Madrid, Feb. 28 .- The Correspondencia Militar, the official organ of the Span-Ish army, says: "The prevailing impression is that war between Spain and the United States will break out in April." It then goes on to quote Martinez Campos, former Captain-General of

"I never entertained a doubt that if the rebellion were not suppressed before 1898 war with the United States would become an accomplished fact. "Unhappily, my prophecy will be fulfilled.

"But I have the consolation of having done all in my power to avert it, and therefore I do not regret the blame which has been heaped upon me. "All that is now possible is that we should all unite to meet the danger that threatens the country."

The Cardinal Archbishop of Valladolid has published a pastoral letter blaming America for the prolongation of the Cuban war. His Eminence says: "The hypocritical friendship of the United States fosters the rebellion and wastes Spain's resources in order the better to attack her when weakened." He exhorts all true Spaniards to "unite in defending the rights and honor of the nation." The letter has caused widespread comment.







In the Leeds Company case not only directors but auditors were compelled to make restitution. The Master added that he did not know how far the law was applicable to the present case.

RACIAL GEOGRAPHY OF EUROPE. Interesting Lecture Last Evening Before

the Biological Section of the Canadian Institute. In the biological section of the Canadian Institute last night an extremely interesting paper on "The Racial Geography o

In the biological section of the Canadiat Institute last night an extremely interest ing paper on "The Hacial Geography of Europe" was read by Mr. G. K. Powell to an interested number or members.

Mr. Powell's paper was reany a digest of a series of articles written by William Z. Ripley, Pn.D., of Columbia university, on his researches on the laces of Europe, which have been published in The Popular Science Montaly.

Mr. Powell showed that nationality has nothing to do with race, and that community of race; the conquering race usually adops the language does not mean community of race; the conquering race usually adops the language of the conquered race, as the Normans in France, and again the Normans in England. As a test of race, language is not to be depended upon, nelther is color. Anthropologists depend chiefly upon the structure of the head usually, although there are exceptions, the shape of the fact corresponds with the shape of the head. The lecturer then went into an examination of the different nations of Europe with respect to the shape of head, their color—that is, the "blondness or brunetness," and to the stature, bringing out many interesting and curious facts. Mr. Powell, in discussing the differences of the peoples of the different races of Europe, said there were three distinct races in Europe; the Teutonic race, characterized by a long head, long face, very light hair, blue eyes, tail stature and narrow nose; the Alpine race, in the centre of Europe, characterized in its purity by a round head, broad face, brown hair, hazel grey eyes, medium stature and rather broad nose; this race is also found in the east of Europe on the plains; in the South, the Mediterranean race, characterized by a long head like the first, long face, dark brown or black hair, dark eyes, short stature and broad nose.



DISTINGUISHED DIVINE. ketch of the Eventful and Brilliant Career

of Prof. Franklin Howard This eminent preacher, professor and inperance advocate who is to preach the niversary sermons in the College-street anniversary sermons in the College-street Baptist Ohurch next Sunday was born in Virginia in 1847. He entered the Confederate army when about 18 years of age. Soon after the close of the war he became a student in Columbian University, Washington, D. C., where he was graduated in 1868. He pursued theological studies in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary (then at Greenville, S.C., now in Louisville, Ky.,), and in the Crozer Theological Seminary, near Philadelphia (1869-1872). After traveling in Europe, Egypt and Palestine he studied for a year in the University of Leipzig.

In 1877 he succeeded Dr. Richard Fuller, one of the most eloquent and influential preachers of his time, as pastor of the Eutaw-place Baptist Church, Baltimore In 1883 he became pastor of the Strong-place Baptist Church, Brooklyn.

In 1887 he was appointed co-professor of systematic theology (along with Dr. J. P. Boyce), in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Two years later he succeeded Dr. Boyce in his chair in the seminary, and in his administration of the finances of the institution. During the last few years (especially since the death of Drs. Boyce and Booadus) he has come to be accepted as one of the trusted leaders of the Southern Baptists.







The advance extended to 1 and 2 per cent. in the general list, with exceptionally larger gains in Metropolitan Street, Railway, Manhattan, People's Gas, Sugar and C. & N.W. The rise in Sugar was accompanied by rumors that an extra dividend would soon be declared, London houses were moderate sellers, but there was extensive covering. After delivery hour prices shaded off fractionally. Messrs. McIntyre and Wardwell have received the following despatch from New There was a sharp recovery in the stock. New York, Feb. 28.—The Evening Post's financial cable from London says: The stock markets here were heavy and dull to day, due not so much to the later political news as to the liquidation of accounts by defaulting clients at the settlement and to other forced closing of accounts. A sharp fall in Spanish stocks was also an adverse feature. Americans opened dull and lifeless. There is little business in them here, recent buyers awaiting developments in the United States, New York absorbed all the stock offered and the market consequently closed steady to firm.
