Complete Cure Very Rare.

Dr. Curschmann pointed out that a complete cure was in a sense extremely rare, but the cessation of the destructive process, a mounting to a cure was not infrequent in modern treatment. He estimated the cures as reaching 20 per cent. An important thing, he said, was to deal with the disease in the early stages. After a certain point, when the secondary infection set in, there was no reasonable hope of a cure. He thought it doubtful whether the climate exercised any great influence on the disease, though pure, fresh air and not too sudden changes in the weather were desirable where a cure was possible. Dr. Breiger delivered a lecture on Dr. Koch's tuberculosis, both the old preparations and the later ones, and showed that the pessimistic reaction against the specific treatment which followed the enthusiasm created by Koch's discoveries after the first failure was unjustified. Tuberculin was undoubtedly a strong healing power, if the course of treatment was persisted in, even in cases where the secondary infection had already set in. He said that in any case it was invaluable as a means of diagnosis, discovering the tunerculosis even in the earliest stages.
