Controversy With Former U.S. Ambassador to Austria Grows Warm-Gives Some Details of Intrigue Which President Has Forgotten.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 10.-Mr. Bellamy Storer, former United States ambassador at Vienna, to-day gave the Associa ated Press the following statement in reply to the letter of President Roose-

velt, made public yesterday; "My letter to the president and his cabinet was written for the cool, deliberate judgment of men who should be kept informed of the true facts in the conduct of the administration. It was not written for the public nor hurriedly given to the press to anticipate public opinion. It stands, when taken in full, as my statement, and should be taken as an entirety, and as such I expect a calm perusal. In itself it is an answer to many things the president has seen fit to say, but as new matter has been put forward by Mr. Roosevelt I feel

compelled to speak.
"There was no need of violent and insulting adjectives to show that the president dislikes me, and did not wish president dislikes me, and did not wish me to remain in the service or to retiral from it in any customary way.

"While the past has shown that few men can differ with either the wishes or the memory of Mr. Roosevelt, without at once becoming a scoundrel and a liar, I must make some comments on what he has given out at the White House

"That anything was ever written to the president by my wife to the effect 'that Mr. Choate and Gen. Porter were not proper persons to be ambassadors' is news to both of us. For both these distinguished men we have had nothing but respect and good-will, personally and officially. It would have been an honor to anyone to take any post ever filled by either of them after they had ceased to occupy it. And the only feeling possible is one of regret that both of them had been lost to the public service since Mr. Roosevelt was re-elected. "That anything was ever written to

THE RAILWAYS AND THE BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS FOR of labor value with the food producers CANADA. Eighth Article.

The board of railway commissioners has now been in existence for a period of three years, and in that time should have been able to accomplish a vast amount of good. A review of the work done by the board plish a vast amount or good. A review of the work done by the will show that they have entirely neglected the most important feature of the duties outlined for them by the minister of railways, viz., supervision of railway tariffs, and that they have never undertaken to dissect or analyze any of the tariffs submitted to them for approval true they have dealt with a few cases of individual complaints True, they have dealt with a few cases of individual cor

and have rectified some of the abuses brought before them, in so far as the individual interests of the complainants were concerned, but, during the whole period of their existence they have only dealt with one general question affecting the country at large, and, in that par-ticular case, the decision banded down by the board of railway commissioners was entirely in favor of the carrying companies and absolutely against the intrests of the people of Canada.

We refer to the decision of the board making demurrage, or car

service, a legal charge, and for the first time in the history of Canadian railways, they are able to produce legal authority for the collec-

It will perhaps surprise the members of the board of rallway ssioners to learn just how the railway companies appreciate their position to-day in this respect, as compared with their situation prior to the legalization of car service charges, and, for the information of the board, we will give a sample circular of instructions to agents, issued by the railways shortly after the board handed down their judgment. The wording of this circular is given from memory, but, in effect it is as follows: "While there may in the past have been some doubt as to our legal right to collect demurrage, the board of railway commissioners have now placed the matter beyond dispute and have made car service a legal charge. You are, therefore, expected to see that the rules laid down by the board of railway commissioners are strictly observed, and that every dollar of revenue which we can properly assess for demurrage is collected from the public." Interesting, is it not, Mr. Chairman and members of the board

railway commissioners? You should feel proud of the way in which the carrying companies are using the power you have given them to extort additional revenue from the people of Canada. If the board of railway commissioners, or any of the officials of the Canadian railways, will answer satisfactorily one question and justify the judgment rendered on the subject of demurrage, we will have nothing further to say on that subject, but until such time as this question is answered, we have no hesitation in saying that the decision handed down by the board of railway commissioners on the subject of car service charges was absolutely and entirely in favor of

the carrying companies and prejudicial to the interests of the people.

The question is: "If it is right and proper to make the public pay for delays to rolling stock, is it not equally fair to make the railway companies compensate the people for delays to traffic en route? The government, in all its operations, acts upon the law of equivalents, and the people are entitled to an equivalent for the tolls exacted by the carrying companies in the shape of car service charges, and that equivalent should take the form of "reciprocal demurrage," which is the only fair solution of this vexed question.

The failure of the board of railway commissioners to fulfil the exectations of the government in the matter of regulating transportation tolls, is due to the fact that the members of the board have not the knowledge of railway questions necessary to enable them to deal intelligently with the issues brought before them. It is true, the government has appointed a traffic expert to act in an advisory capaity, but what is the use of a traffic expert giving an opinion to a body of men who are not thoroly conversant with the questions at issue, and who may, or may not, act upon that opinion as the fancy seizes them? If the board of railway commissioners is to be made useful to the country at large, there should be a thoro and complete reorganization. Instead of having traffic experts in an advisory capacity, the place for such men is on the board itself, where they can use the knowledge they possess and give judgment in accordance with the facts, instead of simply giving an opinion which may be ignored by the powers that be. The board of railway commissioners is too important a factor in our national life to be the sport of any political party, and appointments should be made entirely on the basis of without reference to whether the individuals in question have

been of service to any political party.

In view of the fact that the present board of railway commis sioners have failed to perform the duties entrusted to them and have entirely neglected the most important portion of their work, viz., the regulation of railway rates, is it not rather absurd to keep on enlarging the scope of their work? It is time for the people of Canada to assert themselves and insist upon a proper adjustment of

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RIVER FINDS NEW BED PROPERTY LOSS MILLIONS

Southern Pacific Will Be Forced to Build 200 Miles of New Main Line.

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Yuma, Arizona, Dec. 10.-Once more the entire Colorado River is flowing into the Salton Sink and Imperial and Coachella Valleys are again menaced by

The main line of the Southern Pacific again must be moved to higher ground unless the water can be brought under control. A thousand persons in Salton Basin must lose their homes, including a quarter of a million acres of farming lands. The Southern Pacific must build 200 miles of new main line. and irrigation about Yuma must be abandoned. The government laguna dam irrigation project may become an in possibility. At a conservative estimate more than \$25,000,000 of present values hinging upon the success of the effort to close the break are at stake.

What is known as the Hind dam was thrown across the new channel, and an earth dike was built up parallel to the river for ten miles, mainly in Mexico. On the Arizona side of the river is the government dike. Four days ago it found its way thru both dikes, flooding large areas. This was thought to be serious, but was not considered critical until Saturday night, when the water developed a distinct channel and yesterday morning disclosed the fact that the entire river had found its way around the Hind dam into the channel from which it had just been barred. The dam itself is uninjured. It is believed here that the Southern Pacific immediately will build forty miles of road around the Salton Sea about 50 feet above the present grade.





COBALT --- Mining Shares Become Inactive on Declining Market --- COBALT

CLAIM BY HON. MR. BECK

Declares Consumer Would Pay Cost of Scheme Whereas the Bill Clearly Places the Liability Upon General Taxpayer.

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Hon. Adam Beck at his recent London meeting, told his audience distinctly that only the power consumer would be called upon to assume any liability under his power scheme, and that the general taxpayer would be exempt. The wording unmistakably places the liability upon the general taxpayer as the following sections

Referring to the estimates and plans on which contracts for power with municipalities are based, clause 6 of the bill states as follows:

Provided that neither the commission nor the Province of On-tario shall incur any liability to any municipal corporation or company by reason of any error or omission in any such plans, specifications or estimates.

14. The expenditure of the com

mission upon any works, under-taken under the provisions of this act, shall be repayable to the commission by the municipal corporations entering into con-tracts with the commission as

hereinbefore authorized.

15. In addition to the price per horse-power payable by any municipal corporation under the terms of a contract entered into with the commission (which price shall include an allowance for generating, transforming and transmission losses), every municipal corporation entering into such a contract shall appually mission its pro-

According to the published reports of the meeting Mr. Beck says: "The position of the taxpayer was simply this: No debentures were issued, nowas not impaired, because the government's credit brought the power to the door of the municipalities."

The power, being brought to the door of the municipality, must be distributed by the municipality as part of the Beck scheme. In Toronto this means about \$300,000,000 for distributing is station, wiring, etc., which money can only be raised by the issuing of debentures under a money bylaw of the city and the pledging of the credit of the muni-

Mr. Beck is further quoted as say- Here ing "the taxpayer, who did not wish the power, did not pay one dollar. The consumer paid the shot."

The estimate upon which the commission fixes its price for delivered power is a bare estimate of cost, according to its engineers. Should that cost be exspecifications or estimates or by accident or business mishap, or by unexpected increases in cost of material (such as copper), thus causing an increase in the necessary price, then, any contract be-tween the commission and the municipality to the contrary notwithstanding, the municipality must bear the loss according to proviso of section 6 of the Beck act above quoted. Contracts made by the municipality with consumers would in that event fail, or otherwise the loss must fall on the taxpayers as a whole. Therefore, all taxpayers, and not consumers only, incur liability under the scheme.

If the municipality contracts for 15,000 horse-power with the
