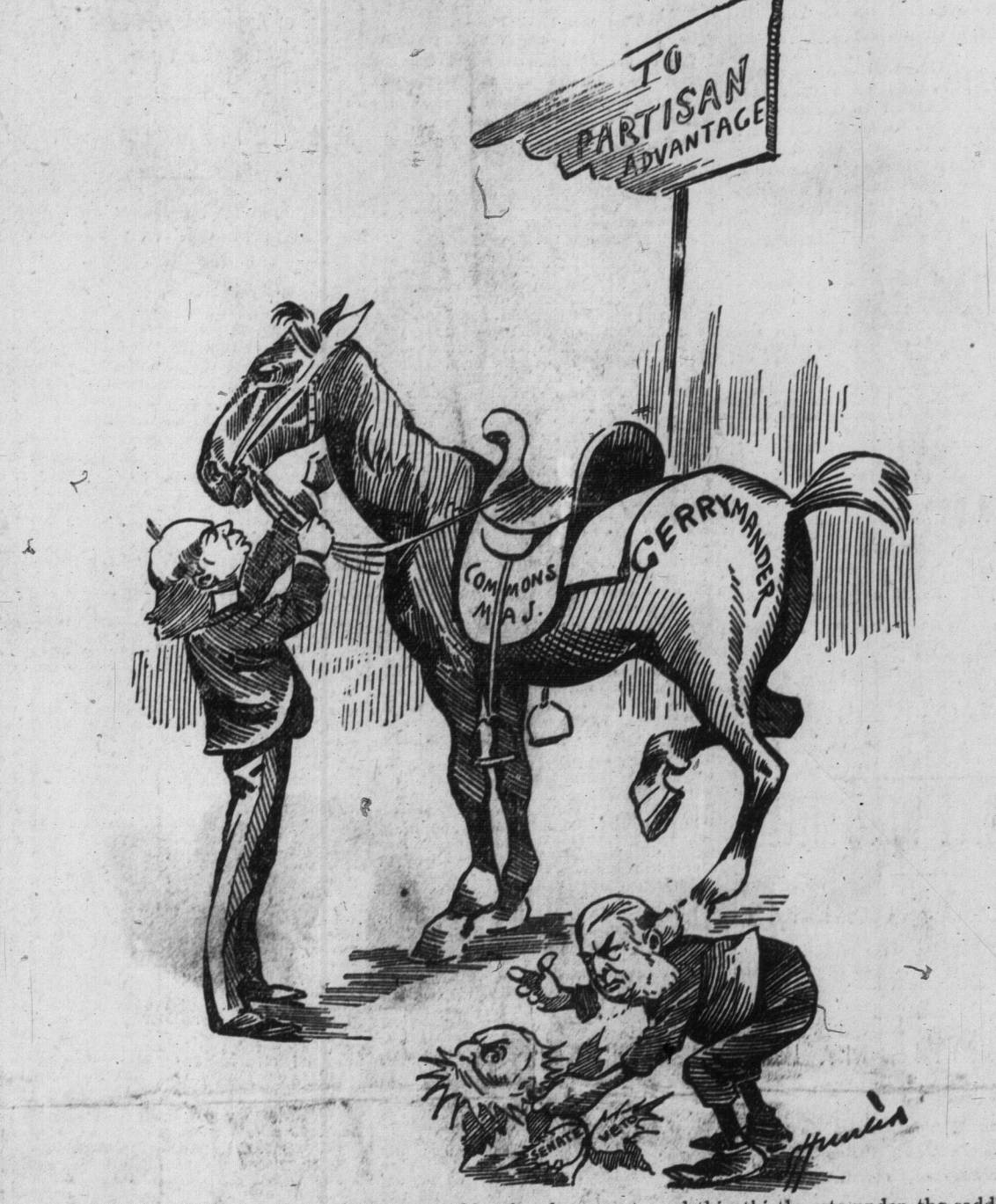

SIR WILFRID SAYS HE BELIEVES IT IS

Liberal Leader Tells the House How They Disagreed on the Boundary Question.

But He Prefers a Compromise to Arbitration-How Washington Views the Situation-Canada Is Blamed For All.

with which they were charged. The House had been called to a most inconvenient session, and his hon. friend knew the sacrifice it was to members on both sides to spend the summer away from home and business, even in so charming a place as the City of Ottawa. "He knows," said Sir Charles, "that they will find the City of Ottawa, even on the Opposition side of the House, a little warmer than most people care for in June and July." [Laughter.] The bill was not to come into force anyway until a dissolution, and the necessity for a dissolution was certainly not pressing. However, he would not expect the leader of the House to make a statement in reply at once, as it was a matter on which he must naturally confer with his colleagues.

Sir Charles Asks for Vindication. In conclusion, Sir Charles observed that he was sure the leader of the Government would vindicate him from the charge in the New York Sun that the motion proposed by the United States would have been accepted by the British Commissioners, but for the fear of the hostility of the Conservative party, because, when Sir Wilfrid consulted him in reference to the motion proposed, he had given him assurance of hearty support in the attitude the Government would receive his suggestion in the spirit in which it was offered, and in the consideration to which it was clearly entitled.

What Sir Wilfrid Said. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Speaker, we on the side of the House may be pardoned, I am sure, for some feeling of satisfaction at the language just spoken by my hon. friend Sir Charles Tupper. The wisdom of the course which I took in the month of February, when, instead of the Anglo-American Commission, has been fully vindicated, I was allowed to refer to a past debate, I might call the attention of the House to the fact that in the debate on the address, my hon. friend took a very different position, and stated that the moment we could not come to an agreement with our fellow-commissioners representing the United States, we should have broken negotiations and come home. We thought that the course was not the course which should be followed under the circumstances.

FOUR SCORE AND TEN.

Many happy returns of the day to Hon. Sir W. P. Howland, who today enters upon the last of his four score and ten years. Born May 29, 1831, he has lived the greater part of an unusually long life in Toronto and York County, where his business career commenced in 1850. A member of the Queen's Privy Council for nearly 40 years, and one of the three surviving members of the Colonial Conference of 1896-97 which formulated the terms of the Confederation compact (the other two being the Hon. William McDougall and Sir Hector Langevin), Sir William retired twenty-six years ago from a long, active and distinguished public career, in which he had rendered signal service to his country.

MELANCHOLY FATE OF MR. JOHN JOHNSON, WHO WAS DRIVING INTO WEST LORNE.

On seeing the train the father grabbed the lines from his youngest son and caused a delay. In an instant the train struck the wagon. The horses got free, but the occupants were thrown several rods. GALICIAN MURDERERS DEAD

Radcliffe Took Their Lives According to Law on Saturday at Winnipeg.

BOTH DISPLAYED GOOD NERVE.

Gaszark Admitted His Guilt, But Csuby Died Maintaining His Innocence. Winnipeg, May 28.-(Special.)-On Saturday morning the two Galicians, Gaszark and Csuby, were hanged in Winnipeg jail yard. Unexpectedly, both displayed great nerve at the end and walked to the scaffold, the fall falling at 8 o'clock. Radcliffe had a good job, death being practically instantaneous. Csuby professed his innocence to the last, even when the black cap was drawn over his head. He blamed Gaszark for the murder. The latter confessed repeatedly having committed the deed. Radcliffe hangs an Indian in British Columbia early in June, for which point he took immediate departure.

INSURANCE INVESTMENTS.
The solvency of Canadian life insurance companies is based upon the supposition that their assets will yield on investment an average of 4 1/2 per cent. interest. This, at least, is the theory, founded upon the act of Parliament of 1877, by which the rate of interest for the valuation of policy liabilities was placed at 4 1/2 per cent. Since that time the rate of interest has been gradually falling, until to-day not more than 3 1/2 per cent. can be safely relied upon. Indeed, the Equitable Life Insurance Society recently canvassed the opinion of the leading financiers of the United States, and the consensus of opinion was that 3 per cent. was likely to be the future ruling rate of interest for high-class securities, such as life insurance companies invest in. Several of the leading insurance companies of the United States are adopting or have already adopted a 3 per cent. basis for all new business. There is a bill now before Parliament reducing the rate of interest for the valuation of policy liabilities to 3 1/2 per cent. The Government measure, having been introduced by the Minister of Finance, The bill fixes the rate of interest at 3 1/2 per cent. As far as new contracts are concerned, the insurance companies have practically agreed to accept without question the proposed 3 1/2 per cent. basis. As to existing insurance contracts, the majority of the companies seem to be in favor of a gradual lowering of the present standard rate to meet the gradual fall in interest earnings. Some think a reduction from 4 1/2 to 4 per cent. for old business is sufficient, while others contend that a 3 1/2 per cent. basis should be the ultimate goal, and that sufficient time should be given to all the companies to reach that standard without embarrassment.

PORT MAILLARD IN THE FIELD.
The latest claimant for Government consideration in connection with the transportation problem of Port Maitland. This port is situated 15 miles west of Port Colborne, at the junction of the Grand River with Lake Erie. It is said the depth of water at the entrance to the harbor is 22 feet, and no accumulations of any kind ever lessen this depth. For five miles up the Grand River there is a depth of 25 feet, and the river has an average width of 300 yards. It is claimed that the largest sized freighters can enter the harbor and transfer their cargoes to canal-sized craft without the expenditure of a dollar for excavation or protection of harbor. Port Colborne, it is stated, would have to be enlarged, protected and deepened before it would be suitable for the transfer of cargoes to canal-sized vessels. All that is apparently necessary for Port Maitland to start out as a rival to Buffalo is the construction of a necessary number of locks. As soon as the 14-foot system of canals is completed, the transportation problem will assume a new complexion. Before the new system can be used to advantage it will be necessary to have a convenient and safe harbor where can be effected the transfer of cargoes to and from the vessels of the upper lakes to the 14-foot vessels of the St. Lawrence system. The fact that Port Maitland is 15 miles from the entrance to the canal is not a serious handicap against it as such a transfer depot. Whether this depot will be at Port Colborne, Port Maitland or some other place is a matter of uncertainty at the present moment. The question will soon be settled on its merits. If Port Maitland has all the advantages it claims, and if its drawbacks are less serious than the disadvantages of Port Colborne, it stands a good chance of becoming the chief port. It is interesting to look at the list of claimants for the transfer station between the 20-foot and 14-foot systems. The claimants are these: Parry Sound, Midland, Penetanguishene, Owen Sound, Goderich, Southampton, Collingwood, Port Maitland, Port Colborne. May the best win.

A BOOM IN ALUMINUM.
