FAVOR TRANSFER OF I.C.R. TO A C.P.R. MANAGEMENT

Halifax Board of Trade Unanimously Pass a Resolution to This Effect-Urge the Necessity of a Fast Steamship

Service on the Government. Halifax, Dec. 5.—The Halifax Board of Trade, at a special meeting, held

this afternoon, unanimously passed a resolution favoring the transfer of the management of the Intercolonial to the Canadian Pacific Railway. The board also passed the following:

Therefore, resolved, that this board communicate with the several Boards of Trade thruout the Dominion, and ask if they would unite in a memorial to the Federal government favoring the transfer of the management of the Intercolonial Railway to the Canadian Pacific Company, provided such arrangements could be made with that company as would retain government ownership of the road, promote local traffic and lead to the extensive development of Canada in export and import business, thru the ports of Quebec, St. John. Halifax and Sydney. John, Halifax and Sydney.

A strong resolution was also passed urging upon the Dominion governs ment the necessity of establishing a fast steamship service. The resolution calls for a line of steamers equal to any running out of the port of New York.



New Hay-Pauncefote Treaty re Construction of Isthmian Canal Sent to Senate.

CONSISTS OF FIVE ARTICLES IN ALL

Full Text Setting Forth the Agree ment as to the Maintenance of Neutrality.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The new Hay-Pauncefote treaty, providing for the construction of a canal across the Isthmus of Panama, which was sent to the Senate yesterday, is as follows:

"The United States of America, and His Majesty Edward the VII. of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, and Emperor of India, being desirous to facilitate the construction of a shi canal to connect the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans, by whatever route may b considered expedient, and to that end to remove any objection which may arise our of the convention of the 19th of April, 1850, commonly called the Clayton-Buwer treaty, to the construction of such canal under the auspices of the government of the United States, without impairing the general principle of neutralization, established in article 8, of that convention, have for that purpose appointed as there

plenipotentiaries:
"The President of the United States John Hay, Secretary of State of the United States, John Hay, Secretary of State of the United States of America, and His Majesty, Edward VII. of the United kingdom of Great Britain and reland, and of the British Dominious beyond the Seas, King, and Emperor of India, the Right Hon. Lord Pauncefote, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., His Majesty's ambussador extraordinary and jesty's ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentlary to the United States; who plenipotentiary to the United States; who, having communicated to each other their full powers, which were found to be in due and proper form, have agreed upon the following articles:

Article 1. The high contracting parties agree that the present treaty shall supersede the aftrementioned convention or the 19th April. 1850.

Article II. It is agreed that the cana may be constructed under the auspices of the government of the United States, either the government of the United States, that directly at its own cost or by gift or loan of money to individuals or corporations, or thru subscription to or purchase of stock or shares, and that subject to

the provisions of the present treaty the said government shall have and enjoy aft the rights incident to such construction, as well as the exclusive right of providing for the regulation and management of the canal.

Article III. The United States adopts as the basis of the neutralization of such ship canal the following rules, substantially as embodied in the convention of Constantinople, signed the 28th October, 1888, for the free navigation of the Suez Canal, that is to say:

1. The canal shall be free and open to the vessels of commerce and of war of attentions, observing these rules on terms of entire equality so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation, or its citizens or subjects, in respect of the conditions or charges of traffic or otherwise. Such conditions and charges of traffic shall be just and equitable.

2. The canal shall never be blockaded, nor shall any right of war be exercised nor any act of hostility be committed within it. The United States, however, shall be at liberty to maintain such military police along the canal as may be necessary to protect it against lawlessness and disorder.

3. Since his recent return from Europe Mr.

Governor of Illinois Calls on His People to Send Supplies to Reconcentrados.

ACCOUNT OF AN EYE-WITNESS

Condition of Non-Combatants Said to Be Reflected in Abnormally High Death Rate.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—The Record-Herald says: Governor Yates issued a proclamation yesterday calling upon the people of Illinois to contribute money, m food and clothes for the use of non-combatants confined in South African prisons The committee named to receive the contributions consists of Judge Edward F. Dunne, Mayor Carter, H. Harrison and Peter Van Vlissingen, treasurer of the Chicago branch of the American Transvaal League.

This is the first time that official re cognition has been take in the United States of the destitute and helpless con dition of thousands of Boer women and children confined in British prisons. The blighting conditions and high death rate prevailing in the reconcentration camps were depicted recently to Governor Yates by members of the Transvaal League in this city, and it was then that he promised

Text of Proclamation.

"Whereas, several thousand citizens of the State of Illinois have called my atten-tion to the destitute and helpless condi-tion of the women, children and other mon-combatants now confined in the military camps of South Africa, and have re quested me to make known by public proclamation the deplorable situation of these defenseless outcasts, and to call for subscriptions of money, clothes, medicine and food to be used for the amelioration of their condition, and

Whereas the enormous death rate pr valing in these camps indicates that the unfortunate prisoners must be suffering a want of the necessaries of life.

"Now, therefore, I, Richard Yates, Governor of the State of Illinois, do hereby in ernor of the State of Illinois, do hereby in the name of humanity call upon all the charitably disposed and humane citizens of this State to contribute money, medicine, food and clothes for the use of the sick and needy prisoners in the South African camps. And I hereby nominate Judge Edward F. Dunne, Mayor Carler H.
