a lucrative one, as when the drug is purchasable at \$12 per pound, in New York, so great is the demand and so stringent the laws that \$50 a pound is obtainable.

FRANCE'S INTENTIONS

Russia and Germany Agree as to Her Sincerity in Morocco.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 11.—The official Russia says that communications from the French cabinet regarding Morocco have been the subject of an exchange of views between the Russian and German governments. Both governments have agreed as to the complete sincerity of France's intentions in regard to Morocco, and her loyalty adherence to international obligations.

NAVIGATION SEASON IN FULL TIDE ONCE MORE.

The full tide of the navigation season had come was plainly to be seen by a casual stroll along the docks at the bay Saturday afternoon, in a flight on the road. They were much in evidence, the old favorites of the different steamship lines.

MONEY STILL POURS IN.

BRANTFORD, May 14.—Despite the fact that the Y. M. C. A. campaign has closed, contributions to the cause continue to come in, particularly from outside sources. The total to date is \$37,000, of which \$8500 was subscribed on the understanding that it would be given to the Y. M. C. A. in the event of a Y. M. C. A. campaign reaching the \$50,000 mark.

STRIKE IN BERLIN.

BERLIN, Cont. May 11.—Building operations in Berlin were brought to a standstill yesterday owing to the hunger strikers and building laborers' strike. It was then necessary for the contractors and laborers to get together until the differences between the contractors and the laborers were settled.

Its capture does not mean, necessarily, that the control of the state is broken, as the place fell prior to the departure of Francisco Figueroa from the capital, to carry the terms to his brothers.





PROBABLE OUTCOME OF THE TRUST CASES

Corporations on Trial Have Prepared for Either Adverse or Favorable Judgment.

NEW YORK, May 12.—The close approach of the supreme court decisions in the trust cases seems once again to have retarded trading in stock exchanges. It is, however, in the course of the proceedings, which, very properly, keeps its plans and movements to itself. I am of the opinion, however, that one, if not both the trust rulings, will be handed down about noon next Monday.

The supreme court has already so clearly indicated in recent decisions its determination to place nothing but the strictest interpretation on the provisions of the trust laws, that the popular expectation of adverse rulings in the current cases is very natural.

It should be understood that it is not within the province of our supreme court to outline the provisions of the law, but to determine whether or not the provisions of the law are being violated, and after that, to adjust the affairs of the corporations accordingly.

In this respect, however, there will be no special difficulty experienced, as the executives of the Standard Oil Company, and probably not less so of the American Tobacco Company, in the past have shown themselves to be such shrewd and efficient business men that they would not already be considered to promptly take whatever action is necessary to comply with the decisions, whichever way they may go.—Henry Clegg.

Railroad Earnings Less Than Last Year

United States Roads Report Decrease of 2.3 Per Cent. in April.

Gross earnings of all United States railroads reporting for the month of April decreased \$2,242,791, a loss of 2.3 per cent. compared with last year, according to Dun's compilation. While this exhibit cannot be regarded as satisfactory, it is somewhat better than that of the preceding month, the return for March of practically the same roads showing a decrease of 4.8 per cent., as compared with the corresponding period of a year ago.

Moreover, as a similar comparison last year showed an increase over 100 of more than 10 per cent., the volume of current railroad business, considering general business conditions may be fairly regarded as remarkably well maintained.

The decrease in earnings are also notably uniform, nearly all the leading systems now reporting loss, indicating lessened operations in practically every section of the country, but at the same time, while the gains are very insignificant, in hardly any instance where a loss occurred is it of sufficient importance to call for special mention.

In the following table are given the earnings of all United States roads reporting for the full month of April, and the loss as compared with the earnings of the same roads for the corresponding period a year ago; also for the two preceding months, together with the percentage of gain or loss compared with last year.

LONDON, May 12.—It is still believed here that, if your crop outlook continues promising, your business situation is bound to improve. Nevertheless, Europe seems to be showing a little depression, and the feeling at the moment is that increased trade depression on your side might turn the balance downward here.

With us, the expected season of cheap money seems to have arrived. The speculative account on our stock exchange was largely reduced by the recent liquidation, and the position of the market is healthier in proportion. The sharp recovery in console reflects both this and the more hopeful general sentiment. The ease in money tells particularly favorably, because console is at their present price yield over a per cent., which is more than the open money market offers. It is believed that people are more inclined to invest for a short period than they were when money rates seemed to be rising.
